### **Executive Summary**

This report informs members of an application to vary a Premises Licence for premises situated at 157 Moorgate Road, Kippax, Leeds, LS25 7ET trading as Sainsburys Supermarkets Ltd.

A Premises Licence Variation application has been received to extend the opening hours of the Premises 06:00 to 00:00 everyday with the Supply of Alcohol during the said hours and to add the provision of Late Night Refreshment everyday 23:00 to 00:00.

The application is to also remove all embedded restrictions referred to in the Premises Licence under the heading Embedded Restrictions in respect of Justices's off Licence attached at Appendix A and to add to Annex 2 the conditions noted in section P of the application form attached at Appendix C

## Purpose of this Report

- 1.1 To advise Members of an application made under section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003 ("the Act") to vary a Premises Licence in respect of the above mentioned premises.
- 1.2 Members are required to consider this application due to the receipt to representations.

# 2.0 History of Premises

An application for the conversion and variation of the former Licenses into a Premises Licence was submitted in June 2005 by Jacksons Stores Limited under the Licensing Act 2003. Representations were received from West Yorkshire Police and Members of the Public to the conversion and variation. The variation application was subsequently withdrawn and a Premise Licence was granted for the existing hours.

A Licence transfer was recieved on the 12th December 2007 to change the Licence holder from Jackson Stores Limited to Sainsburys Supermarkets Limited

- The Moorgate Road area is primarily a residential area
- There is already a problem with litter from the commercial premises and this blows around into garden areas. Any extension of hours will increase this problem for residents.
- Visitors by car to the above premises already create congestion through inconsiderate and illegal parking by parking on pavements, especially at peak hours. Access to and from the residential area is very often difficult at the junction of Moorgate Road and Leeds Road and drivers are forced into the centre of the road when negotiating a 'blind' corner into the estate. ## 5.0 Matters Relevant to the Application

- 5.1 Members of the Licensing Sub Committee must make decisions with a view to promoting the licensing objectives which are:
  - The prevention of crime and disorder
  - Public safety
  - The prevention of public nuisance
  - The protection of children from harm
- In the making of their decision Members are obliged to have regard to the national guidance and the council's licensing policy. Members will be aware they must also have regard to the relevant representations made and evidence they hear.
- 5.3 Members should note that these premises fall within a Cumulative Impact Area. The Cumulative Impact Policy for this area reads as follows:

It is the council's policy, on receipt of relevant representations, to refuse applications in Area 2 for premises which are predominantly 'alcohol-led'. It is also the council's policy to refuse applications to materially extend the opening hours of any licensed premise within the area.

In addition it is also the council's policy on receipt of relevant representations to refuse applications for new premises seeking a licence to provide hot food between 11.00 pm and 5.00 am where the food is purchased to take away from the premises as opposed to premises where the food is to be consumed on the premises and whilst patrons are seated at tables provided for that purpose.

# 6.0 Options available to members

- The licensing sub-committee must take such of the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
  - Grant the variation application as requested.
  - Grant the variation application whilst modifying the conditions of the licence.
  - Reject the whole or part of the variation application.
- Members of the Licensing sub committee are asked to note that they may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must actually be <u>necessary</u> in order to promote the licensing objectives.



# Conditions consistent with the operating schedule relating to the licensing objectives

#### General - All four licensing objectives

- 8. All new staff receive induction training in respect of:
  - a. their store and the services it delivers;
  - b. their store opening stores

- C. Health and Safety/Legal issues, in particular the sale of products outside sell by dates and the age restricted products;
- d. Company policy and procedures, including staff dress, equal opportunities, hygiene, discipline/grievance and security;
- e. merchandising, including shelf filing and price labeling.
- 9. The Company operates, in respect of all age restricted products, a due dilligence system. In relation to alcohol products, it is designed to ensure that no salesof alcohol occur in breach of the Licensing Laws. This system involves:

#### 10. Staff Training

- a. All staff induction training carried out by a member of the Company's training team. The induction training includes specific training on a retailers legal responsibilities arising in respect of age restricted products.
- b. Insofar as induction training relates to retailers legal responsibilities arising in respect of the sale of alcohol, the induction training involves a written test in which the staff member must obtain a 100% mark to pass.
- c. The induction training is fully documented and the staff member is required to sign to certify that they have received induction training.

#### 11. Staff In-Store training

Subsequent to completion of induction training and prior to undertaking work in store, each new staff member received further in-store training on store specific procedures, including:

- i. Till operation, in particular the function of the age restricted till prompt.
- ii. Refusal of sale procedures and completion of the store refusals book.
- iii. Procedures in relation to the stores `ready to trade¿ book, which is the stores daily operation manual (in particular, the requirement to log security incidents such as shoplifting).

All staff receive updating training on a retailers responsibilities arising in respect of the sale of alcohol. This is a written test of the staff members knowledge of their responsibilities. It is periodically undertaken (in any event, a minimum of once every six months). The updating training is again fully documented and again all staff members have to sign to certify that the tests were carried out and properly validated. Any staff member failing the test is subject to further retraining.

#### 12. **Technology**

Upon an age restricted product (e.g. alcohol) being scanned at a checkout, the till immediately identifies that an age restricted product is the subject of the proposed sale and produces appropriate age prompt to the operator. In respect of alcohol, the prompt is 'Is the customer aged over 18'. The till prompt requires the operator to key in 'Y' (for yes) and 'N' (for no) to answer the prompt question. The till will not complete a sale unless and until the operator has pressed the appropriate answer key.

13. A CCTV system is installed in all the Company's stores and will be operated in accordance with the Humberside Police Codes of Practice attached to the application (save that due to the digital nature of the CCTV system copies of recordings can only be kept for 10 days instead of the 28 referred to in the Codes of Practice). The responsible person is the Designated Premise Supervisor.

#### 14. Refusals Log

Each store is required to maintain a refusals log in which refusals of sales of age restricted products (including alcohol) to those suspected of being under age, are logged.

- 15. The refusals log is subject to periodic inspection by store management to ensure that it is being properly maintained by staff members.
- 16. The refusals books is subject to periodic inspection by area managers who are required, upon periodic inspection of a store, to complete a store visit report form confirming (amongst other things) that the refusals log is being maintained by staff members and is being inspected by store management.

#### 17. Proof of age scheme

The company stores operate what is known as the 'under 21 rule' whereby there is a standing instruction to staff members that a customer who appears to be below the age of 21 is required to be challenged to produce proof of age, in the form of photo driving licence, passport or the 'Citizen Card'.

#### 18. Signage

All appropriate signage explaining the law relating to the sale of age restricted products (including alcohol) is prominently displayed or near the checkout area in all the Company's stores. Similar signage explaining the Company's 'under 21 rules' is also prominently displayed in the same area.

#### 19. the Licensing Audit

Each store may be subject, on an ad hoc basis, to a periodic licensing audit involving an internal audit by the Area Manager of the application of the Company's due diligence system, in particular that all its elements are being maintained in accordance with the Company standing instructions.

#### The prevention of crime and disorder

- The Company operates CCTV coverage, as described in the 'General' section above.
- The company employs its own security personnel. Further, where security is a particular issue (for example, where shoplifting is prevalent), the Company has contract supplied security guards to patrol the store.
- 22. The Company operates an 'under 21 rule' proof of age scheme.

#### **Public safety**

- 23. The Company undertakes all appropriate Health and Safety and Fire risk assessments.
- 24. All emergency exits are identified by appropriate signage and the Company's Evacuation Policy in the event of fire is set out on signage by emergency exits.

#### The prevention of public nuisance

- 25. Stores 'ready to trade' book requires store to have an external litter bin available to the public and requires external vicinity of the store to be inspected daily and swept as required. The inspections and required sweeping is required in the relevant section of the daily ready to trade book.
- 26. The Company endeavours to ensure that all deliveries are made between 07:00 hours and 18:00 hours.
- 27. External lighting at the Company stores is limited to the down lighting of fascias, windows and door entrances so as to indicate that the store is open. All such lights are on an automatic timer and switch off 5 minutes after store closing time.

28. Customers who appear to be drunk will not (in accordance with the law) be served alcohol and will not be allowed to remain in the store.

## The protection of children from harm

29. The Company does not restrict its range of alcohol products. The Company relies upon its due diligence system to prevent sales of alcohol to children.

I am writing to strongly object to the proposals submitted by Sainsbury's Supermarkets Limited to serve alcohol for an extended period at 2 Ash Road.

I am objecting in my capacity as a ward member for several reasons. Firstly, this is a predominantly residential area with housing opposite, behind, adjacent and I suspect there is some housing directly above the premises. Later operation will have a significant impact on these residents.

We already know the correlation between groups of drunk young people being in an area late at night and the effect this has on the crime figures. It is why we have the Cumulative Impact Policy in central Headingley. I am writing on behalf of ARARA (The Ash Road Area Residents' Association) to object to the above application to extend the opening hours of Sainsbury's 2 Ash Road, Headingley, Leeds, LS6 3JF.

We would argue that the provision of late night alcohol sales in the Headingley City Centre cumulative impact policy area constitutes a risk of crime and disorder and public nuisance.

A number of our members live in the immediate vicinity of this shop and we are all subject to footfall by shop customers. If the shop was to remain open for the sale of alcohol after 11 pm it would attract people, probably already drunk, who wished to become more so. There is already a large amount of noise nuisance and litter arising from the high levels of on and off alcohol sales in the area. It has been argued I believe that only those who live very close to the site are entitled to object but I would like to point out that alcohol outlets have an impact on a much wider area than their immediate proximity. The Ash Road area adjoins the Headingley centre but the physical evidence of late night takeaways, discarded bottles and cans, food and vomit can be seen over the whole of our area and the sound of over enthusiastic drinkers is very noticeable.

Disorder from people walking along the streets after 11pm and any time up to 5 o'clock in the morning is also a problem in the whole area. These people, once drunk, have no awareness of the amount of noise they make and the disturbance that this causes to others in this area. The cumulative impact policy was established in recognition of the fact that it is very difficult to pinpoint one pub or one take away food premises as the cause of particular act of nuisance or disorder. Taking all these factors into consideration ARARA would request that you turn down the application to extend the opening hours of the Sainsbury's store on Ash Road.



I am writing on behalf of the Wood lane Neighbourhood Association to oppose outright the application by Sainsbury's, 2 Ash Road, for variation of a licence for the sale of alcohol every day from 06.00 - 00.00 and for the provision of late night refreshment every day from 23.00 - 00.00.

The application should be refused on the grounds that it contravenes the renewed terms of the Cumulative Impact Policy, agreed by Leeds City Council, related to "the potential impact of a significant number of licensed premises concentrated in one area" and that the onus lies with the applicant to demonstrate that "the application will not add to the cumulative impact being experienced" in Central Headingley.

#### Crime and Disorder

There is substantial evidence of the crime and disorder that abounds throughout Headingley as a result of alcohol consumption. The more unpleasant elements are vomiting and urinating in public places and private gardens. The destructive elements include criminal damage to street furniture, signs, window boxes, planters, flower beds and parked cars. The variation of this licence must, inevitably, add to the alcohol-fuelled anti-social behaviour that occurs extremely frequently in Headingley, and especially in the vicinity of North Lane and Bennett Road, in very close proximity to Ash Road.

The latest example of crime and disorder, of which we are aware, was the shifting across the pavement of a very heavy planter that is located on the corner of Cross Chapel Street and North Lane - within 10 metres of the business that wishes to make alcohol readily accessible for 18 hours in every day. There was consequent damage to the planter, which has had to be repaired. Given that the planter probably weighs more than 100 kilograms, this vandalism by a group of able-bodied people was, without question, fuelled by excess alcohol. Nobody in control of their senses would even consider trying to move such a substantial and heavy object. The incident occurred during the weekend of 23/24 October 2010, almost certainly at night because this is a very busy location throughout all daytime hours. It has been recorded by West Yorkshire Police as anti-social behaviour and criminal damage (Crime number 13100469156).

As a previous example of anti-social behaviour and criminal damage, between 14 and 18 February, 2009, two large and heavy planters, located on the pavement in North Lane, were smashed (Pictures are attached). One of them had been moved some yards and rammed against a lamp post. The planters had been in place for only one week (placed on 8 February 2009). The cost for the loss of the planters and contents, to "Headingley in Bloom", was approximately £100.

There is also an on-going need to replace plants in the window boxes at the Community Centre on North Lane, within 50 metres of the Sainsbury's premises. On one occasion, a window box was ripped out and stolen. A replacement for it was bought by "Headingley in Bloom", at a cost of £30 (25 May 2009). More recently (5 July 2010), two window boxes were removed from the ledges on the Bennett Road side of the building. Although damaged, one of these was retrieved from outside "Doveners Funeral Services" in North Lane (see attached photograph). The other window box was mysteriously returned a month after the incident. It is always at night that such vandalism occurs, or plants are removed and sometimes strewn on the pavement. Bottles and glasses are also regularly deposited in the window boxes.

Also, the number of empty bottles and cans that are regularly strewn on the "Rose Garden" make it very clear that there is extensive drinking in this public location, despite this part of North Lane being a "Designated Public Place", with its restriction on drinking alcohol. The Rose Garden is adjacent to the Sainsbury's shop.

These criminal acts cause a "loss of enjoyment" for residents of Headingley and inhibit the improvement of the appearance of the district. The evidence is that when people have been given the opportunity to drink alcohol to excess over extended periods they do not share these values.

#### Public Nuisance

The sale of refreshment for consumption off the premises already poses an extremely unpleasant burden of litter on the streets of Headingley. It is unacceptable to add significantly to this problem by granting permission for further sales to be made at a time of night when the potential purchasers have had a considerable and extended opportunity to drink sufficient alcohol to suppress any acknowledgement of the law related to the dropping of litter in public places or any latent regard for public decency.



- 9. The Company operates, in respect of all age restricted products, a due dilligence system. In relation to alcohol products, it is designed to ensure that no salesof alcohol occur in breach of the Licensing Laws. This system involves:

#### 10. Staff Training

- a. All staff induction training carried out by a member of the Company's training team. The induction training includes specific training on a retailers legal responsibilities arising in respect of age restricted products.
- b. Insofar as induction training relates to retailers legal responsibilities arising in respect of the sale of alcohol, the induction training involves a written test in which the staff member must obtain a 100% mark to pass.
- c. The induction training is fully documented and the staff member is required to sign to certify that they have received induction training.

#### 11. Staff In-Store training

Subsequent to completion of induction training and prior to undertaking work in store, each new staff member received further in-store training on store specific procedures, including:

- i. Till operation, in particular the function of the age restricted till prompt.
- ii. Refusal of sale procedures and completion of the store refusals book.
- iii. Procedures in relation to the stores `ready to trade¿ book, which is the stores daily operation manual (in particular, the requirement to log security incidents such as shoplifting).

All staff receive updating training on a retailers responsibilities arising in respect of the sale of alcohol. This is a written test of the staff members knowledge of their responsibilities. It is periodically undertaken (in any event, a minimum of once every six months). The updating training is again fully documented and again all staff members have to si9gn to certify that the tests were carried out and properly validated. Any staff member failing the test is subject to further retraining.

#### 12. **Technology**

Upon an age restricted product (e.g. alcohol) being scanned at a checkout, the till immediately identifies that an age restricted product is the subject of the proposed sale and produces appropriate age prompt to the operator. In respect of alcohol, the prompt is 'Is the customer aged over 18'. The till prompt requires the operator to key in 'Y' (for yes) and 'N' (for no) to answer the prompt question. The till will not complete a sale unless and until the operator has pressed the appropriate answer key.

13. A CCTV system is installed in all the Company's stores and will be operated in accordance with the Humberside Police Codes of Practice attached to the application (save that due to the digital nature of the CCTV system copies of recordings can only be kept for 10 days instead of the 28 referred to in the Codes of Practice). The responsible person is the Designated Premise Supervisor.

#### 14. Refusals Log

Each store is required to maintain a refusals log in which refusals of sales of age restricted products (including alcohol) to those suspected of being under age, are logged.

- 15. The refusals log is subject to periodic inspection by store management to ensure that it is being properly maintained by staff members.
- 16. The refusals books is subject to periodic inspection by area managers who are required, upon periodic inspection of a store, to complete a store visit report form confirming (amongst other things) that the refusals log is being maintained by staff members and is being inspected by store management.

#### 17. Proof of age scheme

The company stores operate what is known as the 'under 21 rule' whereby there is a standing instruction to staff members that a customer who appears to be below the age of 21 is required to be challenged to produce proof of age, in the form of photo driving licence, passport or the 'Citizen Card'.

#### 18. Signage

All appropriate signage explaining the law relating to the sale of age restricted products (including alcohol) is prominently displayed or near the checkout area in all the Company's stores. Similar signage explaining the Company's 'under 21 rules' is also prominently displayed in the same area.

#### 19. the Licensing Audit

Each store may be subject, on an ad hoc basis, to a periodic licensing audit involving an internal audit by the Area Manager of the application of the Company's due diligence system, in particular that all its elements are being maintained in accordance with the Company standing instructions.

#### The prevention of crime and disorder

- 20. The Company operates CCTV coverage, as described in the 'General' section above.
- 21. The company employs its own security personnel. Further, where security is a particular issue (for example, where shoplifting is prevalent), the Company has contract supplied security guards to patrol the store.
- 22. The Company operates an 'under 21 rule' proof of age scheme.

#### **Public safety**

- 23. The Company undertakes all appropriate Health and Safety and Fire risk assessments.
- 24. All emergency exits are identified by appropriate signage and the Company's Evacuation Policy in the event of fire is set out on signage by emergency exits.

#### The prevention of public nuisance

- 25. Stores 'ready to trade' book requires store to have an external litter bin available to the public and requires external vicinity of the store to be inspected daily and swept as required. The inspections and required sweeping is required in the relevant section of the daily ready to trade book.
- 26. The Company endeavours to ensure that all deliveries are made between 07:00 hours and 18:00 hours.
- 27. External lighting at the Company stores is limited to the down lighting of fascias, windows and door entrances so as to indicate that the store is open. All such lights are on an automatic timer and switch off 5 minutes after store closing time.

28. Customers who appear to be drunk will not (in accordance with the law) be served alcohol and will not be allowed to remain in the store.

#### The protection of children from harm

29. The Company does not restrict its range of alcohol products. The Company relies upon its due diligence system to prevent sales of alcohol to children.

#### **Executive Summary**





I am writing concerning the entertainment license being applied for by the managers of the cricket ground, on the grounds of public nuisance.

We welcome the use of the stadium for the purposes for which it was intended, i.e. sporting events. These are infrequent enough to be perfectly acceptable, but only if and when any amplified sound levels are contained within the stadium.

Persistent complaints to the ground about the level of amplified noise from public address systems are persistently ignored. The noise level is frequently well above what would be acceptable from any other neighbour. What gives the stadium the right to trample over the rights of neighbours? If this license is granted as currently framed, this could become a constant and daily danger.

The management claim that they are only intending to use the license 2 or 3 times per year.

This being the case, grant a license to be used for only three days per year on condition that the amplified sound levels are contained within the ground, that notice is given directly to all households within half a mile of the ground at least one month in advance of any event, and that a closing time of 10.00pm is set for any event.


The Broomfields area is still largely owner occupied, with many children and older people in residence. Encourage the maintenance of a balanced community here by restraining the noise excesses of the stadium. Limit this license to three days only per year.



- 1) The noise that would inevitably result from a concert of any type reassurances about the type of concert to be put on do not diminish the impact of this. I am aware that it has been stated by the cricket club that music will only be played a few times a year, but also aware that once permission is granted it is likely to be used.



I write to object to the above application on behalf of our many members who live and work within the vicinity of these premises.

The reasons you should reject this application are on the grounds of

- -Prevention of crime and disorder
- -Prevention of public nuisance
- -Protection of children from harm

The people of Headingley gathered together as a community throughout 2004 and 2005 to meet, discuss and ultimately publish our plans for a balanced and sustainable future for Headingley. This involved businesses as well as residents. We recognized the dangers inherent in the growth of the night-time economy and in the growth of student housing. We saw the need for more public amenity, open spaces and for affordable family housing. We certainly did not see any need for more booze or fast food outlets...nor for any increase in the permitted hours nor for the granting of new Licences to any of the existing establishments.

The Stadium, as a sports venue, has always been largely supported by the community - even though we endure considerable parking and traffic management chaos as a result of the sporting fixtures. In recent years, noise nuisance has been added to our problems due to bigger, rowdier and more alcohol influenced crowds. This, together with a marked increase in very loud, pre-match entertainment, has substantially increased the problems created for our community.

If they are permitted to use the Stadium as an Entertainment Venue, these problems will increase to an unacceptable level and will, in all likelihood, lead to a further increase in the night-time activity within Headingley's Town Centre because audiences will visit our many existing pubs and hot-food take-aways for pre and post event eating and drinking.

The Applicant has made assurances that they will only utilise the Licence a few times each year...and that the events they intend to promote will be (patronisingly) old-folks-music like Neil Diamond and Paul McCartney. There is no way in which these assurances could be enforced and, in our experience, it would only be a matter of time before the Applicant applied for the removal of any restrictions to the Licence.

The nature and frequency of the proposed Stadium Events is not an issue. Put simply, Headingley is too heavilly populated, has too little parking and too little appropriate public transport to be able to absorb a Music and Events Stadium in its midst. Even if the noise generated by the Events were contained within a closed auditorium, Headingley would buckle under the pressures of the arrival and departure of the audiences.

Please do not assume that the community's tiredness, with having to restate its position to the Planning Dept and the Licensing Section with every new commercial application, represents any lessening of our resolve to prevent these proposals...which are in violation of the Cumulative Impact Policy and the Headingley Renaissance Strategy.

Could I also please request that the Licensing Sub Committee stop giving succour to the legal protestation of applicants who seek to ignore the views of residents who are "outside the vacinity". Our community surrounds the Town Centre and the Stadium. We enter "the vicinity" every time we leave our homes. It is ludicrous to assert that our views are at any time irrelayent.

#### Re PREM/02905 Yorkshire County Cricket ground

I write as Chair of the Turnways & Laurel Bank Residents' Association to enter a representation in connection with application PREM/02905.

We would argue that we qualify as 'interested parties' because our street is very close to the stadium and we are affected in many ways by everything which takes place at the stadium. We are an organisation which represents a group of such interested parties.

Our representation relates to the licensing objectives in a number of ways:

### 1. The prevention of public nuisance:

- (a) We are opposed to the expansion of activities at the stadium which give rise to increased noise nuisance. In recent years there has been a noticeable increase in the noise level generated by sporting events at the stadium, which is quite that enough without the additional burden of noisy events for which the premises were not intended when they were originally created, and for which is exceedingly unlikely permission would be given if the facilities were being created now.
- (b) We note that the applicants have not ticked the boxes in the Risk Assessment form GN-H for OE94 (noise management strategy in conformity with the Noise Council standards) and OE99 (vibration). In fact there is no mention anywhere in the application papers of any intention to follow the Noise Council recommendations.
- (c) The application opens up the possibility of events taking place on any day of the year and on any day of the week between 1400 and 2300. No limit is specified on the number of such occasions per year (which would have an effect on the maximum noise levels deemed acceptable). The termination time of 2300hrs for the event is in breach of Planning Application 26/185/95/OT Condition 21 which specifies that any events shall cease by 2230 with the grounds cleared of people by 2300.
- (d) Planning Application 26/185/95/OT Condition 14 sets a limit on the noise level emitted by plant and activities of 60dBA at the nearest boundary of all the properties surrounding the stadium. The application presents no evidence that any such level would be attainable. We are aware that a noise report relating to the stadium has been produced and is lodged with the Licensing department, but, because it does not form a part of the application, we have been denied access to it. We would argue most strongly that it is in the public interest to reveal all such evidence before any decision is taken on the application.

- (e) The application gives the numbers of people expected as up to 14,999. Any such event would be in breach of Planning Application 26/185/95/OT Condition 22 which specifies that all events at the site which are not sports-related shall be limited in attendance to not more than 2000 people.
- (f) The application covers live music, recorded music and dancing. This gives maximum scope for holding a wide range of noisy events generating the kind of social frictions which led to the removal of music festivals from urban Leeds to the rural periphery. We object strongly to setting up a similar source of nuisance in a central area like Headingley.
- (g) We foresee increased light pollution and nuisance, about which the application is silent. Planning Application 26/185/95/OT Condition 24 places a requirement on the stadium to get approval for lighting. Planning Application 26/019/02 Condition 4 specifies that no light fitting shall be installed in such a way that the source of light is directly visible from nearby residential properties. Since the development of night cricket matches this condition has already been regularly breached by the stadium.

#### 2 All four licensing objectives:

Application is made for the supply of alcohol from 1400 to 2300. This would represent a major expansion of mass drinking in our neighbourhood, well beyond what we experience at present. Any event with a crowd generates litter, broken bottles, street rowdiness, pools of vomit and on occasions urination, particularly noticeable in the ginnel between the stadium and our street. We are aware that the stadium falls outside the CIP area, but we are firmly of the view that it should be included.

To sum up, we are opposed to the granting of the premises licenses as it would create the possibility of events which would materially degrade the quality of life for the families and other residents who live in the vicinity of the stadium

I am writing to object to the above application on behalf of the residents living in Headingley Crescent which is within the immediate vicinity of these premises.

The reasons we reject this application are on the grounds of:

- -Prevention of crime and disorder
- -Prevention of public nuisance
- -Protection of children from harm

The Stadium, as a sports venue, has been tolerated by the residents in Headingley Crescent - even though we have to endure considerable parking and traffic management chaos as a result of the sporting fixtures. In recent years, littering and noise nuisance has been added to our problems due to bigger, rowdier and more alcohol influenced crowds. This, together with a marked increase in very loud, prematch entertainment, has substantially increased the problems created for the residents who live here.

If it is permitted for the Stadium be used as an Entertainment Venue, this will undoubtedly lead to a further increase in the night-time activity within and around Headingley Crescent and Headingley's town centre, because audiences will visit the many existing pubs and hot-food take-aways for pre and post event eating and drinking. These problems will increase to a totally unacceptable level (which is already the case regarding anti-social behaviour, vandalism (of cars, fences, property - graffiti), noise nuisance, littering, traffic chaos and parking problems).

The Applicant has made assurances that they will only utilise the Licence a few times each year...and that the events they intend to promote will be (patronisingly) old-folks-music like Neil Diamond and Paul McCartney. There is no way in which these assurances could be enforced and, in my experience, it would only be a matter of time before the Applicant applied for the removal of any restrictions to the Licence.

The nature and frequency of the proposed Stadium Events is not the only issue. Put simply, Headingley is already too heavily populated, has too little parking generally and too few Residents Only Parking areas (Headingley Crescent still does not have this necessary parking restriction), and has too little appropriate public transport to be able to absorb a Music and Events Stadium in its midst. Even if the noise generated by the Events were contained within a closed auditorium, Headingley would buckle under the pressures of the arrival and departure of the audiences. Grid-locked roads on match days already cause chaos for residents who have to make their plans around the activities of the Stadium.

Please do not assume that the community's tiredness - with having to constantly restate its position to the Planning Dept and the Licensing Section with every new commercial application - represents any lessening of our resolve to prevent these proposals...which are in violation of the Cumulative Impact Policy and the Headingley Renaissance Strategy.

Throughout 2004 and 2005, the people of Headingley gathered together as a community to meet, discuss and ultimately publish plans for a balanced and sustainable future for Headingley. This involved businesses as well as residents. We recognized the dangers inherent in the growth of the night-time economy and in the growth of student housing. We saw the need for more public amenity, open spaces and for more affordable family housing. We certainly did not see any need for more booze or fast food outlets...nor for any increase in the permitted hours...nor for the granting of new Licences to any of the existing establishments.

Headingley Carnegie Cricket Ground has applied for a premises license. The new Licensing Act (2003) provides for policies to be implemented for areas affected by 'sheer numbers of people' using alcohol outlets and 'the effect of this on crime and disorder, public nuisance, public safety and protection of children'.

In addition, the Leeds Statement of Licensing Policy 2005-8 proposes a 'cumulative impact' policy which is relevant to the issue of the concentration of licensed premises in Central Headingley and the A660 corridor generally.

I am writing as an interested party, being a local resident with a young family, to **register my objection** to the proposed granting of a premises license to the Headingley Carnegie Cricket Ground. Licensing authorities set out in their licensing policies how they will promote the licensing objectives by regulating and controlling the activities that require a license. The number, type and hours of operation of licensed premises are all important elements to be regulated together with action to mitigate their impact on local residents.

I am concerned that the applicant will be unable to adequately address concerns arising from the four Licensing Objectives as follows:

### The prevention of crime and disorder

Currently, the grounds are primary used for rugby and cricket matches. The Yorkshire County Cricket Club must be more responsive to the issues of parking control and general traffic disruption generated for both local residents and fans before and after such games. The junction of Kirkstall Lane, North Lane and Cardigan Road is a notorious bottleneck, frequently in a state of gridlock owing to the huge volume of people departing the grounds after the matches.

Our home is next to this junction and I often see many car drivers either jump the traffic lights in their desperate need to move ten metres in twenty minutes along a queue of traffic or they manoeuvre down one way roads in the wrong direction.

This is a recognised black spot yet where are the police? The presence of even two or three constables would help to ease the flow of traffic and bring some order to what is at best a chaotic and haphazard arrangement. However, police resources are generally underfunded and overstretched with priority given to the policing of drinking venues around the immediate commercial area and the problem of excessive drink fuelled antisocial behaviour.

Local residents are already concerned about intimidating and aggressive behaviour, including the taking over of public space; alcohol and drug related problems; relatively high rates of graffiti, vandalism, car crime and burglaries, and a distinct and disturbing contrast in perceived levels of personal safety between day and night-time.

Opening the stadium to late night concerts as well as licensing yet another site for the consumption of alcohol (every day between 14.00 and 23.00) will significantly impact upon the quality of life for local residents by putting further pressure upon local services and increase the possibility of crime and disorder in a mainly residential area.

### **Public Safety:**

The effect of thousands of people leaving the premises under the influence of alcohol will surely add to the problems that we experience in Headingley at the moment. Following the end of a match, traffic in Headingley comes to a standstill. Pressure on parking in the area often means that cars park in and around the stadium. On many occasions only one lane of Cardigan Road is 'coned off'. Sometimes the road is not 'coned off' at all. This leaves the road very narrow for passing vehicles making it almost impossible for broad vehicles such as ambulances and busses to pass by easily. Both traffic parking and movement are not being managed effectively. Granting the stadium permission to hold further events must be refused until they can show that they can manage their current events better. Granting of any license must incorporate a provision for a significant increase in the number of police, stewards, security staff and traffic wardens.

#### **Public Nuisance**

Headingley's distinctiveness is being eroded through the growth of inappropriate developments and the cumulative environmental degradation related to a failure to sensitively plan for, and manage, change. In considering this licensing objective the issues concerning noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter must be considered.

#### Noise Nuisance

We will be affected by noise nuisance. Allowing music concert, either day or night, will disturb all local residents. Currently only noise from the stadium can be heard during the day and then it is crowd noise and the occasional loud speaker announcement. Any concert will be a change to the current arrangements and will disturb my family. There can be no mitigating circumstances on the side of the stadium. They cannot physically restrict the noise from a music concert. There are no measures they can take to stop the sound reaching residents. It will be a major disturbance affecting the whole community. The residents must not experience a further deterioration in the quality of sleep and their ability to enjoy peace and quiet. Any license must limit the late time of such activities and ensure that the grounds are closed and made secure no later than 22.00 week days and 21.00 Saturday. Sunday closed.

Mini cabs create major disturbances by blasting horns, playing music and leaving engines idling whilst waiting for customers. A proposal to station a taxi rank by the stadium will inevitably draw people further out of the 'pubs and clubs' and further into a residential area. This has implications for crime and disorder and public safety. Outside areas surrounding the Carnegie Pavilion may become areas for extended smoking and drinking causing a further nuisance to local residents.

All late night activities within the stadiums must be restricted if they are not to impinge upon the ability of local residents to continue to enjoy their peace and quiet. This must also include any start time in the morning and must not be earlier than 8.00 week days and Saturday. Sunday closed.

#### Litter Nuisance

The late collection and disposal of refuse including glass bottles will disturb residents. There is already too much rubbish on and beside the pavements with a fair share coming from food takeaways and the sports events themselves. Discarded bottles, unfinished and half empty drink glasses and takeaway food boxes litter the exits to the stadium on match days. An 'overspill' of rubbish coupled with a general graffiti and fly-posting problem creates a poor image of neglect and abandonment. Rubbish often lies strewn about the entrances of the sports ground on most match playing days. Public bins around the grounds are limited in number and size; often to be found overfilled and spilling their contents for people to the kick into residents' gardens. In particular, rubbish strewn about the entrances of the sports grounds from matches that have been played on Friday is not collected till Monday morning. Our services seem unable to cope with the demands placed upon them at present.

Any scheme for the disposal of rubbish, glass bottles etc must not impact upon the ability of local resident to enjoy their peace and quiet within reasonable hours. All late night activities within the stadiums must be restricted.

#### Food Odours

I am concerned that granting an alcohol license is simply the first step to applying for restaurant planning consent. Any such activity is unacceptable to local residents

Flood and Background Light Disturbance Light pollution is a very important issue for many families in this area. All stadium ground lighting must be shielded and/or directed away from residential areas. There is no reason as to why any lighting should be left on after 23.00.

#### Protection of Children from Harm

My major concern is that the immediate area around the stadium forms part of an 'alcohol free zone' yet I see people coming out of the stadium holding half finished plastic cups of alcohol. There seems to be no enforcement of this policy. Groups of mostly young men walk about openly drinking with many local residents feeling intimidated. There is also a problem of people urinating in gardens before and after stadium games. We have a duty of care to protect our families from physical and psychological harm which is not helped by drunken idiots staggering through both our public and private spaces.

Our public services seem unable to adequately cope with the demands placed upon them by the present sports ground usage. I respectfully request that if the applicant is unable to adequately address the issues raised in this letter the Premises License be refused.



Our community has been proud of the cricket and rugby grounds in Headingley, even happily tolerating the inconvenience of the influx of traffic and parking in our streets. However, in recent years another nuisance has been added to our problems due to bigger, rowdier and more alcohol influenced crowds. The atmosphere has changed and can be intimidating.

If it is permitted to use the Stadium as an Entertainment Venue, these problems will increase with pre- and post-entertainment crowds in our neighbourhood. The 'Otley Run' of pubs (of which half are in Headingley) will have more customers, the take-away and fast food outlets will be used more and residents, particularly the elderly and those with children, will feel even more alienated and intimidated about going into Headingley centre. Litter and unsocial behaviour is already a problem in Headingley and would be further exacerbated by large events such as those proposed for the Stadium.

If this licence is to be granted, the licence MUST include a limit of three events in any 12 month period, and a total time limit of, for example, 6 hours at any one time as opposed to the 9 hours specified in the application.

How the noise levels should be monitored and enforced at each event should also be specified as Leeds City Council is notorious for not enforcing conditions of licensing.

The Becketts Park residents are a part of the community of Headingley and our views should be considered. We urge you to reject this application.



The activities for the licensing of which Yorkshire County Cricket has applied will have a severe impact on the property I own and its use by myself and my partner, as well as on the whole community living in the "Cardigan Triangle", a set of streets bounded by St Michael's Lane and Spring Road in the north, the railway line to the southwest and the line originally drawn by the wall of Leeds Zoological and Botanical Gardens (see Headingley and Hyde Park Neighbourhood Design Statement, September 2010, p. 34).

With its north boundary, the triangle borders at the Cricket Grounds. Noise from any activity at the Cricket Ground travels easily through two unused patches of land off St Michael's Lane to Back Broomfield Crescent and is then amplified on its way through the rows of terraced houses down to the joining of Newport Road and Chapel Lane. In the garden of our property, which is situated at the corner of Broomfield Place and Newport Road, we can understand every word of the text of music played at the Cricket Ground, as the organisers of any event didn't find it necessary to provide for any noise isolation. Also, any activity in the evenings is accompanied by lights, which shine throughout the Cardigan Triangle. Finally, activities of the Cricket Ground draw large numbers of participants, who - in the absence of any public transport system suitable for a city with nearly one million inhabitants in Leeds - frequently use their cars. As the Cricket Ground has not provided for over ground or underground parking facilities on their property, these cars park in residential streets. Many users of these cars bring food and drink which they consume in their cars and smoke their cigarettes before and after the events, adding the stubs to the leftovers of their take away food. The Cricket Grounds are not in a habit of employing staff to clear up the streets after their events, leaving that work to the residents. While visitors of cricket events are often peaceful, visitors of dancing and music events must be expected to be unruly at least in parts, especially after having been served unrestricted quantities of alcohol.

Just to imagine having to endure this for 8 hours every single day of the year makes me shiver. It will not only devalue the use of my property, but also change the neighbourhood profoundly. This neighbourhood is presently still a nice mix of young people, who in their majority study at one of Leeds' universities, retired citizens, middle aged people such as me and adults living with children. Actually, the number of children in the neighbourhood has been growing recently. Given the retired people and the children, there will be a sizeable proportion of the population used to sleep during some of the time between 2 and 10 pm. Performance of noise in the Cricket Grounds will make this impossible. A number of people also have working spaces for writing in their houses (I am one of those). This activity would also be severely disturbed by daily emission of music for 8 hours. Thus, the neighbourhood is bound to change, and will increasingly attract people whose noise emission blends out any of the noise emitted from the Cricket Grounds on a daily basis. This means, that there will be even more noise altogether. Anyone who wishes to actually use their property for activities not emitting noise between 2 and 10 pm will be best advised to move away.

Representatives of Yorkshire County Cricket have assured members of my residents' association that they only wish to run music events for 3 times a year. They have stressed the fact that they really need to raise some revenue, having lost the competition for some cricket events. If this is the case, they should have applied for a much more limited licence. The application to change the Cricket Grounds into a noise and light emitting property for 8 hours every day of the year must be rejected. Any other licence should be restricted in several ways.

First, any licence to undertake all the activities listed above should only be granted for four days in any year for a maximum between 2 and 10 pm, with at least 6 weeks between single events. Also, the licensee should be obliged to provide for measures of noise control, and to consult with neighbouring communities as to how best to place amplifiers in order to minimise noise pollution outside the grounds. The licensee should also be obliged to keep light emission to a minimum, and to switch all lights off at 22:30 hours the very latest. Finally, the licensee or the Council should undertake to clean adjacent streets after each event, and to take measures to reduce the use of on street parking for their events. In addition, residents around the Cricket Ground should receive advance notice of noise emitting events in good time, so that they can plan ahead in order to reduce their personal exposure to noise, light and rubbish.

I am writing to object to the application by Headingley Stadium to have an entertainment license and a sale of alcohol license for events -

On grounds of public nuisance -

1. Noise. I live very close the the stadium and can hear the noise coming from all of its activities. Such noise is already audible in my house, even with the windows closed. I regret the escalation of noise from the stadium in recent years. There is now far more amplified noise to accompany a match than previously. The volume is set unnecessarily loud. As a community association (The Cardigan Triangle Community Association) we have approached the stadium to ask for the volume to be reduced to reasonable levels, but they have not done so.

2. Public urination. This disgusting habit has become commonplace on the pavements and streets in my community. People actually urinate in full public view. Such behaviour is linked to alcohol, since it is consumed in large quantities and it acts as a disinhibitor.

On grounds of public safety -

There is a serious traffic problem arising from all of the stadium's activities. Already Headingley becomes nothing more than a car park for the stadium, during matches. The congestion is a danger to pedestrians, cyclists and other traffic.

On grounds of crime and disorder -

Standards of public disorder in Headingley are already shockingly low, due to the effects of alcohol. The last thing that Headingley needs is more large crowds of people coming to take part in music events, festivals, etc. Such events are always accompanied by the sale of large quantities of alcohol.

On grounds of protecting children from harm - This is a family area with many children of all ages. The traffic attendant on all events at the stadium increases the danger of children being run over in their own neighbourhood.

We, in the Cardigan Triangle, were shocked in 2006 when a friendly community-sized stadium began to transform itself into a monster stadium. This process of becoming too big for its setting has continued with the construction of the new cricket stand. The ground is situated in a family, residential neighbourhood. The stadium has shown that it cannot be trusted to act in a respectful manner to its neighbours (see increase in noise, above). Further expansion of stadium activities can only result in erosion of the sustainable community of this area. Such erosion of the conditions for a stable, livable community has always resulted in an increase in public nuisance, crime and disorder, and a deterioration in public safety. The damaging effects of these trends are plain to see in Headingley today.

I urge the panel to turn down this application. I suggest that vexatious reapplications are pre-empted (at a saving to the tax payer); by making it clear to the stadium that their business will continue to be sporting events and nothing else.

The Stadium is right in the centre of a built-up, residential area. With one of the densest populations of any part of Leeds. The Stadium is also an lepen stadium, it, any noise generated there floats freely through the whole of Headingley, bouncing off terraces and walls. If there is any doubt about the way noise travels, I urge you to come and sit in our garden when a cricket match or a rugby match is being played. Any music from either venue is extremely disturbing. Also, because of the design of the two pitches, the lighting affects all the houses in the area as well. After a match, we do not need any lights in our bedroom as the match lights keep us brightly lit! Also, and again, any visit to the area will show you, there is woefully inadequate parking in the area for match traffic. A drive down Chapel Lane will show how difficult it is to move during a large match.

My main objections are:

- 1. Protection of children from harm. Look at the traffic that will be generated. The Cardigan Triangle is an area with a large number of children, many of whom like to play out. Traffic generated by matches will cause real problems for the families in the area.
- 2. Prevention of public nuisance. Headingley has a very large number of alcohol outlets shops, pubs and restaurants. The Neighbourhood Design Statement makes the point that we cannot handle any further alcohol sales. At weekends, there are gangs of people in fancy dress staggering around the Headingley centre, broken glass, men urinating openly, noise, litter and vomit. Please do not take my word for this I urge you to visit Headingley one weekend evening to see for yourself. We cannot cope with any more venues selling alcohol. We are regularly woken at night at weekends by people loudly crashing down back Chapel Lane, knocking over bins, shouting to each other, m aking a nuisance of themselves on the way back from bars in Headingley centre. A venue like the stadium, 'spilling' large numbers of enebriated people into the Headingley evening would be dreadful for us.
- 3. Pevention of crime and disorder. See above. Alcohol sales fuel public nuisance. Alcohol is also resonsible for the people who bash in our wing mirrors on cars in the street, thrown rubbish bins arounds, and cause fights.

For all the above reasons, I do hope you will turn down this application to further blight our lives. If the Stadium were in an industrial area, or out of town, I am sure there would be little problem with their plans. However, they are in a residential area, with a large number of year-round residents (not just students). Please think about us.



I write to object to the above application as someone who lives on Ash Road a few hundred yards from the premises and who every so often is disturbed by the noise of sporting events taking place there, together with live and recorded entertainment broadcast over the loud-speakers. The noise bounces straight out of the stadium and can at times be intolerable for those of us who live on the top of the "bowl" at the edge of the Ash Road allotments.

The reason I suggest your committee should reject this application is on the grounds of

Prevention of public nuisance.

The Stadium, as a sports venue, has always enjoyed my support - even though we endure considerable parking and traffic chaos as a result of sporting fixtures. Noise nuisance is usually tolerable during the day though it can be aggravating, but it does seem to be getting worse with rowdier and more alcohol influenced crowds. The increase in very loud, pre-match entertainment has recently become a more severe problem and should not be encouraged nor any opportunity given for it to get worse. This is the nub of my objection.

The noise is already at times intolerable for me and my wife. There should be no question of a permit being granted which will (1) allow the noise to get worse and (2) extend the hours when we may suffer this public nuisance.

Noise from events at the stadium should absolutely be prevented after 19.00 hours. The idea that we might be faced with this nuisance "every day" is preposterous.

If the Stadium is licensed as an Entertainment Venue, the noise and other problems will increase to an unacceptable level and will, in all likelihood, lead to a further increase in the night-time activity within Headingley's Town Centre. Audiences will visit our many existing pubs and hot-food take-aways for pre and post event eating and drinking.

Headingley has already suffered a major adverse change in the make up of its population over the last fifteen to twenty years because the Council and the universities have done much too little to protect the residential community from a range of nuisances, public entertainment in the area being just one. A high proportion of the previously settled community has moved out creating an imbalance relative to the "transient" community. Does the Council really want to make this worse?

The Applicant has made assurances that the Licence will only be used a few times each year... There is no way in which these assurances could be enforced.



I am writing to protest about the proposed new application for the grant of a premises licence for:

- Live music
- Recorded music performance of dance
- Facilities for making music
- Sale of alcohol

Every day 14.00 - 23.00

I would like to protest on the following grounds:

### The Prevention of Crime and Disorder.

There has been a marked increase in the level of street crime and antisocial behaviour in the Headingley area. This is most noticeable at night when groups of youths, often drunk and affected by drugs travel between licensed venues. Many of us are affected by late night noise, food litter, broken glass and people urinating in the streets and gardens, damaging cars and showing a general lack of respect for the community. The police are aware of this increase in crime, but admit they have limited resources to deal with the growing problem. Granting a new licence for entertainment and the sale of alcohol will only exasperate an already unacceptable level of crime and disorder in the area. The residential community of the Granbys will be caught between a triangle of licensed venues from St Michael's Lane to Otley Road and North Lane.

#### Public Safety.

I have a real concern for public safety in an area that has already seen a murder outside the Skyrack pub this year and fights are on the increase. Groups of youths can pose a real threat to anyone wanting to use the streets at night. Many already feel they live in a 'no go' area and are frightened by the level of noise, verbal aggression and the threat of physical violence. We witness many young people, badly affected by drink, unable to walk and vomiting or collapsing in the street as they take a short cut through the Granbys. This is a residential area shared by families with children, workers, older people and students. Another licensed premises will only create the potential of more problems.

## The Prevention of Public Nuisance.

We are currently experiencing a growing level of street crime and public nuisance. Most of this is caused by people passing through the area as they travel between licensed premises. Damage to cars and property and increased levels of graffiti are causing real concern. Police awareness highlights the problem, but cannot prevent it as they do not have the resources. At the present time there is only one police video van available for use in Leeds.

## The Protection of Children From Harm.

Children are currently suffering from sleep disturbance as they are regularly woken throughout the night by loud screams and antisocial behaviour. This is both frightening and unacceptable in a residential area. 'Partying' on week day nights creates noise levels that prevent children sleeping and affect their ability to concentrate at school the next day. Another licenced premises in the area will exasperate this already serious problem.

It is clear that existing licensed premises in Headingley struggle to 'police' the people using them and local residents are picking up the results in the form of increased crime and antisocial behaviour. Although I do not live adjacent to the ground, I do like many other residents hear in my house the sounds of the matches etc. being played at this ground. The sound of the proposed music events would be quite audible from my house. Therefore I wish to object on the following grounds to the granting of this licence.

I think the key reason for my objection is the public nuisance and disorder that will result from this event. People attending events at the Headingley Cricket ground park in the neighbouring Moor Road, as we are only a short distance from the ground. The problem is at present minimised on test match days by the drivers of the parked cars leaving in the early evening. The car drivers for music events would return to their cars in the late evening and we would be subject to the noisy departure of our late night visitors. It will also add to the anti social behaviour that we experience late evening in central Headingley, as it will increase the number of people moving about within this area. The noise from the event will be a problem as if I am out in my garden in the evening I will be able to hear the music and sounds of the crowd, whether I wish to or not.

Another reason for objecting is the protection of children. When my children were at school they were distressed by being woken by the return of late night revellers to there houses (HMO's with a young residents). There are a number of families in my street with young children and I would not want them to go through some of the unpleasant experiences my family has had with late night revellers.



I am writing on behalf of the Wood Lane Neighbourhood association to oppose outright the application by HEADINGLEY CARNEGIE CRICKET GROUND for a licence for entertainment by live and recorded music, performance of dance, facilities for making music and for dancing, and for the sale of alcohol every day between the hours of 14.00 and 23.00, since granting this licence will contribute significantly to crime and disorder and public nuisance in a location that constitutes a suburban home environment.

The application should be refused on the grounds that it contravenes the renewed terms of the Cumulative Impact Policy, agreed by Leeds City Council, related to "the potential impact of a significant number of licensed premises concentrated in one area" and that the onus lies with the applicant to demonstrate that "the application will not add to the cumulative impact being experienced" in Central Headingley. The granting of this licence must, inevitably, draw enormous numbers of people into Headingley, so adding to the already serious distortion from a balanced community to an exclusively social and entertainment-based district.

## Crime and Disorder

There is substantial evidence of the crime and disorder that abounds throughout Headingley as a result of alcohol consumption. The more unpleasant elements are vomiting and urinating in public places and private gardens. The destructive elements include criminal damage to street furniture, signs, window boxes, planters, flower beds and parked cars. The granting of this licence will extend the "beaten paths" – at present largely, but not exclusively, confined to the Otley Road, Bennett Road, North Lane sector – in which this havoc is wreaked on a regular basis.

The latest example of crime and disorder, of which we are aware, was the shifting across the pavement and consequent damage to a very heavy planter that is located on the corner of Ash Terrace and North Lane. Given that it probably weighs more than 100 kilograms, this vanadalism, by a group of able-bodied people, was without question fuelled by excess alcohol. The incident occurred during the weekend of 23/24 October and has been recorded as a crime by West Yorkshire police, as anti-social behaviour and criminal damage (Crime number 13100469156).

As a further example, between 14 and 18 February, 2009, two large and heavy planters, located on the pavement in North Lane, were smashed. One of them had been moved some yards and rammed against a lamp post (see attached photographs). The planters had been in place for only one week (8 February 2009). The cost for the loss of the planters and contents, to "Headingley in Bloom", was approximately £100.

There is also an on-going need to replace plants in the window boxes at the Community Centre on North Lane and, on one occasion, a window box was

eventually ripped out and stolen. A replacement for it was bought by "Headingley in Bloom", at a cost of £30 (25 May 2009). More recently (July 2010), two window boxes were removed from the ledges on the Bennett Road side of the building, one of these being retrieved from outside Doveners Funeral Services in North Lane. The other window box was mysteriously returned a month or more after the incident. It is always at night that damage is caused, or plants are removed and sometimes strewn on the pavement. Bottles and glasses are also regularly deposited in the window boxes—despite this part of North Lane being a "Designated Public Place", with its restriction on drinking alcohol.

These criminal acts cause a "loss of enjoyment" for residents of Headingley and inhibit the improvement of the appearance of the district. The evidence is that young people drawn into the "Headingley social scene" do not share these values.

## Public Nuisance

The general noise associated with sporting fixtures held at Headingley Cricket Ground can be heard from a considerable distance throughout Headingley. Also, there is overwhelming evidence of the nuisance of noise throughout the licensed hours from many of the existing licensed premises in Headingley, which can be heard up to ¼ mile away. This arises from the patrons of the establishments themselves, since music is not generally the primary entertainment, but when special provisions are made for live music to be played, its volume is extremely intrusive, especially if it is in the open air. There are domestic premises within a very short distance from the Headingley Carnegie Cricket Ground, and many more within earshot, the granting of a licence to enable music to be played for up to 9 hours in each day will be an intolerable imposition on all residents within a wide radius.


The flats that I manage are less than 30 metres away from the Cricket Ground and the tenants would be significantly impacted if these events were to go ahead.

I am also concerned about the lack of security on the Cardigan Road side of the Ground and implications this woud have in terms of public order if groups of people breached the walls on this side of the stadium.

## Re PREM/02905 Yorkshire County Cricket ground

Dear Ms O'Brien

I am writing as an interested party living in close proximity to Yorkshire County Cricket Ground.

I object to the license application on the following grounds:

### Prevention of public nuisance

#### 1) Noise

My main objection on these grounds is that there has been no meaningful noise assessment carried out at the grounds and the impact to residents in The Turnways and that the Cricket Ground was never designed for, and is wholly unsuited to, holding mass-music events.

I understand that the Cricket Ground have had an environmental noise engineer's survey carried out in regard to a previous application for music on the site although it has not been referred to in the current application and to my knowledge the report is not open to public scrutiny. In order to make a responsible decision on this application you should repeat this study and at the very least carry out a site visit accompanied by an independent environmental noise engineer.

In particular you might like to note that there is a section of the ginnel adjacent to the Cricket Ground, about half way down where the railings meet the wall, at which there is no solid barrier and it is possible to see directly onto the pitch. Until you can answer the following related questions, you cannot possibly make a justifiable decision on public nuisance from noise at the site and in The Turnways.

Do you know how the sound system will be orientated?

Do you know where the stage will be?

Have sound measurements been made at the location I have pointed out?

Have sound measurements been made using source equipment similar to that which will be used for live events, appropriately positioned, and at volume levels expected during live events?

Will there be sound repeater stations around the ground?

Where will they be?

Has crowd noise been taken into consideration?

Any decision made without definite answers to all these questions will not stand up to public scrutiny or challenge, and cannot be said to have fully considered the impact on local residents.

### 2) Parking

There is no parking provision for crowds of this size - up to 15,000. The streets around the ground are already at capacity during term time and the stadium car park is nowhere near

adequate. Parking around the stadium during events will cause significant traffic and public nuisance to local residents.

#### 3) Frequency of events

I note that the applicants have revised their previous attempts at gaining a music license from the original one event per year, then to three events at weekends, to this latest seven days per week 365 days per year. This is typical of the planning creep I have witnessed so many times with the YCC and the stadium, one case that springs to mind is the stadium car park which was originally permitted as a multi-use sports arena until it became more convenient for the stadium/YCC to use it as a permanent car park. I can show that the applicants have demonstrated over and over that they cannot be trusted to keep their word and will inevitably use this license, if it is granted, to their maximum benefit at the expense of the local residents despite claiming unofficially that they only intend to hold a limited number of events per year. If they use the "limited number of events" argument as mitigation, unless they are prepared to amend their application, it must be disregarded by the panel and you must take their application on face value, and assume that they intend to hold many events per year during the week and at weekends.

#### Protection of children from harm

There are properties within a few meters of the location I mentioned in 1) above with elderly residents and young families. I think it is reasonable to object on the grounds of protection of children from harm as the children concerned are of primary school age and the stadium make no guarantee that events will not be held mid-week. This does not just apply to this location, although it will be particularly acute here, but all around the ground.

Although I live little further away in The Turnways (about 100m), I have four children of primary and secondary school age and I can categorically state that, despite double glazing, the noise from rugby events at the stadium on Friday evenings is so loud that my children cannot go to bed before the match is over and the music and crowd entertainment has stopped. I would welcome anyone from the panel to come here and witness this first hand during a match. I think we can reasonably assume that a music event at the Cricket Ground would be louder than a rugby event.

Please refuse this application, it is wholly unsuitable for this venue, in the middle of a residential area to hold events of the type and frequency described in the application.

Approval of this license will add to the already serious problems in the immediate and surrounding areas: excessive noise and public nuisance which takes many forms - alcohol fueled anti social behavior, litter, cars blocking pavements and roads. I have complained at many INWAC meetings about the current and ongoing problems with noise and nuisance and, if this application is granted, the situation will worsen.

I am aware that the proposal is to hold three events per year. I am afraid I cannot believe that if this was exceeded the enforcement officers would take any action. As a resident and member of NHPNA I (we) have lost all confidence in the council to enforce compliance with licensing conditions.

There are many families in the neighborhood which surrounds the cricket ground. The work done over the last few years, by local groups and individuals, aims to encourage families to stay and raise their children - this application will not support this aim.

Re application prem/02905, alcohol and music license for Headingley Cricket Club.

I strongly object to the above application. As a local resident with two children aged 3 and 5 I accept a certain amount of noise and disruption from the cricket ground itself and from the people attending events there. This has already increased recently due to the student teaching accommodation there. This application requests a license for 365 days a year and argues that despite estimating only three or four music events a year it allows the club to negotiate and accommodate the needs of those providing the music. I believe that if given at all this should be clearly restricted as once in place any organisation would be in a position to naturally develop this line of business further especially as it would likely become seen as an available venue by other music providers. Even if only three days I feel this is an inappropriate venue for this type of event, it sits directly in a residential area with family homes adjacent to the property boundaries. The noise is likely to be increased for such events and is a problem for us on large match days, further adding to the difficulties experienced with the student population. The area has an increasing population of families with young children and as a governor of the local primary school this is proved by us holding a current deficit of 30 places. The noise from the club resonates through the surrounding streets and will disturb mine and other children if wanting to play in the garden and by the noise and sharp light emitting from the ground when they are going to bed at night. I invite you to attend my house on a large match day to fully appreciate this. At present these large match days are restricted and usually only up till 7pm, whereas this application is for music and alcohol till 10pm every day, please realise the impact these combined will have on this family area. The litter including beer cans, bottles and take away left overs is already a problem from those attending matches either walking up through my street or parked here and I can only see this worsening at a music event when alcohol is being served for such long stretches. Anti-social behaviour including noisy rowdy groups in the streets, smashed bottles on pavements and damage to cars from those having enjoyed such an event as well as touters and petty criminals that are also attracted will undoubtably impact on the safety and security of this area further impacting on the community of residents and families living here. I would also add that the traffic congestion in the area is already at a limit and increasing the whole number of events at the stadium including cricket matches and rugby next door means there will be few days in the year that we are free of these issues. I accept and enjoy the fact that I live near a sports stadium, I have had to endure the fact that this has now become a large teaching facility but I ask that you do not subject me to living next door to a live music venue. I ask that you hopefully reject the application or at least put a clear limit to the number of events in one year with a reasonable gap between these days.



I wish to register my objection to the proposed license extension at the Yorkshire County Cricket Club where it has applied for a license to host year round events with alcohol sales. The venue is not well sited for noisy events and the existing provision for Rugy and Cricket events has seen a significant increase in noise and other event related nuisance over the last 10 years. I refer to the new flood lights, stadium stands etc where the noise is funnelled and amplified up and down the nearby terraced streets - if you have not experienced this then I invite you to come to Rochester Terrace on a Leeds Rhinos home game to experience it for yourself! As the stadium does not offer any onsite parking for the majority of visitors a massive amount of additional traffic is also funnelled down the local streets causing further problems for local residents with parking.

The regular sporting events are a feature of the area that is worth the inconvenience but the prospect of a virtually unlimited amount of disturbance being broadcast into the local area could be the tipping point for many permanent residents. I am writing to object to the proposed license for Headingley CCG. As I understand it the license is proposed to run 365 days a year from 1400-2300 hrs. Although Headingly CCG are proposing that they will not utilize this everyday I find this difficult to believe as it is first and foremost a business concerned with maximising profits. Therefore any success in this venture would surely lead to an escalation in activity. Apart from this concern with the potential for an event every day my main objectiuons are as follows;

Firstly, the stadium already produces excessive sound on matchdays, and although I am aware this is not connected to the rugby ground, the noise from that stadium's P.A alone is excessive. It can mean our children cannot get to sleep at night and makes relaxing in the garden almost impossible as there are some very serious levels of noise. This is no mere distraction. I believe it is unfair to expect residents to put up with this level of noise disturbance as it can be one of the most distressing things especially when it continues for a length of time. I believe it is everyones right to have a bit of peace and quiet.

Secondly, I believe that concerts and events of the type discussed bring with them an incredible amount of problems associated with large crowds who have drunk heavily. Headingley is already groaning at the seams at weekends with the huge influx of students and the carnage they can leave behind is unpleasant and unhealthy. I do not wany my children picking up empty bottles/used condoms/broken glass/litter etc which would be left behind by revellers.

Thirdly, having drunk partygoers wandering the streets in the middle of the day as they go to and from concerts/events can be intimidating and frightening for young children. I live here because it is a peaceful part of Headingley which still strives to maintain a villagey feel.

Fourth, I believe that these events and the alcohol consumed would without a doubt cause many acts of petty vandalism and stupidity which no amount of warning signs on lamposts or in the bars will prevent.

Fifth, obviously people will drive to these events which will lead to an increase in traffic around streets which quite frankly are not built for purpose. I live on a sharp bend on the street which drivers often struggle with when they are unfamiliar with the road. I believe extra traffic would pose a real risk to my young children.

Finally, I think it is fair to assume that the people applying for this license do not live near the stadium and would be very unlikely to want to have this sort of invasion on a daily, weekly or even monthly basis near their homes. I have two young children and for our quality of life I feel very strongly that peace, quiet and security are vital and what one comes to expect living in a nice area.

It may be a fair argument to point out that the things above will not happen, but I believe the noise is a given, as is the traffic and as for any crimes/misdemeanours I presume Headingley CCG will provide payment for police which in itself implies that trouble would be expected to some degree.

This application was submitted with a risk assessment pro forma specifically designed for outdoor events and although not submitted with the application a noise consultants report was made available to the Environmental Health Services noise team. This document has been assessed and the noise team have submitted a full objection to the application as the noise level will exceed the Code of Practice on Environmental Noise Control at concerts. It has also been noted that the current planning permission restricts the numbers allowed at none sporting events to 2000.

As well as the representation from the noise team we have also received one from the West Yorkshire Police and 25 local residents. The Ward Councillors have also made representations.

The closing date for the receipt of representations is midnight tonight (30 November 2010).

The application is to be considered by the Licensing Sub Committee on the 4 January 2011.

The application is to hold open air concerts at the cricket ground, finishing before 23:00 hours and with an audience of up to 14999 people. It is anticipated that the stage would be on the open cricket pitch, with the audience on the pitch and parts of the stands.

This Department has serious concerns regarding the potential for noise disturbance to the local residents, as the cricket ground is surrounded in close proximity by residential premises and hotels on all sides. These are occupied by a variety of residents. The cricket pitch is in the form of a shallow bowl, with little in the way of barriers between the stage and the residents.

Your application was accompanied by a Pro Forma – Risk Assessment For Outdoor Events, in which you stated that events would be carried out in such a way as to comply at all times with the Code of practice on Environmental Noise Control at Concerts. The application also contained a consultant's noise report, which identified the nearest noise sensitive properties and then calculated predicted noise levels at those locations during concert events.

The Code of Practice on Environmental Noise Control at concerts gives advice on how to limit noise nuisance. It requires that for an 'urban stadium' venue such as this one, holding between one and three events per year, the noise level should not exceed 75dB(A) over a 15 minute period, measured 1 metre from the façade of any noise sensitive premises. However, your noise report indicated that the requirements of the Code of Practice could not be met. You submitted a second noise report, but we did not agree with the predicted

nboard : 0113 234 8080 Page 250 calculated noise levels in that report. The predicted noise levels at the surrounding residential properties would still be in excess of the requirements of the Code of Practice.

The application also states that noise from the event will be inaudible at the nearest noise sensitive premises. However, as your own noise report confirms, it is not possible to have such an open air event and for the music noise not to be audible off site at such locations.

I have also checked your planning permission for the premises with colleagues in the Development Department. I understand that this limits the crowds to 2000 for such (non-sporting) events and limits the noise level to 60 dB(A) at the boundary of the adjacent properties. Therefore, the proposal could also be in breach of current planning permission and the fore mentioned planning conditions were made in the interests of the residential amenity of neighbouring occupiers.

For the reasons outlined above, I am not satisfied that the licensing objective of the prevention of public nuisance could be met and so this Department is making a full objection to the granting of the licence.

Thank you for submitting your application for licensed activities at the above.

This Department is concerned about the activities proposed which would be in breach of conditions on planning approval 26/185/95/OT for the headingley stadium redevelopment.

The granting of the licence application would breach the following conditions imposed on the planning approval:

"All events at the site which are not sport related shall be limited in attendance to not more than 2000 people and the details recorded which shall be supplied to the Local Planning Authority at the end of each calendar year."

"The noise levels from plant and activities carried on within the site shall not exceed 60dBA when measured as a 1 minute Leq at the nearest boundary of all properties surrounding the stadium on plan 95013/117 revision D except in the case of safety announcements."

"All events at the stadium which utilise the cricket or rugby pitches shall be finished by 2230 hours in the evening with the ground cleared of people by 2300 hours."

The reason for these conditions being imposed is to protect the residential amenity of the occupants of nearby properties.



Therefore this Department strongly objects to the granting of this licence application on the basis that I am not satisfied that the licensing objective of the prevention of public nuisance would be met in the breaching of the above planning conditions.

#### List of Concerns

If the Committee is minded to grant the application we would ask them to consider imposing the following as conditions on the license.

#### Access Egress and Emergency Evacuation.

An Event Management Plan has not been made available. We have concerns relating to safe access, egress and emergency evacuation of the stadium for the numbers proposed when the stadium is configured for Pop Concert use. Other concerns may surface when we have sight of an Event Management Plan.

We would suggest the following condition:

1. A fully detailed Event Management Plan, which should be Event Specific, must be submitted and found to be satisfactory by all relevant bodies at least 28 days prior to each event.



### The Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005

The Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order requires that a Fire Risk Assessment is carried out. Such an assessment must relate to the proposed use of the premises. The current Fire Risk Assessment does not include use for Pop concert type events.

We would suggest the following condition:

2. A Fire Safety Risk Assessment must be carried out for the premises as required by The Regulatory Reform (Fire Safety) Order 2005. The Risk Assessment must be carried out by a competent person and the significant findings recorded.

A copy of the Fire Risk Assessment must be made available to this authority no later than 28 days prior to any proposed event.



Although the site itself has never been the cause of complaints it previously operated as a restaurant but has recently applied for change of use to a drinking establishment. The application is for reduced hours than previously granted but in order to bring the licence in line with other premises in the area, the following conditions are recommended.

Having considered the application under the Licensing Act 2003 for the above premises, the Leeds City Council's health and environmental action service considers that the following measures are proportionate and necessary in order to promote the following licensing objective:

#### Noise and Vibration

- The Incident Report Register will be produced for inspection immediately on the request of an authorised officer.
- A policy for searching patrons at the entrance to premises will be adopted and prominently displayed on the premises.
- A suitable purpose-made receptacle for the safe retention of illegal substances will be provided and arrangements made for the safe disposal of its contents as agreed with West Yorkshire Police or British Transport Police.
- There shall be a communication link via radio to other venues in the city centre. This shall be the system recognised by the current Business Crime Reduction Partnership for the city, Leeds City Council and West Yorkshire Police.' – (currently 'Nitenet')
- Drinks, open bottles and glasses will not be taken from the premises at any time. Empty
  bottles and glasses will be collected regularly and promptly. Glass and other sharp objects
  will be stored and disposed of safely using suitable receptacles. Receptacles will be secured
  and not accessible to the customers.
- The PLH/DPS will belong to a recognised trade body or Pub Watch Scheme where one exists, whose aims include the promotion of the licensing objectives

West Yorkshire Police are satisfied that the proposed measures are not adequately dealt with by other legislation.

#### Licensing Application for Unit 3, The Cube, Albion Street, Leeds, LS2 8ER

I write to register my opposition to the licensing application made for the above premises. I am the owner of a flat in the adjoining K2 development which is currently rented, so I have a business interest. I am also a director of K2 Management Company Limited so have the interests of both owners and residents of the Flats at heart.

My objection to the license application for the unit which was previously Felicini's restaurant is on the following basis:

#### Crime & Disorder:

Albion street is already host to 2 bar/restaurants which are large in area, serve 100s of customers and have late licenses. Whilst a resident of the K2 flat, I have often returned to it when large groups of people, entering and leaving Tiger Tiger and Bar Risa, take up the majority of the pavement area and it has been necessary to walk on the street to get past rather than attempt to push through large numbers of men and women displaying drunken behaviour. I have seen occurrences of public disorder, despite the presence of doormen and attempts to control the crowds by means of queue control etc. There is often blood on the pavements in the morning, indicating that fights have taken place.

I have also experienced the difficulty of getting access to the entrance of the Cube/the K2 flats because of the large amount of people crowding on the pavement either side of the access ramp and stairs and often on the stairs and ramp.

To increase the number of bars with late licenses on Albion Street will inevitably increase the number of people of the pavement and street - either assembling to go into the premises or coming out for cigarettes, or to make their way home/hail a taxi. This will in my view significantly increase the potential for crime and disorder. With a murder only a few metres away in Dudley Way a few nights ago, this makes me concerned for my own personal safety, the safety of my tenants, nearby residents, for passers-by and for the customers themselves.

At a meeting with the managing agents of the Cube, in my capacity as a director of K2 MCL, I have been made aware that cleaners employed by the Cube have discovered syringes quite recently. They routinely find vomit and even human faeces within doorways and alcoves of the building which have been used by people to relieve themselves. Whilst it is not possible to say that the persons doing this are customers of the licensed premises I believe that that the likelihood of an increase in such anti-social and illegal behaviour is increased with an additional late licensed premises in close proximity.

There have already been occasions where customers of the licensed premises in the Cube have gained access to other parts of the development including, I understand, to the residential areas. This risk will be increased, I believe, by granting a license of this nature to Unit 3 with the consumption of alcohol being the primary activity it's customers will be engaging in. Access to other parts of the building and unauthorised persons entering and exiting the development via emergency exits and staff/services routes puts residents at risk and the security of the building and its tenants property as a whole is compromised.

#### **Public Nuisance:**

Noise disturbance is already an issue for residents of the K2 and I feel this can only increase with another licensed premises of this nature on Albion Street, currently from my experience the main problem is the noise of its customers entering and leaving the premises. Noise was not audible from the premises when it was a restaurant and its clientele were leaving at a relatively early hour. The plans accompanying the license application indicate that seating would be provided outside. In my view this will increase the noise disturbance for K2 residents as the source of the noise will be directly below their windows and balconies.

The problem of litter is also an extreme one on Albion Street – the litter which covers the pavement & spills out of already full bins is especially bad on Saturday, Sunday and Monday mornings & consists largely of fast food packaging and leaflets from the licensed premises. It is inevitable in my view that the situation will worsen with an additional premises such as the one proposed for Unit 3.

I trust that my concerns will be taken into account when considering the application. Yours faithfully, Helen Kilburn

Please see the attached representation relating to the above application, I am a resident affected by the application as my apartment is above the premises in question.

In addition to the matters set out in the attached document I would also like the Council to consider the noise aspects of the application as I understand the environmental dept has lodged a qualified objection on noise grounds. The residents in the flats above the premises already suffer from noise from the existing premises such as Tiger Tiger and these premises by their very nature can only increase such problems contrary to the policy of the prevention of public nuisance. The problem is particularly bad when live bands perform at the premises and in the summer months. Whilst these premises may not have live bands they appear to have a large and extensive sound system which may be audible outside the premises.

If you refer to the attached plans to the application, in particular PL/LE/178/01 plan number the Council will note that there are several "poseur stands" in the premises and some of these are in view of the windows.

These are apparently for use by girls wearing bikinis or very little clothing and I consider this will be detrimental to the prevention of public nuisance as these dancers or poseurs will be in view from the street, and in particular from people waiting at the bus stops which are directly outside the premises.

People waiting at the bus stops can and often do include children who have been to the cinema complex at the Light as children's films there often finish unto 10 or 11 pm, eg the recent Harry Potter film which finished at ten to 11 pm.

In addition the potential exposure to children of such matters is contrary to the protection of children from harm objective of licensing such premises.

There are already two large licensed bars either side of these premises which already results in substantial disruption to the pavement areas around my home address, frequently when walking home later in the evening you have to negotiate substantial crowds of people smoking or queuing to get in to either Tiger Tiger or Bar Risa and another bar will simply increase the public nuisance this causes. A great many of these people are drunk and there are often fights in the street most recently between a doorman at Tiger Tiger and a apparently drunk member of the public and on a separate occasion between police and a member of the public they were trying to arrest.

There are existing problems with illegal taxi rankings late at night in Albion Street outside Macdonalds opposite these premises and the Council seems to do little to prevent this, another bar can only make this problem worse and add to the public nuisance this causes. There are already problems with large numbers of drunk people in Albion Street later in the evening and it is threatening for people walking home after being out for meals or having taken their children to shows at the theatre etc and another substantial bar can only make this public nuisance worse.

On the 25th November a man was murdered in the street behind these premises and the office cleaners operating for the building we live in which is above the premises in question report they find used syringes and human faeces in the alcoves where the fire doors open out of the building and another bar with the resulting increase in drunken behaviour can only exacerbate these problems so the Council by granting this licence is effectively not promoting the prevention of crime and disorder which is one of the stated licensing objectives and is also not preventing public nuisance and effecting adversely public safety.

I consider the Council should consider the cumulative effect of these drinks licences and

The litter problem in Albion Street is extreme particularly on Saturday and Sunday mornings when the pavements are covered in litter from the fast food shops in Albion Street and leaflets from the bars and another bar can only add to this public nuisance problem.

I consider the Council should consider the cumulative effect of the drinks licenses and the the effect it has on the area and the city centre generally.

The centre of Leeds is no longer a pleasant place to be on a Thursday, Friday and Saturday night, there are large numbers of drunk people, litter, cars cruising the streets picking up people to take them to lap dancing bars and another bar can only add to these problems.

I would therefore submit the Council should consider refusing this application on the grounds that it does not promote the licensing objectives of the prevention of crime and disorder, public nuisance, public safety and protection of children from harm.
