#### Summary of main issues

- The purpose of this report is to present the action plans from Leeds and York Partnership NHS Foundation Trust (LYPFT) in response to the findings and recommendations arising from the Care Quality Commission's (CQC) recent inspection of services at the Trust.
- 2. In September and October 2014, the CQC inspected all core services provided by LYPFT. On 7 January 2015 a Quality Summit was held to discuss the outcomes form the inspection and the Trust's initial response/ proposed improvement activity. The inspection reports were published by the CQC on 16 January 2015 and considered by the Scrutiny Board at its meeting on 20 January 2015. The Trust's overall CQC rating was 'Requires Improvement'.
- 3. At its meeting in January 2015, members of the Scrutiny Board raised and discussed a number of matters in relation to the inspection outcome, including:
  - The relationship between service commissioners in Leeds and York.
  - The experience of patients accessing services.
  - The need to differentiate improvement actions to services across Leeds and York i.e. being clear about which services needed to improve and where – Leeds, York or both.
  - Concerns regarding the 'ligature points' identified during the inspection.
  - Delivery of a 'place of safety' and the working relationship with the Police.
  - Timescales for the Trust to produce and report its action plans to the CQC and future involvement of the Scrutiny Board.
  - Assurance from the Trust and commissioners regarding the quality of services in Leeds.

- 4. The purpose of this report is to present the formal action plans from Leeds and York Partnership NHS Foundation Trust (LYPFT) in response to the CQC's findings and recommendations. The details are appended to this report.
- 5. Representatives from the Trust have been invited to attend the meeting, along with representatives from the Trust's regulator (Monitor) and local CCGs to provide views on the Trust's action plans and details of their assurance role around the Trust's improvement activity.

#### Summary of main issues

- 1. In July 2014, the Scrutiny Board identified Mental Health Services (and in particular Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS)) as areas for more detailed consideration by the Scrutiny Board. The purpose of this report is to present further evidence for consideration.
- 2. In September 2014, the Scrutiny Board considered a range of initial information, including:
  - (a) An overview of Leeds' mental health strategy / framework; and,
  - (b) A summary paper in relation to Leeds' Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) and Targeted Mental Health in Schools (TaMHS).
- 3. The Scrutiny Board gave further consideration to this area at its meeting in December 2014. The information considered at that meeting included: ,
  - Reports to the Integrated Commissioning Executive 2 September 2014 and 2 December 2014
  - Terms of Reference for Joint Commissioning Steering Group for Children and Young People's Emotional and Mental Health Services in Leeds.
  - Children and Young People's Mental Health and wellbeing Taskforce: Newsletter 1.
  - CAMHS waiting lists information (as at 21/10/2014)
  - Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services Tier 4 Report NHS England (July 2014)
  - Briefing note on the above Tier 4 Report NHS England (September 2014)

- TaMHS Expansion Evaluation (2011 2013) Leeds City Council (January 2014)
- 4. At the meeting it was reported the TaMHS service had received positive evaluations, as demonstrated in the reports presented.
- 5. At its meeting in February 2015, the Scrutiny Board heard directly from service users outlining their experience of services provided in Leeds, alongside details of HealthWatch Leeds' stakeholder engagement activity. At that meeting, the Scrutiny Board also considered:
  - A further update from commissioners, including next steps
  - Details from service providers, including issues relating to transition from CAMHS to Adult Mental Health Services
  - Submissions provided by Leeds Local Medical Committee (LMC)

#### Matters for consideration

- 6. At the meeting in February 2015, some concerns were raised regarding comments highlighted by Leeds LMC regarding TaMHS provision across the City. However, there was no representative from Leeds LMC in attendance to discuss such concerns in more detail. Nonetheless, additional information aimed at clarifying the position is now appended to this report, as follows:
  - Response from Leeds Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) August 2014
  - Further letter of clarification from Leeds LMC February 2015
- 7. From discussions at the previous Scrutiny Board meeting, members will be aware that recommendations for change were being drafted for consideration at the Integrated Commissioning Executive (ICE). It is intended to present these recommendations and the outcome of the ICE meeting to for consideration, prior to the Scrutiny Board formulating its inquiry report.

#### Re: Emotional and Mental Health Services for children in Leeds

Thank you for your letter dated 23 July 2014 where you summarised the concerns of the Leeds Medical Committee in relation to emotional and mental health service provision in the city.

The Leeds Clinical Commissioning Groups recognise the importance of children and young people's emotional and mental health, as clearly evidenced in our commissioning intentions and children's commissioning work programme.

Dr Mischenko attended your meeting and advised you that emotional and mental health has been agreed as a priority in the children's joint commissioning programme and that this is moving at some pace. During 2014 a number of developments have already been progressed, such as the commissioning of an online digital counselling service for care leavers, improved pathways in place for young people who self-harm and exciting work to co-design a website with young people specifically for emotional and mental health.

Dr Mischenko presented a briefing paper to you that set out the strengths of local provision, as well as some of the risks and priorities to improve upon. The investment we undertook with partners over the last two years to seed fund the establishment of the TAMHS service across the city is a strength we are particularly pleased with. Such a local and responsive early intervention service follows an evidence-based model and is what young people are asking for – that services are delivered where they are. Whilst still in its formative years and hence some variability, the service is evaluating very well; improving emotional and mental health post intervention, as well as improved attendance and learning at school.

An area all partners are keen to progress is how to jointly commission services to ensure the whole system is joined up, so there is one point of referral for professionals and clear pathways across the

The programme to achieve this will be discussed at the next Integrated Commissioning Executive in September.

Thank you for your letter, your comments will certainly inform our commissioning discussions. We hope that this response provides assurance that, in a context of squeezed public funding, there is a strong commitment and focus on improving the service offer and emotional and mental health of children and young people in Leeds.

#### Re: TaMHS service and Emotional and Mental Health Services for children in Leeds

Thank you for your email of today's date. As you know, the LMC found the meeting on 29<sup>th</sup> January helpful and we appreciate your input and that of the school representatives.

It is difficult however to be definitive about our current perception of TaMHS, as no comprehensive service is yet in place. The GP pilot scheme is operating in certain areas of Leeds and you informed us that it is working well. However, the information about the scheme has not yet filtered down to all GPs in the pilot areas. We have had reports from GPs in the pilot areas being unaware that they were in the pilot scheme at all. We are also aware of GPs, in the pilot areas, being asked to complete inappropriate questionnaires/assessments, although I understand that you have now sorted out this issue. I understood from our meeting that all the pupil assessments would be carried out by TaMHS staff.

Leeds LMC looks forward to receiving full details of the evaluation of the pilot scheme in due course. The full rollout of the pilot would go some way towards meeting the concerns of the LMC, particularly with regard to access for all Leeds children even if they attend school outside the city and for children attending private schools or being home-schooled. As I understand the full service roll out would also mean that some of the issues regarding the gaps in service between the TaMHS and CAMHS services would be addressed and that the two services would work together to ensure that all patients needs are met. Please could you confirm that the full service will be available in all areas by September 2015?

It is essential that the full rollout happens quickly as we have had issues with children's mental health services and access to such services for 2 years now and despite raising concerns at various levels progress has been very slow in addressing these issues. Although we were reassured to some degree that the TaMHS pilots were progressing well and that some of our concerns were being addressed, there was some frustration that this information had not been relayed to us during our numerous letters, meetings and discussions regarding children's mental health services.

I would also mention that the LMC is continuing to hear reports that some schools are finding it difficult to access adequate TaMHS support for their pupils given the level of need and referrals which school clusters are experiencing.

The emotional and mental health of our children is a critical matter for Leeds and it is worrying to read press reports of increasing numbers of young people in our city experiencing mental health problems.

With regard to the LMC letter of 23<sup>rd</sup> July, we received a response on behalf of the three Leeds CCGs dated 19<sup>th</sup> August and I enclose a copy for your information. I had shared minutes of our meeting with you and the cluster leads with Councillor Coupar and Steven Courtney of the Scrutiny Board. Hopefully this letter will relay our current perceptions of the service further.

I know that the LMC's concerns are shared fully by you and your colleagues and we look forward to continuing to work with you on this urgent matter.

#### **1** Purpose of this report

1.1 The purpose of this report is to consider the progress and ongoing development of the Scrutiny Board's work schedule for the current municipal year.

- Clinical Commissioning Group's 2015/16 funding allocation and future commissioning plans

- LCH Care Quality Commission (CQC) Inspection outcome and initial response/ action plan – TBC
- YAS Care Quality Commission (CQC) Inspection outcome and initial response/ action plan – TBC
- Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services (CAMHS) commissioning and provision in Leeds (final report)
- 2.2 The details outlined above should be considered as an indicative rather than definitive work programme.
