Summary of main issues

This is an application to vary a premises licence, made by Mr Mohammed Abrar, for The Forge 143 - 145 New Road Side, Horsforth, Leeds, LS18 4QD.

Responsible authorities and Ward Members have been notified of this application.

The application has attracted representations from responsible authorities.

The premises are located within an area covered by a cumulative impact policy.

1 Purpose of this report

- 1.1 To advise Members of an application made under section 34 of the Licensing Act 2003 ("the Act") to vary a premises licence in respect of the above mentioned premises.
- 1.2 Members are required to consider this application due to the receipt of representations.

2 History of premises

- 2.1 An application to vary an existing Justices 'On' licence was received on the 3rd August 2005 and was granted as applied for.
- 2.2 A variation application was received on the 25th February 2010 to vary the hours of licensable activities, remove conditions and to add late night refreshment. Representations were received from members of the public and responsible authorities. The sub-committee decided to grant the licence in part by adding conditions imposed by West Yorkshire Police and to keep the hours as existing.
- 2.3 Since the initial application, various applications have been received to vary the designated premises supervisor and to transfer the licence holder.
- 2.4 An application to vary the licence was received on the 23rd May 2016. This is to extend all licensable activities by 1 hour and to also include late night refreshment to the licence. Please see below for the time changes on Sunday.
- 2.5 A copy of the existing licence is attached at Appendix A.

3 The application

- 3.1 The applicant is Mr Mohammed Abrar.
- 3.2 Briefly the application is to:
 - Add an additional hour onto the hours for sale of alcohol and regulated entertainment Monday – Saturday. On a Sunday, the hours the premises have applied for are Sun-Thurs 10:00 – 00:00 and Fri-Sat 10:00 – 01:00.

4 The operating schedule

- 4.1 The applicant proposes to promote the licensing objectives by taking the additional steps identified in the operating schedule which is attached at Appendix B.

5 Location

- 5.1 A map which identifies the location of this premises is attached at Appendix C.

6 Representations

- 6.1 Under the Act representations can be received from responsible authorities or other persons. Representations must be relevant and, in the case of another person, must not be frivolous or vexatious.

Representations from Responsible Authorities

- 6.2 Representations have been received from Environmental Health in their capacity as a responsible authority.
- 6.3 The representation submitted by Environmental remains as a matter for Members consideration. A copy of the representation may be found at Appendix D.

Other representations

- 6.4 There are no other representations.

7 Cumulative Impact Policy

- 7.1 The premises are located within the cumulative impact area for Area 5 – Horsforth.
- 7.2 Cumulative impact means the potential impact on the promotion of the licensing objectives due to significant number of licensed premises concentrated in one area.
- 7.3 An applicant wishing to vary a licence for premises which fall within any of the cumulative impact areas must identify, through their operating schedule, the steps they intend to take so that the council and responsible authorities can be satisfied that granting this variation would not add to the impact already being experienced.
- 7.4 Details of the cumulative impact policy specific to Horsforth and an outline of the evidence behind the reason for setting this policy is attached at Appendix E.
- 7.5 Members are directed to paragraphs 7.51 to 7.54 of the Statement of Licensing Policy which provides examples of how an application may be considered exceptional and the matters that the council would not normally take into consideration.

8 Licensing hours

- 8.1 Members are directed to paragraphs 6.8 to 6.15 for the Statement of Licensing Policy which states the criteria that will be applied to any decision for new applications or variations which include extending hours.
- 8.2 In brief the Policy states at 6.14 that restrictions may be made to the proposed hours of use where, after receiving relevant representations, the council considers it appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives to do so. The council will take into account the existing pattern of licensed premises in an area when considering what is appropriate to promote the objectives. Applications which are significantly out of character for a locality will need to demonstrate that granting

the hours sought will not impact on the licensing objectives, given the potential for neighbouring premises to seek the same additional hours to prevent rivals gaining a commercial advantage.

- 8.3 A list of premises in the local area and their licensed hours and activities is provided at appendix F.

9 Equality and diversity implications

- 10.1 At the time of writing this report there were no implications for equality and diversity. Any decision taken by the licensing subcommittee will be in accordance with the four licensing objectives as prescribed by the Licensing Act 2003.

10 Options available to Members

- 10.1 The licensing subcommittee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
- Grant the variation as requested.
 - Grant the variation whilst imposing additional conditions and/or altering in any way the proposed operating schedule.
 - Exclude any licensable activities to which the application relates.
 - Reject the whole or part of the application.
- 10.2 Members of the licensing subcommittee are asked to note that they may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must actually be appropriate in order to promote the licensing objectives.

Annex 1 – Mandatory Conditions

1. Only individuals licensed by the Security Industry Authority may be used at the premises to guard against:-
 - a. unauthorised access or occupation (e.g. through door supervision), or
 - b. outbreaks of disorder, or
 - c. damage
2. No supply of alcohol may be made under this licence
 - a. At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
 - b. At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
3. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
4. The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -

- a. games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage individuals to -
 - i. drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
 - ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
 - b. provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee other public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - c. provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
 - d. selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamorize anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.
 - e. dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
5. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
 6. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -

- a. a holographic mark, or
- b. an ultraviolet feature.

7. The responsible person must ensure that -

- a. where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:
 - i. beer or cider: ½ pint;
 - ii. gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
 - iii. still wine in a glass: 125 ml;
- b. these measures are displayed in a menu; price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and
- c. where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

Embedded restrictions

8. The EVH food team be notified if the Kitchen is re-opened.
9. Throughout all parts of these conditions the phrase 'Licensing Authority' means the Leeds City Council.
10.
 - a) Unless the hours for which the Licence is valid are expressly stated on the Licence there shall be no performance of any nature before 8.00 am or after 11.00pm on any day of the week including Saturdays, or after 10.30pm Sundays, without the prior consent of the Licensing Authority.
 - b) There shall be no dancing or performance including dancing on any day appointed by Public Authority as a day of public mourning.
11. The Chief Constable of the West Yorkshire Police, any Police Officer, the Chief Fire Officer, any authorised officer in uniform of the West Yorkshire Fire Authority, any authorised Environmental Health Officer and their equipment and any other person authorised by the Licensing Authority shall have free access to all parts of the licensed premises at all reasonable times for the purpose of supervising the observance and enforcement of these conditions.
12. The Licensee shall be responsible for carrying out the provisions of these Conditions of the Licence. The Licensee shall take due precautions for the safety of the public, employees and performers, shall retain control over all areas of the licensed premises and shall ensure that nothing shall take place on the premises which:
 - a) is likely to cause disorder or breach of the peace;
 - b) is likely to be grossly offensive to any person on the premises;
 - c) involves drugs misuse; or
 - d) involves any other unlawful activity.

13. The Licensee, or some other responsible person not less than eighteen years of age *and nominated in writing for the purpose, shall be in charge of, and remain upon the licensed premises whenever they are used for licensed purposes. They shall not be engaged in any duties which prevent them from exercising general supervision and control.
14. Any written nomination of management shall be served on the Licensing Authority and a copy of the same shall also be retained on the premises and kept available for immediate inspection by any Official of the Licensing, Police or Fire Authority.
15. The Licensee shall provide notice of his or her intention to provide any form of entertainment which includes lap dancing, pole dancing, table dancing, striptease or any form of nudity or semi nudity on the part of the performers or the staff employed on the premises. Any entertainment of this nature will be subject to additional standard special conditions of the licence.
16. The person in charge shall be conversant with all licence conditions.
17. Any venue which accommodates external promoters shall maintain a register or a diary system to record all such events. Each entry should contain the specific date of the event, nature/title of the event and the name, address and contact telephone number of the promoter specific to that event. The register must be available for immediate inspection on request by any Official of the Licensing Authority or it's authorised agents.
18. The maximum number of persons allowed in the stated areas whilst the Licence is in force is:

19. The Licensee shall not permit persons in excess of the number specified on the licence to enter or occupy any portion of the licensed premises.
20. The Licensee shall ensure that staff are familiar with the maximum capacity of the premises.
21. The Licensee shall display notice containing details as to the maximum capacity figure in a prominent position upon entry to the premises. Where the capacity is divided into separate floors/areas within the premises notice of the appropriate capacity for each floor/area shall also be prominently displayed upon entry to the relevant floor/area.
22. The licensee shall at any time whilst the premises are in use be aware of the precise number of patrons on the premises. Where the licence covers different floors/areas, the licensee shall be aware of the number of patrons in each area at any given time and ensure that the numbers do not exceed those as stipulated on the licence. This information shall immediately be supplied on request to any Official of the Licensing, Police or Fire Authority.
23. Appropriately trained staff shall be provided to oversee general safety within the premises, and these shall be provided to a minimum number of one member of staff per 250 occupancy or part thereof, in accordance with the occupancy figure as stated on the Public Entertainment Licence.
24. Furthermore, in addition to the above the licensee shall ensure that an appropriately trained member of staff is designated to each emergency exit door to assist in the event of an emergency evacuation.
25. All members of staff shall be instructed in the safety precautions to be observed in the premises as far as those precautions relate to their duties and to the action to be taken by them in the event of fire or emergency.
26. All exits, passages, landings and stairways shall be kept free from obstruction at all times when the premises are used for licensed purposes.

27. A clear unobstructed route leading from each fire exit to a place of safety outside the premises shall be provided and maintained available for use at all times.
28. Every door in the building for use by members of the public going from the auditorium to the outside of the building shall open outwards, unless the Licensing Authority shall have been satisfied that this is impracticable to the circumstances of the particular case, and shall be capable of being opened easily and immediately from the inside, without the use of a key, when required.
29. Where, with the prior consent of the Licensing Authority, doors or gates across exits open inwards, they shall be fastened fully opened so as not to form an obstruction.
30. If security is required for outward opening fire exit doors, then they should be secured with panic bolt or panic latch type fastenings only to the satisfaction of the Licensing and Fire Authority. A conspicuous 'PUSH BAR TO OPEN' sign should be provided immediately above the push bars.
31. Any removable fastenings permitted by the Licensing or Fire Authority for securing exit doors when the public are not on the premises shall be removed before the public are admitted to the premises and shall not be replaced until the public have vacated the building.
32. Illuminated fire exit sign boxes lit by both primary and emergency lighting should be provided above all exits. Illuminated boxes incorporating graphic fire exit symbols, e.g. man moving through open door, should have white symbols on a green background. The size of the exit boxes should be appropriate for the maximum viewing distances involved.
33. Doors and openings other than exits to or from parts of the licensed premises to which the public are admitted shall be provided with notices indicating their uses or shall be marked "Private", and wherever practicable shall be kept secured. Where exit doors are fitted with automatic bolts they shall be clearly indicated with the words "PUSH BAR TO OPEN".
34. Where curtains are provided across an exit doorway they shall be divided at the centre and shall not trail the floor.
35. Except with the consent of the Licensing Authority, bars, wire guards or the like shall not be fitted to windows, nor shall the windows be otherwise obstructed in a manner likely to render them unavailable for the purposes of rescue in case of emergency.
36. The closing of collapsible gates or shutters across exit openings shall be prohibited whilst the public are in the premises.
37. The licensed premises shall be provided with fire appliances suitable to the fire risk in the premises and to the satisfaction of the Fire Authority.
38. Fire appliances shall be affixed to wall brackets to the satisfaction of the Fire Authority, and available for instant use at all times.
39. Fire extinguishers should be regularly examined, tested and maintained in accordance with the current British Standard to the satisfaction of the Fire Authority.
40. The licensee and employees should be made fully conversant with the location of fire appliances, method of operation and safe use, and with the action to be taken in case of fire.
41. A manually operated electrical fire alarm system shall be provided to the satisfaction of the Fire Authority. The alarm should be clearly audible in all parts of the building.
42. The Fire alarm system should be tested on a weekly basis in accordance with the current British Standard and to the satisfaction of the Fire Authority. The result of all tests with the exception of the daily inspection should be recorded in a suitable log book provided for the purpose. The

log book should be available for immediate inspection upon request of any official of the Licensing or Fire Authority.

43. The licensee and all employees should be made familiar with the method of giving warning of fire and with the escape route available from each part of the premises to which they resort or in which they may work.
44. All fire doors shall be maintained self-closing and shall not be secured in an open position.
45. A system for automatically cutting off the sound system which is linked to the sounding of the fire alarm shall be provided.
46. All scenery, drapes, curtains and decorations within the licensed premises shall be made of such material or shall be treated and maintained so as to be flame retardant in accordance with the current British Standard and to the satisfaction of the Fire Authority.
47. Plastic decorations are not acceptable.
48. Filling materials used in furnishings should be restricted to combustion modified foam or other materials having at least the same standard of fire performance. Upholstered furniture and floor coverings should comply with the current British Standard to the satisfaction of the Fire Authority.
49. Flumes from kitchens and serveries and over grills and all ventilating shafts shall be maintained in a clean condition.
50. Smoking shall be strictly prohibited within the stage risk area and in dressing rooms. Notices bearing the words "NO SMOKING" in red letters on a white background shall be conspicuously displayed in these areas.
51. Where any open fireplaces, high temperature heating appliances or naked flames are used they shall be adequately protected by a suitable guard.
52. In the event of the heating being by a central heating system the heating apparatus shall be placed in a separate room from the auditorium. The door between this room and the auditorium should be self-closing and fire-resistant to a one hour standard.
53. Explosives, inflammable liquids or high inflammable articles shall not be brought into or used within any portion of the licensed premises.
54. No exhibition, demonstration or display of pyrotechnics or displays involving the use of fire shall be given in the licensed premises without the prior consent of the Licensing and Fire Authority. At least fourteen days written notice of application must be supplied in such circumstances.
55. No exhibition, demonstration or display of laser equipment shall be given by any person in the licensed premises and no laser equipment shall be used by such person in the said premises unless the Director of the Leeds Environment Department has been given not less than 14 days previous written notice.
56. At entrances to venues where strobe lighting is in use warnings should be posted that stroboscopic lighting is in use and the possibility that susceptible people may be affected.
57. Flicker rates from stroboscopic lighting should be set at 4 or less flickers per second. This frequency shall apply to the combined flicker rates on any group of lights which can be directly gazed at.
58. In all parts of the building to which the public are admitted and in all passages, corridors, ramps and stairways to which the public have access and which lead from the auditorium to the outside of the building, there shall provided adequate illumination by general lighting to the satisfaction of the Licensing Authority.

59. In addition to the general lighting, adequate illumination to enable the public to see their way out of the building, without the assistance of the general lighting, shall be provided in the auditorium and all other parts of the building to which the public are admitted and in all passages, corridors, ramps and stairways, which lead from the auditorium to the outside of the building. This lighting shall be referred to as the safety lighting.
60. The safety lighting shall be provided from a source other than that of the general lighting.
61. All notices and exit indications shall be illuminated by both general and safety lighting.
62. The safety lighting shall be kept on at all times when the public are on the premises except in those parts of the building which are lit equally well by daylight.
63. Any battery supplying safety lighting shall be fully charged before the public are admitted to the premises and shall be of such capacity and so maintained as to be capable of supplying at normal voltage, the full load of the safety lighting during the whole time that the public are on the premises.
64. If there is a failure of the general lighting and the lighting is not restored within one hour, the public in the licensed premises shall be instructed to leave the building.
65. If there is a failure of the safety lighting, all parts of the building required to be illuminated by the safety lighting shall be immediately illuminated by the general lighting and the public in the licensed premises shall be instructed to leave the building forthwith.
66. Electrical apparatus and equipment within the building shall not be used for such purpose, or in such a manner, or when it is such a condition, as to cause danger of electric shock, fire or explosion.
67. Where gas is used for the lighting all gas burners within reach of the public shall be protected by glass or wire gloves and all gas taps shall be guarded in such a manner as to prevent unauthorised interference.
68. Electrical installation (including the fire alarm and emergency lighting systems) shall be in the charge of a competent electrician whose name is published on the Roll of National Inspection Council for Electrical Installation Contracting, or a member of Electrical Contractors' Association.
69. One of the following protective measures shall be used for all socket-outlets which may be used for the connection for lighting, video or sound amplification equipment and display models:
 - a) Each socket-outlet circuit shall be protected by a residual current device having a rated residual operating current not exceeding 30mA.
 - b) Each individual socket-outlet shall be protected by an integral residual current device having a rated residual operating current not exceeding 30mA.
70. The current operation of all residual current devices shall be checked regularly by pressing the test button. If the device does not switch off the supply, an electrical contractor should be consulted. At the same time action should be taken to prohibit the use of socket outlets associated with a faulty residual current device.
71. The Licensee shall ensure that the electrical installation to the whole of the premises carries a recent safety certificate issued by a competent electrician whose name is published on the Roll of National Inspection Council for Electrical Installation Contracting, or a member of the Electrical Contractors' Association.
72. The inspection shall include ALL electrical appliances and fire alarm and emergency lighting systems.

73. The licensee shall ensure that the electrical installation is checked on an annual basis and on renewal of the Public Entertainment Licence shall furnish the Licensing Authority with a copy of an Electrical Safety Certificate valid for the period of the licence.
74. Suitable and sufficient sanitary accommodation must be provided and maintained to the satisfaction of the Chief Environmental Health Officer.
75. The premises shall at all times be maintained in a clean, sanitary and safe condition and shall be open during the continuance of this licence to an inspection by the Licensing Authority or their authorised agents.
76. Any seating in the licensed premises shall be so arranged as to allow free access to all exits there from.
77. For a closely seated audience chairs shall be either securely fixed to the floor or alternatively shall be battened securely together in units of not less than four seats. Adequate gangways, not less than 42" (1100mm) wide, unless otherwise approved by the Licensing Authority, shall be provided. The gangways shall lead directly to each exit door and shall be kept free from obstruction. No seat shall be more than twelve feet (4.0m) from any gangway.
78. Seating in invalid chairs other than engine driven chairs will be permitted subject to any condition imposed by the Licensing and Fire Authority.
79. Means of access, egress and emergency egress shall be provided and maintained in accordance with any recommendations of the Licensing and Fire Authority.
80. Alterations or additions, whether permanent or temporary, to the structure, the lighting, electrical heating, ventilating, mechanical, or installations, or to the seating, gangways or other arrangements in building in which the licensed premises are situated shall not be made except with the consent of the Licensing Authority and in accordance with any conditions of such consent.
81. The Licensee shall maintain a first aid box on the premises in accordance with the Health and Safety (First Aid) Regulations 1981 and make sure that:
 - it is accessible at all times
 - items are replaced as they are used
82. Any person who appears unwell, including those affected by drugs or alcohol, must be seen by a trained first aider, who shall:
 - give first aid
 - if necessary, seek medical assistance
83. The licensee shall maintain an Incident Report Register within which staff must record any incident which has occurred on the premises.
84. The Incident Report Register must be retained on the premises for a period of one year, taken from the date of the last entry, and include the following:
 - a) consecutively numbered pages;
 - b) the date and time of incident;
 - c) the nature of incident;
 - d) the full name/s of staff involved including the registration number of any door staff, and to whom the incident was reported, including the names and numbers of any police officers who attended the scene of the incident and details of any witness/es;

- e) Any notes relative to the incident.
85. Incident Report Registers shall be produced for immediate inspection on request by any Official of the Licensing or Police Authority.
86. The premises must be effectively ventilated when the public are present. Any mechanical ventilation system must be properly maintained.
87. Drinking water provision must be clearly available, free of charge, at all times whilst the Entertainment Licence is operative.
88. This facility must be kept in a clean condition.
89. No exhibition, demonstration or performance of hypnotism shall be given on any person in the premises except with the express consent of the Licensing Authority and subject to such conditions as the Licensing Authority may attach to such consent. Any notification of intention to stage a hypnotist should be made in writing providing at least fourteen days notice.
90. The Licensee shall ensure that no nuisance is caused by noise or vibration emanating from the licensed premises resulting from the use of this Licence. The Licensee shall provide urgent attention to any reports of noise nuisance, and act upon direction of the Licensing Authority.
91. Licensees are reminded that unauthorised flyposting is an offence under the Town & Country Planning Act 1990, as amended, Section 224.
92. In the case of an audience consisting of persons under 16 years of age, the minimum number of staff shall increase to a ratio of one per 100 occupancy.
93. At any licensed function no child shall be permitted to occupy any seat in the front row of the balcony, gallery or tier unless accompanied by, or in the charge of a person who appears to have attained the age of 16 years.
94. The Licensee shall ensure that any persons employed on the premises to work in the capacity as a door supervisor, hold current registration with the SIA and comply with all relevant rules and regulations laid down by that body.
95. Door Staff Daily Record Register
- The Licensee shall maintain a Daily Record Register which is to be completed on a daily basis by the door staff when they commence and finish duty.
96. The Daily Record Register must be retained on the premises for a period of one year, taken from the date of the last entry, and include the following:
- a) consecutively number pages;
 - b) the registration number and full name of each registered person on duty;
 - c) the date and time that he/she commenced that period of duty with a signed acknowledgement by that person;
 - d) the time at which he/she finished duty with a signed acknowledgement by that person.
97. Daily Record Registers shall be produced for immediate inspection on request by any official of the SIA, Police or Licensing Authority.
98. Licence holders must have a written search policy for those entering the premises.
- All members of staff must be acquainted with this policy.

99. Sufficient number of staff of both sexes shall be on duty to undertake any searches of the public.
100. Clear and visible notices should be displayed to those entering the premises detailing the establishments search policy. These signs should state that the police will be informed if anyone is found in possession of controlled substances or weapons.
101. Secure receptacles, to the standard as required by the West Yorkshire Police, must be provided in a restricted part of the building for staff to deposit drugs and weapons.
102. Any seizure of controlled substances and weapons must be recorded in the Incident Report Register and reported to the police at the earliest possible time.
103. The licensee shall ensure that drinks glasses and any other glass receptacles are prevented from being taken off the premises accepting off-sales and their legitimate sale.
104. A suitable CCTV system operated in accordance with guidelines from the West Yorkshire Police shall be provided.
105. Any exemption to this condition must be agreed by the West Yorkshire Police and Licensing Authority.

Annex 2 – Conditions consistent with the operating schedule

The prevention of crime and disorder

106. Fixed seating and dining tables for the consumption of food provided on the premises, will be available at all times that the premise licence has effect, in the dining/seating area as identified on the ground floor plan of the premise licence.
107. A menu will be available to purchase hot and cold food at all times that the premise licence has effect.
108. The Premise Licence Holder, Designated Premises Supervisor and all members of staff will ask for proof of age from any person appearing to be under the age of 21 who attempts to purchase alcohol at the premises.
109. The Premise Licence Holder/Designated Premises Supervisor will inform West Yorkshire Police as soon as practicably of any search resulting in the seizure of drugs or offensive weapons.
110. A policy for searching patrons at the entrance to the premises will be adopted and prominently displayed on the premises.
111. A Supervisors Register will be maintained at the licensed premises, showing the names, addresses and up-to-date contact details for the DPS and all personal licence holders.
112. CCTV security footage will be made secure and retained for a minimum period of 31 days time to the satisfaction of WYP.
113. A suitable CCTV system will be maintained and be operational on the premises at all times when licensed activities are being carried out.
114. The Supervisors Register will state the name of the person who is in overall charge of the premises at each time that licensed activities are carried out, and this information will be retained for a period of twelve months and produced for inspection on request to an authorised officer.

Public Safety

115. During opening hours the cellar door must be kept locked or adequately supervised to prevent unauthorised access by the public.
116. Electrical installations will be inspected on a periodic basis (at least every 3 years or at a frequency specified in writing) by a suitably qualified and competent person. If used, any temporary electrical wiring and distributions will also be inspected. Inspection records/certificates will be kept. These will be made available at the request of an authorised officer.
117. One of the following protective measures shall be used for all socket-outlets which may be used for the connection for lighting, video or sound amplification equipment and display models:
 - a) Each socket-outlet circuit shall be protected by a residual current device having a rated residual operating current not exceeding 30mA.
or
 - b) Each individual socket-outlet shall be protected by an integral residual current device having a rated residual operating current not exceeding 30mA.

The current operation of all residual current devices shall be checked regularly by pressing the test button. If the device does not switch off the supply, an electrical contractor should be consulted. At the same time action should be taken to prohibit the use of socket outlets associated with a faulty residual current device
118. Safety glass that is impact resistant should be used wherever possible in all areas where the public may come into contact with it. Where it is not used in public areas, glazing should be shielded to protect it from impact.
119. A written spillage policy will be kept to ensure spillages are dealt with in a timely and safe manner
120. Members of the public will be prevented from accessing hot food and drink preparation areas to prevent risk of scalds or burns to them.
121. Where strobes, lasers, smoke machines or any other special effects equipment may be used, a written health and safety policy covering all aspects of their use will be provided, and staff will be appropriately trained.
122. No strobes, lasers, smoke machines or any other special effects, will be used at the premises unless there is a clearly displayed warning at the entrance to the premises that such equipment is in use.
123. A suitably trained and competent person must ensure regular safety checks of the premises including decorative and functional fixtures, floor surfaces and equipment (including electrical appliances) to which the public may come into contact are undertaken. Records of these safety checks must be kept and made available for inspection by an authorised officer
124. Written records of all accidents and safety incidents involving members of the public will be kept. These will be made available at the request of an authorised officer.

Name and Address of Premises: 143 - 145 New Road Side, Horsforth, Leeds, LS18 4QD

We refer to your licensing application for the above premises. We believe that your application does not give enough information about how you intend to meet an important objective of the licence, which is to prevent public nuisance. We therefore confirm that we are submitting a formal objection to your application.

We base our objection on the following matters:

- The potential for noise disturbance associated with licensable activities to break out of the premises or pass through the fabric of the building to cause noise disturbance to nearby residential/business premises.
- The potential for noise disturbance from the use of outside areas whilst smoking/drinking in the area/s provided/whilst arriving/leaving, including that from vehicles.
- The potential for the alleged sources of nuisance described above to continue into hours where such disturbance may adversely affect sleep and other loss of the use and enjoyment of a property.
- That the hours of operation applied for would set a precedent in an area already served by late opening venues. If the precedent was set and other businesses granted such hours then there would be a significant added impact of noise disturbance deeper into the early morning hours to the surrounding residential premises. The existing impact includes noise from loud music and from sources outside such as from customers.



- The application premises are situated within the Horsforth Cumulative Impact Policy area; where it is the council's policy, on receipt of relevant representations, to refuse new and variation applications for the following premises:
 - Alcohol led premises such as bars, pubs and clubs
 - Café bars and restaurants
 - Premises seeking late night refreshment such as takeaways and late opening restaurants

We also base our objection on experience including that specifically associated with the premises and the area including data relating to complaints received from members of the public.

Having read the matters we describe below if you feel we should consider anything else please do not hesitate to contact us.

Description of the surrounding area

There are a number of commercial properties along New Road Side including, takeaways, shops & offices. East Horsforth bar and restaurant is next door at 141 New Road Side. Both premises share the same Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) however different premises license holders. Kobe Bar lies further down across the main road. There are number of residential properties opposite the application site on Rose Avenue and behind on Victoria Gardens. There is another public house and a number of restaurants located further up New Road Side.

The onus is on the applicant to demonstrate such matters (Items 8.33 to 8.41 of the amended guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 – June 2014)

Complaint and other history specific to the applicant premises

The applicant premises existed as a restaurant since 1996 to the present. Opening hours are restricted by planning to 0800 hours to 2330 hours Monday to Saturday, and 1200 hours to 2300 hours on Sundays. In 2006 a planning application was received to extend opening hours, the application was withdrawn. Another application was received in 2010 to extend opening hours to 10:00 to 0030 Sunday to Thursday and 10:00am to 0130 Friday and Saturday which was refused.

This department has received complaints relating to noise from loud music, noise from patrons entering/leaving the premises and whilst smoking outside. Complaints were received between 2004 and 2014 which have been resolved informally. Those from the last 6 years have been noted in appendix B. There have been 12 complaints in relation to noise from patrons or music emanating from the premises since 2010. Four of the complaints involve noise from patrons in external areas, this includes noise from patrons smoking and leaving the premises.

We anticipate that the applicant may refer to the temporary events notifications (TENs) at any scheduled hearing. We had no grounds to oppose the TENs, but would like to make the following observations. Any objection to a TEN must be specific to the premises and not the whole of the cumulative impact area as with licensing applications. If we were to receive a TEN from a premises linked to significant complaints, we would consider raising an objection based on the site specific evidence.

We have in the past compared service requests concerning specific premises with their TENs. We and found no significant link between TENs and complaints received for any of the premises involved. What was striking during that exercise was the overall lack of such a link, when considering that most of the premises involved that submitted TENs were at some point the subject of complaints of noise whilst operating as usual.

We believe it is reasonable to disregard any suggestion that TEN events that cause no allegations of disturbance means that the days and times of the TEN would cause no issues if operated routinely.

Complaint history for the area around the venue

A search of service requests received by our team since 2010 was undertaken for an area up to 250m radius of the applicant premises in relation to noise from licenced premises. It revealed there have been 19 complaints. 12 of which were in relation to the applicant's premises, 6 related to 141 New Road Side and 1 related to Kobe Bar. 11 of the complaints relate to noise from patrons in external areas. The complaints are listed in appendix 2.

Conclusions reached

We conclude that the area in which the applicant premises are situated is sensitive to noise. Service requests concerning noise include a number emanating coming from outside areas, which would include those where we could not apply our powers under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 (Statutory nuisance). For example, people on the street or outside the boundary of premises who may cause disturbance to local residents by shouting, talking and whilst hanging around waiting for taxis. If the premises were to open later, patrons are likely to leave more drunk and background noise levels will be lower therefore any external noise or music will be more noticeable.

The application seeks to increase its hours beyond the use of other drinking establishments on New Road Side. It is likely this will result in patrons congregating at the later opening bar increasing the potential for disturbance on the street. In addition this will set a precedent for other bars and restaurants to apply for extend their hours of use.

The application has provided no reasons to show that their application is exceptional so as to warrant an alternative view to that directed within the C.I.P. red area

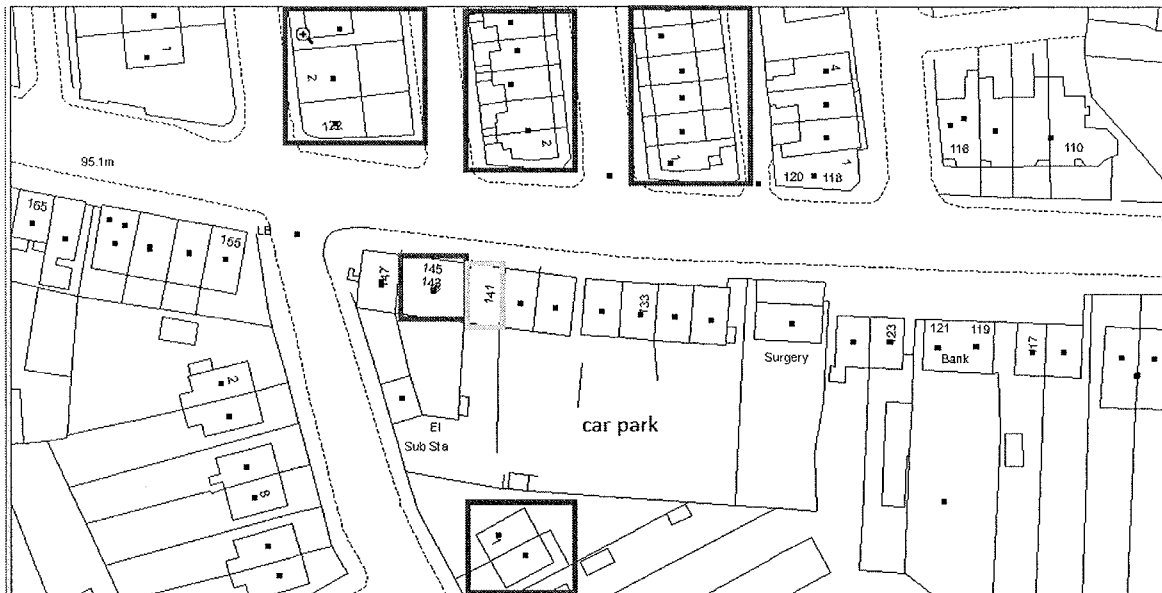
We recommend that the Sub-Committee refuse the application.

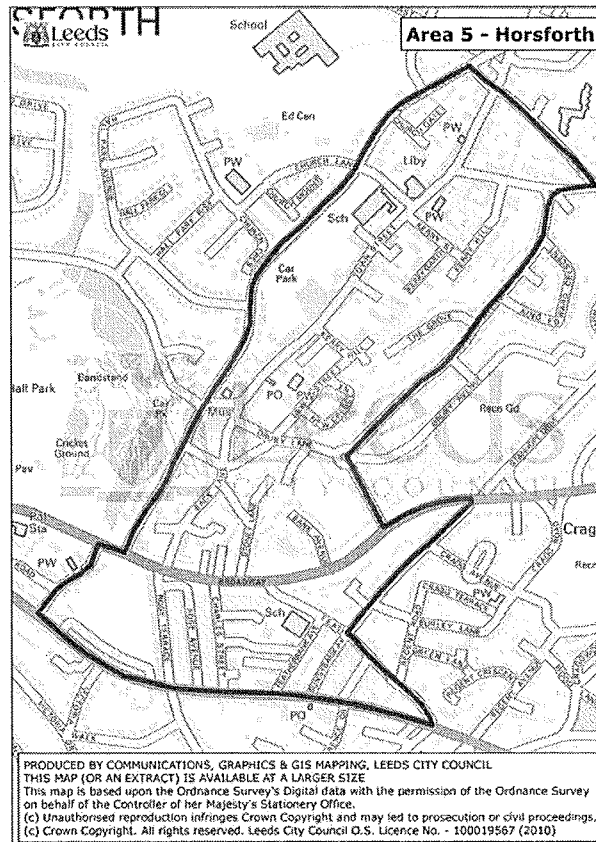

Cumulative Impact Policy

Area 5 relates to the Horsforth district of Leeds centred on Town Street. It includes all areas inside the green boundary, but also the premises on the south side of New Road Side.

It is the council's policy, on receipt of relevant representations, to refuse new and variation applications in Area 5 for licences for pubs, clubs, bars, café bars, restaurants and takeaways, unless the applicant can demonstrate that their application would not impact on the cumulative effect of such licensed premises in the area.

Rationale

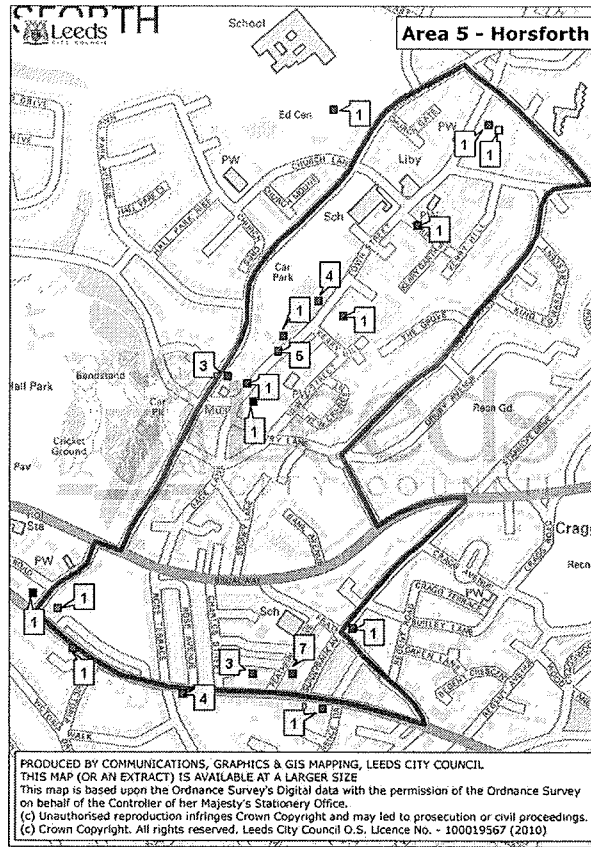
Since the adoption of the Horsforth CIP the council has recognised that the accumulation of licensed premises along New Road Side has contributed to public nuisance in that area, especially as it encourages the use of a route through residential areas used by people moving from Town Street to New Road Side. As a consequence this area has been included in the cumulative impact area for Horsforth.

Horsforth has also experienced creep in licensed hours in the area. The council has noted that although it received no new applications for premises licences it did receive 8 variations in the same time period.

Concern has been expressed by residents about the litter nuisance and public nuisance caused by takeaway premises. The council has received a number of complaints relating to litter and odour nuisance that can be related to takeaway premises.

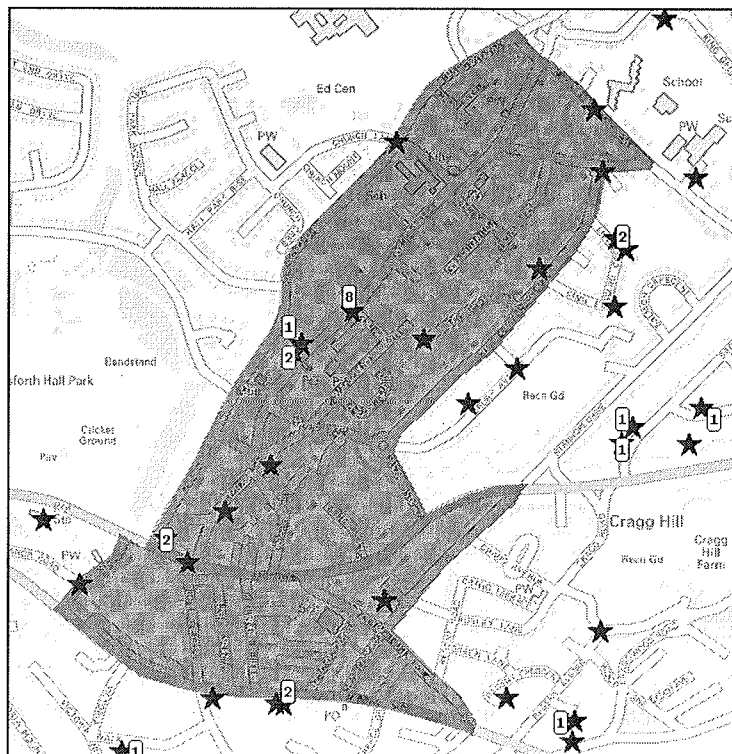

The above map shows the number and location of nuisance complaints received by Leeds City Council relevant to licensed premises in Area 4 since 2005.

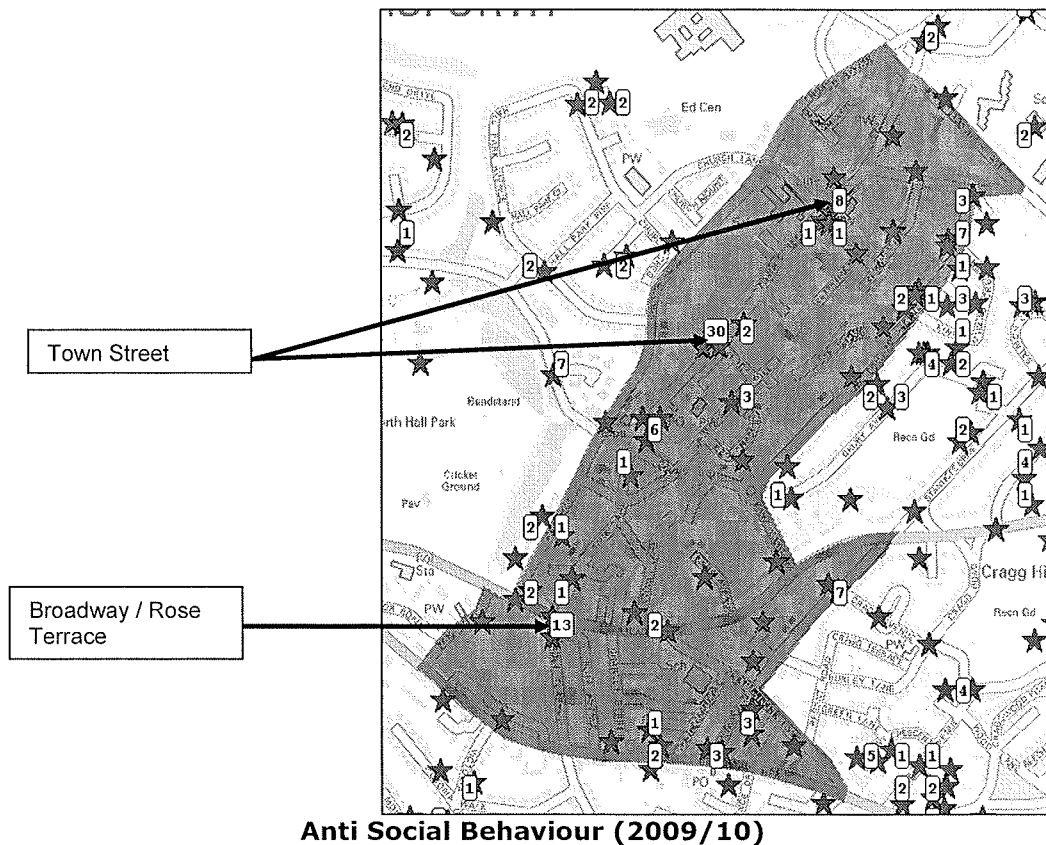

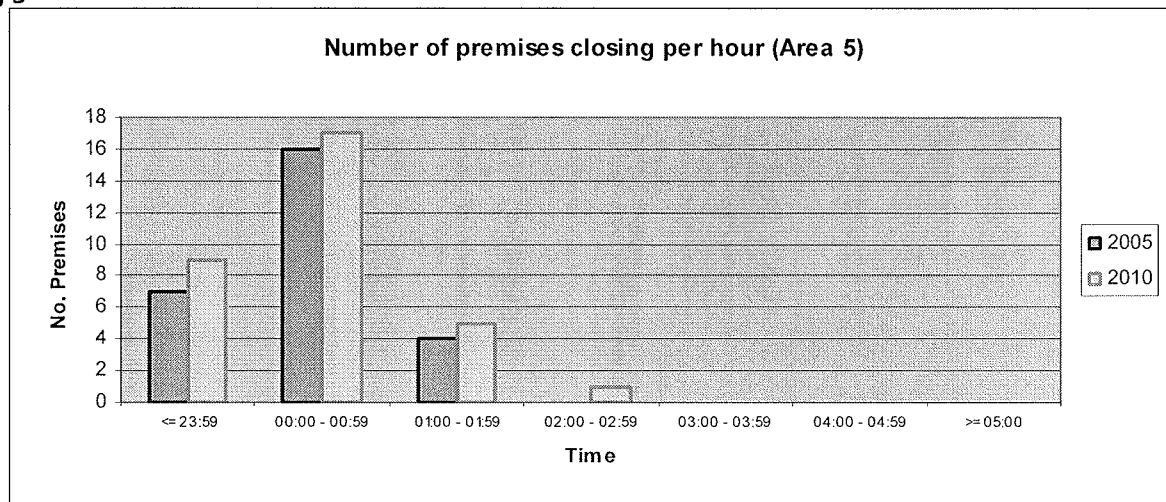

As can be seen from the above maps, there is a concentration of nuisance reports, anti-social behaviour and violent crime in the areas dominated by licensed premises. The concentration is less pronounced with violent crime however, is still apparent in the area around Town Street.

As Fig 5 shows, there has been a very slight and gradual increase over the past 5 years with respect to the number of premises and latest terminal hour for premises in Area 5.

In real terms the numbers are very small and can be summarised as – 2 extra premises which close prior to midnight, and 1 extra premises each for the three following 1 hour time slots. Unlike Area 2, these are not premises which have, in effect, moved their hours later, but rather extra premises on top of what already existed.

While the actual numbers are small, this is to be expected as Area 5 is geographically a small area, where one premises can make a large difference.

Even with reduced numbers, the pattern of increased numbers of premises opening later is evident. Overall, Area 5 now has three more premises open beyond midnight than it did in 2005 (15% increase) – echoing the concerns of local residents that premises are very slowly increasing their hours by small increments.

NB: The above analysis includes the proposed area around New Road Side, as this is an area of concern for residents, and also is the focus of a good proportion of the nuisance complaints.
