#### 2. Please provide a brief description of what you are screening

#### Main aim

The rapidly increasing birth rate in Leeds has resulted in the need to provide an additional amount of places for reception age children in this area of the city. Sharp Lane Primary School was subsequently identified as school site requiring permanent expansion. As such an extension project has been developed to allow pupil numbers to increase from 420 to 630 with effect from September 2014.

#### Purpose

A screening exercise has been carried out to determine if the new extension block required at Sharp Lane Primary to create six new teaching spaces for September 2014 will impact upon equality. These additional teaching spaces, in conjunction with minor remodelling, are required to house the increased school population.
