### **Summary of main issues**

- 1. Leeds City Council has been approached by the Home Office to resettle refugees as art of national and international resettlement programmes.
- 2. The resettlement programmes would be funded by the Home Office through grant agreements with Leeds City Council.

## 1 Purpose of this report

1.1 The report outlines the proposal for Leeds City Council to accept grants from the Home Office to deliver resettlement programmes in Leeds.

# 2 Background information

- 2.1 The Home Office and Cabinet Office wrote to all Local Authorities in the UK in 2013 and 2014 requesting participation in resettlement programmes including providing housing, integration and other support to individuals for a limited period of time from entering the UK.
- 2.2 The proposed resettlement programmes will be funded by grant agreements between the Home Office and Leeds City Council.

#### 3 Main issues

- 3.1 The total value of the grant agreements will be over £250,000 requiring a key decision for acceptance of the grant

4.1.1 Consultations have taken place within Leeds City Council with Executive Member (Neighbourhoods, Planning and Personnel) and relevant Chief Officers.
