#### Summary of main issues

- 1. Planning permission for a single storey medical centre with pharmacy and car parking (reference number 14/03590/FU) was granted in August 2014.
- 2. In order to satisfy planning condition 6 for the above works, the introduction of new waiting restrictions are required to control on-street parking and to ensure the safety and free-flow for all Highway users within the vicinity of the development.
- 3. To ensure the standard and specification of the new vehicular access, the Developer will need to enter into a Mini Section 278 Agreement with Leeds City Council.

#### Recommendations

- 4. The Chief Officer (Highways and Transportation) is requested to:
  - i) note and approve the proposed waiting restrictions as outlined in Section 3 and indicated on drawing referenced: 278209-LCC-HWT-XX-DR-EP-TRO\_03, at an estimated cost of £6,000 for Traffic Regulation Order costs;
  - ii) instruct the City Solicitor to advertise a draft Traffic Regulation Order in relation to the waiting restrictions as indicated on drawing referenced: 278209-LCC-HWT-XX-DR-EP-TRO\_03, and, if no valid objections are received then make, seal and implement the Order; and
  - iii) give authority to enter an agreement with the Developer under provision of Section 278 of the Highways Act 1980 for provision of a new vehicular access

and associated footway works on Swinnow Green, Pudsey at an estimated cost of £2,500 for staff fees.

#### **1** Purpose of this report

1.1 This report seeks the authority for the provision of new waiting restrictions along Swinnow Green, Pudsey and the authority to enter into a Mini Section 278 Agreement with the Developer. The total estimated cost of the proposed scheme is £8,500.

#### 2 Background information

- 2.1 Planning permission for a single storey medical centre with pharmacy and car parking (reference number 14/03590/FU) was granted in August 2014.
- 2.2 In order to satisfy planning condition 6 for the above works, the introduction of new waiting restrictions are required to control on-street parking and to ensure the safety and free-flow for all Highway users within the vicinity of the development.

#### 3 Main issues

- 3.1 The Highway Works will consist of the following:
- 3.2 The introduction of 'No Waiting at Any Time' restrictions on Swinnow Green and Swinnow Road, as indicated on drawing referenced: 278209-LCC-HWT-XX-DR-EP-TRO\_03, to ensure the safety and free-flow for all Highway users.
- 3.3 The physical works required to implement the proposed restrictions will be carried out by the Developer.
- 3.4 The Developer will need to enter into a Mini Section 278 Agreement with Leeds City Council to ensure the new vehicular access and associated footway works are constructed to Highway Authority requirements.
- 3.5 The Mini Section 278 Agreement is currently being progressed and the Developer has already paid the fees and the Maintenance Bond associated with the Agreement.

# 4 Corporate Considerations

#### 4.1 Consultation and Engagement

4.1.1 Relevant sections in Highways and Transportation have been consulted and their comments have been incorporated where possible.

4.1.2 The Emergency Services and Metro were consulted on 5<sup>th</sup> November 2015. No issues were raised with the proposals.

4.1.3 Ward Members of Pudsey, along with local businesses and residents were consulted on 5<sup>th</sup> November 2015. Some issues were raised about the possibility of vehicles parking on Swinnow Road opposite the new surgery and obstructing the visibility of vehicles exiting driveways on Swinnow Road. Subsequently, following consultation with

the Traffic Management section and Ward Members, additional restrictions have been incorporated in the proposals.

4.1.4 Further consultation with Ward Members and local residents and businesses was undertaken on 20<sup>th</sup> November 2015, with no adverse comments received and two councillors expressing support for the proposals.

4.1.5 All parties are now in support of the latest proposals included in this report.

#### 4.2 Equality and Diversity / Cohesion and Integration

- 4.2.1 A screening document (Appendix 1) has been prepared and has identified that there is no requirement to carry out an independent impact assessment on the proposals requested.
- 4.2.2 Crossing points will be provided for pedestrians, as part of the Mini Section 278 Agreement works, where the desire to cross exists and where suitable provision has been specifically provided. These measures provide a safer environment for all pedestrians, especially parents with young children, blind and visually impaired people, wheelchair users, people with mobility issues and the infirm.
- 4.2.3 The proposals will have a negative effect on some people due to the removal of onstreet parking, however, this is mitigated against by providing a safer environment for all pedestrians, especially the equality characteristics mentioned in 4.2.2. Also, blue badge holders are able to park on double yellow lines and there will also be off street parking in the new car park for users of the new development.

#### 4.3 Council policies and City Priorities

4.3.1 The proposed Waiting Restrictions accord with the Council's Local Transport Plan and other policies in that they provide a safe means of access for all users of the Highway, to and around, the development.

#### 4.4 Resources and value for money

4.4.1 The total estimated cost of the scheme is  $\pounds 8,500$ , comprising  $\pounds 6,000$  Traffic Regulation Order costs and  $\pounds 2,500$  staff fees.

4.4.2 The scheme will be fully funded by the Developer through Mini Section 278 revenue receipts.

#### 4.5 Legal Implications, Access to Information and Call In

4.5.1 The works are exempt from call in being a consequence of and in pursuance of a regulatory decision.

#### 4.6 Risk Management

4.6.1 The Council's standard Mini Section 278 Agreement will be used whereby the developer will fund the total cost of the works, including the cost of introducing the new waiting restrictions.

# 5 Conclusions

5.1 This report seeks authority to promote 'No Waiting at Any Time' restrictions as part of a Mini Section 278 Agreement to satisfy a planning condition of a new commercial development.

# 6 Recommendations

- 6.1 The Chief Officer (Highways and Transportation) is requested to:
  - note and approve the proposed waiting restrictions as outlined in Section 3 and indicated on drawing referenced: 278209-LCC-HWT-XX-DR-EP-TRO\_03, at an estimated cost of £6,000 for Traffic Regulation Order costs;
  - ii) instruct the City Solicitor to advertise a draft Traffic Regulation Order in relation to the waiting restrictions as indicated on drawing referenced: 278209-LCC-HWT-XX-DR-EP-TRO\_03, and, if no valid objections are received then make, seal and implement the Order; and
  - iii) give authority to enter an agreement with the Developer under provision of Section 278 of the Highways Act 1980 for provision of a new vehicular access and associated footway works on Swinnow Green, Pudsey at an estimated cost of £2,500 for staff fees.
