Summary of main issues

- There is currently a plot of land located between the two parades of shops on Harrogate Road at its junction with Allerton Grove (Moortown Corner) which has been identified by the Moortown Ward Members and the Moortown Community Group as an area to be developed and improved.
- 2. At the present time Allerton Grove is physically closed off by means of a formal closure with concrete bollards which prevents vehicular traffic, but it is felt by the local community to be quite unsightly.
- 3. This report seeks approval to construct a pedestrianised communal area with benches, planters and a community notice board that can be used by members of the public.
- 4. This report also seeks approval to alter the Traffic Regulation Order for the point closure to include the proposed area of the works.

Best City Ambition

5. The Best Council Plan 2015-20 outlines how Leeds City will achieve its ambition to become the Best City in the UK and Leeds City Council the best local authority. One objective of the Best Council Plan is supporting communities, which encourages the local community to be more involved in their area. This scheme has been designed in collaboration with the local community group which allows them to

influence decisions on where they live and improve the area for the wider community.

1. Recommendations

- 1.1 The Chief Officer (Highways and Transportation) is requested to:
 - authorise the detailed design and subsequent implementation of a scheme to introduce a new pedestrianised footway area on Allerton Grove as shown on the attached drawing TM-24-2378-01-03;
 - ii) note the proposed cost of the scheme is £22,000 funded by £7,000 from the Moortown Community Group and £15,000 from Councillors Ward Based Initiative monies.
 - iii) instruct the City Solicitor to:
 - a) advertise a draft Traffic Regulation Order amending the existing movement order to include the extended point closure; and
 - b) should no valid objections be received, make and seal the order as advertised.

2. Purpose of this report

2.1 The purpose of this report is to seek approval for the alteration of the existing road closure and the construction of a pedestrianised communal area on Allerton Grove between the two parades of shops as shown on drawing TM-24-2378-01-03.

3. Background information

- 3.1 The Moortown Community Group has been in discussion with Ward Members and Highway Officers for a number of years about the unsightly road closure and the possibility of re-developing the area between the two parades of shops on Harrogate Road in the Moortown Corner area.
- 3.2 Through consultation with residents and businesses in the area, the Moortown Community Group have received positive feedback on proposals in this area that would improve it for the local community whilst maintaining the closure to vehicular traffic. Meetings with Highway Officers identified some coloured paving and kerbstones that are being stored at the Henshaw Depot, which could be utilised in order to improve the aesthetics of the proposed communal area.

4. Main issues

4.1 Design Proposals/Scheme Description

4.1.1 In order to improve the area it is proposed to alter the existing road closure and introduce a communal area on Allerton Grove. This will be done through the use of paving to improve the aesthetics of the overall area. It is also proposed to introduce

- benches, planters and a community notice board, being provided and maintained by the Moortown Community Group.
- 4.1.2 The total estimated cost of the proposed highway works is £22,000, consisting of £18,000 works costs and £4,000 staff fee costs to be funded partly by the Moortown Community Group (£7,000) and partly from Councillors Ward Based Initiative monies (£15,000).
- 4.1.3 The existing point closure states that it only covers 2m of Allerton Grove, and therefore it is necessary to alter the Traffic Regulation Order to extend the closure by 8m.

5.0 Programme

5.1 It is anticipated that the proposal will be commenced within the 2017 / 2018 financial year.

6. Corporate considerations

6.1 Consultation and engagement

- 6.1.1 Ward Members: Ward Members have been part of the regular meetings regarding the design and fully support the changes being proposed.
- 6.1.2 Emergency Services: The community group liased with the West Yorkshire Police Crime Reduction Officer to discuss potential issues of creating a communal area with benches as there were concerns it may attract anti-social behaviour. Whilst they did make some recommendations to deter such behaviour (such as lighting and waste bins), they believe that the proposals will enhance the area. The other services and WYCA were not consulted as they road is currently closed and would not affect them.
- 6.1.3 Residents / Businesses: The Moortown Community Group consulted with those residents and businesses directly affected by the proposals, through letters and personal visits, and found that the response was positive.
- 6.1.4 Parks: Discussions were held with parks regarding the maintenance of the planters and plants. It was explained that the Moortown Community Group will be responsible for the maintenance of these through their links with Moortown in Bloom. If the group ever disbands it will be their responsibility to have the planters removed, however parks and highways retain the right to remove them if they feel that maintenance is not be undertaken or they are causing a hazard.
- 6.1.5 Asset Management: The proposals were discussed with Asset Management who were happy with the proposals providing the maintenance issues were clarified. It was explained that highways would look after the footway and paving, whilst the planters, noticeboard and benchers would be looked after by the Moortown Community Group. Asset Management did not approve of the use of coloured surfacing for the footway areas as this would present a maintenance issue, therefore this was removed and the footways would be constructed as standard.

6.2 Equality and diversity, cohesion and integration

- 6.2.1 The introduction of a pedestrianised area will provide positive impacts for pedestrian users, especially those with mobility issues, young and old people by:
 - Providing a safe area to get from one parade of shops to the other without having to negotiate dropped kerbs, the carriageway and motor vehicles.
 - Provide a safe environment for the local community to sit and wait during their visit to the area.

The scheme proposals may have provided negative impacts on road users by;

- The reduction in space for vehicles to park on Allerton Grove, however this is mitigated by the fact that Allerton Grove is subject to residents only permit parking, and there are no residential properties directly adjacent to the proposed works.
- The introduction of benches may encourage groups to congregate in the area, leading to an increase in anti-social behaviour. However this is being mitigated through the police suggestions of adequate lighting, waste bins and a careful selection of planter designs.

6.3 Council policies and the Best Council Plan

- 6.3.1 The proposals contained in the report have no implications for the council constitution.
- 6.3.2 Environmental Policy; the proposals contained in this report are in accordance with Aims 6 and 7 of the Policy in that the proposals will aid to "reduce the impact of traffic in the city by changes to the road system" and "develop a safe, healthy local environment which provides the best quality of life for Leeds residents.

6.4 Resources and value for money

6.4.1 **Full scheme estimate:** The total estimated cost of the proposed highway works is £22,000 consisting of £18,000 works costs and £4,000 staff fee costs to be partly funded by the Moortown Community Group (£7,000) and partly from Councillors Ward Based Initiative monies (£15,000).

7 Legal implications, access to information and call-in

- 7.1 There are no specific Legal implications included within this report, nor is any information contained within the report to be deemed confidential.
- 7.2 The scheme is in the annual programme and will be completed in the 2017-2018 financial year.

8.0 Risk management

8.1 There is no risk, over and above those expected when working in the public highway, generated by the proposals contained within this report.

9.0 Conclusions

9.1 It is considered appropriate to introduce these highway works as it will improve the aesthetics of the area and create a communal area, which can be used by the local community.

10.0 Recommendations

- 10.1 The Chief Officer (Highways and Transportation) is requested to:
 - authorise the detailed design and subsequent implementation of a scheme to introduce a new pedestrianised footway area on Allerton Grove as shown on the attached drawing TM-24-2378-01-03;
 - ii) note the proposed cost of the scheme is £22,000 funded by £7,000 from the Moortown Community Group and £15,000 from Councillors Ward Based Initiative monies.
 - iii) instruct the City Solicitor to:
 - a) advertise a draft Traffic Regulation Order amending the existing movement order to include the extended point closure; and
 - b) should no valid objections be received, make and seal the order as advertised
