Summary of main issues

- 1. A Tree Preservation Order ("the Order") was made in respect of the above site on 7 September 2017 on a provisional basis.
- 2. Under the Town and Country Planning (Tree Preservation) (England) Regulations 2012 the Order will expire if it has not been confirmed (whether or not subject to modification) within 6 months of the date of making.
- 3. One objection to the Order were received within the objection period.
- 4. The Chief Planning Officer is requested to determine whether or not the Order should be confirmed or confirmed subject to modification in light of the objection.

Recommendation

5. That the objection is overruled and the Order be confirmed as originally served.

1. Purpose of this report

- 1.1 To set out the background to the making of the provisional Tree Preservation Order and to note the fact that one objection to the Order has been submitted to the Council
- 1.2 To seek a determination from the Chief Planning Officer that the objection should be overruled in all the circumstances and that the Order should be confirmed as originally served.
- 1.3 Background information
- In September 2017 the brownfield site off Barnsdale Road in Allerton Bywater on which the proposed Tree Preservation Order is located was granted Planning Permission for new affordable housing under Planning Application 17/02935/FU. A site visit was consequently undertaken by the Tree Officer to inspect the trees. Both trees appeared generally healthy and were visible from much of The Avenue, given their frontage position.
- 1.2 In the light of community concerns about potential loss of an established 'buffer strip' of woodland trees on the northern boundary of the site, between the proposed new houses and existing housing on Park Avenue, the retention of the trees was agreed as part of the Planning Permission
- 1.3 Following assessment of the amenity value of the trees by Leeds City Council's Landscape Officer it was considered appropriate to serve a Tree Preservation Order to protect a Woodland comprising of a mix of Sycamore, Cypress, Poplar, Norway Maple and Hawthorn.
- 1.4 In the circumstances a Tree Preservation Order ('the Order'), was made and served on 7 September 2017

2 Main issues

- 2.1 One letter of objections to the Order was received within the objection period from an adjoining property owner
- 2.2 All grounds of objection have been considered by Tree Officer and for the reasons given in their comments it is considered that the Order should be confirmed as originally served.

3 Corporate Considerations

3.1 Consultation and Engagement

- 3.1.1 Tree Preservation Orders are served on landowners on a provisional basis any other party holding an interest in the land other parties and adjoining landowners where any trees overhang their boundary.
- 3.1.2 A minimum statutory objection period of 28 days applies in respect of any Order made.

3.2 Equality and Diversity / Cohesion and Integration

3.2.1 Human Rights. It is necessary to balance the rights of the landowners against the public interest in the protection of trees provided for by the statutory provisions. Local Planning Authorities have the powers to make Tree Preservation Orders if it appears to be expedient in the interests of amenity to make provision for the preservation of trees or woodlands in their area. In the present case the amenity of the trees is considered on balance to justify the making confirmation of a Tree Preservation Order and to outweigh the rights of the property owners to manage trees without local authority control.

3.3 Council policies and City Priorities

3.3.1 The work of the Sustainable Development Unit forms a vital element of the 'Vision For Leeds', 'City Priority Plan' and 'Council Business Plan', which are relevant to the aims of: maintaining high quality buildings, places and green spaces which are clean and looked after; respecting the City's heritage; enabling the growth of the city whilst protecting its distinctive green character. These aims are promoted by the making of Tree Preservation Orders.

3.4 Resources and value for money
