Summary of main issues

- 1. The Best Council Plan update of 2017/18 sets Council outcomes, including:
 - 1.1. Enjoy happy, healthy, active lives; the provision of leisure facilities enhances access to activities and programmes to allow people to enjoy healthy and active lives.
 - 1.2. Enjoy greater access to green spaces, leisure and the arts; by enhancing the facilities within Aireborough Leisure Centre.
- 2. A refurbishment of the swimming pool, changing rooms, reception and entrance as well as the addition of a community hub is currently being undertaken at Aireborough Leisure Centre with the aim of providing an up to date and user friendly facility which will in turn increase the number of users and therefore enhance the access for people to participate.

- 3. The rear car park at the leisure centre currently has 48 spaces. The proposal will give 83 spaces, which will cater for the anticipated increase in users at the centre.
- 4. In December 2018, Executive Board approved an injection of £500k a year for 3 years for sport maintenance projects that enhance the income generating potential of leisure facilities.
- 5. The purpose of this report is therefore to request authority to spend £140k on car park refurbishment works at Aireborough Leisure Centre from the sport maintenance budget 32197\CAR\000.

Recommendations

- 6. The Director of City Development is recommended to:
 - a. Approve the authority to spend £140k on car park refurbishment works at Aireborough Leisure Centre from the sport maintenance budget 32197\CAR\000;
 - b. To note that the Chief Officer for Culture and Sport is responsible for the implementation of these proposals.

1 Purpose of this report

1.1 The purpose of this report is to request the authority to spend £140k on car park refurbishment works at Aireborough Leisure Centre from the sport maintenance budget 32197\000\000.

2 Background information

- 2.1 Aireborough Leisure Centre is currently undergoing refurbishment that will see the following improvements:
 - 2.1.1 Retiled swimming pools tanks, walls and decking;
 - 2.1.2 New gender neutral changing rooms, with facilities for male and female changing, families, schools and the wider community;
 - 2.1.3 Reoriented entrance;
 - 2.1.4 New reception;
 - 2.1.5 New community hub and cafe
- 2.2 The improvements, together with anticipated further improvements to the dryside element of the building, will increase the number of users of the centre significantly. The business case for the pool alone has indicated an increase of up to 10,000 users a year, with further users relocating from the Guiseley library to the community hub. The numbers will increase further should the plans for developing the dryside facilities come to fruition.
- 2.3 The car park has experienced issues for some time with overcrowding and congestion as it also serves the local community businesses as well as the primary school and theatre
- 2.4 On investigation with colleagues from Highways, the current rear car park can be increased from 48 spaces to 83, with disabled parking going from 5 spaces to 4. An additional 4 disabled car parking spaces are being provided through the current scheme as part of the main entrance relocation to the front of the facility.

3 Main issues

- 3.1 Design proposals and full scheme description.
- 3.2 The removal of a redundant roundabout and reorienting of current car park spaces to provide 83 car park spaces and 4 disabled parking spaces.
- 3.3 A plan is shown at 7.1.
- 3.4 Programme –
- 3.5 The works will be planned to follow on from the current refurbishment so as to cause least disruption to centre users as possible. The works are anticipated to be

- completed before the proposed dryside refurbishment, enabling access to the additional car park spaces as early in the programme as possible.
- 3.6 The works are being planned and managed through LCC Highways and are anticipated to be carried out between September and December 2018.

4 Corporate considerations

4.1 Consultation and engagement

- 4.1.1 The Executive Member for Resources and Strategy and Members for Guiseley and Rawdon have been consulted on and are supportive of the plans.
- 4.1.2 Consultation with planners has confirmed this is a permitted development under the Town and Country Planning Order 2015.

4.2 Equality and diversity / cohesion and integration

4.2.1 A screening document has been prepared and an independent impact assessment is not required for the approvals requested. The screening document has been attached at Appendix B.

4.3 Council policies and the best council plan

- 4.3.1.2 Enjoy greater access to green spaces, leisure and the arts; by enhancing the facilities within Aireborough Leisure Centre.
- 4.3.1.3 The Best Council Plan 2015 20, updated for 2017/18 underlines the aim of the city to tackle poverty and reduce inequalities. The role of a leisure centre is clear in the reduction of the health inequalities found across the city and the participation in sport and active lifestyles being a contributing factor to reducing this gap. The health cost of inactivity is estimated to cost the city £10.95m per annum (Sport England), with particular correlations between levels of inactivity and obesity and distinct inequalities in participation in different areas of the city. Reducing these health inequalities is a major priority within the city to which sport and active lifestyles can contribute.
- 4.3.1.4 These objectives are supported through the improvements at Aireborough Leisure centre by ensuring the longevity of the facility for the north west of the city and by providing light, airy and welcoming spaces that people want to use and exercise in and that provide accessible spaces to people who currently cannot use the centre due to its outdated design.
- 4.3.1.5 This in turn also supports the following 2017/18 priorities:



- 3 Members have been consulted and have confirmed their support for the works as they consider them important to the local community – both current users and local businesses
- 4 Feedback to the centre manager from customers has highlighted that the size of the car park can be a barrier to accessing the site

Key findings

There may be issues with the residents that border the car park feeling they are being disturbed by the works, and users in general will experience a loss of car parking spaces during the works period.
