Executive Summary

1. In October 2008, the Secretary of State invited local authorities to submit proposals for government action to improve the quality of life in their area. Leeds City Council has consulted representatives of local persons on what proposals to submit. A proposal to extend the Council's powers to deal with obstructive parking meets the terms of the Act. It is recommended that Executive Board supports the proposal to formally submit this suggested change to the Local Government Association (which will act as 'selector' on behalf of Government) before the deadline of 31 July 2009.

1.0. Purpose of this Report

1.1. This report informs Executive Board of the process undertaken in Leeds to comply with the Sustainable Communities Act; how the Council proposes to respond to the suggestions received, and; recommends that one of the submissions received is formally submitted by Leeds City Council to the Selector.

2.0. Background Information

- 2.1. The Secretary of State invited local authorities to submit proposals under the Sustainable Communities Act in October 2008. The Sustainable Communities Act provides a channel for local authorities to submit proposals to improve the sustainability of their areas that require Government action. Such action can include a change in legislation or the transfer of a function (and accompanying budget) from one organisation to another.
- 2.2. The Sustainable Communities Act requires local authorities to consult with local representatives before proposals can be submitted. In Leeds, the Sustainable Communities Act has been discussed at all Scrutiny Boards; a presentation was given at a conference of parish and town councilors, and; a briefing on the Act was circulated to all parish and town councils, Leeds Initiative groups and partners and voluntary and community and faith groups (through Leeds Voice) inviting proposals.

3.0. Main Issues

- 3.1. A number of suggestions were received as part of this process. In many cases, local authorities already have the powers to do the things suggested and officers have written to the Members or others who made these suggestions explaining how they can raise the issue with the Council. In a number of other cases, the Government has recently taken, or is taking, action to address the issues raised and those who made these suggestions will be written to explaining why the Council does not propose to take forward these proposals at this time. A third category of proposals were considered impractical or outside of scope of the intentions of the Sustainable Communities Act.
- 3.2. One issue that was raised by a number of respondents was the inconvenience caused by obstructive parking, including inconvenience caused to Council refuse and other vehicles as they go about their work. Currently, council employed Civil Enforcement Officers cannot issue Penalty Charge Notices for obstructive parking as this power is not included in Schedule 7 of the Traffic Management Act 2004. An amendment to this Act could extend that power to Council Civil Enforcement Officers. It is, therefore, proposed to submit a proposal to the Local Government Association to this effect. A submission form is attached as an appendix to this report.
- 3.3. A list of all proposals received has been provided to all Executive Board Members and is available on request from the committee clerk.

4.0. Implications For Council Policy and Governance

4.1. There are no policy and governance implications to this report.

5.0. Legal and Resource Implications

5.1. There are no legal and resource implications to the proposal in this report. If the Government chooses to grant Leeds' request, the Council will have a new power to tackle obstructive parking which can be exercised by its existing Civil Enforcement Officers at no additional cost.

6.0. Conclusions

6.1. By consulting interested groups, Leeds has demonstrated its commitment to involving local people in decision making. The measure proposed meets the requirements of the Sustainable Communities Act and is a practical and proportionate response to an issue that causes inconvenience to many people in Leeds.

7.0. Recommendations

7.1. It is recommended that Executive Board approve the submission of a proposal to extend the powers of Council employed Civil Enforcement Officers to issue Penalty Charge Notices.

Amend Schedule 7 of the Traffic Management Act 2004 to extend the powers of Civil Enforcement Officers to issue Penalty Charge Notices (PCN) for Obstructive Parking

Obstructive parking causes nuisance and inconvenience for residents, visitors and people going about their business including Council refuse and other vehicles. Currently, obstructive parking is a criminal offence and Council employed Civil Enforcement Officers cannot issue Penalty Charge Notices for obstructive parking. It is felt that this is not a high priority for the Police and the Council receives a number of requests to deal with obstructive parking that it cannot presently deal with.

Amending the law to grant Civil Enforcement Officers the power to issue Penalty Charge Notices for obstructive parking would enable them to deal with motorists who cause a nuisance to other road users, including commercial and public vehicles as well as private motorists, public transport and pedestrians.

Local residents and others affected by obstructive parking would see that the Council could deal with a nuisance. If the overall incidence of obstructive parking were to be reduced local residents and others would suffer less nuisance, including disruption to commercial or public activities.

Motorists affected would be able to challenge the issuing of a Penalty Charge Notice for obstructive parking in the same way they can challenge any other offence where a PCN is already issued.

Civil Enforcement Officers would need some additional training to deal with instances of obstructive parking but this could be done at little additional cost. The same would be true for Tribunal staff.

The Police might see a reduction in requests to deal with obstructive parking enabling them to concentrate on tackling other crime.

Good transport and the ability to travel easily around Leeds is a priority in both the Vision for Leeds 2004 to 2020 and the Leeds Strategic Plan 2008 to 2011 (Leeds Local Area Agreement). Evidence shows that traffic volumes have grown in Leeds as its economy has grown and reducing congestion is now a priority in the Leeds Strategic Plan. Alongside ambitious measures to increase capacity through New Generation public transport proposals improvements in traffic flow by reducing the number of obstructively parked vehicles would help achieve this priority in the Plan.

2.2 Over which geographic area will your proposal impact? (e.g. neighbourhood, town, city, sub-region)?

Leeds City Council Area

2.3 Who would benefit from your proposal?

Potentially all road users including pedestrians and cyclists as well as private motorists and public and commercial vehicles. Potentially the police who could release resources to deal with other crimes.

2.4 What steps will you take to mitigate any adverse affects on sustainability from your proposal (if relevant)?

There are no adverse effects on sustainability from this proposal

2.5 What project, activities and changes would take place in your area if your proposal was successful?

Civil Enforcement Officers would be trained to use this power responsibly and tribunal staff would be trained to deal with any challenges to the issuing of PCNs for obstructive parking fairly.

A report on the Sustainable Communities Act was presented to all the Council's Scrutiny Boards and Members invited to submit proposals. A Members seminar specifically on the Sustainable Communities Act was held to which all Members were invited.

A Briefing on the Act was sent to all Parish and Town Council Clerks and a presentation given to parish and town councillors at a conference for local town and parish councillors. Again with an invitation to submit proposals.

A presentation was given to the Leeds Voice Strategy Group, the umbrella body for the voluntary, community and faith sector in Leeds on the Act, a briefing circulated to all its member groups and an invitation to submit proposals. The membership of Leeds Voice includes representatives of groups that may be claimed to be underrepresented in traditional decision making processes in Leeds

A briefing was sent to all members of the Leeds Initiative, the local strategic partnership for Leeds and a presentation given to interested groups again with an invitation to submit proposals.

Consultees were pleased to have an opportunity to lobby for action to improve the sustainability of their area.

A number of elected Members expressed support for the proposal, citing obstructive parking as a concern that they heard raised frequently from residents in their area. The issue of parked vehicles obstructing Council refuse and other vehicles going about their business with an adverse effect on the delivery of important public services was also raised.

There were a number of other proposals in areas such as planning and building regulations, traffic regulations, support for third sector groups and other matters. In many instances it was clear that legislation already gives local authorities some scope to deal with these issues and a reminder of this can itself be useful.

The Council's Legal and Regulatory Services confirm that the proposed change in the law would achieve the desired affect. The Council's parking management service confirms that obstructive parking is one of the most frequent issues raised by the public.

3.4 Confirmation of council support

The process for formal endorsement is a matter for local discretion; however we anticipate that authorities will wish to gain political endorsement and clearance for the proposal through the relevant processes at local level. Please give details of how formal approval has been attained.

The Council's Executive Board met and approved this proposal at its meeting on 22 July 2009.

This proposal addresses a genuine public concern for local people in Leeds and probably in other authorities as well. The proposal has the support of local Members from all parties.

This measure involves a simple amendment to legislation and could be implemented quickly at no cost to central government.

The measure involves little additional cost to local authorities as it simply extends the power of a group of employees already employed by the Council. The processes for dealing with the issuing, paying and challenging of Penalty Charge Notices are already in place.

The measure may release resources for the Police to tackle other crimes.
