Executive Summary

1.0 Purpose Of This Report

1.1 The following is a report on provision of service activity in the outer south area which contribute to the delivery of the Leeds Teenage Pregnancy and Parenthood (TPP) Strategy in the outer south area. Please note that the information below was submitted by the agencies undertaking the activities.

2.0 Background Information

- 2.1 Why reducing teenage pregnancy matters
- 2.1.1 Evidence clearly shows that having children at a young age can damage young women's health and well-being and severely limit their education and career prospects. Long term studies show that children born to teenagers are more likely to experience a range of negative outcomes in later life, and are up to three times more likely to become a teenage parent themselves. The facts are stark:
 - The infant mortality rate for babies born to teenage mothers is 60% higher than for babies born to older mothers.
 - At age 30, teenage mothers are 22% more likely to be living in poverty than mothers giving birth aged 24 or over, and are much less likely to be employed or living with a partner.
 - Teenage mothers are 20% more likely to have no qualifications at age 30 than mothers giving birth aged 24 or over.
 - Teenage mothers have three times the rate of post-natal depression of older mothers and a higher risk of poor mental health for three years after the birth.

- Teenage mothers are three times more likely to smoke throughout their pregnancy, and 50% less likely to breastfeed, than older mothers both of which have negative health consequences for the child.
- Children of teenage mothers have a 63% increased risk of being born into poverty compared to babies born to mothers in their twenties and are more likely to have accidents and behavioural problems.
- Among the most vulnerable girls, the risk of becoming a teenage mother before the age of 20 is nearly one in three.
- 2.1.2 Rates of teenage pregnancy are far higher among deprived communities. The poorer outcomes associated with teenage motherhood also mean the effects of deprivation and social exclusion are passed from one generation to the next. There is also a strong economic argument for investing in measures to reduce teenage pregnancy as it places significant burdens on the NHS and wider public services.
- 2.1.3 The challenge for local areas, therefore, is
 - To recognise the interdependencies between teenage pregnancy and improving other outcomes for children and young people
 - To provide young people with the means to avoid early pregnancy
 - To tackle the underlying circumstances that motivate young people to want to be or lead them passively to become pregnant or young parents at a young age
 - To work in effective partnership to ensure universal provision for all young people with strengthened delivery for those most at risk
- 2.2 Leeds under 18 Conception Rates

The Government target is to reduce teenage pregnancy rates in Leeds by 55% by 2010 and to support 60% of teenage parents into education, employment and training. The figures show for 2007 a decrease in the rate of under 18 conceptions in the Leeds but it is higher than the national average





14 out of 24 primary schools (Appendix 1) in outer south have received support from the Sex and Relationship Education (SRE) Advisor for Primary Schools and have achieved the National Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) Certification and/or attended local SRE and PSHE training.

3.4 Sexual Health Services

All GP practices provide contraception and basic sexual health services. There is a pharmacy in Morley providing Emergency Hormonal Contraception (EHC) access, a new Contraception and Sexual Health (CaSH) clinic is opening on the Morley site of Joseph Priestley College on a Wednesday 2.30 to 5.30pm, and there are 4 C-Card points.
