1.0 Purpose of this report

This report seeks to provide:

2.0 Background information

- 2.1 Each Area Committee has been allocated a Well being Budget which it is responsible for administering. The aim of this budget is to support the social, economic and environmental well being of the area by using the funding to support projects that contribute towards the delivery of local priorities.
- 2.2 Well being funding cannot be paid retrospectively. An application form must be submitted and approved by the Area Committee before activities or items being purchased through Well being funding are completed or purchased.
- 2.3 Members are reminded that due to the timescales required for submission to Area Committee the deadline for receipt of completed documentation is at least five weeks before an Area Committee to allow for processing the necessary paperwork.

3.0 Well being Budget Position

Members should note the following points: -

3.1 **Revenue funding 2011/12**

- 3.1.1 The approved revenue budget for 2011/12 was £224,520.00 with a carry forward amount £175,708.00. The total commitment for the year 2011/12 was £ £180,890.59
- 3.2 Revenue funding available for 2012/13
- 3.2.1 The revenue budget approved by Executive Board for 2012/13 is £224,520.00.
- 3.2.2 **Appendix 1** shows the projects funded by the Area Committee up to and including the May meeting. The carry forward figure for 2011/12 is £219,337.41.
- 3.2.3 Therefore the total amount of revenue funding available to the Area Committee for 2011/12 is £ 443,857.41.

3.3 **Revenue funding 2012/13**

Children & Young People's Working Group

- 3.3.1 Following the establishment of the Children & Young People's Working Group, Members at the March Area Committee approved the allocation of £60,000 to this area of work. The group brings together representatives from the statutory and community & voluntary sector who work with and for children & young people, their families and carers in the Inner South. By working together the group will support, coordinate and monitor partners' respective delivery arrangements, to ensure that the Area Committee funding produces added value in provision and enhance the positive impact of this work on the lives of children and young people in the Inner South.
- 3.3.2 Work has been ongoing to improve the approval process for projects related to children & young people. This year, projects have been scrutinised by the Area Support Team in the same way as all other submissions, followed up by discussions at the Children & Young People's working group. This process of consideration and recommendations from the sub-group gives a more appropriate overview of how each scheme fits in to the other work occurring in the area.
- 3.3.3 Improvements to the approval systems have continued in preparation for the 2013/14 financial year. An activity brief has been drafted and approved by the CYP working group. This document outlines the sub-group's criteria for activities. This, along with the application forms have been sent out to all of the current appropriate contacts held by the Area Support team, and also publicised publicly through a post on the South Leeds Life Blog. This transparent approach will hopefully lead to a different range of services being delivered than those in previous years.
- 3.3.4 Members approved funding of £60,000 for the year 2012/13. The majority of this has been allocated to schemes already, along with a significant amount of additional schemes funding out of last years budget for delivery this year. These figures are based on the approvals being sort at this meeting are accepted by the committee.

- 3.3.5 Due to the level of funding for schemes this year and the expected level of interest in the more open approach, funding for the 2013/14 budget will have to reflect the schemes above.
- 3.3.6 If budgets are approved by executive board to a similar level to this financial year members would have in the region of £224,520 to allocate to new schemes. The following indicative ringfences for 2013/14 are the same as the budgets were for 2012/13. However these ringfences may need to be examined to provide additional headroom for the new projects in 2013/14.

- 3.3.7 In the current year we estimate £130,000 will be spent on Children & Young peoples activities. It is suggested that Members ringfence £130,000 in principle for children & young people's projects for projects delivering in 2013/14 to enable the CYP WG to process applications in time for appropriate approval. This level of funding would allow for a range of schemes to be delivered in all of the wards through a transparent and open process.
- 3.3.8 As with the schemes this year the financial implications of this decision will have an impact on the 2012/13 financial year as well as the 2013/14 financial year. With the levels of current underspend in both Beeston & Holbeck and City & Hunslet spend in this financial year.
- 3.3.9 This proposal will have an effect on the level of money available to each ward next year, further work will be completed by officers for presentation at the November meeting of the Area Committee to explain these in more detail. The aim of these works is to support the work of the CYP working group but also to deliver the necessary longer term commitments such as the Priority Neighbourhood Worker and small grants budget.

- 3.3.10 Every effort will be made to offer options that maximise the amount of monies available to members for schemes specific to their wards.
- 3.3.11 Members are asked to note that the last Children & Young Peoples group meeting considered an application from the Friday Night Project. The group supported the application resulting in the summary being presented later in this report.

4.4 Project Summary: Youth provision

Name of Group or Organisation: St. Lukes Cares

Total Project Cost: £56,602

Amount proposed from Well Being Budget 2012/2013: £28,301 (October 2012-March

2013) (Revenue) - Subject to successful resolution of issues

Wards Covered: All three wards

The St Lukes Cares project was supported by Members for six months to allow the developments of the CYP working group to be in place. As discussed above these systems will be established to take project applications for delivery in 2013/14.

The 6 month allocation previously given to St Lukes Cares ends on the 30th September and if not supported there would be a gap in activities between 1st October -31st March 2013.

The CYP's recommendation is therefore that funding should be approved for the six months of October-march 2012 as set out below.

Officers are in discussions with St Lukes to resolve some issues and it is recommended that if funding is agreed that it is subject to the successful resolution of these.

Summary:

The aim of this project is to continue to provide a mix of youth activities for young people aged 8 – 12 years. The mix of sessions include open access activities for young people from various centres ('static sessions'), open access activities from the St. Lukes Cares youth bus ('mobile sessions'), and invite-only young leader programmes (The young leader and life skills programme is targeted at young people at risk of criminal and antisocial behaviour and aimed at getting them to change their lifestyles and become positive leaders in their local community.) The sessions of one and a half hours are run weekly and are the foundation on which St. Lukes Cares offers and signposts young people to further activities, programmes and courses whilst providing support to their families where appropriate. In delivering the sessions, St Lukes Cares will work in partnership and co-ordination with the Youth Service and other voluntary sector providers to avoid duplication and ensure the best use of resources.

4.5 Project Summary: Middleton Friday Night Project meets Back Yard Breeze

Name of Group or Organisation: Breeze Team (in partnership with Youth Service,

South Leeds Health For All ACE Project and NACRO)

Total Project Cost: £16,350

Amount proposed from Well Being Budget 2012/2013: £5,000 (Revenue)

Wards Covered: Middleton Park

Whilst the Middleton leisure centre is closed for refurbishment The Friday Night Project (FNP) is proposing to run as a Back Yard Breeze (BYB) with existing partners; LCC's youth service, NACRO, and SLHFA ACE Project, until they can move back into the leisure centre. Back Yard Breeze will provide sports, arts and crafts, music and media and issue based activities to young people aged 8-18 years of age on their doorstep on a Friday evening. We will make use of the Breeze BAM van (media trucks – please see below for more info), Breeze Football Cage and the youth service bus. These will help us to deliver a variety of activities and provide shelter in adverse weather conditions. We also plan to use the NACRO building in the winter months November to February, alongside the BAM Van and/or football cage.

The "BAM" Van is a multi purpose space that gives organisations the flexibility to deliver a range of activities and sessions to young people. It has workstations down both sides that can cater for 6 people at a time. The BAM van holds CDJ decks and awning on the side of the vans to run DJ workshops inside or out of the vehicle. There are Laptops and Digital cameras for film and creative Image workshops. The workstations can be folded away leaving seating around the van for group work and discussions and enough room for a table down the middle seating 8 comfortably. It can be used as a chill out space with a gaming element with 40" flat screen TVs and PS 3 whilst sessions are delivered outside the van. The "BAM" Vans are a flexible and versatile space that can get into the heart of any community, they are fully accessible with ramp access and they come with a driver, equipment and specialist practitioner. Also with their bright attractive exterior, designed by local young people (including a Middleton FNP club member) they are recognisable to young people from afar.

The funding being sought from the Well Being Fund would be used to pay towards the use of the BAM Van and Football cage. This will enable the team to deliver an attractive 'tried and tested' model of provision to young people, engaging existing club members and new young people by offering an attractive range of facilities in a place that young people socialise.

Staff are funded through the LCC's Breeze Team and in-kind contributions from, the Youth Service (YS), NACRO and ACE. The youth service have also offered the use of the youth service bus as an in-kind contribution.

This scheme has been recommended for approval by the Children & Young People's working group.

Area Committee Business Plan Priorities:

This proposal supports the Area Committee action to 'All children and young people in Leeds have access to out of school activities.'

4.6 Project Title: Off Road Bikes

Name of Group or Organisation: West Yorkshire Police

Total Project Cost: £103,928

Amount proposed from Well Being Budget 2011/2012: £3,952 Revenue

Ward Covered: All three Wards

Project Summary:

Following on from a successful initial year of funding for Police Off Road Motorcycles, this project seeks to provide continued funding for a resource which reduces the impact of the anti-social use of motorcycles and quad bikes upon the community.

Such use of motorcycles and quad bikes is regularly raised as an issue with elected members and the Police through engagement opportunities such as community meetings and through calls for service to the Police. The project during 2011/12 received 321 calls for service in Inner South which was approximately two thirds of the total calls received. Members have received a summary of the evaluation by email and several positive comments were made by Members in response.

The grant will be used to fund the leasing and running costs of two off road motorcycles. It is proposed that the costs for this project are shared across the Inner and Outer South Area with each Area Committee being asked to contribute a sum proportionate to the number of calls for service from each area (£3,952 from the Inner South and £1,976 from the Outer South areas) to cover the on-going leasing and running costs of the bikes with the West Yorkshire Police providing staff, equipment and fuel.

This scheme was approved in principle by members at the March 2012 meeting, subject to satisfactory evaluation that has now been received by Members.

Area Committee Business Plan Priority:

The project will assist in achieving the 'Residents in Inner South are safe and feel safe as a result of reduced crime and ASB' priority of the Business plan.

4.7 Project Title: Dream Radio Drama

Name of Group or Organisation: Dream Reality

Total Project Cost: £40,795.00

Amount proposed from Well Being Budget 2011/2012: £15,000.00 Revenue

Ward Covered: All three Wards

Project Summary

This project aim is to create a series of radio plays over the period of 12 months by the community for a wider audience which will be broadcast by the BBC and be available on a stand alone specifically created web site.

The project will produce 14 new radio plays that can be anything from 5-45 minutes in length. The plays will have a maximum cast of 7 and may include some professional actors. The plays can be by young people but with no experience (we would like to omit students except as volunteers on production). Writers will be chosen from the local urban area. The brief will be wide with the one condition that they have an urban, social class or cultural theme, historical or modern. The plays do not have to be related to one another but we will look to relate as least a quarter with the aim of creating an on going series. The plays will be recorded using the facilities of South Leeds Youth Hub with all the facilities of a fully functional studio. Workshop will be held to get the writers on task and up to speed, remote mentoring will be made available up until production.

Officers have scrutinised the project against the Area Committees business plan and feel that the main focus of the project is the production of the plays rather than the support and guidance of the local people involved in the project. This being the case officer would recommend that Members do not support the scheme to its full £15,000 requested. There are merits to the project due to it potential national exposure therefore members could support the principle of the scheme to a level of £3,000 (£1,000 per ward) on the basis of securing relevant match funding but at a reduced amount.

4.8 Project Title: Atha Street Bollards

Name of Group or Organisation: LCC Highways

Total Project Cost: £790.00

Amount proposed from Well Being Budget 2011/2012: £790.00 Revenue

Ward Covered: Beeston & Holbeck

Project Summary

This project will replace the flat topped bollards currently situated on the ginnel that runs from Dewsury Road to Atha Street. The design of the current bollards mean that they are used as tables for people buying takeaways at the adjacent food establishments. This leads to congregations of people and an intimidating atmosphere for local residents using the ginnel. By replacing the bollards with more appropriate street furniture will remove this issue and improve the aesthetics of the area. The quoted price for the works has been provided by LCC Highways department for an appropriate replacement bollard that continues to serve its purse with regards to restricting vehicular access.

Area Committee Business Plan Priority:

The project will assist in achieving the 'Residents in Inner South are safe and feel safe as a result of reduced crime and ASB' priority of the Business plan.
