2. Please provide a brief description of what you are screening

The Home Energy Conservation Act Further Report is being screened. This is based upon the HECA report 1996 and is required by government to evidence how every Council will help to reduce carbon emissions and alleviate fuel poverty. This report will help to save residents money on their fuel bills, reduce CO₂ emissions, lift households out of fuel poverty and create employment opportunities.

The report presents an ambitious but deliverable programme of works for the next 2 years and outlines our plans for the next 8 years. These integrated carbon reduction and affordable warmth plans are broken down broadly into three categories:

- Improving the energy efficiency of all homes in Leeds in order to reduce home energy demand.
- Supporting vulnerable people in crisis, or at risk of crisis, to reduce the immediate suffering caused by fuel poverty.
- Reducing the cost of fuel and increase incomes in the city.

The report identifies a range of actions, many of which are extensions of existing programmes. New programmes will be individually screened as part of project

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development.

We identified in the EDCI screening for the Home Insulation Scheme that:

"people in fuel poverty (including low income groups and some BME groups) are typically concentrated in inner city terraces which are not suitable for loft or cavity insulation ('hard to treat' properties). We have agreed with our chosen contractor to gather information on those people who's properties aren't technically suitable so that we can re-contact them with new offers linked to the government's Green Deal."

By framing the Further Report as a holistic programme that aims to reduce carbon, support vulnerable people and increase incomes, we will ensure that the environmental aspirations are backed up by social good. Individual programmes (such as the interim Green Deal framework) will be designed to make sure that private sector partners are incentivised to focus on improving heating and insulation in more deprived neighbourhoods as well as promoting carbon reductions from more affluent areas.

Key findings

The learning from Wrap Up Leeds, and the Green Deal Demonstrator have already fed into plans for a larger and longer-term Green Deal programme. We will also ensure that this is reflected in the interim Green Deal framework.

This will help to ensure that an offer for hard-to-treat properties is available over the medium and long term, to ensure equality of opportunity.

The Further Report will have an overwhelmingly positive effect as it is designed specifically to support vulnerable people in fuel poverty as well as reducing carbon emissions. By integrating the two issues, we can achieve environmental benefits whilst also securing social benefits.

Individual programmes within the Report will typically be supported by either loan or grant funding and all will help residents to save energy and money and make their homes warmer and healthier.
