Executive Board report – February 2018 on developments in regard to Digital Health and Well-Being

The report highlighted that we need to ensure we link our ambitions to be a smart city with that of being the Best City for health and Well-Being. The report noted that there are a range of projects underway to support these ambitions, but they need to be co-ordinated and we need to develop a pro-active approach to digital health and well-being.

It also notes that those people who are currently the least engaged with the digital world, notably older people and those with a learning Disability are also those with the most to gain from effective digital solutions.

The report also stresses the benefits of co-production. Which is generally with those with protected characteristics

The report has been developed with a strong equality brief, indeed its central thrust is on ensuring a stronger focus on digital health and well-being being targeted at those with protected characteristics, notably older people and disabled people.

The report also covers a varied range of projects – each of these have their own issues in regard to equality, but again the work has had a strong focus on equality and diversity

As noted, each of the projects highlighted has its own focus on equality. As they range extensively in scale, from Leeds Care Record (which will have had its own EIA's as work developed and reports were taken through the system) to the Inter-generational Writing project – which included reference to equalities in its application process to NESTA.

Each of the projects has strong user engagement – particularly in regard to older people, and where appropriate people from related disability groups etc.

Work has also looked at issues of inter-sectionality, notably in the larger projects, where efforts have been made to engage for example with older people from BAME communities.

Many of the projects directly feed into the Self-Management Board (which itself ultimately reports to the Health and well-Being Board). The Self-Management Board has good user representation from a range of groups, particularly around Long Term Conditions, who are often disabled people.

Crucially, much of the work is driven by an understanding of the current inequalities around digital engagement and digital access by older people and disabled people, as noted in the Executive Board report when it quotes the AGE UK audit. This has been backed up in local consultation and engagement. For example there is a strong digital element in response to the wishes of older people in Leeds as articulated in the cities

ambition to be the Best City to grow Old In. Similarly, access to digital support and
digital literacy as featured highly in the development of the Leeds Mental Health
Framework (which has exemplary engagement with people with MH needs) and is a
thread within the current update 'Being Me' – the Leeds Learning Disability strategy, led
by people with Learning Disability – especially in regard to a wish by people with a
learning disability to 'be connected'.


