#### 22 Inner South Community Committee Update Report

The report of the Head of Locality Partnerships updated members on the work in which the Communities Team was engaged in based on priorities identified by the Community Committee.

The following points were discussed:

 Councillor Almass, the community champion for Children & Families provided an update on recent work. Since the last meeting of the Inner South Community Committee there has been two subgroup meetings. A Youth

- Summit has been arranged on the 8<sup>th</sup> of November at the Civic Hall which will engage young people with the council & democracy.
- Councillor Iqbal, the community champion for Environment & Community Safety will be conducting a subgroup meeting in due course and had nothing to report during the meeting.
- Councillor Burke, the community champion for Health and Wellbeing provided an update on recent work. A subgroup meeting had been held but no one was in attendance, involvement from the community and local councillors would be needed. The Vitamin D campaign was ongoing and was noted to have been effective and important for the community.

Inspector Perry from West Yorkshire Police updated members on recent crime prevention initiatives within the Inner South of Leeds. Key areas were as follows:

- Difficulties the Police faced in tackling anti-social behaviour (ASB) related to
  motorbikes and how there was a balance in reducing ASB for residents while
  also recognising the danger posed to members of the public and the rider. It
  is common for the riders to wear balaclavas and be difficult to identify. West
  Yorkshire Police were currently reviewing their tactical policies for motorbike
  related crimes. Recently the police had recovered nineteen stolen motorbikes
  in the area.
- Community involvement is needed to tackle issues of ASB related to unauthorised traveller encampments. Evidence is needed to support claims of ASB, and a shared communication strategy is important.
- Trap houses are prevalent within the Inner South of Leeds. A 'cuckooing' forum has been set up which covers multiple districts and help from private landlords would speed up the process for tackling trap house related ASB.
- The day of action initiative had been effective in reducing the number of weapons there are on the streets. Positive results were shared on police force social media accounts and reached 150,000 local people.

The Community Committee discussions included:

- Members were mindful of the trend for crime to increase during the winter and anticipated preparations for this.
- Burglary is worrying for citizens and reassurance for them should be maximised, this can be implemented through crime prevention advice and targeting burglary prosecutions.
- Positive police work needs to be publicised to decrease the bad perception of the police and community engagement events were essential.

Cllr Burke passed on her thanks and appreciation for Sergeant Lunn for his Police work in the local community.

## 23 Age Friendly Strategy & Action Plan

The report of the Director of Public Health presented the refresh of the draft Age Friendly Strategy and Action Plan 2022-2025 to gain feedback. The report also requested support and promotion of the work of Age Friendly within the city.

Draft minutes to be approved at the meeting to be held on Wednesday, 30th November, 2022

The Community Committee were provided with the following points:

- Around 1 in 3 people are aged 50 and over. The number of Leeds residents aged 80 and over will increase by about 50% in the next 20 years.
- Age Friendly Leeds is one of the eight priorities in the Best Council Plan 2020-2025. The vision for Leeds is that it is a place where people age well, older people are valued, respected, appreciated and seen as assets.
- The draft Age Friendly Leeds Strategy 2022-25 has been reviewed and refreshed which has been informed by The State of Ageing in Leeds report. The process has been overseen by the Age Friendly Board chaired by Cllr Jenkins. The role of the Board is to set the strategic direction for the Age Friendly Leeds work programme and ensure that the objectives are being met.
- Leeds is a member of the World Health Organisation Age Friendly
   Cities programme and has used and adapted the framework to identify
   and address barriers to the well-being and participation of older people.
- The strategy sets out six key priority areas: housing; public and civic spaces; travel and road safety; active, included, and respected; healthy and independent ageing and employment and learning. Each of the priorities is headed by a domain lead. Domain leads have been identified and are working to implement the actions set out in the plan. The domain leads will feedback on a quarterly basis.
- The Leeds Older Peoples Forum (LOPF) gives practical ways for the local community to become involved to strengthen the age friendly approach and Councillors were invited to support and encourage people and businesses to get involved in:
  - The Age Friendly Ambassador Programme
  - Becoming a Dementia Friend
  - Age and Dementia Friendly Businesses
  - o The Come in and Rest Scheme
  - Leeds Older People's Age Friendly Steering Group
- Public Health are working with partners to support older people in Leeds to be as resilient as possible this winter. It was recognised that the cost-of-living crisis together with the impact that the cold weather can have on older people will require an approach to ensure proactive and preventative support is provided to those most at risk this winter. It was noted there are a range of services to support older people during cold weather including:
  - Information and Advice Service run through Age UK Leeds who can offer information and advice on a range of issues such as:
    - Money Matters
    - State Benefits
    - Housing Rights
  - Home Plus Leeds whose aim is to enable and maintain independent living through improving health at home.
  - Lunch Clubs Public Health fund the annual Lunch Club Grants offering a financial contribution to support voluntary groups to provide hot nutritious meals and social activities for older people in a communal environment for 40 weeks per year.

- Participation in the Vitamin D Campaign
- Sign up to receive Cold Weather Alerts
- o 'Stay Well this Winter' Grants

#### The Community Committee discussions included:

- The council has a strategic problem with hospitality towards the elderly which could be improved through consultation with highways and planning. Benches increase accessibility to amenities for older people.
- The work conducted by Age Friendly Leeds can overlap with disability services, especially in relation to accessibility around the city and a duty of care.
- Information regarding warm spaces project can be accessed through the council website or if an individual does not have digital access to go to a community hub.

#### **RESOLVED** - To:

- a.) Note the content of the report and the refresh of the Age Friendly Strategy
- b.) Consider what work is currently underway to support age friendly, winter planning and the cost-of-living crisis in the local area and how to build on these further.
- c.) To link work with Age Friendly Leeds to disability support to create a cross-generation approach to accessibility around the city.

## 24 Highways - Annual Improvement Consultation

The report of the Executive Manager, Highways provided the Inner South Community Committee with an update on the Highways Annual Improvement Consultation.

The presentation which was appended to the submitted report was shown at the meeting and the Community Committee were invited to make comments.

The Community Committee were informed of the following points:

- The consultation on next years' programme closed on 2nd September. Lists
  of the proposed works had been provided to Councillors and Parish Councils
  at the start of July requesting comments.
- Members were provided with an explanation of the Well-Managed Highway Infrastructure Code of Practice.
- Explanation of how the Highway Infrastructure Asset Management Strategy aligns with the corporate vision and contributes to the vision for Leeds.
- Members noted that the service is currently undertaking more preventative work which is surface dressing. It was noted that the life of a road is generally ten years.
- The service is continually reviewing all streets, and these are added to a sheet with a colour code to show what stage of repair the road is in. All roads are inspected by an engineer and a scoring system is used and checked over a three-year cycle. The service wish to get to the position that only 10% of roads are in poor condition.
- Each year all Members receive lists of roads requiring work and the priority given to them. Members are requested to make comments. Members were advised that all emails are noted and responded to.

The Community Committee discussions included:

- As part on the three-year cycle, local amenities should be taken into account when prioritising road works.
- Connectivity between other services will allow a better allocation of resources
  when it comes to improving and maintaining the Leeds road network.
  Examples of this were clean neighbourhoods could assist with sweep ups
  after road surfacing, housing Leeds often have poor quality carparks due to
  them not being officially part of the road network, better cross department
  communication or adoption of these roads into highways jurisdiction may
  improve this.

- Comments were received regarding the Mini Breeze festival held in Beeston from members of the public and it was noted that the festival finished earlier than scheduled and customers were unsatisfied. As the Mini Breeze festival had received money from the YAF budget there will be an enquiry.
- The request for funding from St Luke's Care home was deferred as it was felt there was a reliance on old figures for future provision and more information was needed on the school contribution.

**Inner South Community Committee - Finance Report** 

### **Purpose of report**

1. This report provides the Community Committee with an update on the budget position for the Wellbeing Fund, Youth Activity Fund, Capital Budget, as well as the Community Infrastructure Levy Budget for 2022/23.

#### Main issues

- 2. Each Community Committee has been allocated a wellbeing budget (revenue and capital) and Youth Activities Fund which it is responsible for administering. The aim of these budgets is to support the social, economic and environmental wellbeing of the area and provide a range of activities for children and young people, by using the funding to support projects that contribute towards the delivery of local priorities.
- 3. A group applying to the Wellbeing Fund must fulfil various eligibility criteria, including evidencing appropriate management arrangements and financial controls are in place; have relevant policies to comply with legislation and best practice e.g. safeguarding and equal opportunities and be unable to cover the costs of the project from other funds.
- 4. Wellbeing funding cannot be paid retrospectively. An application form must be submitted and approved by the Community Committee before activities or items being purchased through wellbeing funding are completed or purchased.

- 5. The amount of wellbeing funding provided to each committee is calculated using a formula agreed by Council, taking into consideration both population and deprivation of an area.
- 6. Capital (CRIS) injections are provided as a result of council assets being sold. 5% of the sale price (up to a maximum of £100k) of a council asset is pooled city-wide and redistributed to the Community Committee areas on the basis of deprivation. The Community Committee will receive a new capital injection every 6 months.
- 7. Each Community Committee has also been allocated a Community Infrastructure Levy budget. For each CIL contribution, Leeds City Council retains up to 70-80% centrally, 5% is needed for administration and 15-25% goes to be spent locally. The money will be vested with the local Town or Parish Council if applicable, or with the local Community Committee and spend decided upon by that body. This local money is known as the 'Neighbourhood Fund' and should be spent on similar projects to the Wellbeing Fund (capital).
- 8. In the Inner South this means that the money will be administered by the Inner South Community Committee.
- 9. Following consultation, the Communities Team will work with members of the community committee, to develop a plan to spend CIL funding on local infrastructure projects. This will be on a case by case basis.
- 10. Projects eligible for funding by the Community Committee could be community events; environmental improvements; crime prevention initiatives, or opportunities for sport and healthy activities for all ages. In line with the Equality Act 2010, projects funded at public expense should provide services to citizens irrespective of their religion, sex, marital status, race, ethnic origin, age, sexual orientation or disability; the fund cannot be used to support an organisation's regular business running costs; it cannot fund projects promoting political or religious viewpoints to the exclusion of others; projects must represent good value for money and follow Leeds City Council Financial Regulations and the Council's Spending Money Wisely policy; applications should provide, where possible, three quotes for any works planned and demonstrate how the cost of the project is relative to the scale of beneficiaries; the fund cannot support projects which directly result in the business interests of any members of the organisation making a profit.
- 11. Any request for funding would involve discussions with appropriate ward members. Where projects do not have support from the Community Committee and are not approved, applicants are offered further discussions and feedback if this is requested.
- 12. In order to provide further assurance and transparency of all decisions made by the Community Committee, any projects that are not approved will be reported to a subsequent Community Committee meeting.

- 13. Sometimes urgent decisions may need to be made in between formal Community Committee meetings regarding the administration of Wellbeing and Youth Activity budgets, and also regarding the use of the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Neighbourhood Fund which has been allocated to the Committee. Concurrently with the Committee, designated officers have delegated authority from the Director of Communities, Housing and Environment to take such decisions.
- 14. The Community Committee has approved the following 'minimum conditions' in order to reassure Members that all delegated decisions would be taken within an appropriate governance framework, with appropriate Member consultation and only when such conditions have been satisfied:
  - a) Consultation must be undertaken with all committee/relevant ward members prior to a delegated decision being taken.
  - b) A delegated decision must have support from a majority of the community committee elected members represented on the committee (or in the case of funds delegated by a community committee to individual wards, a majority of the ward councillors); and
  - c) Details of any decisions taken under such delegated authority will be reported to the next available community committee meeting for members' information.
- 15. Members are reminded that the necessary scrutiny of applications to satisfy our own processes, financial regulations and audit requires the deadline for receipt of completed applications to be at least five weeks prior to any Community Committee. Some applications will be approved via Delegated Decision Notice (DDN) following consultation with Members outside of the Community Committee meeting cycle.

#### **Wellbeing Budget Position 2022/23**

- 16. The total revenue budget approved by Executive Board for 2022/23 was £172,930. This works out at £57,643 per ward.
- 17. **Table 1** shows a carry forward figure of £191,420.75 which includes underspends from projects completed in 2021/22. £117,681.25 represents wellbeing allocated to projects in 2021/22 and not yet completed. The total revenue funding available to the Community Committee for 2022/23 is therefore £246,669.50. A full breakdown of the projects approved or ring-fenced is available on request.
- 18. It is possible that some of the projects may not use their allocated spend. This could be for several reasons, including the project no longer going ahead, the project not taking place within the dates specified in the funding agreement, or failure to submit monitoring reports. Due to this the final revenue balance may be greater than the amount specified in Table 1.
- 19. The Community Committee is asked to note that there is currently a remaining balance of £119,668.52 The ward split is as follows: Beeston & Holbeck (£40,751.88), Hunslet & Riverside (£31,988.03) and Middleton Park (£46,928.61). A full breakdown of the projects is listed in Table 1.

The concept of ParkPlay is a weekly session that will take place at Brickfield Park every Saturday at 10.30am, for all ages. The sessions will continue all year round – whatever the weather (unless conditions unsafe) to encourage families and children to engage in activity in all seasons – not just a summer activity.

The warehouse is also vast and has large areas with glass skylights so is not warm enough for people to sit for long periods of time. Therefore, stand heaters are required for when the community groups are in. Also, by fixing large blackout curtains this will the keep spaces warmer.

## **Monitoring Information**

- 37. As part of their funding agreements, all projects which have had funding approved by the Community Committee are required to provide update reports on the progress of their project. These reports are so that the Community Committee can measure the impact the project has had on the community and the value for money achieved.
- 38. Detailed below are some of the project updates that the Communities Team has received since the last meeting of the Community Committee in June 2022:

#### Skating Galore at Holbeck Moor (Beeston & Holbeck and Hunslet & Riverside)

- 39.6 x 2 hour sessions were delivered at Holbeck Moor Skatepark throughout the summer holidays. The sessions were very well received by the children who attended.
- 40. Children from the area had the opportunity to try out skateboarding and roller-skating (we also included scootering where possible) or to develop their existing skills, and also had the opportunity to make friends and learn together with the help of our coaches.
- 41. Ls-ten were able to provide a unique and fun activity to help boost young people's selfesteem and confidence, while also providing opportunities to be more active and a solution to summer holiday boredom. As the sessions were offered for free, they were able to ensure maximum participation, removing any financial barriers that may be in place.
- 42. The project had 50 participants in total throughout the sessions (35 unique participants), many of whom had visited previous sessions at Holbeck Moor Skatepark or who had attended our other community sessions across Leeds



## Healthy Holidays, Manorfield Hall (Middleton Park)

- 43. The project was a huge success. Each session had different sporting activities throughout the day for the children to do from tennis, basketball, cricket, football, board games etc.
- 44. Not only did the children learn new skills through all the activities provided they also used their social and emotional skills, making new friends and helping each other if they found a particular activity challenging. The feedback from the children and parents was very positive.



#### Youth Activities Fund Position 2022/23

- 45. The Youth Activity Fund is allocated based on population data at Ward level for young people aged between 8-17 years of age. The community committee YAF allocations have stayed the same as the previous year.
- 46. The total Inner South YAF budget approved for 2022/23 was £54,640. The ward balances which are below, are based on the number of 8-17 year olds per ward.
- 47. The total available for spend in the Inner South Community Committee 2022/23, including carry forward from previous year, is £106,639.85.
- 48. The Community Committee is asked to note that so far, a total of £49,487 has been allocated to YAF projects in 2022/23, as listed in **Table 2**.
- 49. The Community Committee is also asked to note that there is a remaining balance of £27,671.85 in the Youth Activity Fund.

## **Inner South Community Committee - Update Report**

## Purpose of report

- 1. To bring to members' attention an update of the work which the Communities Team is engaged in, based on priorities identified by the Community Committee. It also provides opportunities for further questioning, or to request a more detailed report on a particular issue.
- This report provides regular updates on some of the key activities between Community Committee meetings and functions delegated to Community Committees, Community Champions roles, community engagement, partnership and locality working.

#### Main issues

## Children and Families - Champion: Cllr G Almas

- 3. The Inner South Youth Summit took place on 8<sup>th</sup> November at The Civic Hall Banqueting Suite and welcomed young people aged 8-17 from across the Inner South wards of Beeston & Holbeck, Hunslet & Riverside and Middleton Park.
- This was the first Youth summit since the pandemic and the Children & Families
   Champion Councillor Gohar Almass was proud to welcome over 120 people from 11 schools across the Inner South Ward.

- 5. The young people in attendance took part in multiple activities including a democracy workshop, a Q&A session with local Councillors, an interactive Youth Activity Funding game and a visit to the Chamber to see where local democracy took place.
- 6. Also in attendance was Child Friendly Leeds, Leeds 2023, Leeds Youth Service, Royal Air Force, West Yorkshire Police and West Yorkshire Fire Service who engaged with the young people, let them try on their uniforms and advised what was activities were available in their ward.

# **Environment and Community Safety Champion: Cllr Iqbal (Environment & Community Safety)**

- 7. On 31st October an Environmental and Community safety sub-group was held.
- 8. Updates were provided from Anti-Social Behaviour Team, West Yorkshire Police, Forestry, Waste Management, Parks & Countryside, Selective Licensing and The Cleaner Neighbourhoods Team on any issues in the area and any live workstreams.

### Health and Wellbeing & Adult Social Care – Champion: Cllr Burke

- 9. The Health and Wellbeing Champion has started to deliver a pilot project which will deliver health parcels to people in need across the Inner South ward.
- 10. The parcel will include items such as cleaning products, deodorant, toilet roll, toothpaste and toothbrushes that people in need can access. It has been recognised that these are some of the items that people will not spend their money on due to increase costs due to the cost of living crisis.

- 11. Partnership working has taken place in Middleton/Belle Isle with Leedswatch and First Bus utilising the trojan bus to target ASB around Middleton Park Circus and the Stourton Park and Ride.
- 12. The Leeds District Off Road Bike Team have conducted proactive patrols across the Inner South Wards. In the month of August, they issued seven Section 59 warnings, reported eight drivers/riders for summons for driving offences and seized three vehicles.
- 13. A day of action has been carried out targeting two "trap houses" in Beeston resulting in the seizure of a substantial amount of Class A drugs.
- 14. Planning around the bonfire period has taken place. Local ward officers and PCSOs conducted high visibility patrol to offer reassurance and were supported by specialist officers who are trained in dealing with public order incidents.

## **Police Priorities**

## Beeston and Holbeck

15. To act on community intelligence to tackle and disrupt the illegal supply of drugs in the Beeston and Holbeck area. We will be increasing high visibility patrols

in the area and using a number of different tactics to disrupt the drugs supply including executing warrants where we have intelligence. You can help us by reporting any information or concerns you have directly to us or by using Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or <a href="mailto:crimestoppers-uk.org">crimestoppers-uk.org</a>

16. To continue to work in partnership to tackle the problems caused by on-street sex working in the Holbeck area of Leeds. Dedicated officers will conduct intelligence led, high visibility patrols in the Holbeck area and will respond to community concerns raised through the dedicated phone number.

### Ongoing Updates from NPT Priorities above

17. Weekly tasking meetings have been held with partners to create bespoke action plans for individuals involved in sex working. Enforcement action has been taken against individuals committing offences in the area.

#### Hunslet and Riverside

- 18. To reduce persistent begging in the Dewsbury Road area through proactive high-visibility patrols and partnership working, we shall work to engage with those involved in persistent begging in the area, encouraging those individuals to access support services and taking action against those who continue to persistently beg.
- 19. To act on community intelligence to tackle and disrupt the illegal supply of drugs and the linked anti-social behaviour which affects those living in the community. We will conduct high visibility patrols in the area and use a number of different tactics to disrupt the drugs supply, including executing warrants where we have intelligence. You can help us by reporting any information or concerns you have directly to us or by using Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or <a href="www.crimestoppers-uk.org">www.crimestoppers-uk.org</a>

#### Updates from previous priorities

- 20. As a result of increased patrols, crime prevention advice being given to residents and businesses in the Fox Way Industrial area we have seen a decrease in theft offences in this particular area however we will continue to monitor this and still provide high visibility patrols to deter offenders.
- 21. **Drug supply** Officers have utilised a variety of policing tactics, including warrants and stop search to disrupt drug supply in the area. We have also worked with partner agencies resulting in closure orders being obtained in relation to problem addresses linked with drugs and drug related anti-social behaviour.

#### Middleton

22. To target Anti-Social Vehicle use, speeding and inconsiderate driving of off road biker, scooters, quads and electric bikes in and around Sharp Lane / Middleton parks and Belle isle road near to the Aberfield's. We will be increasing patrols in the areas on conjunction with the off road motorcycle teams.

- 23. To disrupt and engage with nuisance youths at Acre road, Sisson's, Middleton park avenue area and the surrounding streets in particular the disruption and criminal damages to the buses. If you have any information in relation to this issue please ring 101 or Crime Stoppers on 0800 555 111 or crimestoppers-uk.org
- 24. To disrupt and engage with nuisance youths in the Middleton park circus around the shops. Monthly community meeting on the 1st Monday of each month, 1800hrs at the Middleton elderly aid in conjunction with the Middleton community group.
- 25. To target the anti-social behaviour around the shops and Bitmo on Belle isle road

#### <u>Updates on continuing priorities</u>

26. Anti-social vehicle use— We have maintained a Police presence in the area and work is ongoing to trace the location the bikes are stored

#### Actions from the Environment & Community Safety sub-group

#### Hunslet & Riverside

#### Trentham Terrace

27.LASBT are completing a file to seek a full closure order for the problem flat at this address and are hoping to be in court in 2-3 weeks for this. Police have executed a warrant at the address and a linked address in recent weeks – nothing of relevance found at this address but arrests made and drugs located.

#### Hunslet TFMV

- 28. There have been 10 in the month of October, which is a reduction from last month when there were 15 offences reported.
- 29. In the month of October there were 8 hate crimes reported, which is a reduction of 3 from the previous month. Of the 8 crimes reported in October, 7 were racially/religiously aggravated and 1 was homophobic.
- 30. There are proactive patrols in place via the local NPTs to target vehicle crime through intelligence led activity.

#### Middleton Park

#### Youths gathering at Kasa stores.

- 31. The Middleton ring road store has a reduction in the youths gathering, they tend to gather between a number of stores/locations and not specifically at that store. The youth ASB in the area surrounding the store has seen a recent reduction in ASB.
- 32. Kasa on Belle isle road has some ongoing concerns which fluctuate, we can have a few days when no youths are present then the next few days we have a number. The new Leedswatch camera has helped reduce the problems and we are looking at

lighting for the car park nearby which is a gathering point. The owner of this store have reached out to Sgt Lund to work with the police to help reduce the youths gathering.

### **CCTV Update**

- 33. The Leedswatch service is currently undergoing a review which is looking at all aspects of the service, including the operation of the control room, effectiveness of its cameras.
- 34. The review is also to include a reporting strand which will serve to agree the way forward to provide information regarding CCTV to Councillors and Partners.
- 35. This report covers the different types of incidents captured by CCTV operators in real time for the cameras located in the Inner South area committee area, for June 15<sup>th</sup> November 16<sup>th</sup>.

#### List of current cameras in the Inner South area

36.181 cameras have captured incidents in the Inner South ward within these quarters.

#### **GDPR** – Information Sharing

37. The introduction of the GDPR 2018 regulations reviewed the area of information sharing and therefore restricted the detail of what can be provided. As a result, the content of this report may not have the detail of specific incidents previously reported but provides a summary of the types of incidents within the area.

- 38.CCTV also contributes towards Police enquiries as requests are made for footage which may not have been observed "real time". These incidents are not included in this report but can contribute towards arrests being made in the Inner South Area.
- 39. Following the recent announcement of the new Full Fibre Network provider being awarded to BT work will now commence to upgrade all CCTV cameras from analogue to digital. This will significantly improve the image quality and increased effectiveness of cameras in the ward.

#### Requests for new Cameras

- 40. The Surveillance Camera Commissioner is appointed by the Home Secretary to ensure that surveillance camera systems in public places keep people safe and protect and support them.
- 41. Following changes to Data Protection legislation the council needs to ensure that all its CCTV systems are managed in line with the Commissioner's recommendations to ensure there are no data breaches (this includes CCTV systems in all Leeds City Council assets including libraries, sports centres, council vehicles fitted with CCTV, etc.).
- 42. A dedicated CCTV compliance team has been established within Leeds City Council.
- 43. The compliance team also work closely with Information Governance to assist in ensuring all system owners are compliant with their codes of practice, policies, and procedures.

#### **Public Health**

#### Health and Wellbeing

#### Belle Isle Green Spaces

44. Work has been carried out, both in person and online, to gain the community view on how best to utilise some of the green spaces within Belle Isle. Public Health, along with some third sector partners attended community events over the summer to speak to members of the community about how they would like to see some of the green spaces being used. A consultation has also been put out via Your Voice, an online tool managed by colleagues in Housing, to gain a wider selection of views. There has been a good response overall to the consultation and results are now being collated to take back to a working group for work to progress.

#### Promoting Pharmacy services

45. Public Health Localities and Primary Care team are working with local pharmacies in the Inner South to deliver information sessions to the community highlighting services that are available in the area. Health Needs Assessments for both Beeston Hill and Holbeck raised issues around availability of GP appointments so, by working with the local pharmacies, it was felt it would be useful to highlight when people can visit their pharmacist for information/advice rather than booking an appointment with the GP. Session planning is underway, and it is hoped the first sessions will be delivered before the end of the year.

#### Stay Well this Winter Grants

- 46. Leeds Community Foundation has awarded the 2022 Stay Well this Winter Grants, with funding from LCC Public Health. The grants help support a range of community-based projects across Leeds. Applicants were encouraged to target support at vulnerable people who are most at risk of becoming unwell over winter due to cold and severe weather. Grants have been awarded to 20 projects across the city and these will run from November 2022 until the end of March 2023.
- 47. Within this year's applications a range of groups have been supported including those targeting older people, homeless, young families and those on low incomes. The focus has very much been on the cost of living crisis with many projects offering support to keep warm, well fed and engaged during the winter months. #### Winter vaccinations

- 52. The national campaign in support of the seasonal flu and Covid vaccination programmes has launched and downloadable assets are available from the Campaign Resource Centre. More than 10 million people have now received their Covid autumn booster in England, with 50% of those 65 and over getting their flu jab, helping protect against serious illness throughout the winter. Key messages are as follows:
  - COVID-19 and flu spread more quickly in winter and can cause serious illness. If you're 50 years or over, you are eligible for a free flu vaccine and a COVID-19 booster.
  - If you are pregnant, flu and COVID-19 can cause serious harm to you and your baby. So, make sure you get your free flu vaccine and COVID-19 booster. Many young children can also get a free flu vaccine.
  - If you have certain health conditions, you are more at risk this winter and will need the flu vaccine and COVID-19 booster.
  - If you're 50 years or over, have certain health conditions or are pregnant, you should have the flu vaccine and COVID-19 booster. Many children are also eligible for a free flu nasal spray vaccine.

#### Covid update

- 53. The autumn booster programme is focused on protecting those who continue to be more at risk of severe Covid. People aged 50 years and over, those in care homes, and those aged 5 years and over in clinical risk groups are being offered an autumn booster. Those at greatest risk are being invited first. Individuals are being asked not to contact their GP practice for an appointment unless they have received an invitation. Key messages are as follows:
  - Continue to wash your hands regularly with soap and water or use hand sanitiser.
  - Although it feels like life is returning to normal, Covid is still with us.

- The virus spreads easily when people are together in enclosed spaces such as on public transport or even indoors at home.
- Getting up to date with your vaccinations is the best defence against infection, to keep yourself and your family healthy.
- The medical professionals at the vaccination clinic will be happy to answer any questions you have about the vaccines. You can read more on the NHS website.
- Visit Walk-in vaccination clinics for a full list of your options across Leeds.

#### Flu update

- 55. Cases of flu have started to climb, indicating that the season has started earlier than normal. This is leading to increased pressure on emergency departments, with rates of hospitalisation rising fastest in children under five.
- 56. The flu vaccine is being offered free through the NHS to help protect groups most at risk of getting seriously ill. Vaccination is important because more people are likely to get flu this winter as fewer people will have built up natural immunity during the Covid pandemic. People who get flu and Covid at the same time are more likely to be seriously ill.
- 57. The vaccine is available at:
  - GP surgeries
  - Some pharmacies available to those aged 18 or over
  - Some maternity services if you're pregnant

#### Sexual Health survey

61. We are currently consulting with people in Leeds on their views on sexual health services in the city. We have a live survey that we'd like people living in Leeds to fill in. #### Better Together

- 62. The Better Together providers of Health For All, Holbeck Together, Asha and St Lukes Cares are continuing to deliver outreach activities and provide groups. 39 groups are currently running, 24 groups are fully supported and 15 are light touch supported a move to sustainable groups.
- 63. Attendance figures show that they are attracting new members to both established groups and new groups with overall, good attendance figures.

#### Your Space

64. The Your Space team have introduced new groups for year 4 of the contract. A Holbeck based, Womens' wellbeing group and Holbeck home cooking group is creating friendships and reducing self-reported loneliness among the attendees. Holbeck also has a Funday Sunday group running. Beeston has a women's health group and Belle Isle is hosting a women's craft and chat group and the book club.

#### Beeston and Middleton Local Care Partnership

- 65. There are now four subgroups formed from this partnership;
  - The Digital health Hub ongoing, but no further updates.
  - Mental health and wellbeing. Following the workshop meeting, family and children provision was agreed as the focus. Discussions are focused on improving the pathway between GP referral and services.
  - Health Inequalities Bid. A new year of funding from the Integrated Care Board and a bid submitted by Public Health, in partnership with Active Leeds and Groundworks has been successful. The initiative is supported by the LCP and Middleton PCN. Leeds Encouraging Exercising People (LEEP) will provide a GP referral pathway for presenting patients with diabetes or hypertension to a Clinical exercise facilitator who will develop, in conversation with the patient a bespoke exercise regime. Groundworks will provide gardening opportunities, while funding as subsided the cost of an Active Leeds membership to £5 per month. 68. SoundMind runs throughout November at Leeds Central Library and is a programme of activities designed to promote positive health and wellbeing through music. The programme includes author talks, live music, instrument taster sessions and singing workshops.

#### <u>Campaigns</u>

#### World Diabetes Day - 14 November

69. Being diagnosed early is important for all types of diabetes. It can save lives, prevent a medical emergency and reduce the risk of life-changing complications later. On World Diabetes Day awareness is being raised of the signs to look out for and individuals are encouraged to find out their risk of type 2 diabetes by using an online tool. This calculates an individuals' risk and they may then be eligible for the Healthier You NHS Diabetes Prevention Programme.

#### <u>Safeguarding Adults - 21 to 27 November</u>

70. Safeguarding Adults week starts on 21 November. This year the focus is on 'responding to contemporary safeguarding challenges.' You can find out how you and your team can get involved <a href="here">here</a>.

#### World Antimicrobial Awareness Week - 18 to 24 November

72. World Antimicrobial Awareness Week is an annual global campaign that aims to improve awareness and understanding of anti-microbial resistance (AMR) and encourage best practice among the public, stakeholders and policymakers, who all play a critical role in reducing the further emergence and spread of AMR. The week is an opportunity to promote anti-microbial awareness and amplify national messaging and each day has a different theme.

#### Training and Development - Leeds health and wellbeing training programme

- 73. If you work with the community, or in a health and wellbeing role, the Leeds Health and Wellbeing Training Programme is perfect for you. The course covers the elements and theory of public health, enabling you to understand and deliver the challenging public health agenda. The programme is open to all those whose work involves improving the health and wellbeing of people and communities.
- 74. Starting in January, the course runs for half a day, once a month, over a nine month period. All workshops take place in person at the Public Health Resource Centre in Leeds.

#### Building vaccine and screening confidence for higher risk populations

75. Vaccine hesitancy can present a risk to population health and negatively impact some of our poorest communities and risk groups. This training is focused on flu vaccinations, although the skills can be utilised for childhood immunisations, Covid vaccine, cancer screening and other health-promoting activities. People who come into contact with low vaccine and screening uptake populations are particularly encouraged to take part. The workshops last 1.5 hours and there are dates up to 10 January.

76. These online sessions are for professionals and aim to improve awareness and practice around the subjects covered. They are free to attend.

#### Abortion services in Leeds - 22 November, 2.00pm to 3.00pm

- 77. There are safe and legal options for ending a pregnancy. In England you can legally have an abortion up to 23 weeks and 6 days of pregnancy. Protecting the rights of pregnant people to make informed choices has never been more important.
- 78. This online session is an opportunity to engage with termination of pregnancy providers in Leeds. The session will cover: What is offered in Leeds for people who want to end their pregnancy or are unsure about their choices, how the providers

support the choices of pregnant people, myths about abortion dispelled and information on how to support pregnant people to access these services.

#### Start with people conference - 24 November, 10.00am to 4.00pm

- 79. This bi-annual conference is aimed at anyone working in health and care who has a passion to improve engagement with people and communities.
- 80. A key event for people involved in public engagement in the health sector within the UK the online conference brings together world-renowned experts and senior NHS leaders with practitioners who are delivering this agenda in the heart of their communities.
- 81. The theme for the event is trust: How do we ensure people and communities feel that they can trust the NHS?

#### Public health taster session - 29 November, 10.00am to 12.30pm

- 82. This free taster session is designed to provide an overview public health and some of the key challenges within local, national and global health.
- 83. The session is aimed at people who are keen to understand more about the scope and breadth of public health. It will also inform what you can do to improve and protect health in your everyday practice. The session also covers career and development opportunities.

#### Community Engagement - Hunslet & Riverside Ward

#### Brickfield Park's celebration day

- 84. To celebrate the upgrade, installation of new equipment and partnership working between residents, local councillors and council services, local residents organised a fun filled community event to mark the end of summer and showcase the improvement at Brickfield Park.
- 85. The residents organised a celebration day to mark the partnership work of all involved, local Councillors, Parks and Countryside, Communities Team, Active Leeds, local residents, St Lukes Cares, Kidz Club and Leeds Citizens. Activities on the day were delivered by Get Set Leeds, Parkplay, LCC Youth Service and DAZL dance.
- 86. This has been the start of a positive journey with local people helping shape the future of this park, with the aspiration of forming a 'Friends of Brickfield Park' and turning the park that was mainly full of dog waste, rough sleeping and throughfare into a much loved and well used community space. A public tree planting event is being planned for the new year to further enrich the burgeoning community spirit

#### Public Meeting with Alison Lowe OBE and Chief. Supt Dodds (Leeds District Commander)

- 87. Following residents' concerns to local councillors relating to drug related crime, trap houses, speeding, use of bladed weapons and solicitation. A community safety meeting was held at Hamara Centre on Thursday, 3<sup>rd</sup> November to give residents the opportunity to raise these issues directly to police by Deputy Mayor for Police and Crime Alison Lowe and operation leadership through Chief Supt Dodds.
- 88. In addition to reports relating to ASB, off road bikes/scooters, criminality, on street sex work, highlights from discussions include residents desire to see more police presence, lack of trust, quicker response to reports made by residents and feedback following intelligences provided by residents and better ways for reporting (lack of clear communication between police and residents).
- 89. The public was reassured that there is a lot of work taking place in the background to tackle the issues raised, whilst they unable to report every progress back to the public, they will endeavour to find even more better ways to keep residents informed of activities taking place to address these concerns. It was also mentioned that there is real commitment to recruit more Police Officers to bridge the current gap. To build upon this, there will be a regular Police and Communities Together (PACT) meeting every three months going forward for the Beeston/Beeston Hill area.

#### <u>Launch of Residents Led Forums</u>

#### <u>Greenmounts</u>

90. The new 'Greenmounts' Tenants And Residents Association was launched on 17th October and was held at Beeston Hill United Free Church, Malvern Road. The initial meeting was chaired by Cllr Paul Wray and officers for the committee successfully established. A follow up meeting was held on the 14<sup>th</sup> of November to give residents the opportunity to put forward ideas about how to improve the area and to agree priorities for their neighbourhood. The next meeting is planned for 9th January 2023 at 18:30 at the Beeston Hill United Free Church on Malvern Road.

#### Beeston Hill

91. Beeston Hill Residents Association launch meeting is planned to take place on Monday, 21st November, 6pm at Building Blocks Centre, Maud Avenue, LS11 7DD. The aspiration is to help form and lead a new resident-led association to build upon the previous Council led community forums. This initial meeting will be led by Cllr Ed Carlisle. An update will be provided at a future Committee meeting.

#### Community Engagement - Beeston & Holbeck

92. Community engagement activities within the Beeston & Holbeck ward have included a big push to get the maximum coverage of *Warm Spaces* across the ward. This was championed by Cllr Scopes and supported by his ward colleagues.

- 93. With the current cost of living crisis the idea of warm spaces is for local venues to open their doors at specific times and allow people to drop in for a drink, a chat, or to socialise if they wish, whilst in the comfort of a warm space. The ward is currently well supported with seven Warm Space venues providing a choice of location every day of the week, with most people being within 500m or a seven-minute walk of at least one venue.
- 94. Hosting venues are the Beeston Community Hub, the Dewsbury Road Community Hub, St Mathew's Community Centre (Holbeck), Jamyang Buddhist & Well-being Centre (Holbeck), Real Hope Café (Holbeck), St Luke's Church (Holbeck), Watsonian Pavilion (Cross Flatts Park), St Mary's Church (Beeston) and St Andrew's Church (Beeston). We're still looking to secure an offer for Cottingley.
- 95. Colleagues took time out to reflect on those lost in the World Wars, whilst helping to decorate the Holbeck Cemetery with the annual knitted poppy displays.
- 96. The spring edition of the Holbeck newsletter is being compiled at the moment and due for release in February.
- 97. Since the last meeting the 33 ward Covid help groups in Facebook have been paused. This was due to sustained inactivity on the pages as we moved deeper into the new normal, and any Covid related messages were being shared directly into local community groups via the Community Committee pages. The Covid groups have been paused rather than deleted in case we need to reactivate them.

#### Community Engagement – Middleton Park Ward

#### Green Spaces

#### West Wood

98. The consultation is ongoing. A contractor is currently quoting for this piece of work.

#### New Forest

99. Plans have been drawn up for New Forest which have been circulated to Members. Members have all been invited to site to discuss the plans.

#### **Neighbourhood Centres Co-ordinator**

#### Beeston & Holbeck

- 100. The Neighbourhood Centre Co-ordinator is visiting all businesses linked with the shopping area on Domestic Street to see how trade is going, advise on any issues and link any new businesses into the weekly email.
- 101. Businesses are being linked with Council departments to find ways to increase promotion of shopping local.

102. Information to help businesses and develop partnership working between the public and private sector continues to be circulated.

#### **Hunslet & Riverside**

- 103. Dewsbury Road Town Team continues to meet. A site visit was also held with the Council's Disability Access Officer and colleagues to ensure the shop fronts are accessible to all. Issues were identified and actions taken to make the pavements more accessible.
- 104. Discussions have taken place with Planning regarding the future for the former Sun Hotel. Building Control agreed to monitor the premise and speak with the owner about future use.

#### Middleton Park

- 105. The AGM for the town team will be held on Monday 16<sup>th</sup> January and all shops and offices will be invited to the event along with Ward Members.
- 106. The street market is now being held monthly at Middleton Circus. There has been good interest from local businesses and about two thirds are locally based. The aim is to ensure no stalls duplicate what is already on offer in the area.
- 107. A site visit we held with Parks in October and they can now remove all but 4 of the troughs and in return they will plant up the remaining ones which will then be maintained by some volunteers from the Town Team.
- 108. Issues at Middleton Shopping Centre (waste build up and travellers encampment, were resolved through partnership working between the agents and Council.
- 109. Belle Isle businesses will be visited by the Neighbourhood Centres Co-ordinator (NCC) before Christmas.

The **most popular post** since the 16<sup>th</sup> August 2022 was the posting regarding *Women's Only Swimming Sessions. This post has:* 


- Reached a total of 2,843 people
