33 Minutes - 26 September 2023

34 Open Forum

In accordance with the Community Committee Procedure Rules, the Chair allowed a period of up to 10 minutes for members of the public to make representations or ask questions within the remit of the Community Committee.

On this occasion no members of the public wished to speak.

35 Lifelong Learning Centre

The report of the Head of Locality Partnerships informed the Committee of a presentation from the Lifelong Learning Centre.

Fiona Chapel and Esther Bissell of the Lifelong Leaning Centre were in attendance to give the Committee a presentation.

In introducing the presentation, it was reported that the Lifelong Learning Centre was based within the University of Leeds and supported mature students who may not previously have had the opportunity to study at degree level.

Further issues highlighted from the presentation included the following:

- Members were asked for help in connecting the centre to people and groups who could make benefit of the offers provided by the centre.
- The centre focussed on providing opportunities for adults who maybe had not had the opportunity to study for a degree in the past.
- The learning hub was based within the University of Leeds and provided support for adults with a focus on community outreach.
- The centre worked with many different partners including colleges and local and voluntary organisations.
- Information could be provided regarding pathways to education as well as the provision of guidance and advice including how to get financial support.
- The centre provided regular open days and taster courses that were aimed specifically at adult learners.
- The role of student volunteers.

RESOLVED – That the report and presentation be noted.

36 Community Safety

The report of the Head of Locality Partnerships invited Members to discuss current community safety concerns in Outer East Leeds.

Georgia Taylor of the Leeds Anti-Social Behaviour team addressed the Committee. Lates figures for anti-social behaviour were highlighted. There had not been any emerging trends or issues across Outer East and reference was made to the planning in the lead up to the bonfire period and the diversionary activities provided by the Youth Service. Members were made of the drop-in sessions that had started at the Garforth Hub and it was asked that similar sessions be provided elsewhere.

Members thanked Georgia for her update and highlighted the success of the diversionary work during the bonfire period and how this demonstrated the success of partnership working.

Sergeant Tom Goringe updated the committee on policing issues in the area. There was an overall decrease in the amount of serious and acquisitive crime in Outer East Leeds although there had been a slight increase in Garforth &

Swillington. There was positive news with regards to anti-social behaviour and there had been success with Operation Dieselcrest in tackling nuisance with off road bikes. There had been the seizure of three bikes and one arrest during the past week. People were encouraged to keep reporting any further incidents. Further issues highlighted included the following:

- Use of the trojan bus which had plain clothes officers spotting crime and anti-social behaviour.
- Issuing of warnings to young people and their parents with regards to antisocial behaviour.
- Anti-social vehicle use partnership work with North Yorkshire Police, Leeds City Council and use of the new Public Spaces Protection Order.
- Tackling serious organised crime and urban street gangs,
- There was now a dedicated officer working with the youth service and schools to support diversionary work.

Members thank Sergeant Goringe for the update.

The following was discussed:

- Children & Families Councillor Millar informed the Committee that the recent meeting of the Corporate Parenting Board had seen the agenda set by local looked after children. The findings of the My Health My School survey had been discussed and it was highlighted that there were disproportionate issues in relation to the use of alcohol, drugs and cigarettes for looked after children. There had also been the preparation of a good tips guide for social work with children in care.
- Community Safety Councillor Harland made reference to the good partnership work across the area and the success of the Operation Dieselcrest. PACT meetings had not attracted many members of the public.
- Youth Service provision in the area there had been a wide range of engagement in Youth Clubs and with the Youth Matters Groups. Activities had included a drama workshop with the University, trips to Flamingo Land and to see Oliver at the Playhouse. Diversionary work for bonfire night had included a visit to York Road Fire Station. Youth clubs remained well attended and further work included young people engaging with the police.

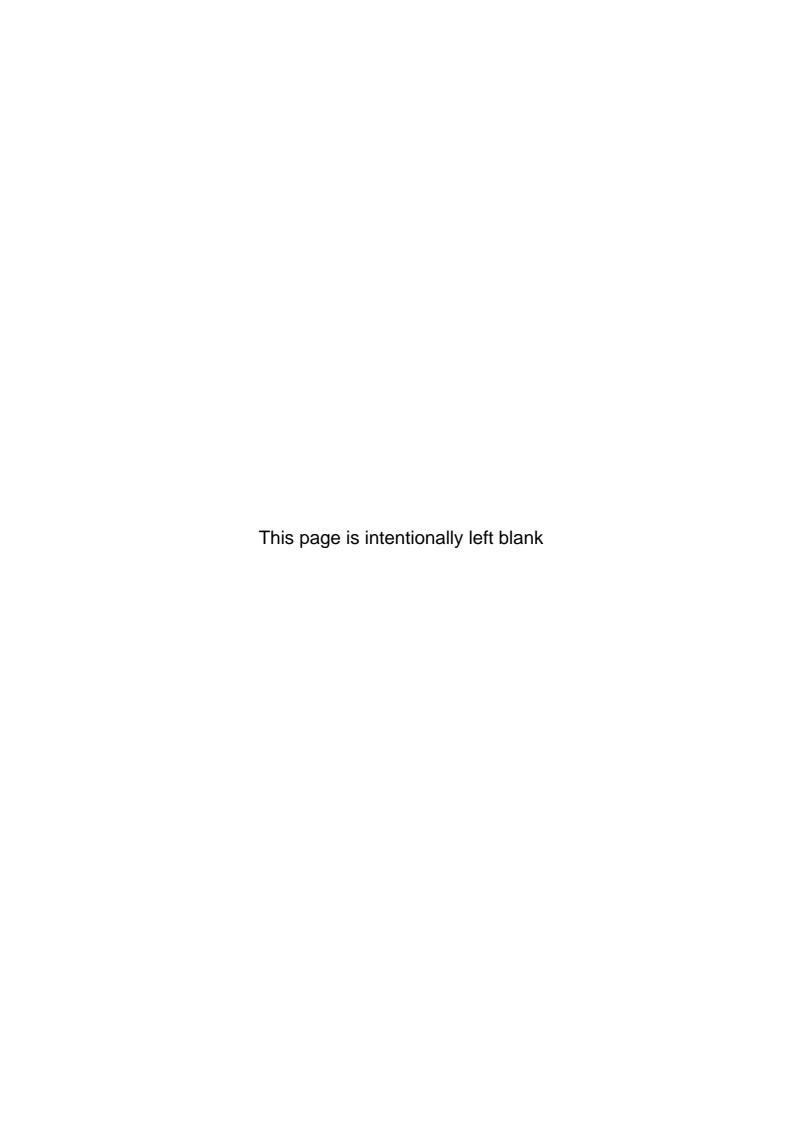

Outer East Community Committee - Finance Report

Purpose of Report

1. The report provides the Community Committee with an update on the budget position for the Wellbeing Fund, Youth Activity Fund, Capital Budget, as well as the Community Infrastructure Levy Budget for 2023/24. Financial decisions are taken to the Community Committee meetings to ensure transparency and that financial regulations are met.

Main Issues

- 2. Each Community Committee has been allocated a wellbeing budget (revenue and capital) and Youth Activities Fund which it is responsible for administering. The aim of these budgets is to support the social, economic, and environmental wellbeing of the area and provide a range of activities for children and young people, by using the funding to support projects that contribute towards the delivery of local priorities.
- **3.** A group applying to the Wellbeing Fund must fulfil various eligibility criteria, including evidencing appropriate management arrangements and financial controls are in place; have relevant policies to comply with legislation and best practice e.g., safeguarding, and equal opportunities and be unable to cover the costs of the project from other funds.
- **4.** Wellbeing funding cannot be paid retrospectively. An application form must be submitted and approved by the Community Committee before activities or items being purchased through wellbeing funding are completed or purchased.
- **5.** The amount of wellbeing funding provided to each committee is calculated using a formula agreed by Council, taking into consideration both population and deprivation of an area.

- **6.** Capital (CRIS) injections are provided as a result of council assets being sold. 5% of the sale price (up to a maximum of £100k) of a council asset is pooled city-wide and redistributed to the Community Committee areas on the basis of deprivation. The Community Committee will receive a new capital injection every 6 months.
- 7. Each Community Committee has also been allocated a Community Infrastructure Levy budget. For each CIL contribution, Leeds City Council retains up to 70-80% centrally, 5% is needed for administration and 15 25% goes to be spent locally. The money will be vested with the local Town or Parish Council if applicable, or with the local Community Committee and spend decided upon by that body. This local money is known as the 'Neighbourhood Fund' and should be spent on similar projects to the Wellbeing Fund (capital).
- 8. In the Outer East Community Committee, the CIL money for Allerton Bywater Parish Council, Great and Little Preston Council, Kippax Parish Council, Ledsham Parish Council, Micklefield Parish Council and Swillington Parish Council will be administered by each individual Parish Council, whereas monies for Cross Gates & Whinmoor, Garforth, Methley and Temple Newsam will be administered by the Outer East Community Committee.
- 9. It was agreed at Outer East Community Committee on the 02 October 2018 that CIL monies for Cross Gates & Whinmoor. Garforth, Methley and Temple Newsam would be spent in the ward it was generated in.
- 10. Until the UK left the European Union, the EU's State Aid rules controlled how UK and discretionary EU funding was provided to enterprises and entities that engage in economic activities. Now the UK has left the EU, it is no longer bound by the State Aid rules and has developed its own domestic subsidy control regime, The Subsidy Control Act 2022. As the Subsidy Control Act 2022 has potential implications for the Community Committees as funding bodies, a 'subsidy control' assessment will be undertaken on all funding requests received by the Community Committees.
- 11. Projects eligible for funding by the Community Committee could be community events; environmental improvements; crime prevention initiatives, or opportunities for sport and healthy activities for all ages. In line with the Equality Act 2010, projects funded at public expense should provide services to citizens irrespective of their age, disability, gender reassignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion or belief, sex, and sexual orientation: the fund cannot be used to support an organisation's regular business running costs; it cannot fund projects promoting political or religious viewpoints to the exclusion of others; projects must represent good value for money and follow Leeds City Council Financial Regulations and the Council's Spending Money Wisely policy; applications should provide, where possible, three quotes for any works planned and demonstrate how the cost of the project is relative to the scale of beneficiaries; the fund cannot support projects which directly result in the business interests of any members of the organisation making a profit.
- **12.** Any request for funding would involve discussions with appropriate ward members. Where projects do not have support from the Community Committee and are not approved, applicants are offered further discussions and feedback if this is requested.
- **13.** In order to provide further assurance and transparency of all decisions made by the Community Committee, any projects that are not approved will be reported to a subsequent Community Committee meeting.

- 14. Sometimes urgent decisions may need to be made in between formal Community Committee meetings regarding the administration of Wellbeing and Youth Activity budgets, and also regarding the use of the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Neighbourhood Fund which has been allocated to the Committee. Concurrently with the Committee, designated officers have delegated authority from the Director of Communities, Housing and Environment to take such decisions.
- **15.** The Community Committee has previously approved the following 'minimum conditions' in order to reassure Members that all delegated decisions would be taken within an appropriate governance framework, with appropriate Member consultation and only when such conditions have been satisfied:
 - a) consultation must be undertaken with all committee/ relevant ward members prior to a delegated decision being taken:
 - a delegated decision must have support from a majority of the community committee elected members represented on the committee (or in the case of funds delegated by a community committee to individual wards, a majority of the ward councillors); and
 - c) details of any decisions taken under such delegated authority will be reported to the next available community committee meeting for members' information.
- 16. Members are reminded that the necessary scrutiny of applications to satisfy our own processes, financial regulations and audit requires the deadline for receipt of completed applications to be at least five weeks prior to any Community Committee. Some applications will be approved via Delegated Decision Notice (DDN) following consultation with Members outside of the Community Committee meeting cycle.
- 17. Members are reminded that urgent delegated decisions on wellbeing funding also covers small grant decisions. In agreement with the Executive Board Member for Communities, Community Committee Chairs & also in accordance with the communication that was sent out to all committees/ Elected Members in March 2023, the approval threshold for small grants has now increased from the 01 April 2023; up to £1000 per ward. This approach will ensure consistency in terms of administering small grants, in accordance with the committees' minimum conditions.

Wellbeing Budget Position 2023/24

- 18. The total revenue budget approved by Executive Board for 2023/24 was £84,921.00 for the Outer East Community Committee. Table 1 shows a carry forward figure of £87,399.52 which includes underspends from projects completed in 2022/23. Allocated wellbeing projects in 2022/23 is £57,536.38 and not yet completed. The total revenue funding available to the Community Committee for 2023/24 is therefore £114,784.14. A full breakdown of the projects approved or ring-fenced is available on request.
- 19. The total amount approved on Table 1 includes all the projects the committee has approved in 2023/24. It is possible that some of the projects may not use their allocated spend. This could be for several reasons, including the project no longer going ahead, the project not taking place within the dates specified in the funding agreement, or failure to submit monitoring reports. Due to this the final revenue balance may be greater than the amount specified in Table 1.
- **20.** The Community Committee is asked to note that so far, a total of £104,847.38 has been allocated to projects and there is a remaining balance of £10,672.61 in the Wellbeing Revenue Fund. A full breakdown of the projects is listed in Table 1 and available on request.

Project Summary: Funding will be used to fund the replacement of the community defibrillator located at Corpus Christi Catholic Club, Halton Moor Avenue, Leeds, LS9 OHB. The defibrillator is accessible 24hrs by any person that needs to use them. The project will enable to purchase of defibrillator, pads, cabinet door and equipment installation following site inspection of the damaged cabinet by the supplier, WEL Medical.

For awareness, local ward budgets may be required to fund replacement equipment costs if and when required.

Monitoring Information

22. As part of the funding agreements, all projects which have had funding approved by the Community Committee are required to provide update reports on the progress of their project. These reports are so that the Community Committee can measure the impact the project has had on the community and the value for money achieved.

Since the last Community Committee meeting, the following project monitoring reports have been submitted:

a) Breeze in the Park 2023, Breeze (Leeds City Council)

Wards Covered: Cross Gates & Whinmoor, Garforth & Swillington, Kippax & Methley and Temple Newsam.

Project Monitoring Summary: Following the success of 2022 delivery model, Breeze in the Park events were delivered over the school summer holidays in 2 x 2.5-hour sessions and took place in all Outer East Wards as follows:

Garforth: 28 July 2023.

Manston Park: 11 August 2023.

Primrose: 16 August 2023.Kippax: 23 August 2023.

Sessions times slots: 12:00: -14:30 and 15:00 – 17:30. Sessions were bookable online via the Breeze website at 50p per child. Capacity for tickets online were capped at five hundred per session. Garforth was identified as a new venue for the relaxed programme and proved immensely popular.

As a response to the challenges facing families not having access to internet or not being able to afford the 50p charge two hundred free places were made available. This opportunity was promoted and made available through the Cluster teams working across all the schools in the area. Although there was a good response in young people being allocated the tickets, Breeze Leeds do not always see a huge uptake in those children attending and will continue to develop this offer to maximise the opportunity in 2024.

Attendance breakdown across all four Outer East Breeze events:

- Total number of young people: 2,834
- Estimated number of parent/ carers: 4,251
- Total number of attendees: 7,075

Breeze in the Park events are made up of six zones with activities available in each zone for all age ranges. The following activities were delivered in each zone:

- <u>Inflatable Zone:</u> Giant Obstacle Course Inflatable, Large Superdome Bouncy Castle, Jungle Slide Inflatable, Demo Ball Inflatable, Bounce & Slide Inflatable, Jungle Gym, Interactive Play Zone, Pillow Wars, Sumo Wrestling.
- <u>Play Zone:</u> Giant Connect 4, Giant Jenga, Skip Ropes, Lawn Darks, Hoops, Diablo building blocks, Mud and Sand play pits. *This area continues to grow each year and is extremely popular with young children (under three's). This is also the area Breeze will focus on improving and growing for the 2024 events.*
- <u>Arts Workshops:</u> Arts & Crafts including eco crafts, Imagination Gaming delivering math based fun puzzles, Claymation workshops for young people to learn how to make digital animations. Messy Play/ Creative Crafts delivering a make it and take it activity. Beauty workshops including nail art, hand and head massages, Lego Master workshop with Lego experts Brik Box.
- <u>Breeze Presents Performance Arena:</u> For 30 to 45 minutes at each event a paid performer delivers a fun, interactive show for all the family. Performances varied from event to event but included one of the following performers:
 - o Professor Pumpernickel: Science show with bags, explosions.
 - o Gecko: Ukulele Workshops.
 - Magic Show with Chris.
 - o Teddy Bear Picnic: Children's Entertainers.
 - Suitcase Pete: Circus Skills Workshop.
 - o Magic Show & Balloon Modelling.
 - o Boom Chika Boom: Dance, sing, rave workshops.

- This area was phenomenally successful with lots of parents and children relaxing on the grass watching and interacting with each performance.
- <u>Sports Zone:</u> A small section of the event for children to play sports including mini football and Cricket Skills providing an open free play area for all the family to get involved. This was a great area for our young volunteer team to support.
- <u>Info Zone:</u> Opportunities were made available for voluntary and private sector organisations to come along to each event to promote their service/ offer, as a result, fifty-five organisations attended Breeze events to engage with the local community.

DDN



The first Core column number refers to distinct Young People who attended provision within the Outer East who reside within the Outer East Wards. The second Core Column refers to the accumulative figure of session attendances. This is a welcome addition as it clearly highlights not just significant attendance levels, but through having the numbers side by side it emphasises the consistent level of engagement for the majority of Young People highlighted in the first column.

The numbers detailed for each ward are concerning, the number reflect only the young people living & attending Core Youth Work provision within the ward they live and within the ward the provision takes place at (they must be the same).

If a young person from Seacroft attended a provision in Crossgates & Whinmoor ward they are not counted.






The Youth Service Outer East Core team focussed engagement on vulnerable young people from the age of 11 to 17 years, during the October to December period the following level of young people engaged:

The group encouraged the young person to read out their work during the group discussions. The group were very supportive and didn't discriminate against them. The young person felt part of the group and enjoyed the course.




Core Youth Workers continue to support young people with Safeguarding & Early Help Plans, Youth Workers have been attending, Child In Need & Early Help partnership meetings.

Core Youth Workers continue to record Safeguarding concerns on the Core + & Mosaic systems (where appropriate) and reflect on caseloads during supervision with Youth Worker staff.

Core Youth Worker are regularly required to focus on their Safeguarding responsibilities during supervision, reviewing cases, ensuring they are aware of procedures & identify appropriate training or refresher training as required.

Youth Service Outer East Core Team continued the focus on ensuring the most vulnerable young people were able to access free food during the regular weekly sessions. The Youth Workers explored food options with group members enabling them to utilise their voice and influence decisions for the groups.



Participation & Empowerment:

<u>Youth Matter group members</u> across the Outer East area have been busy participating in consultation for the October, December & February holiday programmes. The group members consulted their groups and contributed to the October Holiday programme. In November the groups were consulted for Christmas activities and decided on visits to the Leeds Playhouse to see Oliver, Leeds City Varieties to see Rock N Roll Panto & Stockheld Park for Ice Skating. Group members have also been working with Youth Workers to plan the February 2024 holiday programme.

<u>The Temple Newsam Youth Matters Group</u> is flourishing with attendance increasing to ten core members, the young people who attend each session on Wednesday have engaged in various issue-based work including: Knife Crime/Anger Bingo looking at how to manage emotions / epilepsy awareness. The sessions have been received well by the young people and one of the Youth Service volunteers delivered the session on epilepsy awareness.

<u>Fire Fighting Sessions</u> – Young people from across the Outer East area engaged in firefighting awareness sessions during the October Half term period, young people from Temple Newsam & Swarcliffe areas engaged in the full day sessions. The young people were engaged in physical & team challenges and focussed on the role of the fire Service. The sessions also focussed on Fire Safety, Fire Work awareness and the role of the fire service in the local community. In total 20 young people from across the two areas engaged in the two different days.



<u>Consultation</u> - Young people across the Outer East Core provision have been engaging with Youth Workers to complete the Youth Activities Funding and the Leeds Children's Poverty Consultations. The YAF consultation enabled the young people to identify how local funds would be spent on young people and the second enabled young people to highlight the main issues for a young person impacted by Child Poverty.

Inclusiveness, equality & diversity:

<u>Transition Groups</u> - Targeting the year six age group have reopened to help young people with health & well-being concerns including the development of social skills needed in the transition from primary to secondary schools. The weekly sessions allow young people to explore the transition, develop social & communication skills whilst also meeting older young people and developing positive relationships.

<u>Young Carers</u> – Following the July to September report the Outer East team acknowledged the number of young carers registered on the report did not appear to reflect the level of participation in sessions, the Core Youth Work team focussed on how this could be improved and requested young people who identify as a young carer to be reregistered. As a result, the Outer East core Youth Work team has seen an increase in young carers included on the report. Awareness sessions have also been provided to the Core Youth Workers to ensure they are aware of their responsibilities to Young Carers.



Quality, Safety & Well-Being:

<u>C Card – Sexual Health Awareness</u> – Youth Workers continue to offer the C Card Scheme across the Core Youth Work provisions targeting young people aged 13+, working with Leeds Sexual Health Service the local provisions offer young people the option to access sexual health resources including contraceptives, relationship advice, age of consent guidance, pregnancy & STI's testing. This service enables Youth Workers to develop trust & tolerance with young people enabling them to build their life skills.

<u>Personal Safety</u> - Youth workers have engaged young people in sessions around staying safe this has included discussion around electric scooters and bikes. The importance of lights and wearing something bright, youth workers had provided some snap bands to encourage young people to be seen. Another important discussion has been around not wearing headphones, having phones and electric gadgets out of view and being aware of the surroundings.

<u>Cooking Skills</u> - Young people have engaged in cooking programmes and worked with youth workers on programme planning, eating healthy on a budget where young people have learnt basic cooking skills & health & safety in the kitchen. The sessions enabled young people to recognise the health benefits compared to purchasing take aways. One group was engaged in a Bake-off style competition.

Collaboration:

<u>Partnerships</u> - Youth Service Outer East Core Team have been working with several partners to deliver sessions and enhance opportunities for young people, Leeds Health Watch, Yorkshire Housing, West Yorkshire Fire Service, Leeds United Foundation, local Councillors & Community Committees. The partnership work enabled the young people to explore additional opportunities whilst being able to recognise the importance these services have in the local community.

<u>Volunteers & Students</u> – Several volunteer and students have supported the delivery of Youth Work sessions across the Outer East area, Students from Leeds Beckett University & Leeds Health Watch engaged with young people around developing awareness of poetry & mental health issues. The local volunteers increased during the October to December period with three new volunteers supporting sessions. One of the regular volunteers also delivered an epilepsy awareness session.

<u>Yorkshire Housing</u> – Youth Service Outer East Core Team have been engaging with Yorkshire Housing to support young people, the YH staff engaged with Youth Workers to offer a community Christmas Grotto at the local Youth Centre, overall, the event was attended by 200 children, young people, parents, and carers. The Yorkshire Housing staff also provided a large number of Advent Calendars for the young people attending the local Youth Club.

<u>Health Watch</u> - Worked with young people to focus on the impact of mental health and what they liked about living in Leeds including the cost-of-living crisis, personal safety, transport etc. Three groups of ten young people engaged with the workers and feedback that they had really enjoyed the session and felt listened too.

Respect and positivity:

White Ribbon Campaign - All groups were provided with information and encouraged young people to support the White Ribbon Campaign, talking to young people about this very important campaign. Having these conversations with young people will provide an understanding of the issues this campaign supports. Youth Workers provided different campaign aspects to discuss such as women and girls feeling safe in there local areas while out running. It was established that young women and girls don't feel safe in parks alone while boys and young men do mostly feel safe in these areas.

<u>Employment Support</u> - A young person from Holbeck area approached Core Youth Workers to ask for support with their Curriculum Vitae and how they access college courses, the young person had been experiencing some mental health issues whilst at school and as such didn't always attend. Youth workers supported this young person to attend a meeting with the pathways service. (Had previously not attended appointments with Pathways) the Youth Worker followed up with discussion around next steps and encouraged attendance at follow up meetings.

Youth work will be valued and understood:

Youth Work Conference - Youth Workers from across the Outer East Core Team participated in a celebration of Youth Work event in November 23, the celebration at Leeds Metropolitan University enabled Youth Workers to develop awareness of other services available for young people and to celebrate the good work being delivered across Leeds. The Outer East team also consisted of five volunteers at the celebration event.



<u>Issue Based Work</u> – Youth Workers from across the Outer East team have been engaging young people in a range of issue-based work during the last quarter, vaping, hate crime, road safety, epilepsy awareness, alcohol awareness, national recycling week & World Mental Health Day. The group members explored the issues in an informal learning environment with aspects of fun included where possible.

What has gone well and why? Contributing Factors (500 Words)

The examples above of Core Youth Work Activities along with the details in this section are testament to the good work of the Youth Service Outer East Core Youth Work Team undertakes with young people across the Outer East area.



<u>Championing the voice of young people</u> – The Youth Matters & YpmyG groups across the Outer East area have been extremely active working with local councillors to focus on Youth Summits, local light switch events, explore local priorities and working with Youth Service management to recruit Advanced Youth Work Practitioners. These groups have enabled the group members to be active members in their local areas.


Anti-Social Behaviour Work – Youth Workers from the Core Youth Work Team have been engaging with partners to identify hot-spot area and young people identified as being engaged in unacceptable behaviour. Utilising both detached & mobile sessions locations have been visited and young people engaged in discussions regards their actions / behaviours. Two young people who were causing ASB in the community had meetings individually with Youth Workers to discuss their behaviour, actions and consequences and since the meetings took place, the young people are now positively attending and engaging in two sessions a week and their behaviour has improved.

October Half Term – Youth Service Outer East Core Youth Work team have worked with local young people to create and deliver a diversionary holiday programme for the October Half term period. Young people were able to participate in Scare maze events at Yorkshire Scare-fest, bowling at Escape, swimming at Barnsley Metro-Dome & Flamingo Land Theme Park.



<u>Halloween Events</u> – A Halloween event was delivered across the Outer East area by the Core Youth Work team and several local volunteers & senior members, the "House of Madness" event provided a diversionary activity with a challenge. The scare maze were created by the Youth group members and Core Youth Workers focussed on participants and their contributions. Overall, 75 young people participated in the event with many providing very positive feedback. The local volunteers & senior members contributed to the planning, designing of costumes, applying make-up, staffing the events and being part of the Scare Maze Characters.

<u>Bonfire Period / Fire Safety</u> – Youth Workers from the Core Youth Work team offered additional activities over the Bonfire Weekend, some Youth Work sessions remained open later, additional mobile & detached sessions were provided and on Saturday 4th November over 50 young people participated in a full day trip to Flamingo Land for a fun day that included an evening Firework display. This additional work contributed to a reduction in young people related Anti-Social Behaviour across the Outer East area with reports for Service calls being lower than previous years.



Health – Vaping - An ongoing issue with young people is vaping, more and more young people are starting to vape from a very young age. Youth Workers have designated sessions in all areas to raise awareness on vaping and the effects nicotine has on the body. Young people discussed why they vape and the census is that young people are vaping because of the flavours that the vapes are. Young people that vape have said they do not smoke cigarettes because they do not like the small or taste of them, but as vapes have nice flavours they use them. Additionally young people have been very stressed with exams and used vaping to relax. Discussions took place about finding different relaxation techniques and new things to do to relax other than vaping. Youth workers were pleased to discover that local shops around Belle Isle don't sell Vapes to young people, however the flip side of this is that young people are visiting the City Centre to buy vapes and then hanging around in town.

Active members of Society - Young people from the YpmyG voice & influence group / senior member volunteers had a visit from the ward Councillors. The group members have been hard at work planning for the Christmas light switch on event. The group were approached to run a stall at the event to promote the youth club and to raise funds for the light switch on committee and the youth club Christmas party. The group researched various games and activities suitable to do at the event and decided on a "Pick a Stick" game. The group made the game from scratch and with the help of the 3 Ward Councillors made all the game prizes. The prizes ranged from chocolate sweets, Christmas baubles filled with chocolate coins and Elf rubber ducks! The Ward Councillors also visited on the day of the light switch on and chatted with

the young people who also helped run the stall. A brilliant experience for the group to start with an idea and see it through to the finished product.



What has not gone well and why? Contributing factors? (500 Words)

<u>Mobile Provisions</u> – The age and level of maintenance on the 2008 vehicles is causing a number of sessions to be cancelled, regular maintenance and repairs means vehicles are spending a lot of time off the road, this frustrates both staff and young people who are keen for sessions to be delivered.

<u>Halton Moor Kicks</u> - The Leeds Utd Foundation KICKS Programme in <u>Halton Moor</u> has temporarily been suspended due to weather conditions and there is the hope that it will re start as the lighter nights and better weather draws in. Young people have been informed and they understand though they did enjoy the session.

<u>Behaviour of young people</u> - Youth workers have been responding to reports of Youth ASB in Whinmoor this had consisted of young people hiding and throwing stones at traffic. Youth Workers have witnessed this behaviour first hand and had challenged young people. Some young people haven't responded positively to the challenge. Youth workers will continue to challenge this type of behaviour with young people.

<u>Gang Culture</u> – Youth workers are coming across more difficult situations while dealing with local gang culture and at times have been challenging for staff, Youth Workers are working with local partners to explore options and responses to address evolving situations.

Everyone has enjoyed eating the different meals and trying foods that we would not normally cook. He was really upset he couldn't come this
week as he was poorly. Thank you for dropping the pizzas off even though he couldn't come this week

 outdoor sessions require more focus to ensure the provisions can continue. Outdoor sessions with minimal or no lighting require Core
 Youth Workers to arrange portable lights and have cover available for poor weather conditions. Achieved.
- To continue supporting young people with mental & sexual health concerns and to ensure sufficient support is available up to and
 during the Christmas period. Achieved Support offered on a one to one basis and via social media information.

What are your plans and priorities for the next quarter?

- To focus on maintaining the sessions in the Outer East area having had an Advanced Youth Work Practitioner relocated.
- To develop a diversionary holiday programme that is accessible to vulnerable young people during the February 2024 Half Term period.
- To develop a residential experience for young people from the Temple Newsam & Swarcliffe Wards.
- To provide young people with to access to regular educational & recreational activities through Youth Work sessions to ensure their leisure time is used positively.
- To focus on the development of more senior members & volunteers in the Outer East area.
- To promote the Leeds United Kicks session across the Outer East area and hope that Coaches are available via Leeds United Foundation.

Serious and acquisitive crime demands increased across the Outer East ward areas, with an overall combined increase of fifteen crime occurrences, in comparison to the same period reviewed in 2023.

Burglary-residential occurrences presented the largest increase in demands across the Outer East ward areas, presenting with a combined increase of eight additional offences. This category was followed by Robbery occurrences, with four additional recorded offences combined in comparison to the previous year reviewed.

The Crossgates and Whinmoor ward was the only ward to present with an overall reduction in serious and acquisitive crime demands, in comparison to the previous year with an overall demand reduction of seven occurrences.

Anti-social behaviour (ASB) demands presented with a slight increase in demand, with three additional calls for service overall, across the Outer East during the period under review and in comparison, to 2023.

Nuisance motorcycle and quad bike calls for service remain prevalent in the Crossgates and Whinmoor locality and remains a local priority for the ward. This ward presented with an increase of eight calls for service year on year, largely attributed to nuisance motorcycle demands.

The Garforth and Swillington, Temple Newsam and Halton ward areas anti-social behaviour demands remain stable, with no overall demand change year on year.

The Kippax and Methley ward, was the only ward to present with reduced anti-social behaviour demands year on year.

Current Local Priorities Outer East:

Ward Area - Leeds East wide - set February 2024

The Leeds East wide local priority has recently changed to the following:

To address serious and organised criminality, whilst disrupting and pursuing offenders who cause harm to the communities we serve.

Update

Following the introduction of Operation Dieselcrest in July 2023 and the local
priority set in October 2022, to address anti-social motorcycles, vehicular nuisance,
and associated criminality across Leeds East ward areas there has been a
significant reduction in nuisance motorcycle and quad bike calls, in comparison to
the previous year overall. The local priority across Leeds East Neighbourhood
Policing Teams, has now been changed to focus on targeting Serious and



Organised criminality, with a targeted emphasis on Urban Street Gangs (USG's) and Organised Criminal Groups (OCG's).

- Multiple actions were taken to address the previous local priority, and several news releases and updates were circulated whilst the local priority was in place. These actions included the implementation of Operation Republic alongside North Yorkshire Police, working alongside Leeds City Council who secured a city PSPO Public Spaces Protection Order. In addition, fourteen Community Protection Notices were issued, a total of four two-years Anti-Social Behaviour Injunctions obtained and one five-year Criminal Behaviour Order. Multiple motorcycles and quad bikes were seized during the targeted focus and proactive patrols. We will continue to address reported demands through deployments of the Neighbourhood Policing Teams and dedicated Off-Road Bike Team.

To address anti-social behaviour and incidents of damage across the locations identified, we have provided an increased and visible presence across the areas affected and utilised the FIRST Leeds 'Trojan' bus to deploy to the locality. A problem-solving approach has been adopted working alongside First Leeds, West Yorkshire Police Safer Travel Team, LASBT and Youth Services. Officers have deployed in plain clothes, gathering evidence, and identifying individuals involved in the anti-social behaviour, to disrupt and prevent any offences which have previously led to the cancellation of bus services, causing a detrimental impact particularly on the elderly, disabled and vulnerable. A local news release was circulated on the 5th December 2023, to encourage parents, carers, and guardians to speak to young people regarding acceptable behaviour and how such behaviour

- Several young people have been identified as being involved in repeat incidents of anti-social behaviour, referrals were submitted to the Leeds City Council Anti-Social Behaviour Team. As a result, nine young people have been issued with Anti-Social Behaviour advisory letters and parents have been issued with parent advisory letters and some have been issued with tenancy warnings, regarding their child's involvement in such behaviour. Behaviour will be monitored and should the young people continue to be involved in such anti-social behaviour, further enforcement action may be taken.
- We have liaised with Leeds City Council Youth Service in our Community Safety multi-agency tasking meetings, who continue to engage with young people across the site and ward. They have implemented a targeted youth provision on Wednesday afternoon, for those identified as being at risk of being involved in anti-social behaviour across the Naburn's and continue to provide a significant amount of excellent and effective work with young people across the ward, at their well-attended youth provisions programme.
- We continue to focus on the issue of stolen and off-road motorcycles being used across the ward area. Officers have worked alongside the Leeds District Off-Road Bike Team resulting in significant gains in terms of vehicle seizures, recovery of stolen motorcycles and arrests.

Ward Areas – Garforth and Swillington, Kippax, Methley and Villages – set February 2023

Lead Sergeant: PS 0801 Collett

Lead Area Problem Solving Officer: PC 3826 McAleese and PC 2484 Jenkins

- To address public concerns of youth anti-social behaviour, drugs misuse and alcohol misuse across public park areas with a particular focus on Barley Hill Park, Garforth, Glebelands Park, Garforth and Rocket Park, Millennium Village, Allerton Bywater.
- To target and address multiple road safety concerns including speeding and parking offences across the ward areas.

Updates:

We have continued to conduct multiple targeted high visibility and plain clothes
 Operations across Barley Hill Park, Main Street, Garforth and Fiddler Close and
 Lane, to address reports of anti-social behaviour and suspected drugs
 use. Following the last review whereby officers identified several young people



involved in anti-social behaviour and a community resolution was issued, youth related anti-social behaviour has declined across the wards. We continue to monitor and deploy across the locations, at this time.

- As part of our ongoing commitment to address road safety concerns, we have
 delivered road safety lessons in schools and conducted multiple schools parking
 patrols, with advice given to parents regarding safe parking. On the 27th
 November 2023, we released our Road Safety Matters Local
 Priority update highlighting multiple road safety deployments, alongside West
 Yorkshire Police Roads Policing Unit, neighbouring forces, and partner agencies,
 resulting in multiple arrests, vehicles, drugs and weapon seizures and enforcement

- Since the last local priority update, we have focused on schools parking issues
 across the ward following raised concerns from schools and the public highlighting
 dangerous and bad parking. On the 2nd February 2024, PCSO's deployed at
 Great Preston Primary School, which is part of the School Streets programme,
 whereby parking time restrictions are in place. The deployments resulted in several
 tickets being issued, for dangerous and illegal parking and followed on from
 previous warnings issued.

Ward Area - Temple Newsam and Halton - set August 2023

- To address road safety concerns and road related offences, across the Temple Newsam and Halton ward with a particular focus on Temple Newsam Park and The Springs Retail Park.
- To address reports of urban street gangs and organised criminal groups involved in the supply of drugs and serious violence, particularly across the Wykebecks and Halton Moor sections of the ward.

Updates:

- As part of Operation Anthenmill the dedicated youth violence engagement officer continues to conduct proactive diversionary patrols, to engage with identified young individuals and divert them away from criminality.

- Since October further warrants have been executed across the ward, resulting in arrests, drugs and property seized. Cleaner Neighbourhoods Team, (CNT) service update.

Key Updates & Information:

• Due to the current financial situation, the citywide CNT service is expected to lose on or around 34 vacancies, 17 of those before April 2024 and the next 17 by the end of April 2025. This is due to CNT having to save £1.2 million. A full review of how our service areas operate will also be undertaken. The aim will be to minimise as much as possible the impact on the day-to-day cleanliness of streets and neighbourhoods; with the priorities remaining to empty litter bins, clear and investigate fly tipping, remove offensive graffiti, and ensure streets are swept to reduce the risk of flooding. Resources will continue to be focused in those areas where the need is greatest and in support of corporately agreed priority neighbourhoods. The review will also look at how residents and local groups can be better supported in community led action to keep their neighbourhoods clean and green.

- Due to two Team Leaders being on Long Term sickness absence, Mel Abbott _ Team Leader for South is overseeing Lee Hayward's Outer South ward areas and Jack Priestley
 5 Day South Chargehand has been successfully appointed into a 3 month honorarium position covering Diane Otley's Outer East wards.
- If you have any unwanted items that are not suitable for donation and you cannot get to a Recycling Centre, you can book in a free unwanted items collection (bulky collection). If you live within the Leeds council tax area the service can collect up to 5 items per collection, with a maximum of 4 collections per year. Bulky collections are relatively high in the above ward areas which shows the system is well used by residents.

During April – December 2023

- 9,799 people accessed the Service, 412 of whom were residents from the Outer East.
- Supported 2,457 people into work, 126 of whom were residents from the Outer East. Customers
 were supported into work across all sectors with the largest numbers in construction, health and
 care including childcare, manufacturing, ICT, digital and comms.
- Supported 2,975 people to improve their skills, 175 of whom were from the Outer East.

Leeds Employment Hub

A single point of contact for all funded programmes and Jobshops which provides tailored and comprehensive support into employment or education to <u>all</u> Leeds residents. Employment Hub Advisors deliver the programme by providing one to one support, tailored preventative and remedial support to Leeds residents who are disadvantaged in the labour market. The Employment Hub Advisors are colocated within the Jobcentre Plus centres across the city. Further funding has been secured which will see the role of the Advisors continue until at least March 2025.

All Jobshops are open, 5 days a week for face-to-face appointments which includes Seacroft and City Centre Community Hubs. The Community Hub Mobile schedule stops include: Friday 9:30am to 11:30am Mickletown Community Centre, Methley and Friday 09:30am to midday Windmill Health Centre, Swarcliffe.

Community Learning

Community Learning provision continues to deliver an effective, broad, and inclusive curriculum to support the continuation of learning in collaboration with subcontracted partners. Courses were delivered through a range of models which includes face to face within a community setting, online and through distance learning, opening new opportunities for adults to learn and develop their confidence.

Between April - December 2023, 3,554 people started an Adult Learning course. There were 559 courses delivered at 118 venues, in addition, there were 17 courses delivered on-line. In the Outer East area, there were 5 courses delivered at 4 venues, 169 people had started a course.

Employment & Skills had a full Ofsted Inspection from 11th – 14th December 2023. The Community Learning provision was graded Outstanding across all areas, the first Local Authority to achieve the Outstanding judgement since the new Education Inspection Framework (EIF) commenced in September 2019. The inspectors found:

- That adult learners gain valuable skills, which often transform their lives.
- They benefit from a highly ambitious curriculum that meets a diverse range of needs across the city, widens participation in learning, improves life chances and develops stronger communities.
- Subcontractors are carefully selected with expertise in community learning to enable them to meet the needs of specific local communities and groups, and to meet skills priorities.
- Subcontractors deliver highly effective, bespoke programmes to support the most vulnerable learners to access education.

The first event Community Learning Celebration Awards took place on the 18th July 2023 at Leeds Civic Hall. This event celebrated the accomplishments of all learners and tutors and embraced their future progression into further/high education, volunteering and/or employment.

<u>Multiply</u>

Multiply is the free, government funded, adult maths support programme, part of Levelling Up, Skills for Life. The programme is aimed at helping adults to improve their maths skills and boost their number confidence. E&S are developing and delivering courses and activities through partnerships with community organisations and other partners; to help people use numeracy to manage their money; for parents wanting to increase their numeracy skills in order to help their children.

Delivered Events and Activities

- School and College Engagement and Delivery during July December 2023, delivered 55 activities to a total of 5,660 young people, 596 parents and carers and 129 teachers. This included 48 Apprenticeship Awareness sessions delivered at 27 schools to a total of 3,730 young people, 518 parents and 119 teachers. The sessions were delivered at the following schools in the East of the City:
 - Abbey Grange C of E Academy, Allerton Grange, Allerton High School, Bishop Young Academy, Boston Spa Cardinal Heenan Catholic High School, Corpus Christi, Mount St Mary's, Roundhay High School, Temple Moor High School Science College, The Temple Learning Academy, Wetherby High, Springwell Academy, Ruth Gorse Academy and Leeds College of Building.
- LCC Highways and Transportation Information and recruitment sessions delivered at Yeadon, Hunslet
 and Seacroft Community Hubs to help improve recruitment within the locality of their depots. The
 session provided an overview of vacancies and an opportunity for attendees to talk to Highways
 employees. Support provided by Employment Advisors with applications for the roles or seeking
 alternative employment. Engaged with 22 customers.
- Connecting Communities to Health and Care Careers 19 Information and Assessment Sessions
 were delivered from July to December 2023. 197 people engaged in the sessions of whom 82 were
 referred to pre-employment courses, 23 referred into We Care Academy and 68 were referred for
 Numeracy and Literacy support via Community Learning.
- **Security Recruitment Event** at the City Centre Community Hub held on the 27th July 2023. Advisors engaged with 53 customers and DWP for a Sector-Based Work Academy Programme (SWAP) Fair on 27th September 2023.

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- **Black Young Professionals** event held at the Infinity Works office in Leeds on 6th September 2023, 25 people attended. The team promoted upcoming events and support for finding employment in Leeds, the aim was to encourage a diverse audience to consider digital and creative careers.
- A tech careers information session was delivered at Leeds Maximus office on 6th September 2023. This session provided information to 15 employment advisors and team members to let them know about tech career options and entry routes to help support their customer groups into sustainable employment options in the tech sector.
- The Leeds Digital Careers Fair (LDCF) 2023 took place on 26th September 2023, at the Leeds First Direct Arena. The event was aimed at those new to a career in tech and digital. 4,000 attendees were given an opportunity to engage with a range of tech training providers and employers to find out about the diverse career opportunities available, plus attend interesting talks and demonstration sessions.
- Virtual Careers Expo (LDCF) as part of Leeds Digital Careers fair, a virtual careers expo was launched on 26th September until 31st December 2023. This was an immersive platform for young people to access careers and skills information and opportunities in Leeds, with a focus on our emerging sectors. A mini roadshow also took place at 3 higher education venues to showcase the virtual careers expo to students and encourage sign ups, allowing more students access to the emerging sector careers information.
- Leeds Tech Careers Launchpad 3.0 Getting Hired in Tech took place at BJSS office in Leeds City Centre on 20th September 2023. Guest speakers from BJSS, Glean and NHS LTHT joined the session to provide guests with knowledge and tips on getting hired in tech roles. 40 people attended.
- **Reducing Re-Offending:** Jobs Fair was delivered at HMP Wealstun 28th September 2023. 7 organisations attended with Advisors engaging with 60 prisoners to offer support on their release.
- **SEND Employment** Forum was launched by E&S on 17th October 2023 at the City Museum. 100 people attended and covered:
 - How to help young people with additional support needs take their first step on the career ladder
 - Pathways to employment, including supported internships
 - How you can help to build an inclusive workforce across the city
 - How to sign up for a supported internship
- **UK University Search Jobs Fair** held at Elland Road on 17th October 2023. 480 young people aged 15-19 attended. Delivered a presentation on benefits of doing an Apprenticeship to approximately 180 of the attendees.
- **Refugee Jobs Fair** held at the Civic Hall on 7th November 2023, 71 refugees and migrants attended, with lots of previous experiences and transferable skills.
- The BIG Social Care Jobs Fair was delivered on 15th November 2023 at the Bridge Community Church, Burmantofts. The event was co-ordinated in partnership with We Care Academy and provided information and opportunities for people interested in accessing roles within the care sector. 304 visitors attended. 27 employers provided opportunities offering interviews, collected CVs and distributed applications form. Employers included Children's Residential, private care homes and Adult Social Care. E&S Advisors also provided support, 10 job offers were made on the day.
- Leeds Creative Skills Festival returned to the Leeds first direct arena on 20th November 2023 with
 exhibitors showcasing opportunities in the creative and cultural sector. The event offered the 3,081
 visitors a chance to speak to 63 exhibitors including training providers, colleges and universities who
 offer creative courses; talk to employers; attend interesting speaker sessions to learn about creative
 careers, skills and pathways; and also offered interactive activities. 9 Leeds schools block booked
 students and were sent the targeted LCSF23 presentation prior to the event.
- Jobs Fairs Community Hubs working in partnership with DWP delivered the following:
 - Youth Jobs Fair at City Centre Hub 27th October 2023.
 - Jobs Fair at Kirkgate Market 20th October 2023.
 - Over 50's Jobs Fair at City Centre Hub 22nd November 2023.
- Have a Go Fortnight as part of the national Lifelong Learning campaign, local partners delivered taster
 and have a go skills sessions from 6th November 2023 to 17th November 2023. The focus was on digital
 and other priority sector skills as part of the fortnight of activities, aiming to encourage adults to
 undertake further learning to help progress their career. 4 skills taster sessions took place with 26
 people attending the in-person and on-line sessions.
- **EME (Elected Home Educated) Community Forum** held on 23rd November 2023 at Civic Hall, attended by parents/carers and young people to gain a better understanding of various opportunities available to them in Leeds. Offered support and guidance for post 16 options through E&S.

Planned Events and Activities

- Social Care Recruitment Events, in partnership with We Care Academy, will take place at Vale
 Circles on 19th January 2024 and East Recovery Hub on 24th January 2024. The events will support
 the recruitment to Support Worker and Case Officer roles across the city. Advisors will be attending to
 support delivery.
- Careers in Catering recruitment information and interview sessions planned for 24th January 2024 at City Centre Community Hub to support promotion of kitchen assistant posts in schools across the city.
- Leeds Apprenticeship Recruitment Fair will take place on 5th February 2024. Visitors can find out more about Apprenticeships and meet with providers and employers. Over 100 organisations have booked stands to exhibit at the event and approximately 6,000 visitors are expected on the day.
- **Smart Works Jobs Fair** at Leeds Beckett University Students' Union planned for 8th February 2024. This event will provide information on vacancies, Apprenticeships and supported internships to all attendees.
- Migrant Access Project 8 week facilitated training programme for migrants new to Leeds, starting January 2024. The advisors will attend the event taking place on 9th February 2024 at Compton Community Hub with guest speakers sharing information about their services.
- Connecting Communities to Health and Care Careers fortnightly Information and/Assessment Sessions will be delivered at sites across the Priority Wards and City Centre Hub. The sessions will continue to support recruitment to roles within the Health and Care sector, including Adult Social Care, Children's Residential Practitioner and Administrative roles. Additional Community Learning provision will also be in place.
- Reducing Re-Offending a planned pilot to offer support to prisoners due to be released into Leeds
 from HMP Wealstun will be offered early in the new year. Advisors will establish contact with the
 identified group prior to release to enable support in accessing employment and training opportunities
 when resettled.
- **Digital skills bootcamps with UA92 and Microsoft** on-line and Tech North training centre. Working with UA92 and Microsoft to support 2 digital skills bootcamps to be delivered to Leeds residents, to upskill them in areas of Cloud and Data. On completion of the 10-week bootcamp, graduates will be supported to gain employment in the tech sector.

Employer Engagement

Within the last year the Service has supported 385 new businesses including recruiting new staff, providing support for staff facing redundancy, developing initiatives to address staff shortages and filling a high number of vacancies within key sectors.

E&S provides a school brokerage service 32 businesses provided activities to approximately 1,680 young people at 6 events. The events included a careers fair, 4 mock interview sessions and an employability session.

A Business Sustainability Event was delivered on How to Build a Greener Future, in partnership with Leeds Beckett University and West Yorkshire Combined Authority E&S delivered the first Business Sustainability Breakfast Event in Leeds with over 20 businesses signing up to attend. Guest business speakers included Dawn O'Keefe, Co- founder and Director at Shine and Jannice Dye, HR Manager at C-Capture shared their green journey experiences to date and plans for the future. Businesses attending the event found out about a range of support options available:

- Measuring their environmental impact, understanding how climate change might affect their operations and taking steps to improve energy efficiency or flood resilience measures.
- Ensuring they attract, develop and retain a greener, healthier and inclusive workforce.
- Accessing research and academic expertise to enhance their business.

The Employment and Skills Business Newsletter that provides information and resources to support businesses' workforce needs across the city, also including the upcoming sustainability breakfast events, Leeds Inclusive Employers Network and T-Level support. Garforth and Kippax & Methley Housing Office

Voids Levels (empty properties)

Demand for properties remains high across my management area, especially for houses. The Lettings Team have worked hard to reduce the number of ready to let properties and currently have just 3 property in the area.

We are finding that our more difficult to let stock is Retirement Life accommodation as there are several schemes across the area of a very similar property type.

Income Collection

Our rent collection figures at week 44 are:

Garforth - 96.06%

Comparing figures to the same week last financial year, collection has increased by 0.66%.

We are working closely with our residents to maximise their income, particularly through the costof-living crisis, by referring cases through to Benefit Advisors, assisting with Discretionary Housing Payments in acute cases and involving third party support agencies.

We continue to make referrals to Leeds Credit Union for tenants who would benefit from budgeting accounts and who are experiencing the effects of the cost-of-living crisis. Our Housing Officer (Income) is working with our more complex cases, linking in with support agencies, to ensure tenants receive advice on how they can maximise their incomes.

British Gas Energy Trust have offered LCC £200,000 of free energy vouchers, which is double the amount initially offered last year, we will use the vouchers to support our most vulnerable LCC residents to spend on their gas or electricity and help keep their homes warm through the winter months. The vouchers have been shared proportionately amongst the local housing teams based on the number of properties they manage; we have been allocated £7889 for our area.

We have also secured government funding via the Housing Support Fund to assist tenants in financial hardship and the Rothwell office has been awarded £10,914

ASB

Focus on directing customers to Triage Team for ASB who will risk assess every complaint, set out expectations in terms of reporting and ensure that the cases are passed to the correct team (Housing, LASBT or no further action). The team have strong links with local police officers to share information.

There are 2 open ASB cases across Garforth and the surrounding villages which are managed by the Housing Officers and reviewed monthly by the Team Leader.

6 weekly partnership working meetings booking in with the Leeds Anti-Social Behaviour Team to share information and discuss ongoing cases between the teams.

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Annual Tenancy Check-in (ATCI)

We are currently carrying out Annual Tenancy Check-in's for customers who are deemed as a priority, such as customers with support needs or previous tenancy issues. We are also visiting residents who have not had an annual home visit for the last 3 years.

The Garforth Team have visited 71% of our tenants since April.

Environmental Actions Team

Quarter 3 Estate Walkabouts have been carried out. The main issues identified during the walkabouts is fly tipping. Housing Officers are ensuring they are reporting any fly tipping on the estate whilst carrying out their day-to-day duties. Teams have access to the Skill Mill scheme, where referrals can be made for ad-hoc estate improvement work. If any tenants or members do want to have a walkabout in their area just contact their Housing Officer who would be happy to arrange.

Swarcliffe and Halton Moor Housing Office

Voids Levels (empty properties)

Demand for properties remains high across my management area, especially for houses. The Lettings Team is working hard to ensure properties are allocated in a timely manner.

Referrals continue to be made for issues and waste/fly tipping, which is aimed to remove the items in a timely manner to ensure properties enjoy an appealing kerb-side appeal.

Current number of Ready to Lets are as follows:

Swarcliffe/Whinmoor – 6 Halton Moor/Osmondthorpe – 2 Total - 8

Income Collection

Our rent collection figures at week 46 are:

Swarcliffe -93.85% Halton Moor -92.49%

Comparing figures to the same week last financial year, Swarcliffe's collection has increased by 0.54% and Halton Moor has increased by 0.62%.

We are working closely with our residents to maximise their income, particularly through the cost of living crisis, by referring cases through to Benefit Advisors, assisting with Discretionary Housing Payments in acute cases and involving third party support agencies.

We continue to make referrals to Leeds Credit Union for tenants who would benefit from budgeting accounts and who are experiencing the effects of the cost-of-living crisis. Our Housing Officer (Income) is working with our more complex cases, linking in with support agencies, to ensure tenants receive advice on how they can maximise their incomes.

ASB

Focus on directing customers to Triage Team for ASB who will risk assess every complaint, set out expectations in terms of reporting and ensure that the cases are passed to the correct team (Housing, LASBT or no further action). The team have strong links with local police officers to share information.

There are 6 ASB cases across the Swarcliffe and Halton Moor areas which are managed by the Housing Officers and reviewed monthly by the Team Leader.

Peter Greenwood, Housing Manager, will now cover this panel until the end of March when Housing Advisory Panel funding will discontinue resulting in the closure of all 11 HAP's across Leeds.

The Cross Hills TA is now fully formed. Constitution, Committee, Equal Ops policy and bank account in place. Regular meeting schedule will be decided soon. Cllrs Harland and Lewis were in attendance at their meeting on 13th February. The group would like to provide more activities, including gardening opportunities to all tenants at Cross Hills Court.

At the January meeting of the HAP one bid was approved:

- Providing two external litter bins at Sherburn Court.
- Two bids were deferred.
- Gardening equipment and outdoor furniture for Cross Hills Court (A smaller bid to provide a
 mini HiFi system for the communal room was approved outside the meeting schedule).
 Since the meeting several items have been provided free of cost and removal of a picnic
 bench which has decreased the cost by approx. £2k
- Cross Gates Good Neighbours. More info was requested on how many tenants would benefit and which areas of Leeds.
- Both of the above bids will be discussed again at the HAP meeting on 14th March.
- We also have a number of bids in the pipeline or submitted:
- Two new bin stores at Brooksbank Court. to improve recycling.
- East Leeds Comets would like a contribution towards equipment costs.
- · Repairs to Primrose Lane footpath.
- Fencing around Fieldhead rugby club.

The panel have £20,424 available and the total costs approximate to £75k of the above projects, so the panel will have some difficult decisions to make at their next meeting,

Purpose of report
