

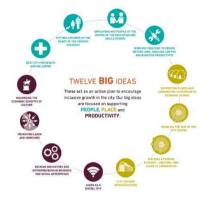

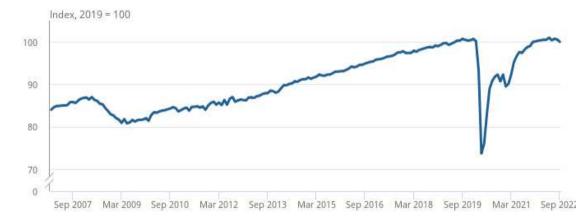
ure 1: Rising domestic fuel prices push CPIH and CPI inflation rates to levels last seen over 40 years ago
