## Annex 1 – Mandatory Conditions

1. Only individuals licensed by the Security Industry Authority may be used at the premises to guard against:-
  - a. unauthorised access or occupation (e.g. through door supervision), or
  - b. outbreaks of disorder, or
  - c. damage
2. No supply of alcohol may be made under this licence
  - a. At a time when there is no designated premises supervisor in respect of the premises licence, or
  - b. At a time when the designated premises supervisor does not hold a personal licence or his personal licence is suspended.
3. Every supply of alcohol under the premises licence must be made or authorised by a person who holds a personal licence.
4. The admission of children under the age of 18 to film exhibitions permitted under the terms of this licence shall be restricted in accordance with any recommendations made
  - a. By the British Board of Film Classification (BBFC,) where the film has been classified by the Board, or
  - b. By the Licensing Authority where no classification certificate has been granted by the BBFC, or,
  - c. where the licensing authority has notified the licence holder that section 20 (3) (b) (74 (3) (b) for clubs) of the Licensing Act 2003 applies to the film.
5. The responsible person must ensure that staff on relevant premises do not carry out, arrange or participate in any irresponsible promotions in relation to the premises.

In this paragraph, an irresponsible promotion means any one or more of the following activities, or substantially similar activities, carried on for the purpose of encouraging the sale or supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises -

- a. games or other activities which require or encourage, or are designed to require or encourage individuals to -
  - i. drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
  - ii. drink as much alcohol as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise);
- b. provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- c. provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
- d. selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or

glamorize anti-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner.

- e. dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).

6. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.

7. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.

The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy.

The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either -

- a. a holographic mark, or
- b. an ultraviolet feature.

8. The responsible person must ensure that -

- a. where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply in a securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures:

- i. beer or cider: ½ pint;
- ii. gin, rum, vodka or whisky: 25 ml or 35 ml; and
- iii. still wine in a glass: 125 ml;

- b. these measures are displayed in a menu; price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises; and

- c. where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

9. A relevant person shall ensure that no alcohol is sold or supplied for consumption on or off the premises for a price which is less than the permitted price.

For the purposes of the condition set out in paragraph 1 of this condition -

- a. "duty" is to be construed in accordance with the Alcoholic Liquor Duties Act 1979;

- b. "permitted price" is the price found by applying the formula  $P = D + (D \times V)$  where -

- i. P is the permitted price,
- ii. D is the amount of duty chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the duty were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol, and
- iii. V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol;

- c. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence -

- i. the holder of the premises licence,
- ii. the designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
- iii. the personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence;

- d. "relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question; and
- e. "value added tax" mean value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.

Where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.

- 1. Sub-paragraph 2 applies where the permitted price given by Paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
- 2. The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

Non standard timings: On Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Mondays of Bank Holidays an extension until 01:00hrs  
 On Christmas Eve and Boxing Day an extension until 01:00hrs

 Non standard timings: When hours for sale of alcohol are extended on bank holidays, Christmas Eve and Boxing Day these hours are also extended.

## **Conditions consistent with the operating schedule relating to the licensing objectives**

### **The prevention of crime and disorder**

10. A suitable closed circuit Television (CCTV) system will be in operation at the premises at all times when it is being used for the provision of licensable activities and/or when members of the public are permitted to be on the premises. The CCTV system will record images to cover all areas of the premises to which the public have access (except for toilets), including any external areas of the premises such as car parks and beer gardens. The CCTV system will be capable of retaining images for a minimum of 31 days, will be of good quality and will contain the correct time and date stamp information. The CCTV system and images will be kept in a secure environment to which members of the public will not be permitted access. At least one member of staff will be on duty at the premises who is capable of operating the system and downloading images recorded by it. These images will be downloaded and provided, on request, to an officer of a responsible authority.
11. The premises licence holder and/or designated premises supervisor will ensure that an Incident Report Register is maintained on the premises to record incidents such as anti social behaviour, admissions refusals and ejections from the premises. The Incident Report Register will contain consecutively numbered pages, the date time and location of the incident, details of the nature of the incident, the names and registration numbers of any door staff involved or to whom the incident was reported, the names and personal licence numbers (if any) of any other staff involved or to whom the incident was reported, the names and numbers of any police officers attending, the police incident and/or crime number, names and addresses of any witnesses and confirmation of whether there is CCTV footage of the incident. The Incident Report Register will be retained for a period of twelve months and produced for inspection immediately on the request of an authorised officer.
12. The premises licence holder and/or designated premises supervisor will belong to a recognised trade body or Pub Watch Scheme where one exists, whose aims include the promotion of the licensing objectives.

### **Public safety**

13. Written records of all accidents and safety incidents involving members of the public will be kept. These will be made available at the request of an authorised officer.
14. Regular safety checks of the premises including decorative and functional fixtures, floor surfaces and equipment (including electrical appliances) to which the public may come into contact, must be undertaken. Records of these safety checks must be kept and made available for inspection by an authorised officer.
15. During opening hours the cellar door must be kept locked or adequately supervised to prevent unauthorised access by the public.
16. Electrical installations will be inspected on a periodic basis (at least every 3 years or at a frequency specified in writing) by a suitably qualified and competent person. Inspection records/certificates will be kept. These will be made available at the request of an authorised officer.
17. If used, any temporary electrical wiring and distributions will be inspected by a suitably qualified and competent person before they are put into use. An inspection record/certificate will be retained for inspection by an authorised officer.
18. Regular safety checks of guarding to stairs, balconies, landings and ramps will be undertaken, and a supervision policy will be maintained to prevent people from inappropriate behaviour including climbing which may lead to a fall from height.
19. Safety glass that is impact resistant or shielded to protect it from impact will be used in all areas where the public may come into contact with it.

20. All floor surfaces will be suitably slip resistant, kept in good condition and free of obstructions to prevent slips, trips and falls.
21. Members of the public will be prevented from accessing hot food and drink preparation areas to prevent risk of scalds or burns to them.
22. A suitably trained first aider or appointed person will be provided at all times when the premises are open.
23. Adequate and appropriate first aid equipment and materials will be available on the premises.
24. A procedure for dealing with unwell members of the public will be in place including those who appear to be affected by alcohol or drugs. Staff will be appropriately trained in such procedures.
25. Where strobes, lasers, smoke machines or any other special effects equipment may be used, a written health and safety policy covering all aspects of their use will be provided and staff will be appropriately trained.
26. No strobes, lasers, smoke machines or any other special effects will be used at the premises unless there is a clearly displayed warning at the entrance to the premises that such equipment is in use.

### **The prevention of public nuisance**

27. Ensure that no nuisance is caused by noise or vibration emanating from the premises.
28. Noise shall be inaudible at the nearest noise sensitive premise after 23:00 hours and when entertainment takes place on a regular basis at all times.
29. The playing of musical instruments by performers (live music) shall not take place at the premises between 23:00 hours and 10:00 hours on any days without prior approval of the Licensing Authority.
30. No bottles shall be placed in the external receptacle after 23:00 hours to minimise noise disturbance to adjoining properties.
31. Patrons shall not be allowed to use the beer garden, or any external area after 23:00 hours.
32. Clear and legible notices shall be displayed at exits and other circulatory areas requesting patrons to leave the premise having regard to the needs of local residents, in particular emphasising the need to refrain from shouting, slamming car doors, sounding horns and loud use of vehicle stereos and antisocial behaviour.
33. A facility shall be provided for customers to order taxis and telephone numbers for taxi firms shall be displayed in a prominent location. Where possible there should be a liaison with a local taxi firm to ensure a ready supply of transport and thereby reduce disturbance.

### **Protection of children from harm**

34. Children under 16 will not be permitted to sit or stand at the point of sale (bar).
