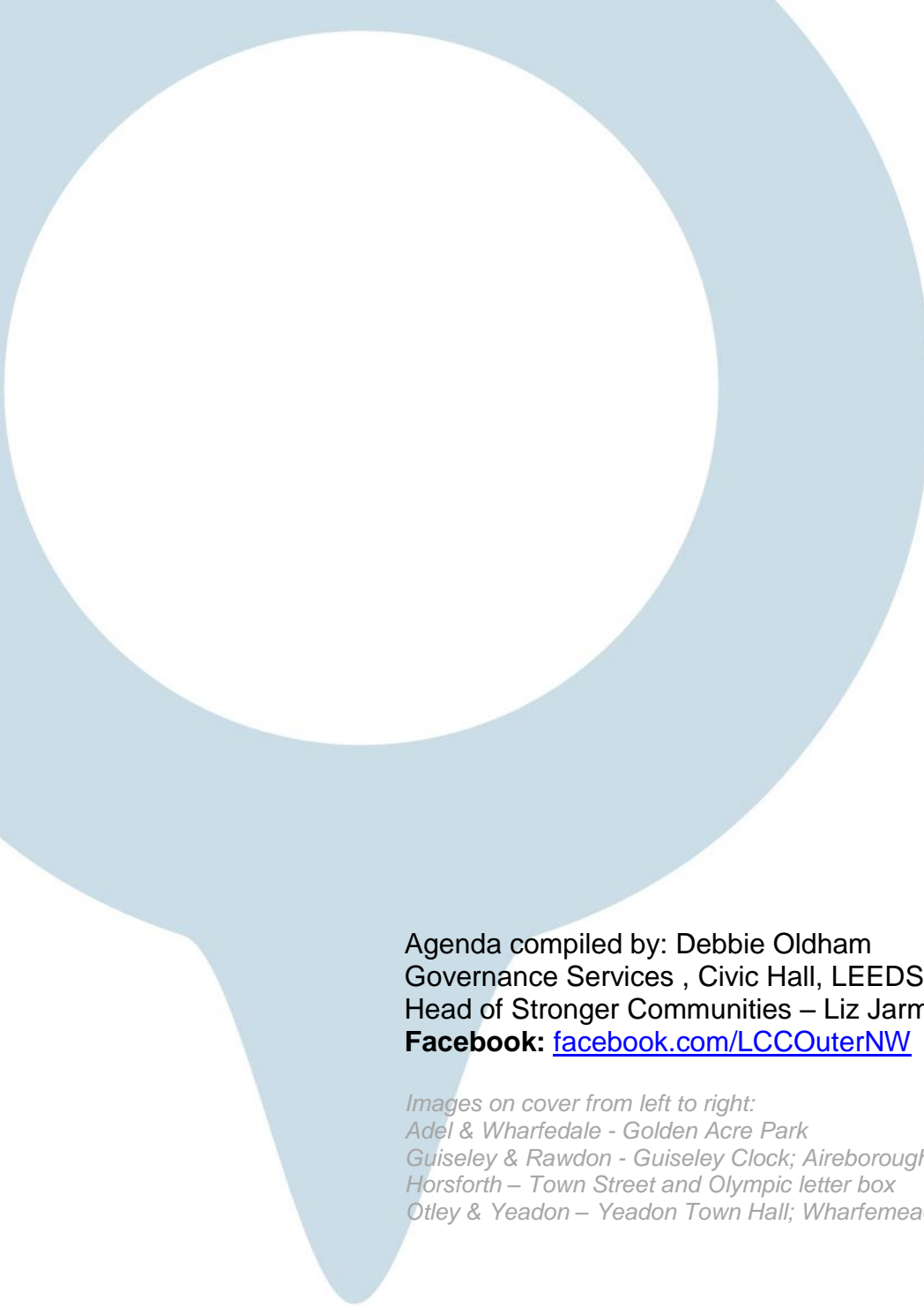

18 Apologies For Absence

There were no absences.

19 Minutes - 24th June 2019

RESOLVED – That the minutes of the meeting held on 24th June be approved as a correct record with the following amendment:

Minute 12 – Outer North West Finance Report to include in the resolution approval of the following project:

h) Noted that Members had agreed a Delegated Decision for £5,000 on 26th April 2019 for Horsforth Sheds, St Johns Church, Horsforth.

20 Matters arising

In relation to Minute 9 Community Committee Appointments 2019/2020, Cllr. Lay requested an update on the position of the Pool/Otley /Bramhope Cluster. The Committee were informed that the concerns of the Councillors appointed to this cluster had been raised with Children and Families Services, who had arranged a meeting with all Members appointed to the Clusters scheduled for 30th September 2019.

Cllr. Lay expressed his disappointment with the meeting as he had hoped to have a one to one on this specific matter. Governance Services offered to take this back to Children and Families Services with the Councillors request.

The confirmation of the appointment of Cllrs Lay and B Anderson to the Pool/Otley /Bramhope Cluster was affirmed.

21 Climate Emergency and Air Quality

The Community Committee received a presentation which provided background on the Climate Emergency and on-going work on air quality.

Members were informed of the following points:

- In March 2019 the Council declared a Climate Emergency with the target to work towards net zero by 2030 for the whole city;
- As part of the climate emergency the Council has committed to undertake a city conversation to include residents, public sector, businesses;
- The team have attended community events;
- There had been a 15% response rate to the questionnaire from this area which is the highest in Leeds;
- Alongside climate change the Council is also focusing on increasing biodiversity across the city with planting schemes, and a more relaxed approach to mowing to encourage nature;
- Introduction of the Clean Air Zone to improve the air quality through a number of measures including anti-idling campaign, roll out of charge points, changes in the council fleet vehicles to a more green fleet. It was noted that the Council currently have a large fleet of electric vehicles with more due for 2020;
- Promotion of traffic free days;
- To avoid dangerous climate change we need to ensure that we stop global warming and keep temperatures below 1.5°C if we

carry on at our current rate we would use our total budget for a period up to 2050 within 9 years;

- There has been a 70% decline in insects;
- There is a toolkit to explain how individuals can help and make a difference;
- 5 Main themes were listed as:
 - Homes – including energy efficiency, LED lightbulbs, efficient appliances, insulation;
 - Food – including how food is produced, processed, moved, bought and wasted;
 - Stuff – including how we buy and select clothes and how we could repair and reuse clothes;
 - Biodiversity – including tree cover, flowering plants, less mowing, encourage insects
 - Travel – including use more public transport, charging points, change to electric cars.

The Committee Community discussed the following points:

- Electric cars including the benefits and the costs;
- Air quality at the junction at the top of Pool Bank;
- Anti-idling in areas of the outer north west particularly outside schools, Councillors welcomed the suggestion of banners to be placed near all schools in the area and suggested that they are also placed at busy junctions;
- Welcomed the suggestion of more tree planting on the area;
- The success of the car free day in Otley and that there should be more in the city;
- Need for all departments to work together especially Parks and Countryside and Planning;
- Benefits of walking for health and climate change;
- Need to engage with older people by visiting sheltered housing;
- Use of social media to communicate with the communities;
- The need to engage with schools in the area by speaking to head teachers to encourage work within schools and engage children;
- More transport hubs to increase choice and use of public transport;
- Airport expansion in relation to air quality.

The Climate Emergency Team were invited to attend a workshop of the Environment and Community Safety Sub Group date to be confirmed by the Environment and Community Safety Champion.

RESOLVED – To:

- Receive the presentation and to offer any feedback;
- Provide feedback on the best way to engage with the local community, including potential to link to the youth summit;
- Highlight any locations in the area where there is scope to increase biodiversity;

- Highlight any areas where idling is an issue and where the promotional banners could be used to best effect;
- Identify any schools that may be interested in hosting car free days;
- Identify any areas that may be interested in participating in a rolling programme of car free days in 2020.

22 Get Set Leeds – Making Leeds a More Active City

The report of the Director of Public Health updated the Community Committee on the progress made in relation to 'Making Leeds a more active city'.

The report also provided an overview of 'Get Set Leeds' and the promotion of the city wide conversation. Members received a presentation and were informed of the following points:

- The aim of the Council is to make Leeds the most active city in the UK;
- The 'Get Set Leeds' agenda links into the Climate Emergency agenda and the Health and Wellbeing agenda for the city promoting healthy eating and exercise;
- To change behaviours to activity and eating to reduce diabetes, cancers, cardio vascular disease, and promote physical and mental benefits and improve life during old age;
- Cancers within the Outer North West are high although it was suggested by the Members that this is probably due to the fact that more people in this area attend their GP when recognising symptoms and the population of the area are older;
- GP's can now write prescription for physical activity;
- The need to engage all parts of the community and embed physical activity into daily lives;
- The team are using online survey, community events, focus groups to engage.

Members' discussions included the following points:

- Use of Housing Advisory Panels to get the message out to those in more deprived areas;
- To visit sheltered housing to engage with older people;
- Need to better educate all communities to the benefits of being more active especially those hard to reach groups;
- Make use of the HUBs to cut across a number of services;
- There are a number of groups across the Outer North West who do physical activities and it was suggested that the Team contact these groups to find out what they are offering and how they get people involved so that this can be replicated in other areas of the city;
- Suggested ways to engage were: TV and radio adverts to explain the benefits of exercise; social media; straplines on emails; ask schools to send letters home to parents to encourage the family to take part in daily exercise.

The Health and Wellbeing and Adult Social Care Champion invited the Get Set Leeds Team along to a workshop of the Health and Wellbeing sub group.

- Note the content of the report;
- Champion the ‘Get Set Leeds’ conversation and the completion of the online survey: getsetleeds.co.uk;
- Spread the word across networks and communities encouraging people to join the conversation;
- Share social media posts and links to promotional video and online survey.

23 Finance Report

The report of the Head of Stronger Communities provided the Community Committee with an update on the Budget position for the Wellbeing Fund, Youth Activity Fund, Capital Budget, as well as the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) budget for 2019/20.

Members were informed of the following points:

- Point 16 - that the Northwest Leeds Country Park & Green Gateway Trial project had been cancelled and the £11,516 had been returned to revenue and £2, 440 returned to capital budget;
- The remaining balance of the Wellbeing budget is £84, 971. Table 1 of the submitted report presented a full breakdown of the projects;
- Members were asked to consider projects listed at points 21 – 31 of the report;
- Youth Activity Fund projects were presented at Table 2 with a total spend of £56,280 and a remaining balance of £2,885;
- Table 3 presented the small grants and skips that had been approved with a remaining balance of £1,974;
- Table 4 of the report set out the remaining balance of capital for each ward. It was noted that the balance for Horsforth required amending;
- Table 5 showed the amount of Community Infrastructure Levy available to spend in each ward.

Cllrs B Anderson and C Anderson briefly vacated the room whilst Members considered the application from the Adel War Memorial Association. Minute 17 refers.

Cllr. Campbell declared a non-pecuniary interest in point 25 of the submitted report as he is on the New Yeadon Christmas Lights Committee. He took no part in the consideration of this project.

The Community Committee requested that a letter be sent to Safer Leeds to highlight the Community Committees’ view that CCTV should be a central function and not paid for by the Community Committee.

Members requested that spend and balance for small grants and skips be broken down into wards in future finance reports.

Horsforth Ward Members raised concerns that work to improve the acoustics in the Horsforth Ballroom had not been undertaken, although, money had been approved some time ago. Members were of the view that a time limit of 4 months should be conditioned in which to make the improvements. Members requested that an update be brought back to the next meeting.

Outer North West Community Committee - Finance Report

Purpose of report

1. This report provides the Community Committee with an update on the budget position for the Wellbeing Fund, Youth Activity Fund, Capital Budget, as well as the Community Infrastructure Levy Budget for 2019/2020.

Main issues

2. Each Community Committee has been allocated a wellbeing budget (revenue and capital) and Youth Activities Fund which it is responsible for administering. The aim of these budgets is to support the social, economic and environmental wellbeing of the area and provide a range of activities for children and young people, by using the funding to support projects that contribute towards the delivery of local priorities.
3. A group applying to the Wellbeing Fund must fulfil various eligibility criteria, including evidencing appropriate management arrangements and financial controls are in place; have relevant policies to comply with legislation and best practice e.g. safeguarding and equal opportunities and be unable to cover the costs of the project from other funds.
4. Wellbeing funding cannot be paid retrospectively. An application form must be submitted and approved by the Community Committee before activities or items being purchased through wellbeing funding are completed or purchased.
5. The amount of wellbeing funding provided to each committee is calculated using a formula agreed by Council, taking into consideration both population and deprivation of an area.

6. Capital (CRIS) injections are provided as a result of council assets being sold. 5% of the sale price (up to a maximum of £100k) of a council asset is pooled city-wide and redistributed to the Community Committee areas on the basis of deprivation. The Community Committee will receive a new capital injection every 6 months.
7. Each Community Committee has also been allocated a Community Infrastructure Levy budget. For each CIL contribution, Leeds City Council retains up to 70-80% centrally, 5% is needed for administration and 15-25% goes to be spent locally. The money will be vested with the local Town or Parish Council if applicable, or with the local Community Committee and spend decided upon by that body. This local money is known as the 'Neighbourhood Fund' and should be spent on similar projects to the Wellbeing Fund (capital).
8. In the Outer North West Community Committee this means that the CIL money for Arthington Parish Council, Bramhope & Carlton Parish Council, Horsforth Town Council, Otley Town Council, Pool in Wharfedale Parish Council and Rawdon Parish Council will be administered by each Parish or Town Council, whereas monies for the parts of Adel & Wharfedale, Guiseley & Rawdon and Otley & Yeadon wards that do not have a Parish and Town Council will be administered by the Outer North West Community Committee.
9. It was agreed at Outer North West on the 27th November 2017 that CIL monies for Adel & Wharfedale, Guiseley & Rawdon and Otley & Yeadon would be spent in the ward it was generated in.
10. Projects eligible for funding by the Community Committee could be community events; environmental improvements; crime prevention initiatives, or opportunities for sport and healthy activities for all ages. In line with the Equality Act 2010, projects funded at public expense should provide services to citizens irrespective of their religion, gender, marital status, race, ethnic origin, age, sexual orientation or disability; the fund cannot be used to support an organisation's regular business running costs; it cannot fund projects promoting political or religious viewpoints to the exclusion of others; projects must represent good value for money and follow Leeds City Council Financial Regulations and the Council's Spending Money Wisely policy; applications should provide, where possible, three quotes for any works planned and demonstrate how the cost of the project is relative to the scale of beneficiaries; the fund cannot support projects which directly result in the business interests of any members of the organisation making a profit.
11. Any request for funding would involve discussions with appropriate ward members. Where projects do not have support from the Community Committee and are not approved, applicants are offered further discussions and feedback if this is requested.
12. In order to provide further assurance and transparency of all decisions made by the Community Committee, any projects that are not approved will be reported to a subsequent Community Committee meeting.
13. Sometimes urgent decisions may need to be made in between formal Community Committee meetings regarding the administration of wellbeing and youth activity budgets and also regarding the use of the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Neighbourhood Fund which has been allocated to the Community Committee. Alongside the Committee, designated officers have delegated authority from the Director of Communities and Environment to take such decisions.

14. The Community Committee has previously approved the following 'minimum conditions' in order to reassure Members that all delegated decisions would be taken within an appropriate governance framework, with appropriate Member consultation and only when the following 'minimum conditions' have been satisfied:
- a. consultation must be undertaken with all committee/relevant ward members prior to a delegated decision being taken;
 - b. a delegated decision must have support from a majority of the Community Committee elected members represented on the committee (or in the case of funds delegated by a Community Committee to individual wards, a majority of the ward councillors), and;
 - c. details of any decisions taken under such delegated authority will be reported to the next available Community Committee meeting for members' information.
15. Members are reminded that the necessary scrutiny of applications to satisfy our own processes, financial regulations and audit requires the deadline for receipt of completed applications to be at least five weeks prior to any Community Committee. Some applications will be approved via Delegated Decision Notice (DDN) following consultation with Members outside of the Community Committee meeting cycle.

Wellbeing Budget Position 2019/20

16. The total revenue budget approved by Executive Board for 2019/20 was **£93,930** for the Outer North West Community Committee. **Table 1** shows a carry forward figure of **£101,802** which includes underspends from projects completed in 2018/19. **£60,402** represents wellbeing allocated to projects in 2018/19 and not yet completed. The total revenue funding available to the Community Committee for 2019/20 is therefore **£135,329**. A full breakdown of the projects approved or ring-fenced is available on request.
17. It is possible that some of the projects may not use their allocated spend. This could be for several reasons, including the project no longer going ahead, the project not taking place within the dates specified in the funding agreement, or failure to submit monitoring reports. Due to this the final revenue balance may be greater than the amount specified in Table 1.

disabilities had the opportunity to attend the concerts as the designated performances spaces in each park are easily accessible for those with access needs.

33. The concerts benefited the community as people were able to experience free music in their local parks, which not only gets them out and about with children, elderly friends or relatives, dogs etc, it offers them music and the opportunity to meet and engage with other people from their local area and all the while experiencing these positives in their own local park.



34. Leeds Central Band had a great afternoon playing to the audience at Wharfemeadows Park, Otley on Sunday 30 June



35. Spa Sax had a great afternoon playing to the audience at Nunroyd Park, Guiseley on Sunday 23 June

Rawdon Cricket Club improvements

36. The clubhouse is a more open facility, with an acoustic partition in place to allow them to subdivide the room for additional functions and meetings. Rawdon Cricket Club are now able to offer a modernised, flexible community space that can be more readily used by members and local groups alike, allowing them to grow their role as a community hub.



Horsforth hall park- New play equipment

37. The new roundabout meets the criteria for inclusive play for children with physical disabilities as it allows wheelchair users to use the roundabout.

The new equipment has replaced missed or equipment in disrepair, therefore providing additional play facilities for the children who use the park

Any planning application approved prior to the 6th April 2015 do not qualify for a CIL contribution. As part of this payment schedule, Leeds City Council retains up to 70-80% centrally, 5% for administration and 15-25% goes to a Community Committee or the relevant Town or Parish Council. This 15-25% of the CIL receipt (25% if there is an adopted neighbourhood plan, 15% if there isn't) is known as the 'Neighbourhood Fund'. In the absence of a Town or Parish Council, the Neighbourhood Fund element of CIL is allocated to the Community Committee.

This campaign has just commenced to help the frail and vulnerable stay well and protected this winter within our wards. Below are six short films giving professional advice on topics such staying well, social isolation and how to access Primary Care services.

9. There is up to date training available for local organisations who look after older citizens, frail, vulnerable or those with learning disabilities this winter.

11. Physical Activity for our Children and British Cycling

12. Go Ride for School is a fantastic free provision for Schools and also local organisations. Sessions available at an introductory level and a more advanced outside of school four hour periods. With the current high level of interest with cycling in Yorkshire this is an opportunity to get local children more interested in cycling and thus increase their levels of physical activity. The scheme has up to twenty bikes to loan children for the sessions if they don't have their own. Cycle maintenance, up keep and general safety sessions are also available.

13. Physical Activity for our Children and the Daily Mile

14. This is an effective, evidence based initiative helping to get our Primary school children moving more, maintaining a healthy weight and developing healthy habits for life. It involves teachers walking with children in every class every day to set up strong

habitual healthy practices. The scheme is set up by the Yorkshire Sports Foundation and has its own dedicated officer to help schools start.

15. Public health are delighted to announce that the Leeds City Council health app has secured European Space Agency funding to carry on its research work and add new reporting features for the city's community development workers. This is a partnership project with Leeds, Wakefield Age UK, Bury Council and two European cities as yet undecided.

19. Outer North West Hubs update from Customer Services

Otley Community Hub and Library and the new Guiseley Library were host to a visiting assessor from the Customer Services Accreditation Team. They were fully compliant for the Award (with 3 compliance plus's) Both sites are recently refurbished

Otley has been refurbished incorporating the revolutionary way of marketing the library provision. Comments from customers have included. 'It is more like walking into Waterstone's bookshop'. The customer PCs have had an upgrade and we have 2 rooms available for booking. The new Children's area is particularly popular with the Library Rhyme Time increasing weekly. 30 children and adults on most days.

Otley now has visiting agencies – Money Buddies and CAB delivering surgeries from here.

The team continue to support charities – they held their own coffee morning for St Gemma's Hospice, raising £175.00 and the local Macmillan group used the venue for their annual fundraising event- they find there is a substantial footfall.

20. Guiseley Library

Having reopened at the Aireborough Leisure Centre on 28th September– the footfall in the library has increased beyond expectation- stats not available yet but the first week saw 120 new joiners to the library. Customers can already see the benefits of all the services - Leisure, libraries and a café under one roof. Feedback from customers has been very positive.

A very lively Craft and Chat group meet weekly. The ladies give money each week for charity and have been discreetly collecting funds to give one of the members of the group £250. Her husband had a bad cycling accident a year ago and now needs 24

hour care at home after head and neck injuries. The ladies felt charity begins at home.

21. Yeadon Community Hub and Library

The Go digital/get online sessions in the library and very well attended, all retired members keen to develop their computer skills.
A coffee morning for Macmillan raised approx. £50
