As part of the efficiency savings to be delivered in 24/25 within the Children's and Families directorate and as part of the programme of decommissioning, the contract held with Child Bereavement UK for the delivery of the Leeds child bereavement service was deemed to be in scope for decommissioning. This contract is due to expire on 28th February 2025.

This assessment reviews the impact the end of this service will have on staff, service users and the wider system.

Equality

Child bereavement is one of the most damaging adverse childhood experiences (ACEs). As part of Leeds journey to become more trauma informed in the way we support children, young people and families, feedback from our public consultation has noted the need to prioritise child bereavement.

The Child Bereavement service supports many vulnerable families who will represent those communities who are identified by protected characteristics.

The service supports families across Leeds with the highest referrals this year coming from a number of our deprived communities:

- South Leeds LS10 (Belle Isle, Middleton)
- East Leeds LS14 (Seacroft), and
- West Leeds LS12 and LS13 (Armley/Wortley and Bramley).

As we embark on this impact assessment, we know that there is a gap in the data we have relating to understanding the true impact of this service ending on vulnerable cohorts and those with protected characteristics.

The Leeds child population (under 18) has grown 10.9% in the last decade. This growth has seen an increasingly diverse child population and a child population weighted towards more deprived communities and families with low income.

In 2023 the rate of children in care in Leeds was 84 per 10,000, which is the 6th highest rate out of 11 statistical neighbours. It is also the 4th highest rate out of 8 core cities.

(Leeds Sufficiency Strategy 2024-2027).

There is a 10-year difference in life expectancy between those people living in the most and least deprived areas (Leeds Mental Health Strategy 2020-2025).

ONS 2022 data shows there were 12.5 deaths by suicide per 100,000 people in West Yorkshire and 11.9 per 100,000 in Leeds, which is higher than the England rate of 10.3. (Leeds Health and Wellbeing Board March 2024).

Diversity

The service works with complex bereavement cases and operates a train the trainer model with schools (currently 127 individual schools). The current offer delivers support to both children and their families – building capacity within families to provide ongoing support. as well as to professionals in schools across Leeds.

The children, young people and families who are supported by this service represent some of our most vulnerable communities who are already affected by the impact of poverty.

The 2022-2023 annual report noted that the service had supported 311 individual families and professionals via the Helpline (telephone and email support).

135 of these resulted in referrals to the local Leeds service where they needed in-depth further direct support. A total of 232 referrals were taken during 2022-23 supporting 1083 individual children and young people over 1264 sessions.

Child Bereavement UK, Leeds have a key link with the clusters and have aligned to Early Help, providing a place within the systems to belong.

The removal of this offer will mean that provider staff (2 in total) will go through the redundancy process within Child Bereavement UK. This is in turn may leave staff without employment either for the short or long term which brings about the impact of poverty.

Cohesion and Integration

Our vision of an integrated and cohesive community includes ensuring that people from different backgrounds have similar life opportunities. The removal of this service will have an impact on those communities who already are vulnerable and lack some life opportunities. Understanding the communities most affected is vital to ensure we target the system support going forward to those most in need.

Consultation feedback notes that there is evidence to show that adults who struggle with crime, homelessness and severe mental health issues have experienced bereavement at a young age and have not received any support. The removal of child bereavement services means that only those who are able to pay for specific bereavement support will be able to access it. Leaving the most vulnerable in society without.

Current service offer in place until 28/2/25 at an annual cost of £133,447.
The service had previously been operating at a loss (to Child Bereavement UK) of £4000 per month.
A staff member left and was not replaced which now leaves the current service operating at a loss of £2000 per month.
A further member of staff is on maternity leave.
This leaves the current commissioned service operating with 2 full time members of staff.
One staff member is also the team leader and therefore service user practitioner time is reduced to 1.5 FTE.
Feedback has been received from service users and professionals as part of the public consultation to exercise the break clause within the Child Bereavement UK contract.
This feedback has provided strong support for the service but also identifies the gap the removal of this service will bring.

Leeds City Council is not alone in having to make extremely difficult decisions in relation the ending of service contracts. Due the challenging financial landscape a number of bereavement services have ended across Leeds including:

- Leeds Bereavement Forum closed at the end of April 2024 due to a lack of sustainable funding support from the Integrated Care Board.
- In 2024 all one-to-one bereavement support at Wheatfields Hospice has ended with their bereavement staff being made redundant.
- The long-term counselling offer previously delivered by The Market Place has ended this year.
- A reduction in the service that Cruse Bereavement provide in Leeds.
- OWLS (Overcoming Worry, Loss and Sadness) children's bereavement counselling, which was funded by Jane Tomlinson Appeal, is currently closed until further notice.
- Martin's House Children's Hospice bereavement service is currently on pause as they review their offer in the face of increased cost pressures.
- Mind Grief and loss support service closed March 2023.

We have attempted to shield the Child Bereavement service from facing any reductions or closure however we are now in a position where the financial situation makes this unattainable.

We acknowledge that the impact of these reductions will be widespread and that it is important to act as close to the values, understandings and principles set out within the COMPACT for Leeds.

However, we acknowledge that as these savings are to be enacted at speed there may be challenge linked to the above.

Input from internal Leeds City Council colleagues alongside Child Bereavement UK colleagues is ongoing to enact these savings recommendations.

In addition, shared communication developed by Children and Families commissioning team (approved by CFLT) and Child Bereavement UK will be shared with both the service and service users (including referees) to communicate the decision.

We will work with colleagues across the Children and Families directorate and wider system to signpost children and their families to other services who may be able to support for example the newly commissioned Time for Young People service being delivered by The Children's Society. This service will be able to support children with many social, emotional and mental health issues including bereavement. Whilst this does not replicate the counselling offer provided by Child Bereavement UK and the support will be more generic than specific, children and young people can be supported initially through their brief intervention model and would be able to access more structured support (up to 10 sessions) if deemed appropriate. We will work with providers across the system to understand service pressures and service gaps as the impact of the service closure becomes live.



There is a need to work through how service users will be supported following the end of the service particularly looking at how service users are signposted to universal services as appropriate. There may be financial implications as families who would have been supported at an earlier point through this service may now have to wait longer (or indeed no longer receive support at an earlier level) which may in turn increase risk and their then need to access higher cost services.

8a. Positive impact:

The information gathered through this impact assessment and assessing the risk to families will be used to reset the future role and function of the Children and Families directorate alongside our system partners.

Action required:

The impact assessment will be used as a tool to support the reset of Leeds City Council as we develop within the unprecedented financial challenging landscape with our system partners.

As part of the public consultation YLL and Forum Central are aware that other services providing social, emotional and mental health support to children and young people are in increasingly high demand. For example, the demand for the shorter-term counselling provided by Barca, GIPSIL and Northpoint in schools is currently unable to be met. YLL and Forum Central would be keen to support any mapping of other provision and the levels of demand they are experiencing to ensure that children and young people still receive the support they need.

Feedback received through the public consultation exercise also expressed a need to understand the nature of support available i.e. the appropriateness of online/digital solutions.

8b. Negative impact:

Removing access to timely bereavement support may mean that there is an increase in families who need to access our high-end support services due to an increase in vulnerabilities and risk.

The removal of this service offer may also result in negative public feedback due to less families being able to access timely bereavement support and thereby achieving our ambitions as a city to provide timely support to those we need it most. Feedback received through the public consultation notes the high level of support for this service.

As we undertake our programme of decommissioning in order to achieve the efficiency savings required other services who may have been able to support these families will also come under pressure to fill gaps in service offer.

All of this impact affects our most vulnerable families who will represent those communities who are identified by protected characteristics.

Action required:

As we work with the provider, Child Bereavement UK, to decommission the child bereavement offer it will be key to gather information in relation to how service users will be supported going forward and we seek to mitigate this impact by signposting service users to alternative support services.

In order to minimise potential public conflict in relation to the service ending it will be important to ensure a consistent communication to those who both refer to the service, use the service and work within the service.

This message will be developed by members of the Children and Families directorate alongside Child Bereavement UK.

Children and Families Leadership Team will be provided with detail that will inform them of the impact of the removal of this service in order for them to understand the risk that Leeds City Council will now hold as a result of the termination of this service.

With regards to the impact on provider staff, there is a reliance on corporate HR, legal and governance processes which provide the necessary reassurances of EDCI consideration.
