1.0 Purpose of this Report:

This report seeks to provide Members with:

- a current position statement on the Well-being Budget. a)
- a progress report on revenue projects agreed for the current financial year b) (04/05), any changes, and recent expressions of interest (appendix 1 and 1.1).
- details of revenue projects agreed in principle and recent expressions of interest c) for the Well-being budget 05/06 (appendix 2, 2.1 and 3).
- details of capital projects agreed in principle and recent expressions of interest d) for the capital Well-being budget. (appendix 4).
- a proposal of how monitoring of the projects will be undertaken. e)
- f) details of Small Grant applications received.

2.0 Background

- At the last Area Committee meeting, a Well-being report was considered, and it was decided to convene a separate Area Committee meeting to look at Well-being allocations for the remainder of 2004/05 and 2005/06.
- 2.2 At the December Area Committee meeting the final allocations of Well-being funding were noted as £202,729 revenue funding for 2004/05 financial year and £394,196 capital funding over three financial years from 2004/05 to March 31st 2007.

- 2.3 Members should note the following points: -
 - It is anticipated that unallocated revenue funding for 2004/05 will be rolled forward to next year. This is subject to a report to Executive Board, and Executive Board approval.
 - A total of £7482.10 is remaining in the small grants fund. See section 6.1 for recent applications to the small grants fund.
 - The budget for community skips has been incorporated into the Well-being budget. So far this year approximately £5, 200 has been spent. The total figure allocated for the year is £6000. (Please note that at the last Area Committee meeting a further £1,000 was allocated to the skips budget if required).
- 2.3 The following are the eight priority themes agreed by the Area Committee that ideally the 2004/05 Well-being budget should be allocated against-
 - Cleansing related streetscene improvements
 - Improving the standard of roads and footpaths
 - Enhancing the streetscape and the environment
 - Protecting and supporting vulnerable people
 - Maintaining community assets that are deemed to be valuable
 - Tackling antisocial behaviour by young people
 - Improving facilities for young people to use
 - Addressing issues linked to shared housing
- 2.4 The priorities for 2005/06 are contained within the 2005/06 Area Delivery Plan, which was agreed in principle at the last Area Committee meeting, subject to Member amendments.

3.0 2005/06 Well-being Revenue Allocation

3.1 Members are asked to note that the 2005/06 financial year Well-being revenue budget has been allocated at £202,730.

4.0 Well-being Projects

- 4.1 Details of projects agreed for the 2004/05 revenue budget, including a current position statement and project outputs are listed in Appendix 1.
- 4.2 Details of new expressions of interest to the 2004/05 revenue budget are listed in appendix 1.1. The Area Committee is asked to consider and agree projects to be developed.
- 4.3 Details of revenue projects agreed in principle for 05/06 are listed in appendix 2.
- 4.4 Details of new expressions of interest for 05/06 are attached at Appendix 2.1. The Area Committee is asked to consider and agree projects to be developed. Following requests at the last Area Committee meeting, further details of the worker posts, Hyde Park Unity Day and Little London Arts applying for Well-being revenue funding from the 2005/06 budget, can be found in appendix 3.
- 4.5 As stated in the September Area Committee Well-being report, Members are advised to progress with caution around agreeing funding for posts that over commit ongoing revenue from the budget.
- 4.6 Details of capital projects agreed in principle for 05/06, and new expressions of interest for 2005/06 are attached in appendix 4. The Area Committee is asked to

consider and agree projects to be developed. (Please note that the £394,196 budget allocation is over a 3 year period for 2004/05, 2005/06 and 2006/07).

5.0 Monitoring of Projects

5.1 It is proposed that the North West Area Management Team undertake quarterly monitoring checks on each project, based on the project Outputs and Outcomes as indicated in the Appendices. This monitoring will be summarised and reported to the Area Committee as part of the Well-being updates. The Area Committee is asked to agree to receive project monitoring in this format at future meetings.

Appendix 1.1 – Bids for approval for 2004-05 Well-being Revenue

Project Name: Promoting Crime Reduction **Lead Organisation:** West Yorkshire Police

Project Summary: Purchase of metal poster frames to display crime prevention messages. These frames can be used on lampposts and the messages can be changed and the frames moved from

location to location. The aim is to purchase 25 frames for use in the various apollo areas.

Total Project Cost: £1,100

Amount requested from Area Committee: £1,100

Project Name: Community Re>Paint

Lead Organisation: Seagulls Re-use Limited

Project Summary: The Community Re>Paint project collects leftover paint from households and redistributes it to community groups and people on a low income. This diverts materials from landfill and also provides a cheap source of paint. They are looking to purchase a van to collect and redistribute the paint (they are currently having to use a volunteers' car to do this).

Total Project Cost: £4509.35

Amount requested from Area Committee: £4509.35

Project Name: Refurbishment of the Hawkwsorth Wood Community Shop

Lead Organisation: Hawksworth Wood Community Association

Project Summary: To refurbish the Community charity shop, which is currently in a poor state of repair and does not provide a welcoming environment for community users. The refurbishment of the shop should attract more people to use it. The proposed work includes a new suspended ceiling, electrical works, new floor, new internal door.

Total Project Cost: £7,850

Amount requested from Area Committee: £3,850

Project Name: Sustainable Energy Project **Lead Organisation:** Leeds Organic Growers

Project Summary: The Station Allotments will act as a beacon site for sustainable energy with a range of initiatives. Multi grant applications are being pursued with Central Govt, Powergen and Energy Saving Trust for equipment to produce renewable electricity and heating (solar panels and wind turbine). Area Committee support is needed to provide funding to pay for the necessary quotes required for the equipment. LOG have offered to pay the AC back, once they have generated enough money through the sale of their surplus electricity

Project Name: Cragside Fields Bollards

The project will be holding workshops in local parks (Burley, Alexandra etc...) and community centres/church halls (Burley Lodge Centre, Cardigan Centre, Woodsley Road Multicultural Centre) to highlight local artistic talent and encourage participation. A further area of work will be to work with local environmental projects to showcase the important work done by these groups. A Slightly larger event held in the summer on Woodhouse Moor will showcase the art/dance/music etc. that was developed at these workshops. All events will be free. If appropriate some form of partnership may be possible with LCC's summer activities for young People. The target area is in many ways unique in Leeds in its demographic. It has probably the most active voluntary and 'Do it Yourself' culture in the arts and small environmental regeneration projects (two activities that are linked on a practical basis) – this culture is key to the areas economic and social success. Unity Day provide the only activity and participation based celebration of what is going on in the area on a day to day basis.

Total Project Costs: £20,000 Funding Requested: £20,000

PLEASE NOTE: Hyde Park Unity Day are aware of the well-being budget restrictions for 2005/06, and are willing to receive a contribution towards funding for the project.

In previous years the Headingley Kirkstall Weetwood CIT have funded the above project varying amounts between £1,500 and £500, totalling £3,000 over 3 years.

However, previous funding for the event included SRB funding up to £3,330. This funding has now ended and the event will now require increased funding from other sources. The event has also had approximately £2,500 Leisure Services Arts grants in the past.

Other Funding Explored:

£3,500 applied for from Learning & Leisure Arts Grants, and will explore other funders.

Organisations/ Groups that work with:

The project will be delivered by volunteers (and a small number of paid workers for e.g. electrician, and sometime workshop leaders) in partnership with local community groups and other 'arts' (Oblong, Pandemonium Theatre Co.) and 'environment' (HP source, Community Safety Project, Rosebank Millennium Green) related groups. The organisation and finances of the events are overseen by a management committee.

What will happen if no funding is given:

The event will seek other funding sources, but will require £20,000 if the event is to go ahead as planned. Therefore a Well-being contribution to the event would be welcomed.

2. Rosebank Millennium Trust – Co-ordinator post

Name of Project: Rosebank Millennium Trust – Co-ordinator post

Contact Details: Freda Matthews

Project Description:

The co-ordinator is responsible for organising community involvement in the Rosebank Millennium Green and promoting use and fundraising for the Millennium Green to ensure future sustainability.

The project addresses key Area Committee priorities through:

- Enhancing streetscape & environment through maintenance and development of Rosebank
- Maintaining community asset deemed to be valuable-open space for use and recreation of community
- Tackling antisocial behaviour of young people-providing opportunities for constructive art work, (graffiti jam and wall) horticultural work
- > Improvement of green, opportunities to volunteer organising events
- Improving facilities for young people to use-improving and keeping green in good and safe order for use by children and young adults

Total Project Cost: £20,750

Funding Requested: £20, 750

PLEASE NOTE: Since the Area Committee meeting on 17th February 2005, the Rosebank Millennium Green Trust (RMGT) have revised the amount they are requesting from the Area Committee to £12,000 due to the fact that Area Committee has an over subscription to the fund for the next financial year. This funding will pay for a part-time worker and office space.

REVISED FUNDING REQUESTED: £12,000

Other Funding Explored:

RMGT have applied to the Lottery Community Fund, but so far have been unsuccessful. They are now looking to resubmit the bid for a 3rd time. The RMGT have also applied to Resourcing the Community, and again have been unsuccessful.

RMGT have also submitted a joint Objective 2 bid with Hyde Park Source, which looks to extend the Hyde Park Source training base to horticultural training. Unfortunately there is currently a strategic pause on this pot of funding, and the project cannot be progressed.

RMGT have also applied to Lloyds TSB for a small grant and are waiting for a reply.

RMGT have had a meeting with Sharon Knott (funding officer), who will be looking to help with funding advice.

Organisations/ Groups that work with:

- Work with HP Source (itself in funding difficulties)close neighbours to Green, hoping to extend work they do with disaffected young people in construction to horticultural work training etc (see above Obj 2 project)
- ➤ Liaise with Burley Hyde Park Community Safety Project in clean ups on site, reporting of drug use on site (also close contact with local Police CAD team and PCSO officers)
- Work with local Community Handyman Cardigan Centre (pay for clearing away of rubbish collected in monthly clean ups, small repair jobs e.g. vandalism to features, stones etc. small horticultural jobs
- Liaise with St John's Probation Hostel (Hyde park Rd)-horticultural work on site clearing weeds overgrown areas for team with their project worker
- Liase with student action teams CALM Leeds6 to provide volunteers for cleanups and events on site.
- ➤ LMU mature student spent year (2004)working with co-ordinator to organise events and do work with local school etc as part of his course work.
- > Individual student volunteer working with present co-ordinator one day per week

What will happen if no funding is given:

The project will continue to run, but will be managed by a small group of volunteers. There may be a lack of capacity to keep the project going in its present form, and the site may deteriorate.

3. Leeds Library & Information Service - Celebrate

Project Name: Celebrate – a festival of word and story **Lead Organisation:** LCC Library and information Service

Project Summary: As part of the Headingley Festival at the beginning of September, Headingley and Burley Libraries will put on a day of activities, workshops and entertainment at each library to promote the enjoyment of words and story telling. The project will raise awareness of the resources and facilities offered by the library and it is hoped to increase the number of people visiting the libraries. The project will also highlight to parents the importance of reading with their children.

Total Project Cost: £3,100

Amount Requested from Area Committee: £1,600

4. Hawksworth Wood Community Association – Co-ordinator post

Name of Project:

Hawksworth Wood Community Association – Co-ordinator post

Contact Details: Lali Torrents

Project Description:

The centre co-ordinator extension for Hawksworth Wood Community Association (HWCA) will enable the agency to continue to support capacity building and socially inclusive ways of working by providing core management support for volunteers and outreach work in the community, specifically by:

- > Developing the Association's project work
- Networking with local agencies and professionals
- > Securing funding to achieve sustainable projects
- Promoting community safety work
- > Supporting surgeries with local agencies, councillors and services.

The Co-ordinator's role ensures accountability of service providers to local community and ensures services meet locally identified priorities. The need to continue providing a central point of information, locally for people to receive advice, support and guidance. The local Community will be supported which instigates resident led collective action. This is the key to enabling people exercising a choice about which services to access involving local people in the decision making progress that impact on their lives. Promote greater social cohesion by facilitating and encouraging residents to work together in the community. To enable a wider section of the community to engage in community activity e.g. refugees and those seeking asylum and ethnic minority. Support migrant groups to be more integrated and accepted into the local community, thus more transient residents having inclination to stay on in the area and progressively contribute to the local life.

Cleansing related street scene improvements

HWCA managed/organise a clean-up Days in the community. This was a joint initiative with Leeds North West Homes and Leeds City Council.

Enhancing the streetscape and the environment

- ➤ Working with Partners in Change as a member of the Hawksworth wood Action Plan Steering group to identify key Streetscape and environment issues. An Architect has been appointed by Partners in Change to assess and develop house improvements and environmental improvements to public open spaces.
- > HWCA is also planning on regenerating the small green spaces around Hawksworth.
- > HWCA also involved with the Kirkstall Valley park Project

Protecting and supporting vulnerable people

The Community Association meets a clear and identifiable gap in the local community and acts as a sustainable community organisation which facilitates links with other initiatives and acts as a main focus of community activity.

Improving facilities for young people to use

The Community Centre is currently offering an on going free internet service for young

people to search for employment. In April HWCA will run a free IT Enhancing Skills course to all residents. This is a joint initiative with the Learning and the Leisure Department of the Council. We are also planning to organise an event in the Breeze International Young Festival. This is a project in partnership with the YMCA.

Total Project Cost: £25, 580.66 per annum

Funding Requested: £19, 185 (9 months funding, full-time worker)

PLEASE NOTE: Following discussions with Sharon Knott (Funding Officer), the HWCA would reduce the amount requested to 6 months funding, and work closely with the Funding Officer to secure longer term funding in the future. There have been discussions between HWCA and CALLS about combining posts, but it is felt that this would not be beneficial as Hawksworth Wood and Little London are very different areas. There has also been discussions around making the job part time, but it is felt that this would have an adverse effect on the work that is being carried out in the area.

The minimum that HWCA are requesting from 2005/06 Wellbeing revenue is £12, 790

HWCA state that "We would appreciate any contribution of funding available to ensure the position of Hawksworth Wood Community Association Co-ordinator while we look at other sources of long term funding. We would accept a smaller amount of financial help if that meant to ensure sustainability of other projects. Due to the location of Hawksworth Wood there is no other organisations to share resources with in close enough proximity to make it viable."

Other Funding Explored:

We have approached a number of large Charities and Foundations that provided financial help for salaries. We have approached the following; The Charles Hayward Foundation, The Yapp Charitable Trust, The Tudor Trust, Esmeé Fairbairn Foundation, The Levy Foundation, The Co-operative Charitable Foundation. Barclays Foundation Trust, Lloyds Foundation Trust, Leeds & Holbeck Building Society Foundation, Abbey Foundation, The Henry Smith Charitable Trust. We have also approached other main charities, which are mainly based in London, unfortunately their funding priorities are restricted to certain areas which we do not fall into.

The Management Committee is exhausting all sources of funding to support the bridge funding for the position of the Centre Co-ordinator. Further funding is expected to be secured for 3 years post extension from the Big Lottery Fund from November 2005.

HWCA will be able to pay for an extension of a month salary. After April 2005 and due to lack of financial resources the Community Centre can no longer afford the salary of its Centre Co-ordinator.

Organisations/ Groups that work with:

Hawksworth Wood Action Plan Steering Group, Leeds City Council, Leeds North West Homes, local residents, Kirkstall Valley Park Project, Police, Anti Social behaviour Team, YMCA, Hawksworth Primary School and Early Years Centre, Local Councillors, and

Hawksworth Older People Support.

HWCA holds monthly multi agency meetings.

What will happen if no funding is given:

There will be no further funding for the post from April 2005. There will then be at least a six month gap in funding for the Co-ordinator post, and the work the co-ordinator manages will not be done in this time period.

5. Breakers Unify Development Project

Name of Project:

Breakers Unify Development Project

Contact Details:

Breakers Unify - Shaun Clarke

Project Description:

Breakers Unify aims to work with young people from deprived communities in Leeds, especially those who are at risk. We encourage and initiate activities that celebrate what is positive and progressive about Urban Art cultures', in particular Break-dance and Rap/poetry. One of our main aims is to educate young people about the positive aspects of Hip Hop Culture through participation and involvement in activities, where they learn new skills, and how to identify with the positive message of this street culture rather than the negative and violent. At the same time we promote good health, social consciousness and cultural awareness.

We also aim to refer Young people onto training, educational or employment opportunities as well as sign post them to other service providers/organisations from which they may benefit. Wherever possible we take part in community festivals e.g. Hyde Park Unity Day, Little London Community Day as well provide information and advice about Urban Arts.

BU is a network for urban talent and enthusiasm and supports local Urban Art activity as an alternative to crime, violence, boredom & drugs.

The project will meaningfully engage with up to 30 young people from the area in particular those who are at risk, of becoming either excluded or involved in anti social behaviour, Create an update of members, volunteers and useful contacts to update the BU network, Promote healthy living through dance and open expression. Also, train and support current volunteers, as well as recruit new ones for this project.

Young people will have:

- A better knowledge and respect for Urban Arts and Culture, having learned about the origins and positive aspects, which the mainstream media fails to represent.
- Acquired new skills in creative writing and performance and have had the
 opportunity to contribute (to a publication based on the their poems and spoken
 word, as well as perform their own materials to the public.
- A means through which they can express themselves, taking into account their own feelings and experiences.

- Increased their confidence, and communication skills on a personal level & through working with a group.
- Learned organisational and planning skills by being involved in the process of putting together a showcase.
- A better idea about how they can utilise the skills in everyday life.
- Had an opportunity to contribute and influence the development and delivery of the project, by being involved in all aspects, from publicity to establishing groundrules.
- A greater awareness of why not to get involved in anti social behaviour.

Breakers unify will also being working towards promoting and supporting little London community asset, the space @ which at present has very few community activities taking place there, little awareness in the community of what this space is for. At present breakers unify have been donated some office space there, so will be working from the space @ and raising awareness of this asset.

Total Project Costs: £19, 973.55 Funding Requested: £19, 973.55

20 hours per week Project Worker (SO1) for one year = £13973.55 Artists Costs for 30 weeks based on £25 per hour = £3000 Overhead costs including publicity, stationary, telephone, sundries = £3000

Breakers Unify are aware of the budget restraints and would be willing to negotiate a lower level of funding if this was required by the Area Committee.

Other Funding Explored:

Breakers Unify, have applied to the Local Children's Network Fund to contribute towards the costs of this project, and have recently been awarded a small amount from the local Community Chest.

Organisations/ Groups that work with:

At present Breakers Unify undertake partnership work with the Youth Service, where Breakers Unify are called in to run some workshops. Breakers Unify have also been doing some work in the area, in partnership with Connect2 Community Safety project and Serious Fun, where young people involved or at risk of becoming involved in anti social behaviour were identified and have been working with the Poetry Group, unfortunately Connect 2 will be ending at the end of March and this will no longer be an option. Breakers Unify contribute a lot to local projects such as Hyde Park Unity Day, and other showcases such as the one held at Little London Space@. However, the majority of this work is limited especially in terms of the outreach and administration due to the majority of work being done on a voluntary basis. Serious Fun who are part of West Yorkshire police also make referrals and support the work we do.

What will happen if no funding is given:

A limited programme of work will continue, but the project will struggle to develop in the area.

6. Community Action Little London and Servias (CALLS) – Co-ordinator post

Name of Project:

Community Action Little London and Servias (CALLS) – Co-ordinator post

Contact Details: Katie Griffiths

Project Description:

Community Action for Little London and Servias (CALLS), is a residents led based group, that works towards bringing about improvements and positive change in the geographically defined area of Little London. The main aims of the group are to improve Little London and its immediate surroundings, improve the local environment, improve community safety, and community services, increase community involvement to utilise the skills of local residents.

The project has run community led environmental and streetscape initiatives, over the past year CALLS have organised and raised the funds for four community clean-ups totalling to about 30 skips being placed in the area. We also plan to run environmental initiatives, which encourage residents to take more responsibility for their gardens and surrounding area.

CALLS also have £4000 from the local DAT team to work with young people on regenerating the subway in Little London, which is a magnet for anti-social behaviour, CALLS would really like to see this project into fruition with the support of a full time development worker.

Through the intergenerational work we aim to undertake, we hope to reduce some of the levels of anti social behaviour perpetrated by young people as we aim to install some trust and respect within the community. By familiarising residents and young people to each other, we hope that they will understand each other's perspectives. Through the work of the Multi Agency Drugs Group, we aim to work with young people and raise their awareness of the issues surrounding drugs and getting involved in criminal activity associated with this, both through the work on the subway project, and the drugs educational project which we have also received funding for from the local DAT. This plans to run a calendar project in partnership with Base10 and Little London Arts, set to take place in the three local primary schools.

CALLS support and work with vulnerable people ensuring that their concerns and voices are heard. We work towards empowering residents and increasing their confidence to take a more active role in their community and wider society as a whole.

Total Project costs: £35,000

Funding Requested: £29,972.93 (1 years funding)

PLEASE NOTE: Following discussions with Sharon Knott (Funding Officer), CALLS would reduce the amount requested to 6 months funding, and work closely with the Funding Officer to secure longer term funding in the future. There has also been discussions around making the job part time, but it is felt that this would have an adverse effect on the work that is being carried out in the area.

The **minimum** that CALLS are requesting from 2005/06 Wellbeing revenue is **£14,986.46**

Other Funding Explored:

CALLS have explored a number of possibilities for this project, we are awaiting to hear from the Community Fund and should hear the outcome of this application in the middle of March. However, we have been advised that it is unlikely that we will be successful in this bid, due to the over subscription of these funds and they are looking at it on a geographical basis and two other projects have received funding from them in this ward.

We have also applied to the Tudor Trust, and we will hear from this application in the middle of April, the money applied for is smaller than that to the lottery and requires some match funding from another source, to fulfil full amount to carry on three year project. We have attended Objective 2 meetings, however it was agreed that this type of funding would not be suitable for a lone worker small organisation due to amount of administration work involved.

Sharon Knott (Funding Officer) is working with the CALLS to help identify funding sources.

Organisations/ Groups that work with:

CALLS work with a number of organisations in the area, and use a multi agency approach wherever possible. CALLS facilitate the Little London Multi Agency meetings. to ensure that organisations and agencies are working together wherever possible to regenerate the area, and tackle concerns. Organisations involved in this process are Surestart, North West Homes, the police, Little London Arts, Little London Tenants and Residents, Streetscene etc. CALLS also initiated and oversee the running of Little London Multi Agency Drugs Group, this involves working with the North West Drug Action Team, Connect2, the police, North West Homes, local health care providers, to ensure that there are services and projects aimed at improving the drugs problems in Little London. CALLS have been working with Little London Arts, NW West DAT and Base 10, on an educational calendar project to be run in three schools n the area, and have recently secured funding in order to do this. CALLS have worked a lot with Connect 2 Community Safety Project over the last year, initiating projects such as the flower day, where residents were invited to come along and make their own hanging baskets to brighten up the neighbourhood. Unfortunately Connect2, have no secured funding after March. CALLS organise the annual Little London Community Day, which involves working with a number of the organisations who work in the area this includes Leeds College of Technology, Caring Together, Space@, Little London Primary, Little London Arts, Breakers Unify, the Grove, Leeds Libraries and Little London Community Centre.

What will happen if no funding is given:

CALLS will lose their development worker, and projects that have been developed will struggle to continue.

7. Leeds Youth Service - Youth Development Worker

Project Name: Youth Development Worker **Lead Organisation:** Leeds Youth Service

Project Summary: A worker post to build specific partnerships and delivery agreements with key voluntary organisations across the area. The proposal is to share this worker with the North East Area. The post would include several elements; identifying fundraising opportunities, guidance and information on Youth Service policies and procedures, access to training and development opportunities.

Total Project Cost: £40,000 (this is currently an estimate)

Amount Requested from Area Committee: £20.000 (this is currently an estimate)

8. Little London Arts – Programme of Delivery

Name of Project:	Little London Arts – Programme of Delivery
Contact Details:	Hannah Carey

Project Description:

The aim of the project is to deliver a programme of activity where funding will be spent directly on providing the service, which includes various staffing costs (including tutors etc) among other expenditure. In particular plans to produce a community magazine while providing training to local residents, supporting the Little London Community Day, and provide specialist skills to address a wide range of groups/ individual needs.

The activities of Little London Arts helps to address the following Area Committee Priorities:

Maintaining community assets that are deemed to be valuable,

- Venue: Space Little London where we run community wellbeing activities and there is no other budget currently for this.
- Human resources: utilising people with a range of specialist skills, expertise and local knowledge to provide these – our own and other contracted staff, and to delivering training in transferable skills
- Making use of money, time and effort already input into establishing contacts and setting up activities

Improving facilities for young people to use

As above and below, providing a range of services and activities locally for all ages, including children / young people through provision of various creative activities, in conjunction with other agencies as appropriate

Enhancing the streetscape and the environment

- > Through positively utilising outdoor spaces when providing outdoor activities (eg Breeze, community day)
- ➤ Through actively promoting environmental awareness in activities such as the Environmental Design Project with Little London Community Primary School pupils, and promoting wider community action on litter and recycling issues
- Through environmentally friendly activities such as use of recycled/reclaimed

materials; and working very locally, therefore reducing contribution to pollution

Protecting and supporting vulnerable people

➤ Through working with various groups of people including the elderly, residents of Lovell Park House [homeless hostel] and young people, in conjunction with other relevant organisations – all in Little London, where the community in general feels vulnerable with regard to social/health problems and lack of investment

Outcomes of the project will be:

- Production of a community magazine/directory
- Creation and production of a range of activities for local residents
- Creation of work/training opportunities
- Development and profile-raising of local organisations

Total Project Costs: £35,000

Funding Requested: £35,000 (full programme of work).

PLEASE NOTE: Little London Arts can run a part programme of work (as outlined above) with £17,000. Therefore the minimum required for this programme is to run is £17,000, but for a full programme £35,000 is required.

Minimum funding: £17,000

Other Funding Explored:

We are continually exploring other funding and other forms of support, (but many schemes have ended) and have some core funding contributed as part of the Arts & Regeneration Unit's Celebrating Creative Communities Objective 2 programme. This was conditional upon us seeking other funding from e.g. former CIT / now Area Management to fully realise the proposals and develop the capacity to deliver local services. We have also successfully fundraised for small-scale one-off projects such as Leeds Children's fund, Breeze, Royal Armouries, etc over the past year, and Community Chest / Learning Chest, etc prior to that. However we are now seeking funding which can be used in a more responsive way within the local community

Organisations/ Groups that work with:

We have worked with:

WEA [adult education], Community Action Little London, Connect2, Youth Service and other LCC Departments/Units, Caring Together, LL Community Primary School, Space@ Little London, SureStart, The Grove, Lovell Park House hostel, DAT, and will consider working with anyone else in the area.

What will happen if no funding is given:

A full and comprehensive programme of activity will not be available in the area.

9. Older Active People – Extension of project

Project Name: Extension of Older Active People services

Lead Organisation: Older Active People

Project Summary: To extend the services and activities of Older Active People into the North Headingley area. The project is for people over 55 and involves a range of health activities and services such as shopping service, lunch clubs, trips and parties, befriending scheme, intergenerational activities, newsletters and many others. The project currently operates in the Hyde Park, Burley and South Headingley areas.

Total project cost: £4,000

Amount requested from Area Committee: £4,000

10. North West Sustainability Initiative

Name of Project: North West Sustainability Initiative

Contact Details: Penny Bainbridge, Cardigan Centre

Project Description:

The Cardigan Centre will manage and deliver the project, and existing contacts and staff skills will contribute to the initiative's success. The project is designed to complement existing organisations and their services, such as the Funding Officer from VAL, Burley Lodge Centre, Oblong, VOICE, the Burley Network and RtC.

A capacity building community worker will be employed to work intensively with existing community groups in Hyde Park, Burley, Little London and Woodhouse. The aim is to enable those organisations to become stronger and more sustainable. The support will be available at various levels, for instance with management committees, volunteers and paid staff (if any). In order to do this the worker will help groups identify their support needs and then draw up a suitable action plan. The groups will be signposted to appropriate specialists for funding advice and for skill development. Networks in the local geographical areas will be established where these do not already exist. Networks will be supported to become more effective resources for their members. An annual networking event will be organised. Any other relevant services will be organised if there is a need and no one else is providing it e.g. to meet a particular training need.

There is a need for this project because of the existence of community groups which are addressing very local and important issues. In the Burley / Hyde Park area there are relatively many active residents, as shown for instance through applications to the Can Do fund, but fewer in Woodhouse and Little London. The project will therefore be addressing the need for progression: individuals working in a very small way with others could continue if they develop the appropriate skills and methods of organisational development. There are also groups which have had access to sufficient funds to employ a part time temporary worker which has enabled effective work to be delivered but this has not been sustainable. This has been the case for some groups who have had SRB or smallish lottery funding.

There is a general need to strengthen community groups because it is public policy to deliver services in a variety of ways, and to deliver the services at a very local level in order to ensure equity of access to services by the people who need them most. In inner city NW Leeds the communities cannot generate their own financial resources from

within their communities so public funding is the seedcorn to sustain community activity ultimately.

The Project will:

- To enable community groups in Burley, Hyde Park, Woodhouse and Little London to become stronger and more sustainable.
- To enable networks to become stronger and become an effective source of support for community groups.
- The ultimate aim therefore is that local residents become more active in flourishing community groups which have a positive impact on the quality of life in Inner NW Leeds.

The project will address the following Area Committee priorities:

- protecting and supporting vulnerable people,
- maintaining community assets,
- tackling anti-social behaviour, and
- improving facilities for young people.

Total Project Costs: £115,500 over three financial years

Wellbeing Funding Requested: £ 35,000 over three financial years

£7,000 2005/06 Well-being revenue

£20,000 2006/07 Wellbeing revenue £8,000 2007/08 Well-being revenue

- The total cost is £115,500, spread over three financial years.
- Objective 2 will fund 50%, i.e. £57,750.
- The Cardigan Centre has match funding of £22,750, made up of existing eligible grant funders and private match-funding from earned income.

We believe this is a balanced approach to the sources of funding, in that the two slices of match-funding will bring £57,750 additional money into the area.

The Cardigan Centre as a whole attracts around half a million pounds of funding in to the area per year. Most of this is restricted funds and is therefore committed to specific purposes. The organisation has a range of resources: building, equipment, skills, voluntary governance which will be used to support the initiative.

Other Funding Explored:

Other funding includes Objective 2 funding and Cardigan Centre reserves (see above).

Customers who receive means tested benefits and have no-one else they can ask to help, will be charged a modest hourly charge for the service. Others can access the service by paying a commercial hourly rate.
