52 Declaration of Interests

Councillor Lancaster declared a personal and prejudicial interest in Minute 69, 2006/07 Well-Being Fund – application for funding from Meanwood Elders, due to her role as Vice Chair of the organisation and withdrew from the meeting during discussion and voting on this item. She also declared an interest in the application for Fieldhouse Drive Improvements as she is a Member of the Leeds North East Homes ALMO.

53 Apologies

An apology for absence was submitted on behalf of Councillor Harris.

54 Minutes

RESOLVED – That the minutes of the meeting held on 11th October 2006 be confirmed as a correct record.

55 Children's Trust Arrangements for Leeds

The Director of Children's Services submitted a report regarding Children's Trust Arrangements for Leeds. The Chair welcomed Rosemary Archer, Director of Children's Services, who was in attendance to present the report.

It was reported that the Executive Board had formally agreed proposals for children's trust arrangements to provide a framework to improve the lives of children and young people within Leeds. There was a need to connect strategy to local area thinking as a statutory requirement of the Children Act and Councillors and Area Committees would be consulted as part of the overall plan.

The Committee was informed of the Council's responses to the 2004 Children Act. These included the following:

- The appointment of a Lead Member for Children's Services.
- The creation of a Director of Children's Services would give a route to accountability.

- The establishing of Children Leeds city wide partnership which included all agencies in Leeds that dealt with children's issues.
- Children and Young People's Plan this was a statutory requirement of the act; had first been produced in June 2006 and was currently under revision.

Members were informed of the six main elements of Children's Trust Arrangements:

- Integrated Strategic Commissioning Board
- Children Leeds Partnership this was a themed board of the Leeds Initiative.
- Locality Arrangements this included consulting with Area Committees.
- Local Safeguarding Children Board covering a range of protection issues for children and young people.
- Open Forum
- Directorate of Children's Services Unit.

Further issues discussed included the targeting of vulnerable groups, funding, Youth Service input and working with relevant partners such as the District Partnership and District Children's Partnership.

The Chair thanked Rosemary Archer for her attendance.

RESOLVED – That the report be noted.

56 2006/07 Well-Being Fund

The North East Area Manager submitted a report which contained recommendations of the Well-Being Fund Working Group on applications that had been received for funding.

An application for £5,000 had been received from Radio Asian Fever who had recently been awarded a full-time community radio license to broadcast from February 2007. A representative of Radio Asian Fever attended the meeting to support the application and answer Members questions. It was reported in the Radio Asian Fever business plan that funding had been assured from East Inner Area Committee, East Safer Stronger Communities Funding and North West Inner Area Committee. South Inner Area Committee had been unable to provide funding due to other commitments and Members expressed disappointment as this area had a large Asian population. Subject to approval of funding from other sources, it was reported that match funding would be made available from European Regional Development Funds. An application had also been made for big lottery funding. Concern was expressed regarding the sustainability of this project and how it would be funded in future years.

RESOLVED -

- (i) Leeds Reach £3,000 Approved.
- (ii) Meanwood Elders £2,418 Approved as a one off payment.
- (iii) East Specialist Inclusive Learning Centre (SILC) Youth Club £3,000 Approved.
- (iv) Air Training Corps North Leeds Squadron £3,190 Approved.
- (v) Fieldhouse Drive Improvements £11,000 Approved. (£2,415 from capital and £8,585 from revenue).
- (vi) Radio Asian Fever £5,000 Approved as a one off payment.

(Councillor Harker declared a personal interest in the application from East Specialist Inclusive Learning Centre due to his position as Executive Member for Children's Services and under the provision of Council Procedure rule 16.5, requested it to be recorded that he abstained from voting in this matter).

(Councillor Dowson declared a personal interest in the application for Fieldhouse Drive Improvements as she is a member of the Leeds North East Homes ALMO).

(Under the provision of Council Procedure rule 16.5, Councillor Hamilton requested that it be recorded that she abstained from the voting in relation to the application from Air Training Corps North Leeds Squadron).

57 Scrutiny Action Learning Project around Community Development in Health and Wellbeing

The Head of Scrutiny and Member Development submitted a report regarding the Scrutiny Action Learning Project around Community Development in Health and Wellbeing. Leeds City Council had been one of only 9 local authorities to receive £20,000 funding to carry out an action learning project around Community Development in Health and WellBeing and Area Committees were being consulted to ensure awareness was raised city wide.

One of the main aims of the project was to progress community development in the commissioning of health services. This would involve community engagement and assist with the development of local services to improve access to health care and enable people to remain in their own homes. It was recognised that there was a need to establish what services were already available and which organisations could provide local services.

RESOLVED – That the Area Management team co-ordinate the response of North East Inner Area Committee Members.

(Councillor Wadsworth joined the meeting at 4.50 p.m. during the discussion of this item).

58 Community Safety Update

The North East Area Manager provided the Committee with a report that summarised recent community safety actions and achievements including the work of Neighbourhood Wardens.

The Chair welcomed Trudie Canavan, Locality Co-ordinator for North East Leeds to the meeting.

It was reported that gating orders would be submitted to the technical board in January 2007 for Carrhome Drive/Road and Wensley Crescent. Successful approval of these orders would then lead to a public notice and consultation period.

In response to a question of concern regarding anti-social behaviour around the shops at Reginald Row and a request for fencing, it was reported that this had been identified by North East Homes and funding was to be approved. Further issues discussed included the future of the Latvian Club following recent problems, the deployment of mobile CCTV units and City Services Wardens. Trudie Canavan agreed to supply members of the Committee with information on Neighbourhood Wardens and Police Community Support Officers.

The Chair thanked Trudie Canavan for her report, positive work and attendance.

RESOLVED – That the report be noted.

59 Building Schools for the Future Phase 1

The Chief Planning and Development Services Officer submitted a report regarding progress on the replacement and refurbishment of school buildings under phase 1 of the Build Schools for the Future programme. The report focussed in detail on Allerton Grange High School which is based in the North East Inner Area and Members were informed that presentations would be made to Area Committees as part of the consultation towards planning applications.

Members were shown plans of the proposed new school building, which would be on the current Allerton Grange High School site and were also informed of local considerations such as vehicular access and public transport services. A short animated presentation that gave an overview of the interior of the buildings and the school site was also shown.

In response to a Members question it was reported that students had been consulted regarding the proposals. Consultations sessions had been held and students had raised their concern regarding social spaces within the School which had been reflected in the proposals.

RESOLVED – That the report be noted.

(Councillor Wadsworth declared a personal interest in this item due to his position as a Governor of Allerton Grange High School).

60 Open Forum

In accordance with the powers outlined in the Area Committee Procedure rules for members of the public to make representations or to ask questions within the terms of reference of Area Committees, the committee received a representation from the Chapeltown Community Centre Action Group (CCCAG).

The CCCAG had raised concerns regarding the review of community facilities in Chapeltown following the Area Committee's decision not to support the release of land for the purposes of building a new community centre in Chapeltown and a group representative attended the meeting to address these concerns.

Concerns focussed on the data and conclusions of the community facilities review along with gaps in provision and it was reported that CCCAG had planned meetings with community facility providers in Chapeltown to gather further information on facilities available and their views on a new community centre. There was also to be a public meeting to update people on progress with the Joint Service Centre and to present options for the group and decide the way forward as a community. The CCCAG reported that should the outcome of these meetings be that a new community centre for Chapeltown was considered to be the best way forward then they would seek the support of the Council and the provision to purchase land at market value.

In response to the CCCAG representations, Members were reminded that the review of community facilities in Chapeltown had been instigated following a deputation to full Council. Area Management staff were due to meet with community facility providers in the new year and a further update would be provided to the Committee in February or March 2007. It was also recognised that Chapeltown already had a large number of community facilities for a small area and there were other considerations such as the Chapeltown Road Development Plan.

61 North East District Partnership Update

The North East Area Manager submitted a report which provided Members with a summary of recent actions and achievements of the North East District Partnership.

Issues highlighted in the report included progress on delivering the District Neighbourhood Action Plans; Chapeltown redevelopment; community facilities review of Chapeltown; organisational restructures of the PCTs; Police; Adult and Children's Services and the Primary Review which proposed the closure of Fir Tree and Archbishop Cranmer primary schools.

RESOLVED – That the recent actions and achievements of the North East District Partnership be noted.

62 Area Delivery Plan 2007/08

The North East Area Manager submitted a report which provided information on the development of the priorities that would inform the Action Plan Content of the Area Delivery Plan 2007/08.

It was reported that the Area Delivery Plan priorities had been re-ordered in line with the Local Area Agreement which was structured into the following four blocks:

- Children and Young People
- Safer and Stronger Communities
- Healthier Communities and Older People
- Economic Development and Enterprise

RESOLVED – That the report be noted and the priorities proposed under each of the four blocks of the Local Area Agreement be approved.

63 Area Actions and Achievements Progress Report

The North East Area Manager submitted a report with a summary of recent actions and achievements of the Area Committee and Area Management Team.

Appended to the report was a list of actions arising from Area Committees and their progress. It was further reported that the Chapeltown Community Facilities Review would be reported to the January meeting of the Executive Board and not December as stated and that a meeting with the Yes Cyber Management Committee was to be arranged within the next week. The Area Management Team also agreed to e-mail Members with details of the 2007 Celebrations programme.

RESOLVED - That the report and recent actions and achievements be noted.

64 Working Groups Update

The North East Area Manager submitted a report which informed Members of the issues raised at the Area Committee Working Groups held since the last meeting of the Area Committee.

RESOLVED – That the report be noted.

65 Area Committee Forums

The North East Area Manager submitted a report which provided the Committee with feedback from the consultative forums that had been held in the North East Inner Area.

Since the last Area Committee meeting there had been consultative Forums in Chapel Allerton Village and Roundhay Ward - Talbot Area. Disucssion items included Policing Issues, Yorkshire Bank Site, Parks & Countrised, the Chappel Allerton Arts Festival and Street Scene.

In response to comments regarding Christmas lights, it was reported that contact had been made with the PFI streetlighting contractors and the provision of banner hangers and hanging baskets had also been discussed.

Executive Summary

The attached report was submitted to the Executive Board on the 15th November 2006. It sets out the background to the establishment of the Affordable Housing Task Force, and the subsequent production of the Affordable Housing Delivery Plan, 'Making the Housing Ladder Work'. It also forms a response to the "Right to Rent" delegation to the Council in September.

The report also sets out the housing market conditions in Leeds at the moment and the issues of affordability and the economic implications of not providing sufficient affordable housing.

The concept of a 'Housing Ladder' is explained and how there are rungs of the ladder, which are missing in certain areas. The consequences of not having the right mix of housing to meet different needs, requirements and aspirations are also considered.

It describes where existing policy and procedures can be improved and puts forwards a number of proposals in order to increase the supply of affordable housing.

The purpose of the presentation to the North East (Inner) Area Committee is to describe the overall picture across the city in terms of housing markets, the issues of increasing affordable housing across the city and to seek from a local perspective issues that need to be taken into account.

Executive Summary

This Report sets out the background to the establishment of the Affordable Housing Task Force, and the subsequent production of the Affordable Housing Delivery Plan, 'Making the Housing Ladder Work'. The report also forms a response to the "Right to Rent" delegation to the Council in September.

The report sets out the housing market conditions in Leeds at the moment and the issues of affordability and the economic implications of not providing sufficient affordable housing.

The concept of a 'Housing Ladder' is explained and how there are rungs of the ladder, which are missing in certain areas. The consequences of not having the right mix of housing to meet different needs, requirements and aspirations are also considered.

It describes where existing policy and procedures can be improved and puts forwards a number of proposals in order to increase the supply of affordable housing.

Executive Board is requested to support the Affordable Housing Delivery Plan and note that further exploration is needed in relation to the setting up of new vehicles to deliver affordable housing solutions.

1.0 Purpose of the Report

- 1.1 The purpose of the report is to describe the key components of the plan for the delivery of Affordable Housing in Leeds "Making the Housing Ladder Work" that has been developed by the Corporate Affordable Housing Task Group. Copies of the plan are now available on the intranet.
- 1.2 The report recommends Executive Board to:
 - Support the principles of the Plan
 - Authorise Officers to deliver the key actions
 - Request a report on an SPV, the primary objective of which would be to deliver more affordable housing in Leeds.

2.0 Background Information

- 2.1 Leeds is a vibrant, successful and modern city with a thriving quality of life and it is set to grow further in the future. In order to ensure that Leeds can develop and grow, it is essential that there is a range of good quality housing that can meet the needs, requirements and aspirations of its citizens.
- 2.2 The Council has responded to the government's agenda to create balanced mixed sustainable communities by the development of the large scale regeneration schemes such as the PFI scheme at Swarcliffe and the proposed schemes at Holbeck Moor and Little London, together with the EASEL initiative. However members have become concerned that over recent years increasing numbers of citizens can no longer afford to buy housing or get access to social housing.
- 2.3 In response to these concerns a corporate 'Affordable Housing Task Force' was established in July 06, chaired by the Chief Housing Services Officer from the Department of Neighbourhoods and Housing. This group has been looking at increasing the provision of affordable housing across the City.

The key issues the Task Force has focused upon are:

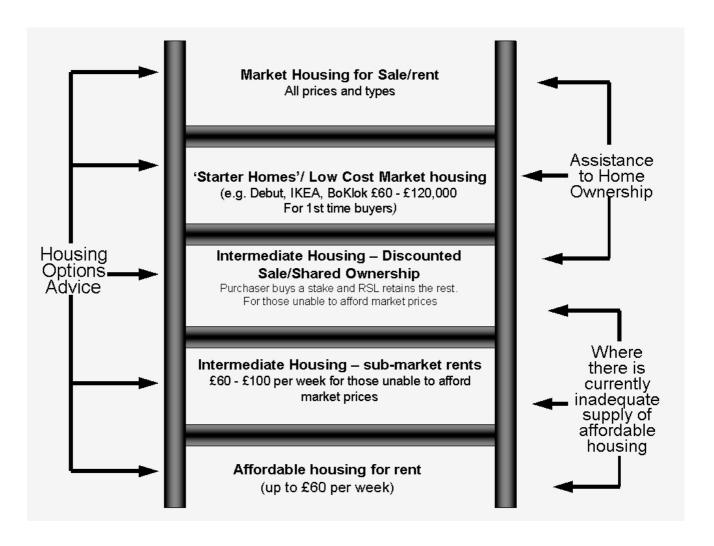
- How the lack of affordable housing may compromise the economic strength of Leeds
- The increasing difficulties for first time buyers
- The mismatch of the demand for social housing and its supply.
- How vulnerable groups, like the elderly and disabled are experiencing problems in getting the housing they need in the areas they want to live
- How poor quality housing in areas with high levels of deprivation can impede proposed regeneration initiatives
- How a range of high quality housing can be developed across the city for all the people of Leeds as well as the incoming population.

- 2.4 In September 2006 a deputation from Leeds Tenants Federation, 'Right to Rent Campaign' was heard by full Council. The campaign is calling for increased social rented housing. The Affordable Housing Delivery Plan in part responds to this campaign but seeks to cover the full range of affordable housing that can be provided in Leeds and the mechanisms to improve access to existing housing. The Plan stresses the importance of ensuring that there is sufficient affordable housing to meet current and future needs across the city.
- 2.5 The plan sets out the priorities and actions that will need to take place in the short, medium and long term, to increase the provision of affordable housing across the City.

3.0 Affordable Housing Plan 'Creating a Housing Ladder'

- 3.1 In the past affordable housing tended to be seen as being social housing for rent provided either by local authorities or Registered Social Landlords. In view of the escalation of property prices over the last five years, however, the question of the affordability of home ownership has become ever more pressing. As part of the Affordable Housing Plan, the concept of the "local housing ladder" has been developed. This seeks to establish a range of housing for sale, shared ownership and rent.
- Putting an effective 'local housing ladder' in place will need a mix of 'supply side' measures to increase the supply of affordable housing and 'demand side' measures to improve access to existing housing in the market. In the Affordable Housing Delivery Plan, the 'rungs' of the ladder are explored and explained in more detail.
- 3.3 The Chief Housing Services Officer is presenting the aims and objectives of the Plan to key Members, Department Heads, and Partner organisations over the next 3 months. This will ensure that all those involved directly and indirectly in the provision of affordable housing will have a better understanding of the issues, and the steps being taken by the Council to increase the supply of affordable housing.

The Local Housing Ladder



3.4 Why there is a Need for Additional Affordable Housing

The Plan explains how the Leeds Housing Market has not been working effectively enough to provide the range of housing which is needed. The social and personal consequences of a lack of supply are well known, manifesting themselves in extended council waiting lists, homelessness and over crowding. There is also a real threat that a lack of suitable housing as described by the "housing ladder" will hold back economic growth within the city

Economic growth will generate substantial job growth for key workers and those in low paid, short term and part time jobs, in the service, retail, leisure and catering industries. It is essential that suitable housing is available, other wise it may be difficult for employers to fill vacancies, thus restricting economic growth.

Other issues which the plan covers include:

• Home ownership has become increasingly unaffordable. At the moment only 4 out of 102 postcodes in Leeds have house prices affordable to those on below average incomes. The city average income for a single person is £22,000 per

annum based upon 2005 figures. A single income of £18,571 or dual income of £22,414 is needed to afford the cheapest back to back of £65,000. The city wide average for house prices according to the latest HM Land Registry information is £159,000.

- Reduction in social housing stock and lettings. There are almost 27,000 fewer social rented homes now compared to 1980. A further reduction of up to 10,000 is predicted by 2016 which will reduce the council housing stock to below 50,000.
- There is also the issue of neighbourhoods across Leeds where there is no access to housing for those on low to average incomes. Providing appropriate housing can help maintain neighbourhoods and ensure the viability of schools, shops, post offices etc and so protect the sustainability of the area.
- Regeneration issues, such as creating mixed tenure housing, promoting low cost home ownership and shared equity in areas of deprivation can help diversify demographic profiles, and enable the housing ladder to operate effectively and ensure more affluent households remain in the area.
- Statutory duties and obligations are also explored in more detail in the Plan and the consequences for not meeting these requirements are explained.

4.0 Increasing Affordable Housing through Existing Routes

4.1 There is a need to further develop existing approaches and programmes to enhance affordable housing provision and improve access for those unable currently to access housing through the open market. There is recognition that in a lot of areas across Leeds the preferred route to home ownership is through shared ownership arrangements. The following mechanisms are in operation at the moment but in order to increase provision needs to be improved and accelerated.

• Land release (Less than best)

Disposal of Council owned land at 'less than best' consideration is a tool open to the Council in conjunction with its partners to support the development of affordable housing. Schemes of this nature would, in the main relate to funding by the Housing Corporation through their Approved Development Programme (ADP).

The Housing Corporation has been charged by central government to increase affordable housing supply across the country. One of the mechanisms that the Housing Corporation is now using is to place a ceiling of £5,000 per plot on land values for the provision of affordable housing. This will increase the supply of affordable housing, but will be on the basis that the land owners will take a significant reduction in the value of the land.

This mechanism places difficulties on the Authority, which resulted in a below average allocation to the city for the ADP 2006/08 programme.

To attract future ADP resources, together with any other public funding for affordable housing, a more strategic commitment to making sufficient land available at less than best consideration for affordable housing is required.

This could deliver a higher overall level of grant funding from the Housing Corporation and lever in significant private sector investment to the City to improve the supply of affordable housing and also support the traditional housing market.

A more sophisticated 'evidence based' approach to delivery

A robust and continuous housing market assessment and local housing market tracking, will form the basis for geographical focus on" hot spots" in terms of need for market restructuring or where affordability pressures are greatest.

Full integration of Housing and Planning in Delivering Affordable Housing

The use of the Council's planning powers to require a certain proportion of new developments to be affordable housing, has gradually developed as way of increasing new affordable housing across the City. Close and effective working relationships between the Neighbourhoods and Housing and Development Departments of the Council are key to increasing the supply of new affordable housing. More effective joint working between the two departments will deliver speedier responses to planning applications, streamline the project management of affordable housing schemes and improve targets for affordable housing completions.

Proactive approach to Council owned miscellaneous properties

These are council owned properties which have been leased to Registered Social Landlords and supported housing agents. A number of these properties have been returned to the Council, and do not form part of the ALMO Decency portfolio. A starter home initiative is being piloted on the current void properties, and will be reported to Executive Board.

5.0 How Can Affordable Housing Supply Be Further Increased

5.1 The following represent short-term priorities for action that should be considered to enable progress to be made, to enable significant change in the provision of new affordable housing:

Consideration of a 'Special Purpose Vehicle' (SPV)

Modelling of a range of different SPV needs to be explored. This would involve less than best consideration being agreed for cleared Housing Revenue Account land, previously used as council housing, up to an agreed value sufficient to maximise Housing Corporation Grant Funding and private investment within the city, over initially a five-year period. The Housing Corporation has stated that schemes are only supported where land costs do not exceed £5k per unit.

A comprehensive and planned approach needs to be developed towards land use to lever in investment for affordable housing development. A city-wide SPV Land agency should be established to hold HRA land to an agreed value, created from clearance of council housing or regeneration schemes, to maximise the ADP and private investment in affordable housing for the city.

While the Council would need to satisfy itself that the other alternatives for the sites were less attractive, (i.e. an open market scheme or commercial use) there would be a predisposition to treat the land for affordable housing.

A pilot exercise is being undertaken to map out HRA land designated redevelopment. To date land in the region of 5.56 hectares has been identified. Over the last two years in Leeds 95 dwellings per hectare is the average number of units built on new developments, however a majority of these have been flats. For new family accommodation, per hectare, the new build rate is in the region of 50 units per hectare. The average grant per unit received from the Housing Corporation is £33,066; added to private finance per unit of £106,309, would give levered investment of £139,375 per unit.

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Therefore, should the 5 hectares of land be offered for affordable housing, this would fund approximately 250 new units; the grant funding levered in would be in the region of £8.3 million and the total grant plus private finance levered in would be in the region of £34.8 million, compared to the estimated value of the land of approximately £6.4 million.

Corporate Asset Management Working Group in September 2006 considered a report outlining the proposal to develop a Special Purpose Vehicle. It was agreed in principle that developmental work commence in order to produce a report to Executive Board in early 2007.

Proactive Marketing and Monitoring of low cost home ownership schemes

There needs to be increased involvement in the marketing of low cost home ownership options. This will involve establishing a database of interested persons and closer liaison with RSLs to ascertain when the schemes are ready to sell. Close monitoring will also be required as accurate clear and timely data is required in respect of delivery, type and the location of units of schemes under construction and completed.

Identify the missing 'Rungs' from the Ladder

There is a pressing need to identify which forms of tenure are absent across Leeds to help fill the missing 'rungs' from the 'housing ladder'. This will assist in the provision of appropriate housing in those areas.

Section 106 Agreements

More flexibility and closer monitoring of S106 agreements for affordable housing is required. A policy is being discussed in relation to the collection of commuted sums in city centre areas on developments over 166 dwellings in order to provide affordable family housing elsewhere in the city.

Private Developers/Financial Institutions

It is proposed to establish closer links with private developers who specialise in starter home products and make contact with financial institutions to research financial products to support access to home ownership.

ALMOs and Social Housing Grant

ALMOs are able to take part in the Housing Corporation's National Affordable Housing Programme, either bidding for social grant themselves or in partnership with others. ALMOs that do this are expected to demonstrate their capacity to manage the risks related with acquiring new stock and demonstrate that they can continue to deliver the core business. ALMOs need a three star rating to bid direct and a two star rating to bid in partnership.

Long Term Future of ALMOs

As round 1 and round 2 ALMOs near the completion of their decency programmes, the government together with ALMOs and Local Authorities is looking at the longer term future for ALMOs. One consideration is over the future funding of ALMOs. It is being considered whether or not ALMO funding could be outside the Public Sector

Borrowing Requirement (PSBR). If this was achieved then ALMOs would be able to borrow money on the open market with a view to funding the development of additional affordable housing. The results of the this review will be published in a white paper in early next year. The reorganisation of the ALMOs into larger units places them in a better position to take advantage of these potential freedoms.

6.0 Implications for Council Policy and Governance

- 6.1 The Affordable Housing Delivery Plan is complementary to the Vision for Leeds, the Corporate Plan, Leeds Housing Strategy, the City Wide Regeneration Plan and the Corporate Asset Management Strategy.
- 6.2 The Affordable Housing Task Group is a corporate group and includes representatives from Neighbourhoods and Housing and Development Department, led by the Chief Housing Services Officer. The officers and partnership representatives of the Group are fully supportive of developments and proposals. However it is recognised by the Group that a programme of consultation needs to be carried out to include, key Councillor Members and Partner organisations including the Housing Corporation and Government Office. A detailed programme of consultation is being undertaken by the Group.

7.0 Legal and Resource Implications

7.1 The legal and resource implications of increasing affordable housing by improving current procedures and introducing new vehicles e.g. the SPV will require further analysis and will be reported at a future Executive Board meeting

8.0 Conclusion

- 8.1 The Affordable Housing Delivery Plan outlines how the housing 'ladder' is not working properly across many areas of Leeds and describes the extent of the problems facing those unable to buy or rent on the open market.
- 8.2 The Plan outlines and provides a strategic framework for improved access to existing housing and provision of new affordable housing for those unable to afford to buy or rent on the open market. It sets out the approach that will be taken in Leeds, based upon enabling access to a range of housing by operating 'local housing ladders'.
- 8.3 The Plan also features a range of actions that are needed over the coming years to enable an adequate provision of access to affordable housing to take place. It also identifies the key priorities for the short term.

9.0 Recommendations

That Executive Board:

- Note the contents of the report
- Support the principles of the Plan for Delivering Affordable Housing in Leeds and the key actions required for delivery
- Note that a proposal to develop a 'Special Purpose Vehicle' in respect of cleared Council land is being developed as one of the key mechanisms to deliver affordable housing solutions on the scale required

Executive Summary

This report asks the Area Committee to consider and approve the final draft report of the above study.

Background

- 1. Chapeltown Road Development Plan (CRDP) was commissioned by Leeds City Council in January 2006 with the objective of producing a realistic physical regeneration plan for Chapeltown Road.
- 2. A consortium of consultants led by GVA Grimley was awarded the contract using Leeds City Council's Regeneration Framework contract. The other consultants in the consortium are Bauman Lyons Architect, Andy Edwards Design and JMP Highway Consultants. GVA Grimley has led on the Investment Plan and Bauman Lyons on land use framework.

Final (draft) Report

- 3. The District Partnership considered an Executive Summary of the Study and its key recommendations on 26 July 2006 and made a number of comments and observations. Comments have also been received from members of the Officers' Steering Group, North East (Inner) Area Committee and from Asset Management Group. The comments received from these consultees have been incorporated in the final draft version that is available for Area Committee Members on the confidential link supplied. Members of the public may be excluded from this item as the (draft) plan has commercially sensitive information contained in it and therefore remains confidential and not for public publication at this point.
- 4. Chapeltown Development Plan will contribute to the Leeds Regeneration Plan 2005-2008 by helping to attract investment from both private and public sector for the regeneration of Chapeltown Road. This will in turn help Leeds Initiative to achieve its overall objective of "narrowing the gap between the most disadvantaged people and communities and the rest of the city".
- 5. This (draft) plan has also been informed by the North East Leeds District Partnership Action Plan 2005-2008. It will be used by the Partnership Board in guiding their work in the Chapeltown road area.

Key Recommendations

- 6. Chapeltown Road Development Plan will incorporate a Land Use Framework, Investment Plan and an Executive Summary (which is being currently drafted by the consultants). Together, these documents will set out proposals for the physical regeneration of Chapeltown Road, delivery options and means of attracting both public and private sector support in the sustainable regeneration of the area.
- 7. In addition to that a Public Document on CRDP will also be published which will exclude market sensitive information and figures but will clearly set out the regeneration objectives. This public document will also be used as an awareness and marketing tool for the area, for mobilising the local property owners to act and for attracting external developers.
- 8. The Land Use Framework is a physical land use document, led by design and sets out proposals for key sites on Chapeltown Road. The Investment Plan provides the context for the Land Use Framework and includes recommendations for delivering the sites to foster wider regeneration of the area. The Public Document will explain

the proposals and be produced in a readily accessible form to attract investment and engender enthusiasm for the area.

- 9. Chapeltown Road is the local service centre for the Chapeltown community and offers a localised opportunity to address certain aspects in the creation of a sustainable community. The area has been damaged by negative stereotyping and the presence of a number of undeveloped sites and buildings in a poor state of repair.
- 10. The Development Plan identifies a number of key sites which, if acquired by the Council, would contribute significantly towards regeneration of the area. The Land Use Framework sets out mixed use proposals for these sites that would bring existing buildings back into use wherever possible and provide the opportunity for modern, striking and high quality new build on cleared sites.
- 11. The following key recommendations are proposed:
 - The Chapeltown Conservation Area is extended to include the entire length of Chapeltown Road. This will secure the long term viability of a number of buildings of historical merit as well as bringing about environmental improvements in the locality.
 - Recently secured funding from Townscape Heritage Initiative (THI) through the Heritage Lottery Fund is also closely aligned with regeneration of Chapeltown Road as recommended in this plan.
 - Development briefs should be prepared and adopted by the Council for each of the key sites identified in the Land Use Framework.
 - A marketing campaign is run to improve the image of the area. A strong brand will help to re-launch Chapeltown as it enters a new and positive phase of regeneration.
 - Advantage is taken of the LCC highways improvements to secure tailor made designs for bus shelters to create a sense of place and celebrate the diversity of the area.
 - Chapeltown Road is included into the Leeds Renaissance Plan to secure support and connections to wider city strategies.
 - A liveability audit will measure perceived and actual change in the local environment for the community and this is vital to the holistic regeneration of Chapeltown.
 - A full review of the present provision of community centre is undertaken with a view to encouraging joint working, mergers and sharing of space.
 - The sustainable regeneration of Chapeltown Road is dependent on a private sector led approach to delivery.

Next Steps

12. The District Partnership Executive Board have considered the final draft report of the Chapeltown Road Development Plan and agreed its recommendations. In addition to Page 23

these, they have requested that consideration is given to the development of a mechanism for the delivery of these proposals. It is expected that the report will be submitted to the Council's Executive Board in March 2007.

- 13. This final draft report with an Executive Summary (to be drafted by the consultant) will also be presented for support/ adoption to:
 - Asset Management Group
 - Corporate Management Team
 - Executive Board

The Executive Summary will be forward to the Area Committee when it is available.

- 14. Once adopted by the Executive Board, this Plan will be used:
 - as a tool for future bids for external funding.
 - to guide and inform a local Area Action Plan to be produced by the Development Department.
 - to help the Council in resolving its asset management issues and develop a Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) strategy for the area.
 - as a policy/strategy document by North East Leeds District Partnership.

Recommendations

15. Members are requested to consider and approve the contents of the final (draft) report produced by the consultants as part of the Chapeltown Road Development Plan.

Executive Summary

This report contains information on the Well-Being Fund grant allocations made during 2006/07. It also requests the Area Committee review their decision to grant funding to Radio Asian Fever in light of information received since the December meeting.

Purpose Of This Report

1. The purpose of this report is to update the Area Committee on the current position with the Well-Being Fund. It also requests that the Committee review the decision taken at the last meeting to grant £5,000 towards the Radio Asian Fever project.

Background Information

- 2. The North East (Inner) Area Committee received an allocation of £166,774 Well-Being revenue funding for the 2006/07 financial year.
- 3. In addition, the Committee has a three year capital allocation of £317,925. Members are requested to note that 2006/07 is the final year for spending the remainder of this allocation.
- 4. The current position is that both revenue and capital budgets have been fully committed for 2006/07. Some projects may not spend their full allocation in 2006/07 and a detailed report covering the Well-Being Fund final position will be presented to the final Area Committee meeting of 2006/07 in March. This report will also cover commissioning proposals for 2007/08. Appendix 1 shows large grant approvals to date and Appendix 2 the small grant approvals to date.

Projects for discussion

Revenue – Large Grants

INE.06.30.LG - Radio Asian Fever - £5,000

- 5. The Area Committee will recall at the last meeting discussing and agreeing to allocate a £5,000 contribution to Radio Asian Fever. Since that meeting new information came to light and Members have asked for the position to be reviewed at this Area Committee meeting.
- 6. The new information relates to their funding circumstances and the decisions of other Area Committees. The position with each of the two other Area Committees is as follows:
- 7. Inner East Members resolved that the in principal approval of Gipton and Harehills Well-Being capital funds be withdrawn. In coming to this decision, concerns were expressed about the revenue implications for the council in future years and the fact that not all Area Committees had provided funding and other Committees were not contributing an equal amount.
- 8. Inner North West Members resolved that as the organisation had not achieved the required funding from other Area Committees, its allocation would be withdrawn.
- 9. The City Council is the accountable body for the Safer and Stronger Communities Fund (SSCF). Working groups for the District Partnerships in North East and East Page 26

Leeds each allocated £10,000 towards Radio Asian Fever. Given the position of the various Area Committees and concerns this leads to in relation to their funding profile for 2007 and the longer term viability of the business plan without Leeds City Council funding, the Council is not in a position to release any SSCF match funding contributions to Radio Asian Fever.

- 10. Radio Asian Fever's most recent business plan indicates the match funding required for their ERDF grant has been confirmed, and in addition that they anticipate significant resources from trading. The Council hopes this means Radio Asian Fever will be in a position to re-profile their funding and commence the project whilst looking at alternative funding sources, or be in a position to scale down their project in 2007 to maximise the ERDF against the match confirmed so far.
- 11. In light of the decisions taken by the other Area Committees, Members are requested to consider if they wish to confirm the decision taken at the December meeting or withdraw the offer of £5,000 grant support to Radio Asian Fever.

Recommendations

12. The Area Committee is requested to consider if they wish to confirm the offer of £5,000 Well-Being Funds towards the Radio Asian Fever project or withdraw the offer in light of the information supplied in this report.

Executive Summary

The Grants & Funding Advice Officer covering the Chapel Allerton, Moortown and Roundhay Wards, has had some success generating a client list and providing funding advice as well as administering the Inner NE K-Fund. By far the greatest call on the Officer time is spent assisting with development planning with groups needing to change the way they operate in order to attract local funding through the commissioning of services as well as external funding from trusts and charities.

The Officer has so far assisted in levering £48,500 of funding for local groups and £6,000 of donations, in addition to distributing £37,850 of K-Funds to 11 groups. In the current period, of 50 active clients generating 109 separate meetings, 15 originate from the Chapel Allerton ward, 2 from Moortown, 4 from Roundhay and 31 straddle two or more wards or have a citywide brief. Plans are in place to generate additional clients in the Moortown and Roundhay wards over the next period.

Purpose of Report

1. This report provides members with an update on the progress of the work of the Grants & Funding Advice Officer in the Chapel Allerton, Moortown and Roundhay wards, and the distribution of 3rd round K-Funding in the inner Chapel Allerton ward

Background Information

- 2. The Area Committee has allocated funding for a three-day a week post to provide grants and funding advice to voluntary organisations in the Chapel Allerton, Moortown and Roundhay wards.
- 3. The Area Committee with ERDF contributions, has also allocated grant funding of £60,000 during the 2006/7 period to help 'connect communities to the economy' benefiting organisations in the inner Chapel Allerton ward area.
- 4. This report provides Members with details of groups receiving grant and funding advice and groups receiving K-Funding in its 3rd round.

Grants & Funding Advice

- 5. The Grants & Funding Advice Officer has been in post since 10th February 2006 employed on an 18 month contract for 3-days a week and covering the Chapel Allerton, Moortown and Roundhay wards.
- 6. The North East Area Committee funded post is targeted at voluntary sector organisations seeking funding, business sustainability and social enterprise advice, and advice on accessing the local authority's new funding arrangements during the transitional period 2005/7.
- 7. Of 133 eligible enquiries from the 3 wards, excluding non-eligible enquiries or enquiries that required little follow-up, groups claiming beneficiary areas of 2 or more wards have generated the greatest number of enquiries and call on Officer time. Currently, the Officer's active caseload of 50 breaks down by beneficiary wards as follows:

- 8. In order to generate more clients in the Moortown and Roundhay wards, the Officer wrote to listed organisations and groups in these areas in December 2006, asking about their fundraising needs for the 2007/8 period (see Appendix 2 Letter Copy). To date the Officer has received no replies.
- 9. Support provided to clients by the Officer is broken down into the following elements:

- 10. Additionally, Since October the Officer has been providing all registered client groups with a monthly Funding Digest generated from information provided by the *Funding Insight Newsletter* produced by www.*grantsonline.org.uk*. It is hope to form these groups into a network around mutual funding issues, synergies and partnerships.
- 11. The Officer has also facilitated the development of a network of newsprint media groups: 4 Chapeltown based newspaper / magazine groups have formed an alliance to generate synergies around journalism, graphics and typesetting, photography, printing, advertising, distribution and training in newsprint media. The alliance hopes to register as a social enterprise separate from the ownership of individual papers and magazines, and to increase coverage to all NE wards.
- 12. The Officer has completed a survey of organisations and groups that have been in contact with the service. Of 56 survey forms sent out, 20 completed forms were returned. Analysis of returns can be found at Appendix 3 Grants & Funding Advice Client Survey Returns
- 13. Much of the Officer's time is taken up assisting organisations to business plan and produce development statements to aid fundraising. This is often a long drawn out process requiring organisational management committee approvals at the various planning stages.
- 14. The Officer has signposted a number of organisations to specialist advisors, in particular to Wajid Hussain and Tracy Nicholl at the Sustainable Futures unit for social enterprise advice, and to Martin Dawson at Resourcing the Community(RtC) for specialist business planning and fundraising assistance.

The K-Fund

- 15. The 4th and final K-Fund round deadline is 4pm on 10th March 2007, with the K-Fund Panel sitting in the last week in March.
- 16. Organisations applying for K-Funding must meet one or more criteria around creating a new group, enabling sustainability, enabling social enterprise, getting people into work, benefiting the local area and/or improving the quality of life for local residents.
- 17. Over the 3 K-Fund rounds since April 2006, the Panel has awarded 11 groups and organisations a total of £37,850.
- 18. Groups granted K-funding can be identified under the column 'Current Outcome(s)' in Appendix 1 Grants & Funding Advice Client Digest, attached.

Gantsonline is easy to use with a little practice. Many libraries and organisations such as Leeds VOICE, Voluntary Action –Leeds, RtC and Leeds North East Homes office have online fundraising tools installed on their PCs, in particular the popular FunderFinder programme which can be accessed by appointment by groups and individuals from the north east community. Support staff are also available at these venues to assist you with fundraising online.

Since June this year, I have also been emailing out a funding-digest gathered from the internet and other sources. I enclose a copy here for your perusal.

Once again, do let me hear from you if you have an urgent need.

Executive Summary

This report provides Members with a summary of recent actions and achievements of the North East District Partnership.

Background Information

 This report has been prepared at the request of the Area Committee Chairs and Executive Board of the North East District Partnership. It provides a summary of key issues and the work programme of the North East District Partnership and decisions taken by the Executive Board.

Significant action and achievements since the last Area Committee meeting

- 2. At its meeting on 8th December, the current Chair of the North East District Partnership, the Chief Executive of Leeds North East Homes, advised that due to the re-organisation of the ALMO she was unable to continue in her role as Chair. Councillor Matthew Lobley was nominated as the new Chair and accepted this position.
- 3. A review of the North East District Partnership action plan is currently being undertaken. In response to the review, an updated version of the action plan will be produced to ensure that the actions undertaken in 2007 onwards continue to be the right set of actions to meet the needs of the district. Priorities identified in the revised plan centre around the following four thematic blocks of the Local Area Agreement(LAA).
 - children and young people
 - healthier communities and older people
 - safer and stronger communities
 - economic development and enterprise
- 4. The LAA has a number of cross cutting principles and it is proposed that the action plan has an additional block to reflect this. Priorities have been identified in the plan under the heading of "Making things happen".
- 5. The LAA provides the opportunity to secure improved relationships between local partners in a way that supports the delivery of the Vision for Leeds and to make real progress against key priorities. It is proposed that the revised district plan will provide;
 - a strategic framework for satellite partnerships to develop their own plans and actions;
 - a set of actions for the North East District Partnership Executive Board;
 - a set of operating principles for all partners who work under the auspices of the North East District Partnership;
 - opportunities for greater effectiveness and efficiency through shared resources and joint business planning and commissioning
- 6. The revision of the plan has been undertaken in consultation with the North East Area Committees and a meeting took place on 22nd January to allow Members to consider the priorities and actions identified in the plan. Members' comments from this meeting will be considered and incorporated in to a final draft to be submitted to the District Partnership Executive Board on 23rd February. The review process is expected to conclude in February 2007 with Executive Board and Narrowing the Gap Board approval. The Executive Board approved draft will form the basis of the Fourth District Partnership conference to be held in Spring 2007.

7. At its meeting on 8th December 2006, the North East District Partnership Executive Board confirmed their commitment to tackling fuel poverty further to the recommendations of the Chair of the Narrowing the Gap Executive. Fuel poverty and the implementation of the city-wide Fuel Poverty Strategy in the North East have been prioritised as a key issue in the revised District Plan.

Executive Summary

This report provides Members with a summary of recent actions and achievements of the Area Committee and Area Management Team.

Purpose of this report

- 1. This report enables the Area Committee to track progress of the actions identified in the Area Delivery Plan 2006/07, and provides details of work achievements of the Area Management Team since the last Area Committee meeting.
- 2. Appendix 1 refers to progress on specific issues raised by Members at Area Committee meetings.
- 3. Appendix 2 tracks progress against the Area Delivery Plan 2006/07.

Significant action and achievements since the last Area Committee meeting

- 4. The Volunteer Thank You Event took place on Monday 4th December in the Lord Mayor's Banqueting Hall and was a great success with over 100 representatives from voluntary and community groups attending alongside Members, officers and the Lord Mayor of Leeds. Entertainment was provided by pupils from Roundhay High School working with East Leeds Community Radio, the New World Steel Orchestra and a dance group who won the Chapeltown talent competition which was funded by the IMPaCT partnership in summer 2005. The event was widely advertised including an article in the Yorkshire Evening Post.
- 5. Work on a proposal to retain Miles Hill Primary School site for community benefit has been progressing since the Council's Executive Board agreed to the proposed closure of Miles Hill and Potternewton Primary School and the establishment of a one and a half form of entry primary school on the Potternewton site. It should be noted that the final decision has been referred to the School Organisation Committee meeting in January. A scoping exercise is underway to establish if this is a realistic proposal and how the site could be linked with the Meanwood Extended Services initiative. A meeting of potential stakeholders will take place in January.
- 6. The Oakwood Town and District Centre proposal may be considered for funding this financial year, following the news that Tesco are planning a major redevelopment of their Roundhay Road site at the southern end of the Oakwood district centre. This offers opportunities to link both developments together and maximise funding opportunities including S106.
- 7. The Council's Executive Board agreed at its meeting on 24th January, the recommendations of the North East Inner Area Committee that the review of community facilities in Chapeltown demonstrates there is no case for the Council to consider the release of land as requested by the Chapeltown Community Centre Action Group (CCCAG) for the purposes of a new community centre. They also supported the way forward, as outlined in the report, to improve community provision through some form of consolidation of existing provision. The Area Management Team facilitated a meeting of providers of community facilities in Chapeltown on 15th January. The aim of the meeting, attended by eight providers of the fifteen facilities identified in the review, was to discuss the findings of the review that many of the facilities are underused and poorly coordinated. There was general consensus that existing provision will benefit from improved coordination, marketing, alternative managements arrangements and some form of consolidation. Those who attended the meeting expressed their willingness to engage with the Area Management Team and the other providers in finding a way that supports and

enhances the community facilities provision for Chapeltown. It was agreed to hold a further meeting in February. At the meeting of the North East (Inner Area Committee) on 5th December, during the Public Open Forum, representatives of CCCAG outlined their proposals to establish the need for a community centre in Chapeltown. They requested that the Area Committee give their support to the group and work with them to identify land for the group to buy at market value to build a new community centre. Given the findings of the review supported by the Council's Executive Board, members of the North East Inner Area Committee are requested to support the recommendation that there is no case for land to be earmarked for the purposes of a new build community centre.

8. Following agreement by the Area Committee to the priorities for next year's Area Delivery Plan, work is progressing with officers from across the Council to develop actions and initiatives to meet them. These will be presented for Member comment through the ward Member meetings in February before coming to the Area Committee for final agreement at the March meeting.

Executive Summary

This report informs Members of the issues raised at the Area Committee Working Groups held since the last meeting of the Area Committee.

Purpose of this report

- 1. This report provides an update to the Committee on the progress of the Working Groups.
- 2. The Area Committee established the Working Groups at their meeting on 5th April 2005. The groups have no decision making powers, tabling recommendations for consideration by the Area Committee.
- 3. The primary roles of the Working Groups are to drive the achievement of actions in the Area Delivery Plan, and scrutinise service areas in order to meet local need.

Feedback from the Working Groups

Community Safety

4. The Area Committee will recall that a decision was taken not to continue with these meetings, as the working group were happy with officers progress in spending the Well-Being Funds and do not wish to scrutinise aspects of community safety at the moment. Updates on progress are dealt with through the Action and Achievements report.

Youth Issues – 8th January 2007

- 5. The working group heard feedback from the meeting held with John Paxton in December which clarified the delegated function position and sought positive ways to enable Members to get involved with activities. Members were offered the opportunity to shadow Youth Officers for a day. A discussion took place around how priorities were developed based on intelligence. Members are keen to see young people targeted through schools benefit from Well-Being Funded Youth Service projects.
- 6. The latest version of the YAG MAG, produced by the Youth Development Worker was circulated for comments. When finished this will provide details of youth provision across the inner area covering Youth Service, voluntary, community and private sector provision. It was reported that Ian Jones, the Youth Development Worker has taken up a two month secondment in west Leeds and will resume the Youth Development role in March 2007. The latest progress report from Ian Jones is attached as appendix 1.

Well-Being Fund

7. As the Well-Being Fund has been fully allocated for 2006/07 no meeting was held. There will be a working group meeting in advance of the March Area Committee to consider any underspends from 2006/07 and commissioning proposals for 2007/08 Well-Being Fund allocations.

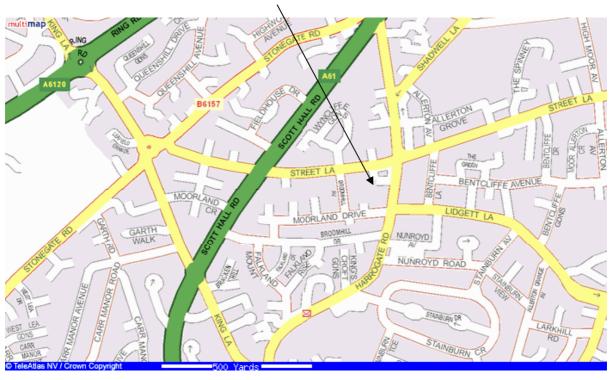
