1 Chairs Opening Remarks

The Chair welcomed the new members of the Committee – Councillor N Manaka from the Burmantofts & Richmond Hill ward and Councillor A Ali from the Gipton & Harehills ward who were elected to Council at the May 2023 local elections.

2 Appeals Against Refusal of Inspection of Documents

There were no appeals against refusal of inspection of documents.

3 Exempt Information - Possible Exclusion of the Press and Public

There were no exempt items.

4 Late Items

There were no late items.

5 Declaration of Interests

There were no declarations of interest made at the meeting.

6 Apologies for Absence

Apologies were received from Councillor J Tudor.

7 Open Forum

The Committee received the following Open Forum submissions;

- One Harehills resident has faced issues with anti-social behaviour from neighbours, and was put in touch with relevant Leeds City Council services.
- One resident was paying a bedroom tax on a three bedroom property where he only needs two bedrooms. The resident was provided with information on how to arrange a housing exchange.
- The same resident has had an issue with people taking away rubbish from bins in the street. This was acknowledged as being a part of a wider financial scam. The resident was encouraged to report all such instances to the police so that they may use the information to build up a map of hotspots.

8 Minutes of the Previous Meeting

9 Matters Arising

Minute 52 – Councillor D Jenkins had received a response from Transport Development Services Manager regarding the use of road blockading.

Minute 53 – Councillor K Dye had requested Climate teams attend future youth summits which will be the approach going forward.

Minute 53 – Councillor D Jenkins had raised the issue of high turnover of senior police leadership in the Inner East area with the West Yorkshire Mayor.

Minute 53 – Councillor D Jenkins enquired about whether the Marmot City agenda will be incorporated into the Localities report to the Executive Board. The Senior Localities Officer confirmed that the Marmot City agenda underpins the Localities work but it has not been specifically mentioned.

The Committee discussed accessible venues for the December meeting, due to weather and light conditions, with Civic Hall being ruled out as an option in order to keep the meetings within the Inner East Community wards.

10 Developing a vision for Community Parks

The Committee received the report of the Chief Officer, Climate, Energy and Green Spaces which provided information on the new approach to community park development in Leeds. The report is a part of a community consultation designed to capture local residents opinions about their parks ahead of future development of the parks.

The Parks Technical Support Officer, Christopher Megginson, attended the meeting and provided the Committee with a presentation which provided details of the Community Park Vision, and the public consultation exercise within the Inner East area. The aim of the plans for each park is for them all to achieve the Leeds Quality Park (LQP) accreditation, which would entail delivering priorities set out in the accreditation such as 'Quality parks', 'Access for All' and 'Health and Wellbeing'. The Vision Plans will include features such as circular paths and improved facilities to meet these objectives

The Parks Technical Support Officer provided the Committee with an oversight of the Leeds City Council Community Parks programme of work. 65 parks across Leeds were identified as Community Parks, which serve primarily serve local residents. City Parks were identified as having amenities which attract people from across the city and beyond.

The Inner East area has six parks identified as Community Parks. The consultation process for East End Park (Burmantofts & Richmond Hill) has begun, with Harehills Park (Gipton & Harehills) due to start. Banstead Park (Gipton & Harehills) has been provisionally scheduled to begin in the next nine months.

The consultation process will contribute to the development of a tailored Vision Plan for each park. The consultation process for East End Park runs until 12th September 2023, and has so far included 250 local flyers and engagement with schools and local organisations. There will be Officer presence in the park to capture local residents views. Whilst there is an online survey the focus has been on enabling those who do not use online services to be able to access the consultation.

The order in which to carry out these consultation exercises was determined by a mixture of factors including existing public access to green space, deprivation, current condition of the parks and likelihood of future funding being obtained. One potential source of funding would be the use of the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL), which is raised through local developments, and so areas where future developments are planned have been prioritised.

After the presentation the Committee discussed the following matters;

- As under 12's cannot participate in consultations, engaging with parents and schools was highlighted as an appropriate way of capturing children's views and needs.
- Killingbeck & Seacroft has had Seacroft Gardens identified as a potential site to be consulted on, but the focus is on six month increments.
- Members would share details of local groups that would be interested in supporting this work with the Parks Technical Support Officer.
- The Committee noted that whilst Active Leeds and Parks are in separate directorates they work closely together, and that this work will support the Marmot City agenda to reduce health inequalities in the city.
- Discussion was had on improving language access to the consultation, such as the use of QR codes.

b) To note that, in line with the strategy, community parks public consultation activities are being undertaken with community groups, members of the public and schools being contacted.

c) To note Members' intention to share their knowledge of local groups and networks with the Parks Technical Support Officer.

12 YAF Consultation

The Head of Locality Partnerships submitted a report which updated the Committee on the Community Committee Youth Summit, the Youth Activity Fund Consultation and requested the Committee take into consideration the youth consultation when determining the Youth Activity Fund for the 2023/24 financial year.

Councillor K Dye provided further detail on the Youth Summit and ways in which it could be further developed in the future. Council Officers working within Climate, Energy and Green Spaces had attended the event which was received well and has been suggested to other Community Committee Youth Summits.

The Committee and Officers considered that, resources permitting, separate group work with younger children and young people would allow the young people to have more engaging conversations on topics such as climate change.

Councillor D Jenkins informed the Committee of his concern regarding children and vaping, and that the Children and Families Scrutiny Board has been requested to provide further analysis on this issue.

The report of the Head of Locality Partnerships updated Members with the work on the Communities Team had been engaged in based on the priorities of the Community Committee.

Policing

There was an update on policing in the Inner East area by Jonathan Attree, recently appointed as Sergeant for Burmantofts & Richmond Hill.

During discussions the following issues were raised -

Bike thefts - the Committee was informed of around 70 arrests arising from police action. The Police have focused their efforts on identifying the causes of the thefts, which was identified as being for the dismantling and sale of parts. Additionally there has been a focus on identifying the lock ups which are used as part of the thefts.

E-Bikes - The Committee sought clarity on the legality of e-Bikes and were informed that whilst the pedal assisted models are legal, they are often modified which makes their use illegal. It is suspected that stolen e-Bikes are modified in this way.

Drones – Discussion focussed on the challenges involved with using drones as part of operations, as a police officer must obtain 20,000 hours of aviation experience in order to be able to use them there is a significant resource issue. Whilst West Yorkshire Police have drones, they are not in constant usage as a result.

Routes into crime were discussed- Comments on urban street gangs targeting pupils who were excluded from school for offences such as drugs and knives were noted. The aspirational influence of gang members has encouraged young people who are educationally excluded to partake in gang activity. Plain clothes officers have been on patrol in areas known to have high levels of organised crime activity, such as Lincoln Green.

Additionally, the Committee requested that the Police Officer stay in post longer than a year, commenting that the high turnover of senior officers in the area has had an impact on long term partnership working

Further to minute 7 above, Sergeant Attree engaged with the local resident who had raised issues of anti-social behaviour in their neighbourhood, Sgt Attree also noted the reports of rubbish stealing.

Inner East Community Committee - Finance Report

Purpose of report

1. This report provides the Community Committee with an update on the budget position for the Wellbeing Fund, Youth Activity Fund, Capital Budget, as well as the Community Infrastructure Levy Budget for 2023/2024.

Main issues

- 2. Each Community Committee has been allocated a Wellbeing budget (revenue and capital) and Youth Activities Fund which it is responsible for administering. The aim of these budgets is to support the social, economic and environmental wellbeing of the area and provide a range of activities for children and young people, by using the funding to support projects that contribute towards the delivery of local priorities.
- 3. A group applying to the Wellbeing Fund must fulfil various eligibility criteria, including evidencing appropriate management arrangements and financial controls are in place; have relevant policies to comply with legislation and best practice e.g. safeguarding and equal opportunities and be unable to cover the costs of the project from other funds.
- 4. Wellbeing funding cannot be paid retrospectively. An application form must be submitted and approved by the Community Committee before activities or items being purchased through wellbeing funding are completed or purchased.
- 5. The amount of wellbeing funding provided to each committee is calculated using a formula agreed by Council, taking into consideration both population and deprivation of an area.

- 6. Capital (CRIS) injections are provided as a result of council assets being sold. 5% of the sale price (up to a maximum of £100k) of a council asset is pooled city-wide and redistributed to the Community Committee areas on the basis of deprivation. The Community Committee will receive a new capital injection every 6 months.
- 7. Each Community Committee has also been allocated a Community Infrastructure Levy budget. For each CIL contribution, Leeds City Council retains up to 70-80% centrally, 5% is needed for administration and 15-25% goes to be spent locally. The money will be vested with the local Town or Parish Council if applicable, or with the local Community Committee and spend decided upon by that body. This local money is known as the 'Neighbourhood Fund' and should be spent on similar projects to the Wellbeing Fund (capital).
- 8. The Inner East Community Committee area has no Parish or Town Councils. This means that the money for the Inner East will be administered by the Inner East Community Committee. It was agreed at Inner East Community Committee on the 25th September 2019 that CIL monies for Burmantofts & Richmond Hill, Gipton & Harehills and Killingbeck & Seacroft would be split equally three-ways.
- 9. The Communities Team work with members of the Community Committee to develop a plan to spend CIL funding on local infrastructure projects. This is on a case-by-case basis.
- 10. Projects eligible for funding by the Community Committee could be community events; environmental improvements; crime prevention initiatives, or opportunities for sport and healthy activities for all ages. In line with the Equality Act 2010, projects funded at public expense should provide services to citizens irrespective of their religion, gender reassignment, marital status, race, ethnic origin, age, sexual orientation or disability; the fund cannot be used to support an organisation's regular business running costs; it cannot fund projects promoting political or religious viewpoints to the exclusion of others; projects must represent good value for money and follow Leeds City Council Financial Regulations and the Council's Spending Money Wisely policy; applications should provide, where possible, three quotes for any works planned and demonstrate how the cost of the project is relative to the scale of beneficiaries; the fund cannot support projects which directly result in the business interests of any members of the organisation making a profit.
- 11. Any request for funding would involve discussions with appropriate ward members. Where projects do not have support from the Community Committee and are not approved, applicants are offered further discussions and feedback if this is requested.
- 12. In order to provide further assurance and transparency of all decisions made by the Community Committee, any projects that are not approved will be reported to a subsequent Community Committee meeting.
- 13. Sometimes urgent decisions may need to be made in between formal Community Committee meetings regarding the administration of wellbeing and youth activity budgets and also regarding the use of the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Neighbourhood Fund which has been allocated to the Community Committee. Alongside the Committee, designated officers have delegated authority from the Director of Communities and Environment to take such decisions.

- 14. The Community Committee has previously approved the following 'minimum conditions' in order to reassure Members that all delegated decisions would be taken within an appropriate governance framework, with appropriate Member consultation and only when the following 'minimum conditions' have been satisfied:
 - a) consultation must be undertaken with all committee/relevant ward members prior to a delegated decision being taken.
 - b) a delegated decision must have support from a majority of the Community Committee elected members represented on the committee (or in the case of funds delegated by a Community Committee to individual wards, a majority of the ward councillors), and
 - c) details of any decisions taken under such delegated authority will be reported to the next available Community Committee meeting for members' information.
- 15. For the committee's awareness, urgent delegated decisions on wellbeing funding also covers small grant decisions. In agreement with the Executive Board Member for Communities, Community Committee Chairs & also in accordance with the communication that was sent out to all committees/Elected Members in March 2023, the approval threshold for small grants has now increased from the 1st April 2023; up to £1000 per ward. This approach will ensure consistency in terms of administering small grants, in accordance with the committees' minimum conditions.
- 16. Members are reminded that the necessary scrutiny of applications to satisfy our own processes, financial regulations and audit requires the deadline for receipt of completed applications to be at least five weeks prior to any Community Committee. Some applications will be approved via Delegated Decision Notice (DDN) following consultation with Members outside of the Community Committee meeting cycle.

Wellbeing Budget Position 2023/2024

- 17. The total revenue budget approved by Executive Board for 2023/2024 was £166,630.00.
- 18. Table 1 shows a carry forward figure of £272,054.81 which includes underspends from projects completed in 2022/2023. £31,689.03 represents wellbeing which is unallocated from 2022/23 and will be added to the income from 2023/2024. The total revenue funding available to the Community Committee for 2023/2024 is therefore £198,319.03.
- 19. It is possible that some of the projects may not use their allocated spend. This could be for several reasons, including the project no longer going ahead, the project not taking place within the dates specified in the funding agreement, or failure to submit monitoring reports. Due to this the final revenue balance may be greater than the amount specified in Table 1.
- 20. The Community Committee is asked to note that there is currently a remaining balance of **£96,926.65.** This figure includes any underspend from projects. A full breakdown of the projects is listed in **Table 1** and is available on request.

Connecting Crossgates Community Fridge

Connecting Crossgates ran 26 sessions between 1st January and 31st March 2023 at St James Parish Church Hall, Sandbed Lane, LS15 8JH. Each member chose 12 items for £3.50. In total there were 259 visits from members which fed 740 people plus additional one-off hampers to 30 families and 13 emergency parcels. Unlike a food bank, the community fridge is more like a pantry which is open to all, and no referral is needed. This seeks to avoid stigma and helps build community cohesion. Choice and payment ensure dignity is a key feature. The project is not just about cheap affordable food but also about encouraging our community to share food and avoid waste.

A team of 9 volunteers delivered the project under the supervision of the Connecting Crossgates Food Operations Manager who has day to day oversight of the Community Fridge Project. The project was delivered in partnership with St James Manston which provided the Hall Hire as an in-kind donation.



Nowell Mount Community Centre – Activating the Space

Leeds Community Spaces have met the following outputs at Nowell Mount:

- A timetable that reflects the needs of the community has been developed and is reviewed all of the time to make sure the activities are delivering the outputs that are wanted and needed for the community. A summer of activities has happened.
- Income is being generated from room bookings and events.
- A way of working to enable private bookings to happen has been developed.
- A permanent tenant who is able to work from the centre and also support the local community has been secured for the centre.
- Agreement with the Children Centre about how we can use the space in this part of the centre to maximise the space available for activities has been put into place.
- Work has happened with the Nowell Mount community group and another local community group MASC and support has been given to them. An AGM has been held and the committee has been reformed for Nowell Mount Community group. The groups are receiving support and guidance in how to work effectively. The NMCG also organised an extremely well run and attended Coronation celebration for the whole community.
- Support for sessions that happen at the centre and promotion of them is in place.
- LCS has participated in the steering groups for the building.
- LCS have brought Nowell into the mix and worked with other organisations and connected up organisations.
- LCS have worked and produced a business plan for the way the centre can be run and developed in the future.
- Ensured in the current climate that there is free food offered at the centre and free warm items being put in the centre for people to help themselves to.

In comparison to the previous year reviewed, serious and acquisitive crime demands, have declined across the Inner East localities, with thirty fewer recorded crime occurrences across the crime categories highlighted above.

Burglary-residential occurrences presented with the largest demand reduction, in comparison to the same period in 2022 with a 33% reduction in recorded offences.

Robbery offences presented with the largest increase in demand, in comparison to same period in 2022, with 15 additional recorded occurrences, across the Inner East wards. A review of the demands has been conducted, in order to facilitate a proactive response inclusive of proactive patrols at peak demand times, disruption visits and new crime prevention materials are being produced to raise awareness.

Anti-social behaviour (ASB) demands continue to decline, with a 51% demand reduction across the Inner East ward areas, in comparison to the same period reviewed last year.

Nuisance motorcycle/quad demands, presented with the largest demand reduction with an 83% reduction in demands, in comparison to the same period in 2022.

Community and Policing Priorities are reviewed frequently and will be amended in line with community concerns, raised issues at Police and Community Together (PACT) meetings, identified risks and information obtained from local policing analysis.

We will frequently share news updates on Social Media channels, Community Alert and via the West Yorkshire Police Website.

Operation Dieselcrest and Operation Republic – Local Priority Update: Ward Area: All ward areas across the Inner and Outer East

To address anti-social motorcycles, vehicular nuisance, and associated criminality across the Leeds East ward areas.

As part of Operation Dieselcrest and Operation Republic we will proactively gather intelligence and identify those involved in the anti-social use of motorcycles, vehicles, and associated criminality. We will monitor and respond to incident demands, collate evidence, conduct disruption visits on known offenders, hold targeted days of action and arrest suspects identified.

In addition, we will collaboratively work alongside partner agencies to utilise all enforcement methods available, against those repeatedly involved in such behaviour.

You said:

You want to see positive action taken against offenders, involved in the illegal use of motorcycles, vehicles, and associated crimes.

We have:

- Executed several misuse of drugs warrants which resulted in drugs, motorcycles, quad bikes being seized, and offenders arrested
- Seized over 100 motorcycles, quad bikes, electric scooters, and cars inclusive of stolen vehicles.
- Arrested several individuals for road related offences, theft, weapons, and drugs.
- Issued Traffic Offence reports for speeding and other motoring offences.
- Issued multiple Section 59 Warnings, particularly across areas identified for car meets and vehicular nuisance.
- Conducted several targeted days of action.

- Identified several individuals and have issued 14 Community Protection Notice Warnings (CPNW)
- Served one Community Protection Notice, following a breach of CPNW issued.
- Following the ongoing legal work conducted by Leeds City Council, Operation Leodis and West Yorkshire Police, one individual has been issued with a five-year Criminal Behaviour Order and two individuals have been issued with a two-year Anti-Social Behaviour Injunction Order.
- Worked alongside Leeds City Council who have secured a Leeds City wide Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO), to tackle vehicle related anti-social behaviour. Further information is available at: Anti-social Behaviour Awareness Week sees city-wide Public Space Protection Order comes into force (leeds.gov.uk)
- Implemented Operation Republic working alongside North Yorkshire Police on the force borders to tackle illegal, anti-social and dangerous car meets. The full news release can be accessed at: Police forces join together to tackle illegal car meets | North Yorkshire Police
- Following the implementation of Operation Republic over 150 motorists received a notice of impending community protection warning letters. Should the motorists continue to take part in the dangerous activity, they will be issued with a formal community protection warning, which could escalate to a Community Protection Notice. Arrest and prosecution could follow if the notices served are not adhered to.
- Held a Police and Community Together meeting at Squires Cafe, for motorcycle owners and riders to allow open discussions of concerns and actions being taken to address Theft of motorcycles, whilst providing crime prevention information and advice.

We continue to conduct targeted enforcement patrols, we are working alongside partner agencies and Operation Leodis, to take further enforcement actions.

Key Issues

Citywide Nuisance Vehicle PSPO is now live and enforceable, and it is hoped that this will help to address the ongoing vehicle related issues around Harehills, Cross Green, Seacroft and on York Road. 20 Fixed Penalty Notices have already been issued to address this behaviour at other locations in the city. Signage has been erected at key "hotspots" and shortly to be extended to the main arterial routes into the city.

Brooklands Close, Seacroft – A successful application for a Premises Closure Order was made in respect of a property in the street linked to cannabis production and the subsequent disorder and intimidation of residents that followed the police warrant. A further injunction was made to keep certain key individuals out of the street which was again successful. Subsequently the occupants have been served with a Notice of Absolute Grounds for Possession and a court hearing will be set in due course. Attention is now turning to other problematic addresses in the street as we and Team Leodis press ahead with our plan to restore order to the street so that those law-abiding citizens can once more experience the quiet enjoyment of their homes.

Further premise closure orders have been issued at several addresses in the Lincoln Green area in our efforts to combat the scourge of the "cuckooing" of vulnerable residents by those involved in the world of drug supply and misuse.

LASBT Continues to work alongside West Yorkshire Police on the Clear, Hold Build strategy for Harehills and will be participating in the Harehills CommUNITY process moving forward.

5. Health & Wellbeing – Champion Councillor David Jenkins

Public Health Update

Harehills, Burmantofts and Richmond Hill and Gipton Health Needs Assessments

Over the next 18 months the Public Health Localities team will be conducting three Health Needs and Assets Assessments across the Inner East; one in Harehills, one in Gipton and one for Burmantofts and Richmond Hill.

A Health Needs and Assets assessment is a systematic process of;

- identifying the health needs and resources of a specific population and;
- what changes are required to meet health needs, building on the existing assets in the community wherever possible

They provide an opportunity to bring evidence and understanding "into one place" to:

- Inform decision making and local practice
- Influence service planning and commissioning
- Strengthen partnership working around key themes
- Develop a health strategy that is responsive to the assets in the community and people's needs

We have and will continue to work closely with the Communities Team to ensure data and evidence from the Health Needs & Assets Assessments are fed into Local Area Plans.

Furthermore, a key part of the Health Needs & Assets assessment is community and stakeholder consultation and over the coming months we'll continue to attend local events to start these conversations by supporting residents to complete a short survey about their health and happiness in relation to where they live.

Oral health project in partnership with Healthwatch

The children and young people's HNA, identifies children under 5 in the Inner East have on average higher number of filled/missed and decayed teeth compared to other wards areas in Leeds. Healthwatch have recently undertaken a questionnaire to ascertain the experiences of adults/ carers and children in relation to oral health and dental care.

The survey will be reported to at the Oral Health Strategy Board in Autumn. Commissioning of dental contracts has now moved from NHS England to West Yorkshire Integrated Care Board which will hopefully help shape services to support our local communities. BRH elected members recently agreed to fund a project focusing on oral health promotion which will start from September onwards.

Heathy Start (HS) update

Earlier in the year PH worked with Zest to increase the uptake of HS vouchers in the Inner East due to the low uptake of vouchers with a move to an online service.

Recently there has been an increase in uptake of vouchers and PH is working to identify funding to support the promotion of the vouchers. An update from the government was released.

Domestic Violence and abuse subgroup (DVA)

The HATCH DVA subgroup has been paused and will resume from September onwards focusing on the action plan from the second workshop. This will include developing community ambassadors to raise the profile of DVA in the community as well looking at opportunities for local organisations to develop the new charter mark in DVA. AME for Roma women's group

The women's group funded by Public Health has now ended with some excellent results, the ladies were grateful to have a chance to learn about new experiences with many speakers attending the sessions these included sexual health, employment and skills, oral health, cancer awareness and

Zumba sessions. The PH team are now supporting the group to gain more funding to carry on the work and have applied to the Lottery for an 'Awards for All' grant.

Childhood Vaccination and Immunisation Project – For York Road PCN patients

Public Health Localities have been supporting York Road PCN to develop a community-based vaccine project to increase the uptake of the MMR vaccine in children aged 1-5 years. Five stay and play sessions have been set up at trusted community venues across the PCN including Gipton Old Fire Station, The Vinery Centre and Meadowfield Children's Centre. At these sessions, families are invited to attend, enjoy free children's activities, learn more about the vaccine from trained nurses and, if comfortable, get their child vaccinated. This project is currently ongoing.

Local Care Partnership Update

Cost of living /Winter

There will be a LCP Learning Forum in October, bringing partners together to share good practice around winter plans and visit partner stalls around cost of living support. LCPs are considering what they have learnt from last year and what they can do collaboratively. Invites to be circulated shortly.

Digital Heath Hubs

Digital Health Hub Network. First tried in Beeston and Middleton. It takes the Digital Health Hub model which is well established at Cross Gates and builds on this by creating a network that collaborate together, giving coverage across a whole LCP area.

Hubs can be libraries/one stops, third sector community buildings, housing association or social housing shared spaces, etc. They can offer help to get online, digital champions, confidence building, equipment loans, data, how to access specific health apps. Offer can vary from one to another

York Rd started to develop what this might look like in their area and HATCH and Seacroft now exploring this. York Road LCP now has a digital worker to work across the network to generate volunteers and embed the model in the area.

Focus on Food

In HATCH LCP, partners have selected food as a new focus as it's something that everyone can get involved with. Ideas from partners on how to take this work forward have been themed around:

- Health and Wellbeing
- Food Security and Economy
- Sustainability and Resilience

To match the city's food strategy. Early ideas partners have been to explore:

- Our workforce advocating for healthy eating with confidence.
- Getting behind Healthy Start Voucher scheme (to support buying of food and milk)
- Supporting enhancing cooking skills, food growing
- Looking at food environment tackling local take aways to offer healthier affordable options.
- Links to the ongoing cost of living and Diabetes focus.
- Linking in with the city's food strategy

Domestic Violence and Abuse

LCPs are exploring the next focus of their work around tackling DVA with a whole neighbourhood approach. This will include planning for the White Ribbon campaign and 16 days of action which happens end of November – December.

6. Employment & Skills – Champion Councillor John Tudor

Universal Credit

The number of people who are claiming Universal Credit (UC) due to unemployment, as of May 2023, in the Inner East Community Committee area is 10,970. This is an increase of 94% since March 2020, and an increase of 52 claimants on the previous month.

During April 2022 – March 2023

- 14,179 people accessed the Service, 3,540 of whom were residents from the Inner East.
- Supported 2,999 people into work, 527 of whom were residents from the Inner East. Customers were supported into work across all sectors with the largest numbers in construction, health and care including childcares, manufacturing, ICT, digital and comms.
- Supported 3,753 people to improve their skills, 970 of whom were from the Inner East.

Leeds Employment Hub is a single point of contact for all funded programmes and Jobshops which provides tailored and comprehensive support into employment or education to <u>all</u> Leeds residents.

Employment Hub Advisors deliver the programme by providing one to one support, tailored preventative and remedial support to Leeds residents who are disadvantaged in the labour market. The Employment Hub Advisors are co-located within the Jobcentre Plus centres across the city. Further funding has been secured which will see the role of the Advisors continue until at least March 2025.

All Jobshops are open, 5 days a week for face-to-face appointments which includes Seacroft, Burmantofts and Compton Community Hubs. The Community Hub Mobile bus runs Monday - Friday, the schedule stops include:

- The Old Fire Station, Gipton Approach, LS9 6NL Thursday 9:30 12:00
- Windmill Health Centre, Whinmoor Way, LS14 5BD Friday 9:30 12:00
- East Park Medical Centre, East Park Road, LS9 9JD Friday 13:00 15:30

Community Learning provision continues to deliver an effective, broad, and inclusive curriculum to support the continuation of learning in collaboration with subcontracted partners. Courses were delivered through a range of models which include face to face, online and through distance learning, opening new opportunities for adults to learn and develop their confidence. Between April 2022 - March 2023, in the Inner East, 272 courses were delivered at 42 venues. 1,080 residents have accessed a course. In addition, there were 50 courses delivered on-line.

In addition to the above Community Learning courses and in response to requests for ESOL support, a 10-week ESOL course was delivered to residents from the local community at Kentmere Community Centre. The courses have been well attended with 3 courses delivered since September 2022. A new curriculum is in place to support the continued learning from September 2023 which is open to new and current learners.

ESOL support will continue to be delivered at City Centre Hub, Hillcrest Academy, Chapeltown Childrens Centre and Gipton Childrens Centre from September 2023.

Basic Introductory Digital taster sessions have been developed and will be delivered from October in local venues, yet to be confirmed. On completion learners will be signposted and supported onto digital courses within the area.

Between April 2022 - March 2023, 15 Developing You Health and Wellbeing courses, a preemployability programme which helps people to become happier, healthier and move closer towards employment were delivered across the city, 123 people completed the course and 24 of whom were supported into work. Developing You courses were developed and delivered to people with Learning Disabilities, 18 people completed the course and are being supported by the Employment Hub to support progression to further learning, employment or volunteering.

Delivering in partnership the Connecting Communities to Health and Care Careers work focuses on narrowing inequalities with a one system approach across the sector, adapting recruitment methods and building on the good practice in the system, targeting the Priority Wards. The pathways that are being delivered provide people with a supported programme into Administration and Care roles within the NHS and Adult Social Care. There are functional skills (Maths, English and ESOL) support provided to upskill individuals to the required entry level for their pathway of choice. Since February 2022, 422 people, 51% of whom were from the Priority Wards have attended the information sessions, 167 have achieved a qualification and 174 people have been supported into work. New pathways that have been developed for Children's Residential, Care Practitioner roles and Care Navigators within GP Practices and will be delivered from September 2023.

Within the last year the Service has supported 342 new businesses including recruiting new staff, providing support for staff facing redundancy, developing initiatives to address staff shortages and filling a high number of vacancies within key sectors.

Delivered Events and Activities

- **Informed Choices** supported school careers events and parents evenings and delivered Apprenticeship awareness sessions, engaging with 10,535 young people, 458 parents/carers and 409 teachers.
- **Next Steps** support for young people following GCSE or A Level results is hosted on Start in Leeds.
- Connecting Communities to Health and Care Careers delivered 28 information sessions between January and July 2023 at 7 venues across the city, five of the LCC Community Hubs, Age UK and One Community Centre
- Jobs Fairs 19 recruitment events delivered since April 2023 at 10 venues across the city, seven LCC Community Hubs, Wetherby Community Hub, Farnley Community centre and the White Rose Shopping Centre.
- Leeds Community Learning and Employer Provider Apprenticeships Celebration Awards 2023 took place on 18th July 2023 at Civic Hall to celebrate the accomplishments of all learners and tutors and embrace their future progression into further/higher education, volunteering and/or employment.
- **SEND Next Choices Event**, Getting Ready for Adult Life took place on 29th June 2023 at Leeds First Direct Arena. The event was aimed at supporting young people who have Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND). A total of 67 exhibitors participated, offering jobs, Apprenticeships, volunteering, training opportunities, leisure activities and along with other specific support. 2,200 young people attended with very positive feedback.
- **Financial Wellbeing Events** delivered in partnership with Credit Union, Yorkshire Water and Leeds City Council, Housing, Jobshops for residents concerned with the rising cost of living. Support provided included debt advice and employment assistance
 - Compton Community Hub on 15th June 2023. 20 people attended.
 - Burmantofts Community Hub on 13th July 2023. 60 people attended.
- **Leeds Apprenticeship Recruitment Fair (LARF)** took place on 6th February 2023 at Leeds First Direct Arena. A total of 106 organisations participated and 8,000 visitors attended.
 - 78% of visitors were either more likely to start an Apprenticeship or more interested in an Apprenticeship since attending the event.
 - \circ 85% of visitors would recommend the event to a friend.
- **Family Learning Festival** was delivered on the 16th February 2023 at the Carriageworks Theatre, approx. 150 people participating along with 25 exhibitors from across the Community Learning sector. Local skills providers, colleges, universities, employment advisors attended to provide advice for anyone looking to develop their skills further or to plan their next steps.
- **Reducing Re-Offending** construction recruitment events took place on 24th January 2023 and 19th July 2023 at HMP Leeds, 5 construction companies attended offering employment opportunities. 77 serving prisoners engaged with the advisors who delivered employability support sessions.

Summer events

In addition to the community festivals there have been a number of Leeds 2023 cultural events and two mini breeze fun days for local families to enjoy.



Youth Activity Funding (YAF) Consultations

On the 7th and 22nd August Oliver Taylor attended the Mini Breeze events at Haslewood Park and East End Park to engage with young people about their priorities for the Youth Activities Fund. Young people were asked to vote for their favourite activities that they would like to see on offer locally. The residents meeting is open to the public who live in the local area (Burmantotts and Richmond Hill ward). It is an opportunity for residents and businesses to discuss local issues, find out about upcoming projects, and to raise any concerns. There will also be a community safety update via West Yorkshire Police and Leeds Antisocial Behaviour team at the meeting. Local neighbourhood police will be on hand to discuss local issues and efforts to tackle crime and antisocial behaviour.

Harehills Neighbourhood Forum Engagement

The Harehills Neighbourhood Forum have developed a community questionnaire for residents of Harehills to help get their views on living in the area. The questionnaire covers a range of topics that are important to residents and gives them an opportunity to have their say about the local issues that matter to them. The findings of the questionnaire will shape a neighbourhood priorities statement for the forum which will be formally recognised by Leeds City Council.

Forum members have been attending community events throughout the summer to get people's views. The community questionnaire can also be viewed and downloaded from the forum website in English and eleven other languages. The site also has lots of information on the work of the Harehills Neighbourhood forum including details of how people can get involved.

CommUnity Harehills

The Clear/Hold/Build project is a Home Office initiative to tackle serious and organised crime. It has been running in Harehills for several months and sees West Yorkshire Police work with a range of local partners to pursue criminals to clear an area, maintain a hold over the location to prevent

another gang from taking control, and then work with communities to build resilience in an area so it is less susceptible to the draw of crime groups.

There is evidence to suggest the presence of several separate criminal groups operating in Harehills in both independent and organised approaches. The main issues identified are street dealing, cannabis production, weapons offences, and street drinking.

In Harehills the project has been titled CommUnity Harehills and will use the Clear/Hold/Build approach to tackle this criminal activity though partnership working and buy-in from the local community.



To mark the official launch of the CommUnity Harehills project, police, residents, and community safety partners met at The Compton Centre on Thursday 22nd June where the Deputy Mayor for Policing & Crime Alison Lowe helped to launch the initiative.

9. Killingbeck & Seacroft - Priority Ward

Community Updates: We Are Seacroft Art Festival

On Saturday 12th August, the We Are Seacroft Art festival took place on Seacroft Green as part of the Leeds 2023 Year of Culture campaign. On a day that celebrated the wide range of culture and art present in Seacroft & Killingbeck, the event showcased a wide range of activities including music and dance performances, theatre shows, circus skills, scarecrow trails, arts & crafts, and sport. Local residents also had the opportunity to explore the Moon Palace magical mobile observatory during the day, and even book onto night-time observatory sessions in the evening to see the night sky like never before. The day was a huge success, with local residents and young people turning up in droves to engage with the organisations, clubs, and groups that support the local community every day.



Healthy Holidays provision

The summer has been bursting with activities and events for young people through Healthy Holidays funding provision. With events organised by LS14 Trust, S.C.O.T, Fall into Place, and Chapel FM, the range of activities on offer has been fantastic. Included in the schedule has been drama camps, sports camps, playbox sessions, circus skills, bike mechanic groups, pride banner making, and activities based at LS14 Trust Café. The offering has covered all of Killingbeck and Seacroft ward, including new play sessions on the Sutton Estate and Poole Estate. Young people have regularly fed back how much they love the activities, with the opportunity to make new friends, keep active, and learn new skills during the summer holidays period.
