

NOTICE OF OBJECTION - PERSONAL LICENCE SECTION 120(5) - LICENSING ACT 2003

#### **APPLICANT: SAM DONNELLY**

In accordance with section 120(4) Licensing Act 2003, we received notification from Leeds City Council of an application for a personal licence by the person named above. The notification from the licensing authority was received in this office on 20 July 2012.

I PC 5783 Dobson, North East Leeds Licensing Officer for West Yorkshire Police, hereby give you notice that I intend to object to this application for a personal licence.

West Yorkshire Police are satisfied that granting the licence would undermine the crime prevention objective, for the following reasons-:

- The applicant has one relevant unspent conviction for driving whilst over the prescribed limit. This offence will not be considered spent until November 2013.
- On 12 July 2012 the Neighbourhood Policing Team for the Swillington area conducted a test purchase operation. The Swillington public house was visited and the test purchase children were sold alcohol. The seller at this time was Sam Donnelly. Mr Donnelly was reported for this offence and a court hearing is pending. It is unlikely that this matter will be dealt with, through the court system, prior to the personal licence hearing.
- When checks have been conducted with Disclosure Scotland, on West Yorkshire Police Systems and the Police National Computer, the applicant has come to our attention on a number of occasions. However, his recent conviction is the basis for this objection.

The information provided above, leaves West Yorkshire Police in no doubt that this person is unsuitable to be authorised to supply alcohol by way of being granted a personal licence.

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Because of the 'unspent' relevant offence which prompted Leeds City Council to contact us in the first place, West Yorkshire Police are of the opinion that granting this personal licence would undermine the crime prevention objective, and consequently West Yorkshire Police would invite the presiding sub-committee at a hearing to refuse this application

# OBJECTION NOTICE: VARY PREMISES LICENCE - DESIGNATED PREMISES SUPERVISOR: SECTION 37(5) & 37(6) LICENSING ACT 2003

PREMISES SUPERVISOR: KENNETH GREENHOUGH
PREMISES: THE WHINMOOR, STANKS LANE SOUTH, LEEDS LS14 5HZ

West Yorkshire Police serve notice to this application, which we received at Millgarth Police Station on 10 October 2012.

If granted, West Yorkshire Police are satisfied that the exceptional circumstances of the case would undermine the crime prevention objective.

The Whinmoor is situated in the middle of the Swarcliffe area and has been closed for several months. Prior to its closure, the venue suffered from a disproportionate number of problems and was the subject of intelligence and recorded crimes. The premises had a 'rotating door' in respect of licence holders. All of whom, it is fair to say, struggled to operate a challenging premises in a challenging area.

On 2 July 2012 I received information that the premises had been bought, at auction, by a gentleman from outside the immediate area. He had contacted the Licensing Authority, tentatively enquiring about the licence. He was advised in very general terms and told to contact me as the representative for the North East Leeds area. This gentleman is Mr Hing How.

On 17 July 2012 I contacted Mr How, by e-mail, to introduce myself and suggest a meeting. On 19 July I met Mr How at Stainbeck Police Station to discuss his proposals for The Whinmoor.

Mr How does not have a background in the licensed trade and is a baker. Very briefly, his plan for The Whinmoor was to provide tea, cakes and refreshments by day and a carvery in the evening.

#### NOT PROTECTIVELY MARKED

At this same meeting, Mr How stated that he had been approached by a number of local personal licences holders who were keen to take on the premises. I was familiar with all the names except one, who originated in the Bradford area. Whilst it is accepted that personal licence holders do move around, it is unusual for a licence holder, who has always operated in one district, to move to another local authority area. This candidate was Kenneth Greenhough.

Mr How appeared to be keen to employ Mr Greenhough, but I said would check with Bradford Licensing to see if they had concerns whilst he had been at Bradford premises. Because of the challenging nature of The Whinmoor I stressed that it was important to employ the correct designated premises supervisor (DPS) from the start. This person would need to be 'hands on', they would need to spend a great deal of time at the venue and not be a DPS in name only. They would also need to be prepared to challenge anything which would undermine the licensing objectives. Mr How was keen to engage with the Police, but seemed equally keen to appoint Mr Greenhough and open The Whinmoor as soon as possible.

Having communicated via e-mail with the Bradford Licensing Officer, PC Dawson, it became clear that there had been a number of issues at premises where Mr Greenhough had been the licence holder. I asked PC Dawson to provide a statement of her involvement and a copy of this is attached to this letter of objection.

On 6 August 2012 I contacted Mr How, by e-mail, to let him know concerns had been raised regarding Mr Greenhough and that an application to propose him as DPS would attract an objection. I heard nothing more.

On 10 October 2012 this application was received. I contacted Mr How by telephone to express my concern and surprise that he had proposed Mr Greenhough in light of our discussions and the subsequent e-mail. Mr How said that he had not received an e-mail from me and that he wished to proceed with the application. I agreed to meet Mr Greenhough and Mr How to outline the concerns in person.

On 11 October 2012 I met with Mr How and Mr Greenhough at Killingbeck Police Station and outlined the issues brought to my attention by PC Dawson. Mr Greenhough challenged the concerns and did not think there had been any problems at the premises he had operated. It can quite clearly been seen, from PC Dawson's statement, that there have been a number of issues with Mr Greenhough and his style of management would not be correct for The Whinmoor.

Whilst it is accepted that there is nothing set down in the legislation to say how much time a DPS needs to spend at a premises, there are premises that are needier and more time consuming than others. As Mr How intends to leave the day to day management of the venue very much in the hands of the DPS, then this person needs to be able to be frequently on site and needs to engage with the authorities. These two points have clearly been failings in Mr Greenhough's management of other licensed venues.

West Yorkshire Police would ask any presiding Sub-Committee to refuse this application.
