It was felt that the Council had been misled regarding an application for planning permission to develop family homes on the site. Further reference was made to the number of empty homes and HMO properties in the area along with the lack of open spaces.

It was agreed to refer the matter to the Planning Sub Group.

18 Wellbeing Update Report

The report of the West North West Area Leader provided Members with an update on the budget position for the Wellbeing Fund for 2015/16 and the current position of the Small Grants and Skip Pots and those small grants and skips that had been approved since the last meeting. It also provided an update on the Youth Activities Fund.

Members were also asked to approve the commissioning process, timescales and funding priorities for the 2016/17 Wellbeing budget.

Members were informed that the Football & Your Future project had not taken place and £1,040 would be returned to the Wellbeing budget.

Members also discussed a Wellbeing fund request of £10,000 from the Council's waste management team to make changes to the binyards on the Beamsleys in Headingley. 23 Open Forum

In accordance with the Community Committee Procedure Rules, the Chair allowed a period of up to 10 minutes for members of the public to make representations or ask questions on matters within the terms of reference of the Community Committee.

With regard to the wellbeing funding given by the Community Committee in previous years towards the provision of wardens at Woodhouse Moor, Members were urged to once again provide funding. The Committee was informed of the success of this scheme since 2010. It was reported that a bid for funding was expected as part of the 2016/17 wellbeing fund commissioning round.

Victoria Gardens development – it was reported that work was being started on this site from 7.00 a.m. when conditions to the planning application had stipulated that works should not commence until 8.00 a.m. to prevent noise and disturbance to residents. Concern was also raised about a proposed planning application which sought to increase the number of bedrooms at an existing student property on Ash Grove. It was agreed to raise these matters with Planning.

Woodhouse Neighbourhood Planning – the interim forum was currently carrying out public consultation and there was due to be a public meeting in March 2016. There was some concern that, due to ward boundaries, part of the area would be overlooked. It was suggested that Members from City and Hunslet ward be invited to the meeting in March.

Problems with parking around the Woodsley Road Community Centre area were reported. This was an ongoing situation and it was suggested that officers from Highways and Parking Services be invited to a future meeting.

Rosebank Millennium Site – it was reported that paths on the site were falling into disrepair and Members were asked for support regarding an application for Section 106 monies to carry out necessary repairs.

24 Environmental Services - Update and Service Agreement for 2015/16

The report of the Locality Manager, Environmental Action Service presented for approval, a new Service Agreement between the Committee and the Environmental Action Service to help maintain clean and tidy neighbourhoods across the Inner North West Area.

The proposed framework had been discussed at the Environmental Sub-Group with a recommendation to approve the Service Agreement and further develop the 'plans on a page' for each Ward through Ward Member meetings and for the Sub-Group to oversee on behalf of the Community Committee.

Further issues highlighted in the report included the following:

- The existing Service Agreement
- The delivery model based on a zonal team approach
- The full list of functions delivered by the Locality Team.

Further issues discussed included other projects that had been awarded wellbeing funds and the next commissioning round for Youth Activities funds. Members were informed that further applications for Youth Activities Funds were still being sought.

Inner North West Children's Engagement Event

Purpose of report

- To update the Inner North West Community Committee on the engagement event that took place with children and young people at the University of Leeds on Friday 15 January 2016.
- To update the Committee on how the children and young people at the event told us that they would like to see Youth Activities Fund monies spent in the area.

Recommendations

The Community Committee is asked to:

 Note the report and the findings from the engagement event, which will feed into the allocation of Youth Activities Fund monies for the 2016/17 financial year.

Main issues

- 1. On 15 January 2016 57 children, from 13 different schools within the Inner North West wards, came to a children and young people's engagement event at the University of Leeds.
- 2. The event was organised by the Communities Team West North West, with support from Children's Services, the University of Leeds and Inner North West Councillors. The purpose of the event was to engage with young people and learn what activities they would like to see being delivered in their local area. These findings will in turn help shape the priorities for youth activities fund spend in the 2016/17 financial year.
- 3. On the day, young people carried out activities such as a flipchart relay race to tell us what they liked and disliked about where they live, there was a question and answer session with local councillors and lunch in the University's Students' Union. The afternoon was designated as time to carry out an exercise whereby the young people were given monopoly money amounting to £24,000 per group, and asked to allocate the monies to various activities that they would like to see put on in their area. The results of this and full feedback can be found in the attached report at **Appendix 1**. It is these results will help shape the priorities for the 2016/17 financial year.
- 4. Overall the feedback from the event was very positive. The event was supported with £500 funds from the Inner North West Community Committee's wellbeing budget.

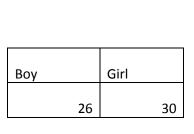

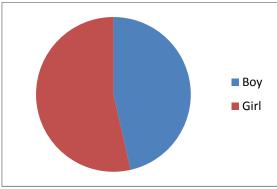

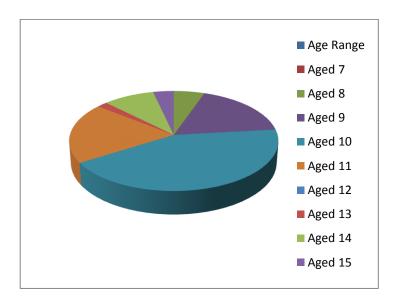

Ages and genders of the young people attending



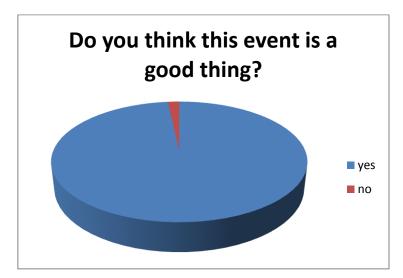




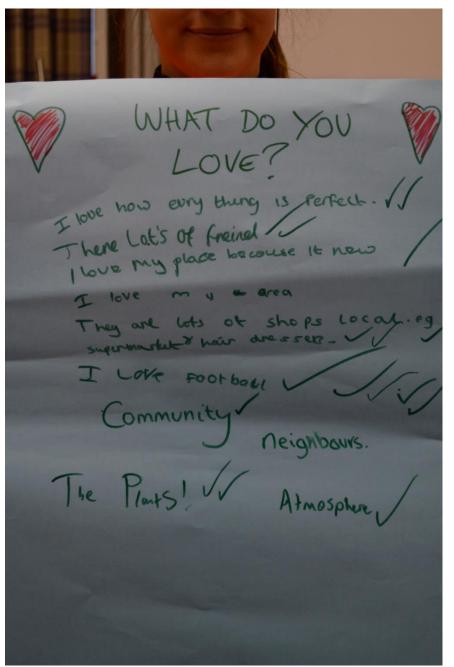

All the feedback forms except one stated attendees thought the event was a good idea.



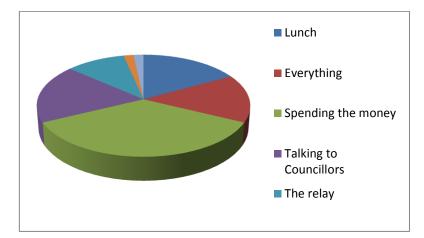

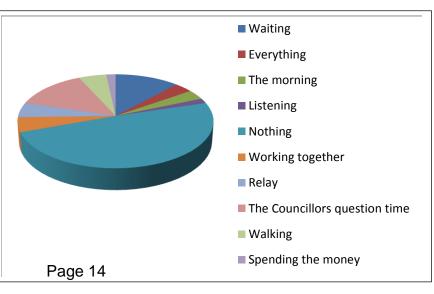

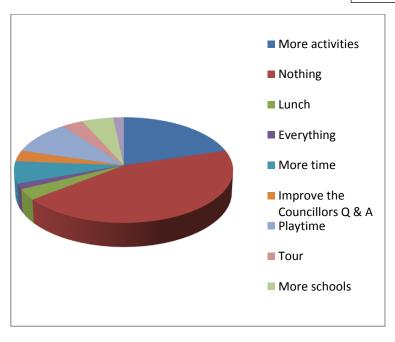

The groups were then asked to put their chosen activities in order of preference. This information will be used to look at priorities in the coming year and help Councillors in allocating funding for activities for young people.





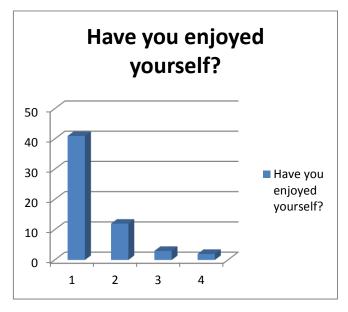

Children's Profile

- It is proposed that from spring 2016 children's profiles will be produced for community committees. These will provide regular updates and trends on key measures respect to children and young people in February/March and October/November of each year. Profiles are intended as position statements, contextual information, to help shape local conversations about an area's priorities for children, rather than a formal report to each committee.
- This information supports transparency on children's measures at the community committee level. Importantly it can help inform local conversations on what is it like for a child growing up in that community committee area and how do we make it better. As such profiles are a starting point for a dialogue between Children's Services and community committees in agreeing priorities and areas of focus for individual committees.
- While covering a broad range of subjects this information is only a starting point for local improvement conversations. It doesn't provide a full rounded story or the depth of analysis perhaps wanted. The data does help shape conversations between community committee children's champions and children's services officers, which will inform community committee priorities and areas of focus. The intent is to support a dialogue on local children's priorities and not on report production.
- Colleagues from the children's performance service are available to support the use of the profiles and wider intelligence resources. They are happy to meet with Committee Chairs, Children's champions and Cluster representatives.
- These profiles will develop iteratively with feedback taken and refinements made to each cycle. They do though need to be produced systematically for the city.
- They are one source of intelligence, others are highlighted below, the Leeds
 Observatory being the broadest where extensive information is available by a range of
 geographies including community committee and ward.
- It is not suggested that these profiles are either appropriate or informative as a formal report. They may though in supporting discussion inform what reports individual committees request from Children's Services.

Contents

The following two tables set out the data being provided at community committee and ward level. Where possible data is based on home address.

- Part One suitable for printing
 - o 10 committee specific summaries of the data (current period and previous period);
 - o One sub-set of the data at ward level (current period only).

Additional Information

Information that will be provided is a summary of the range of Children's Services data available from other sources, such as the <u>Leeds Education Hub (access required)</u> and the <u>Observatory (public)</u>. These self-service sites hold a vast range of data, maps, and analyses of information relating to children and young people across Leeds. The majority of the information on these sites is disaggregated to cluster level, and is shared monthly, quarterly, or annually, as appropriate for each measure with the wider children's and families partnership in Leeds.

The Inner North West contains 5.8% of the Leeds under 19 population, an estimated 10,006 children and young people. Free school meal entitlement is 2-3 percentage points above city levels at just over 22%.

At the end of December 2015 the number of Children Looked After was 68 this is very similar to the 66 of the previous December. In the context of the Looked After Children population falling in the city over this period the Inner North West now accounts for 5.4% of the Leeds CLA population. This though remains a lower percentage than the area makes up of the overall under 19 population. Over the same period there has been a safe reduction in the number of children subject to a child protection plan from 56 to 37. In percentage terms the area still accounts for a slightly greater share of children on plans than it does for the overall child population. There has been a small increase in the number of child protection and safeguarding contacts being made to the council's Duty and Advice Team (child protection frontdoor). However the number of these contacts that then became a referral to be followed up by social care fell slightly suggesting no increase in need.

In 2015 60.4% of 5 year olds living in the area reached what is known as a good level of development, this represents largely static year on year performance, and the INW is now marginally below the Leeds average of 61.7%. In terms of age related expectations at 11 (year 6 end of key stage 2) and 16 (year 11 end of key stage 4) the Inner North West saw good improvement from 2014 to 2015. Results are within a percentage point of the city averages with 77.4% of those in year 6 achieving level 4 or above in Reading Writing and Maths and 55.2% of those in year 11 gaining 5 or more GCSEs at A*-C including English and Maths.

All schools in the area are rated as good or better by Ofsted, accepting that this will not include new sponsored academies awaiting their first inspection.

Leeds attendance levels remained high for the 2014-15 academic year accepting they were, due to illness, marginally down on the previous year. INW levels compare positively with the city accepting 2014-15 was not as strong as 2013-14. For primary children in the INW attendance was at 96.3% down 0.2% points but remaining above the city average. Secondary attendance levels also remains above the city average but locally there was a 0.8% drop from the previous academic year for young people resident in the INW. 50 primary children and 96 secondary young people were absent for more than 15% of the school year, this was classed as being persistently absent (it is now 10% absence). While an increase on the previous schoos year the area makes up only 3.9% and 3.7% of city primary and secondary persistent absence numbers.

The number of NEET young people 16-18 remains stable at around 7%, reassuringly the number of young people whose employment, education and training status is not known has reduced. There was a strong reduction in the number of 10-17 year olds committing one or more offences, while this was reflected at city level the improvement locally was greater a reduction from 40 to 23.

Wellbeing Fund and Youth Activities Fund Allocation Report

Purpose of report

- 1. The purpose of this report is to advise the Inner North West Community Committee of:
 - The current position of the Wellbeing budget and Youth Activities Fund budget.
 - The Wellbeing budget available for allocation in 2016/17.
 - The Youth Activities Fund budget available for allocation in 2016/17.
 - Those projects for consideration and approval from the Wellbeing Budget allocation for 2016/17.
 - Those projects for consideration and approval from the Youth Activities Fund allocation for 2016/17.

Recommendations

- 2. The Community Committee is asked to:
- Note the projects that have been approved since the last Community Committee meeting on 17 December 2015, as contained in Table 1, Table 2 and Table 3.
- Note the current budget position of the Wellbeing Fund and Youth Activities Fund at **Appendix 1.**
- Note the available Wellbeing Budget and Youth Activities Fund for allocation in 2016/17.

- Consider the projects listed at Table 5 for approval from the Wellbeing Budget allocation for 2016/17.
- Consider the projects listed in **Table 6** for approval from the Capital Fund allocation for 2016/17.

Main issues

- 1. Community Committees have a delegated responsibility for the allocation of Wellbeing Funding. The amount of Wellbeing funding provided to each committee is calculated using a formula agreed by Council, taking into consideration both population and deprivation of an area.
- 2. The Inner North West Community Committee seeks to ensure that Wellbeing funding is allocated in a fair and transparent way and that recipients are able to commence delivery of their projects as early as possible in the financial year. To facilitate this process, a commissioning round is held which requires organisations to submit proposals for projects. Once the annual Wellbeing budgets are set by Executive Board and ratified by Full Council, the Community Committee meets to agree which projects will be supported in the year ahead. These projects are then monitored and assessed by the Community Committee throughout the year to ensure they are fully meeting their objectives.
- 3. The 2016/17 Wellbeing allocation for the Inner North West Community Committee has now been approved by Full Council and, as such, the meeting of the Inner North West Community Committee on 3 March 2016 will consider revenue applications for 2016/17 and provide notification for successful projects to proceed with delivery.
- 4. In addition, the Inner North West Community Committee receives a sum of Youth Activity Fund funding. This fund is to commission sports and cultural activity for young people age 8-17. This should be allocated with the involvement and participation of children and young people in the decision making process.
- 5. <u>Wellbeing Revenue Funding approved since the last Community Committee meeting</u> Since the last meeting of the Community Committee on 17 December 2015, Councillors have approved the following project, as contained in **Table 1**, for funding from the Wellbeing revenue fund.

6. 7. Wellbeing 2016/17

Community Committees have received a reduced allocation to their Wellbeing Revenue Budgets for 2016/17 compared with that given in 2015/16. This gives the Inner North West Community Committee an allocation of £109,850. Taking into account project underspends from 2015/16, the total fund available for new projects in 2016/17 is £111,922. The details of this calculation are set out in **Table 4** below:

8. 2016/17 Wellbeing Revenue Projects For Consideration

The Wellbeing commissioning round for 2016/17 received 26 applications for funding totalling £153,801. (For a full list of these projects, please see **Appendix 2**). These applications have been assessed against the funding criteria for the Inner North West Wellbeing Fund. Members have reviewed the applications in detail and have agreed that the 15 projects listed in **Table 5** below, valued at a total of £87,861, should go forward for consideration by the Community Committee on 3 March 2016. Should all of the following projects be approved, this will leave £21,989 of Wellbeing revenue funding available for allocation in 2016/17.

One project, 'Employ-abled', from the applicant Right Choices, has been deferred for decision at a later date.

Area Update Report

1. Purpose of report

1.1 This report provides members with a summary of recent sub group business as well as a general update on other project activity.

2. Background information

2.1 An area update report is submitted at every cycle of community committee meetings, unless there is no additional business to report from sub groups or any other project activity to report. Partner organisations and council services may also contribute information to the area update report.

3. Main issues

Forum and Sub Group Key Messages

3.1 **Planning Sub Group**

The Inner North West planning sub group met on 13 January 2016 and 10 February 2016.

- 3.2 At the meeting on 13 January the following issues were discussed:
 - The recent flooding in Kirkstall and how the planning process needs to take account of these issues in future applications.
 - Key planning applications were discussed including; Headingley Office Park and the development of a new hotel at the Arndale Tower in Headingley.

- Whether the letting board control zone could be expanded to include Little Woodhouse and parts of Kirkstall.
- 3.3 At the meeting on 10 February the following issues were discussed:
 - -The pre app for the new enclosure proposals at Headingley Stadium has been submitted. Councillors and local residents raised concerns about the consultation process for the proposals and about the proposed housing developments on Weetwood Avenue and Tetley Fields.
 - A separate meeting is to be organised to discuss the boundaries for Headingley, Kirkstall and Hyde Park neighbourhood plans.
 - A communication strategy for applications at pre-app stage needs to be developed.
 - That a list of all of the 'sleeping land sites' in the area be compiled.

3.4 Key Messages

The Community Committee is asked to note the discussions of the Planning Sub Group, as noted above.

3.5 **Environment Sub Group**

The Environment Sub Group met on 18 January 2016. The following key issues were discussed:

- Graffiti issues provided the focus of the meeting, with several areas highlighted as hot spots. There was some discussion around the effectiveness of using graffiti walls as a deterrent.
- Poor cleansing and maintenance of Virgin Media boxes remains an issue throughout Inner North West Wards. Members of the group discussed how the condition of the boxes is monitored and how this could be improved.
- Feedback from residents showed that 2015 Christmas bin collections were successful, although there could be some improvements in how the changes were communicated with residents.
- Initial indications show that the Recycling and Energy Recovery Facility (RERF) at Cross Green is performing adequately. The formal contract is likely to commence in March 2016.

3.6 Key Messages

The Community Committee is asked to note the discussions of the Environment Sub Group.

Children & Young People Sub Group

- 3.7 Elected Members of the Children and Young people's sub group met on 8 January 2016. The following key issues were discussed:
 - The Communities Team West North West had held a commissioning round for Youth Activities Fund applicants to apply for funding to hold activities at February half term and the Easter break 2016. These applications were presented to Members for comment. The following projects were recommended for approval:
 - British Military Martial Arts £600
 - Leeds Libraries Adventures with Minecraft £696

- RJC Dance Camp £4100
- Lazer Centre activity programme £5970

These applications have now received approval from the Inner North West Community Committee and been approved by delegated decision.

3.8 Key Messages

The Community Committee is asked to note the discussions of the Children & Young People's Sub Group.

4. Free lets

4.1 Under the new pricing policy for community centres, free lets are now agreed on an individual basis. The table below details the free let that has been agreed in the Inner North West area since this new policy was introduced and the financial value that this represents to the council:

5. Update from the Inner North West Housing Advisory Panel (HAP)

- 5.1 During the financial year 2015/16, the Inner North West Housing Advisory Panel has committed over £96,000 to seventeen environmental and community projects across the Hyde Park & Woodhouse and Weetwood Wards. In addition, the Panel committed a further £11,000 towards two citywide projects; a community payback scheme and winter wellbeing packs; benefitting tenants across the four Wards represented by the Panel.
- 5.2 Through partnership working we have been able to achieve added value to projects. Examples include:
 - INW HAP have funded some environmental works around the Lovell Park multistorey flats. The HAP contribution has also enabled Groundwork Leeds and the local Residents Association to secure match funding from the Department for Communities and Local Government towards a community pocket park. This Committee has also agreed to fund additional environmental works.
 - The INW HAP have part-funded the new community kitchen at the former Bedford Arms, led by the Older Persons Action in the Locality (OPAL).
 - The INW HAP have part funded the Rosebank Rangers project, with Hyde Park Source to deliver an environmental education project involving primary school children and their families on the Rosebank Millennium Green.

5.3 The INW HAP are continuing to develop closer working with the Community Committees and Communities Team colleagues to ensure we can better achieve shared Council objectives and maximise resources for the benefit of communities.

6. Area update newsletter

6.1 Through discussions at area chair's forum, it has been agreed that update newsletters be produced for each of the community committees as a new means of communicating business to the public. Attached at **Appendix 1** is the latest INW area update newsletter for Members information.

7. Commemorating the First World War: Battle of the Somme

- 7.1 A report to the Community Committee Chairs Forum, on 12 February 2016, stated that there is a planned programme of activity in the city to commemorate the centenary of the first day of the Battle of the Somme. In particular, to commemorate the historical significance and the role played by the city's volunteer battalion, the Leeds Pals.
- 7.2 It is proposed that, in order to mark the contribution made by the Leeds Pals Battalions, buglers be employed to play an appropriate piece of music to mark the point in time at which men went 'over the top' at 7.30am on 1 July. It is proposed that these buglers would be in prominent positions in the city with at least one bugler located in each Community Committee area. The exact location of the bugler would be determined by each area.
- 7.3 There is a budget of £1,000 for each Community Committee; this funding will include the cost of the bugler and the remaining balance of the £1,000 funding will be available to support additional locality events.
- 7.4 Community Committees are requested to identify and support additional local events on the 1 July which they feel would be most appropriate to their communities.

Focus on: Children & Young People Engagement Event

On 15 January, the Inner North West took it's chosen topic outside of the usual Committee setting, and headed to the University of Leeds to meet with young people from across the area.

57 young people from 13 different schools from Headingley, Hyde Park & Woodhouse and Weetwood wards attended the event.

There were games where young people told us what they liked and disliked in the area, a Q&A session with Councillors and an activity where young people

told us what they would like to see Youth Activities Fund monies spent.

Young people were also given monopoly money, as part of an activity that saw them allocate funds to projects that they would like to see running in the local area. Their top choice was a multi sports Page 45

event, followed by Leeds City Council Breeze events and then cookery classes. The full results of the event will help form the Community Committee priorities for Youth Activity Fund allocations in 2016/17.

Cllr Pryor is Chair of the Inner North West Community Committee, and the Children and Young People's sub group, he said "We all had a great day at the event, listening to all the ideas that young people have for their local area. We'll be making sure that this feeds into which projects we fund this year. There was a lot of positive feedback from the event and we'd love to do one again next year, to engage young people in local democracy."

Supporting Community Projects

Grant approvals

Councillors have allocated over £160,000 to community and youth projects since April last year. Here is just a taster of some of them:

Hyde Park Unity Day— £5,000

Funding for Hyde Park Unity Day event, for main stage hire and security fencing. The event was in its 20th year with between 6,000—8,000 people attending annually.

Welcome In Community Centre - OPAL - £7,500

Inner North West Sub Groups

The Inner North West Community Committee has three sub groups that meet on a regular basis. Here's a round up of key work since the last Community Committee meeting in December:

Environment Sub Group

The Environment Sub Group met on 18 January 2016 and had a focus on graffiti. Both residents and Councillors have reported that there is a problem with graffiti in the area and were keen to hear what was being done to try and tackle the issue. At the meeting, the group looked at what could be done to alleviate the problem, and whether mural walls could offer a solution. The Council's Locality Team have also been meeting with landlords and building owners around their duties to ensure that graffiti is cleared up when it is on their property.

Planning Sub Group

The Planning Sub Group meets once a month and is made up of local Councillors and residents. They discuss key planning applications for the area, along with planning policy developments and any neighbourhood planning issues.

Most recently the group considered the pre application for the expansion proposals at Headingley Stadium.

The group also looked at the recent flooding problems at Kirkstall and what might be done to alleviate these issues through the planning process in future.

Children & Young People Sub Group

Elected Members from the sub group met on 8 January to look at the applications that had been received from organisations that wanted to access Youth Activities Fund monies to put on activities over February half term and at Easter.

Councillors recommended four projects for approval totalling just over £11,000. Following further approvals, these projects are now all going ahead. They include a dance camp, Lego and Minecraft workshops, a martial arts course and activities at the Lazer Centre in Armley.

Inner North West Round Up

Student Changeover

The Inner North West Community Committee area contains two Universities, which, combined with the large number of students that live in the area, means that we work hard in the local community to make sure that things run as smoothly as possible. The end of June sees many students leaving their accommodation for the summer. This can cause issues with additional waste being created, noise nuisance problems and the Council and partners start planning early to work out how we can mitigate these issues and the impact it can have on the local community. In fact, planning has already started, and our first meeting is already in the pipeline; local Councillors, Community Committee staff, the Universities, and key partners like the police all come together to start looking at how we can work together and what we can do differently to deal with the student changeover period.

The Council has now developed new zonal teams that are now more localised and link in with the local police, there is a noise nuisance patrol that operates in the LS6 area during peak times, and new ideas are being trialled such as placing additional clothing banks in key locations during changeover to encourage recycling. We're having loads of great , positive feedback on all of this and will continue to think of innovative ways of working.

Your Community Committee

The ten Community Committees in Leeds link local residents to Councillors and other decision makers to focus on topics that matter to our communities. In the past year, the Inner North West Committee has looked at domestic violence, improving access to housing, highways and high streets and carried out an engagement event with young people.

Dates, Times and Venues of Community Committee Meetings 2016/2017

Purpose of report

1. The purpose of this report is to request Members to give consideration to agreeing the proposed Community Committee meeting schedule for the 2016/2017 municipal year, whilst also considering whether any revisions to the current meeting and venue arrangements should be explored.

Main issues

Meeting Schedule

- The Procedure Rules state that there shall be at least four ordinary or 'business'
 meetings of each Community Committee in each municipal year and that a schedule of
 meetings will be approved by each Community Committee. In 2015/16, this Committee
 held four meetings.
- 3. To be consistent with the number of meetings held in 2015/16, this report seeks to schedule four Community Committee business meetings as a minimum for 2016/17. Individual Community Committees may add further dates as they consider appropriate and as the business needs of the Committee require. The proposed schedule has been

- compiled with a view to ensuring an even spread of Committee meetings throughout the forthcoming municipal year.
- 4. Members are also asked to note that the schedule does not set out any Community Committee themed workshops, as these will need to be determined by the Committee throughout the municipal year, as Members feel appropriate. During 2015/16, where such workshops were held, many took place either immediately before or after the Committee meetings. Therefore, when considering proposed meeting arrangements, Members may want to consider whether they wish to adopt a similar approach to the themed workshops in 2016/17, as this could impact upon final meeting times and venues.
- 5. The following provisional dates have been agreed in consultation with the Area Leader and their team. As referenced earlier, this report seeks to schedule a minimum of four Community Committee business meetings for 2016/2017 in order to ensure that the dates appear within the Council's diary. Individual Community Committees may add further dates as they consider appropriate and as business needs of the committees require.
- 6. The proposed meeting schedule for 2016/17 is as follows:
 - Thursday, 16 June 2016 at 7.00 p.m.
 - Thursday, 22 September 2016 at 7.00 p.m.
 - Thursday, 15 December 2016 at 7.00 p.m.
 - Thursday, 23 March 2017 at 7.00 p.m.

Meeting Days, Times and Venues

- 7. Currently, the Committee meets on a Thursday at 7.00 p.m. and the proposed dates (above) reflect this pattern.
- 8. Meeting on set days and times has the advantage of certainty and regularity, which assists people to plan their schedules. The downside might be that it could serve to exclude certain people i.e. members of the public, for instance, who have other regular commitments on that particular day or who might prefer either a morning or afternoon meeting or a meeting immediately after normal working hours. Therefore, the Committee may wish to give consideration to meeting start times and venue arrangements which would maximise the accessibility of the meetings for the community.

Options

9. Members are asked to consider whether they are agreeable with the proposed meeting schedule (above), or whether any further alternative options are required in terms of the number of meetings, start times or venue arrangements.

Corporate considerations

10a. Consultation and engagement

The submission of this report to the Community Committee forms part of the consultation process as it seeks the views of Elected Members with respect to the Community Committee meeting schedule and venue arrangements.

In compiling the proposed schedule of meeting dates and times, the current Community Committee Chair, the Area Leader and colleagues within Area Support have been consulted.

10b. Equality and diversity / cohesion and integration

In considering the matters detailed, Members may wish to give consideration to ensuring that the Community Committee meeting arrangements are accessible to all groups within the community.

10c. Legal implications, access to information and call in

In line with Executive and Decision Making Procedure Rule 5.1.2, the power to Call In decisions does not extend to decisions taken by Community Committees.

Conclusion

11. The Procedure Rules require that each Community Committee will agree its schedule of meetings and that there shall be at least 4 business meetings per municipal year. In order to enable the Committee's meeting schedule to feature within the Council diary for 2016/17, Members are requested to agree the arrangements for the same period.

Recommendations

- 13. Members are requested to consider the options detailed within the report and to agree the Committee's meeting schedule for the 2016/17 municipal year (as detailed at paragraph 6), in order that they may be included within the Council diary for the same period.
- 14. Members are requested to give consideration as to whether they wish to continue with the Committee's current meeting and venue arrangements or whether they would like to request any amendments to such arrangements.
