2. Please provide a brief description of what you are screening

The three former area Clinical Commissioning Groups in Leeds (now merged and known as the NHS Leeds Clinical Commissioning Group) have provided funding for the Forward Leeds drug and alcohol service to provide a dedicated team of staff in each of the three CCG areas to deliver targeted interventions in GP practices, primarily for GP referrals.

The former Leeds South and East CCG committed to invest in the service for five years (1 July 2015 to 30 June 2020) however until recently the former Leeds North and Leeds West CCGs had only committed funding to 30 June 2018. Further CCG funding of £60k and £87k has now been confirmed to continue this work in these two respective areas from 1 July 2018 to 31 March 2019. This additional investment is the subject of this screening.

The Forward Leeds service is available to all Leeds residents however, through the consultation that was undertaken prior to the service being commissioned and from analysis of client data from the service since it commenced, we know that it particularly

works with many service users who have complex needs including mental health problems and homelessness. It includes dedicated support for expectant mothers, children / young people and families including those participating in the Family Drug and Alcohol Court pilot in West Yorkshire. GPs often have regular contact with or are the first port of call for many of these protected groups making them ideally placed to engage people in support and treatment.

The additional investment will support the ongoing targeting of services through GP surgeries which is in keeping with the ethos of the service on using community based - settings such as these to improve accessibility to drug and alcohol treatment services for these client groups. This particularly benefits those who wish to receive support closer to where they live or prefer a more anonymous setting and would not seek help directly from a Forward Leeds hub. An increasing number of service users are accessing this part of the Forwards Leeds service and successfully completing their interventions with this team prior to leaving or moving to other Forward Leeds services such as recovery support.

Key findings

Varying the contract with Humankind to include the additional CCG funding will ensure that all residents of Leeds including vulnerable client groups continue to have access to substance misuse services through community-based settings across the whole of Leeds and not just in the South and East. Those residing in the north and west of the City would feel discriminated against and disadvantaged if this particular service wasn't available in their area. Additional pressure would be put on other Forward Leeds services with a potential increase in waiting times and reduction in successful completions for service users from these parts of the city.

Actions

Work is ongoing by Forward Leeds and officers involved in primary care engagement to ensure that GP practices are aware of this treatment pathway for their patients and are making referrals as appropriate.

In the unlikely event that the additional funding was withdrawn or the contract wasn't varied, officers involved in the contract management of the Forward Leeds service would monitor the level of take up of support and treatment in the different areas to establish the impact of the service being withdrawn in the northern and western parts of the city. Work would be undertaken to encourage referrals from GP's into alternative parts of the Forward Leeds service so that residents from the northern and western part of the city were still accessing support.
