required to send details of a new door policy to Leeds City Council Licensing after a complaint, but these were not resolved, and in July 2018 he informed us he had resigned.

His successor, was named as DPS in August 2018. He asked for help with issues in the alleyway and liaised with West Yorkshire Police regarding the run up to August Bank Holiday weekend and the acknowledged increase in knife and drug related incidents in the area. It tried to address some long standing issues around the customer base in the venue and this may account for what appears to be an increase in some of the incidents whilst he was in charge. In my opinion this was a result of him pro-actively managing the venue. His attempts to change the style of the venue and what it attracted were short lived. At the beginning of 2019 he informed Police Licensing that he was to leave the venue but would oversee the transition between him and the new manager who was yet to obtain her personal licence.

Leonna Taylor took over the running of the venue. She is relatively young and inexperienced and only obtained her personal licence on 21st February 2019. There were some concerns regarding her inexperience but no reason or grounds at that time to object to her becoming the DPS. On March 24th she and her staff were clearly overwhelmed by events which has led to objections to the pending applications to transfer the licence in to her name and for her to be named as DPS on the licence. These matters have been scheduled to be heard at a later date.

Chronology

Incidents of major concern

<u>28/05/2018</u> – suspects involved in stabbing incident elsewhere in the city have been in Norman Bar prior to attacking victim.

29/07/2018 – victim of stabbing had been in Norman Bar prior to assault. Will not co-operate with police.

<u>12/08/2018</u> – double stabbing. Victim had been in Norman Bar prior to being stabbed. Victim unable or unwilling to account for what happened. NOT IN ORIGINAL CHRONOLOGY.

<u>07/10/2018</u> – victim of stabbing had been in Norman Bar prior to attack – victim and friends unwilling to co-operate with the police.

All four of the above incidents refer to knife crime – none of it occurred inside Norman Bar but the people involved, victims and suspects, clearly feel comfortable in the bar, as opposed to any other venue on the street, or indeed the city. I can't show that any knives had been inside the venue or why these people are attracted to the bar but they obviously are, and this needs addressing in the interests of public safety and in order to promote the licensing objectives.

Since the suspension of the premises licence West Yorkshire Police have had an opportunity to meet with the owner's representative and solicitor. A full and frank discussion has taken place and our concerns have been addressed with the following suggested conditions.

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- 1. A computer based identification system shall be installed and maintained to the reasonable satisfaction of West Yorkshire Police. The details of all customers seeking entrance to the premises shall be processed through the system.
- 2. Polycarbonate vessels shall be used at all times the premises are open with the exception of champagne glasses in dedicated VIP areas. No glass bottles will be sold over the bar without first being decanted with the exception of bottles of Champagne in VIP areas. These areas will be supervised and glassware will be removed from these areas promptly.
- 3. The minimum number of door supervisors employed at the premises shall be 4. Additional door supervisors (to a maximum of 7) will be employed after a risk assessment and are deemed to be required.
- 4. At least 2 door supervisors at the front door and 2 door supervisors inside the premises will wear body cameras. The cameras shall record constantly throughout their tour of duty.

In my opinion, the i/d scanner should be off-putting to the element which is comfortable around the use of knives and do not co-operate with the police. It should also be off putting to those who are not afraid to use violence once inside licensed premises.

There is already an element of plastic/polycarbonate use at the premises which may account for the lack of really serious injuries during the recent violent disorder offence. Tightening up on this will help reduce the potential for more serious injuries to be sustained should there be any disorder.

The current condition on the premises licence in relation to door staff is for a minimum of 1 to be deployed. The offer of a minimum of 4 with chest cameras constantly recording is also a tightening up of security and adding another element, the audio and video, which will be off putting to the more undesirable element that may try and access the bar.

I would strongly suggest that the proposed modification of conditions be adopted at the review hearing on 17th April. The 4 suggested conditions are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives and address specific concerns West Yorkshire Police have in relation to the premises.

At any review of the interim steps under Section 53D of the Licensing Act 2003, West Yorkshire Police would not object to the modification of the original steps taken (suspension of the licence) only if any modification were to replicate word for word the suggested conditions we have asked the Licensing Authority to consider imposing at the review. We are mindful that the decision at review does not take immediate effect, and would therefore want to ensure appropriate proportionate safeguards are in place until that time. The suggested course of action would ensure that those safeguards have to be in place.
