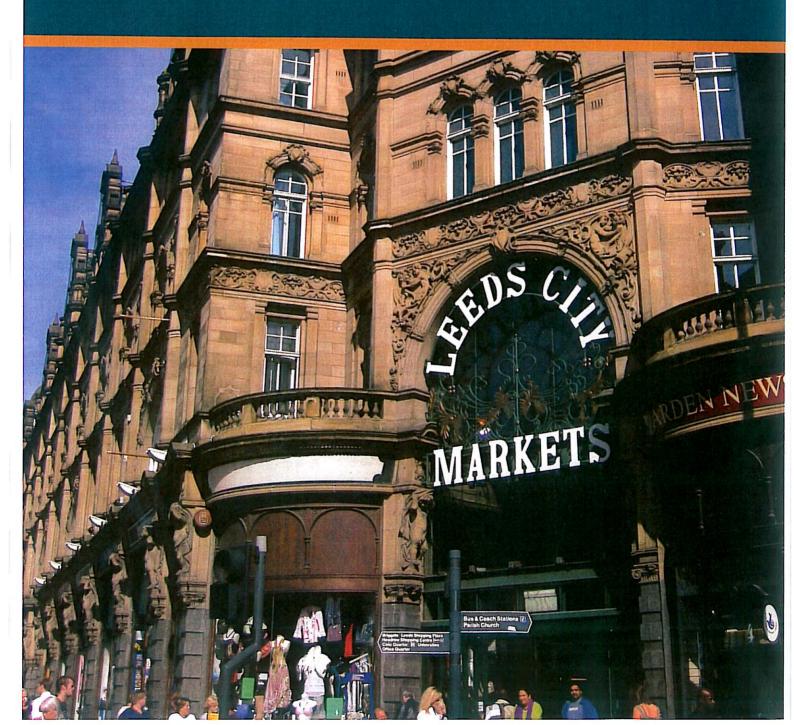

The council aims to build on the success of Kirkgate Market to create a unique shopping experience which enhances the historical nature of the site and:

- secures the strong food themes of fresh fruit and vegetables, game, fish, meat, dairy and delicatessen;
- provides a vibrant market space a destination in its own right within the city centre;
- promotes Leeds as a centre for architectural innovation.

The council guarantees that:

- any new development will preserve the market as the dominant feature;
- the market will remain in its present location and will be of the same scale as the current market;
- the council will continue to operate the market after any redevelopment.



The market sits between the proposed new Eastgate/ Harewood development area and the existing heritage buildings to the south whilst, on the western side, the magnificent 1904 Edwardian Market Hall provides exclusive frontage onto Vicar Lane.

The 1875 and 1904 sections feature historical architectural splendours and entice customers into a vibrant and unique shopping environment. However, some of the heritage characteristics are difficult to see or are completely hidden from view.

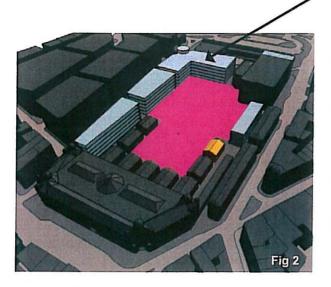
Fig 1) to its original form to complete the 'lost' symmetry. This would provide a visual and physical balance to the 1875 market hall, whilst keeping the block shops under cover.

For example, before the market halls were roofed, there were a number of free-standing shop units open to the elements, known as *block shops*, which are shown in Fig 1 below, with the upper structure of a block shop shown in Picture 3, above.

Redevelopment proposals include the possible reinstatement of a ninth block shop (marked yellow in

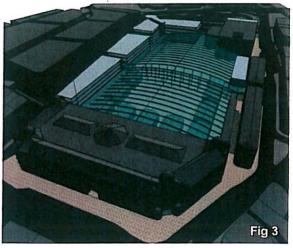
The existing 1930s buildings, mainly located on George Street and Butchers' Row, together with the 1976 and 1981 structures, which were built after the devastating fire of 1975, are of little architectural or operational merit and an opportunity now exists to replace them.

In Figs 2 and 3 below, are images of the overall development potential. Whilst not providing significant detail at this stage, they offer an idea of the eventual scale of the project together with the possibility of an iconic building on the north east corner opposite Millgarth Police Station.

The main objective of the project is to ensure that the 1875, 1904 and any new market halls remain the dominant feature of any redevelopment. With this in mind, the council has considered possible peripheral commercial development (highlighted in blue) which might be appropriate to help fund the construction and physical integration of the new market hall (shown in purple) with the existing historic sections. It is thought that the cost of rebuilding the market hall, at around £20m, could be met by the commercial sector simultaneously developing the peripheral (blue) parts of the site.



The council would also like to optimise the use of public open space within the proposed development. In part, this can be achieved by introducing new high level walkways connecting the existing balcony areas (see Picture 4) in the 1904 Edwardian Market Hall with the new market hall. This would enable customers to access new vantage points to appreciate the heritage features and may provide the opportunity for rest or refreshment and meeting friends.

DM Fig 4 An extremely important principle of Kirkgate Market is the operation of a day or open market, and this will be fully retained under any future scheme. The redevelopment of Kirkgate Market offers the option to provide protection from the elements to day traders and visitors alike (location DM, Fig 4).
