Summary

Main issues

- The 2015 Autumn Statement announced the establishment of the Pothole Action Fund of £250millilon to provide funding over the following five years. This grant is targeted at improving local roads and delivering better journeys. It will contribute to the Best Council Plan.
- Leeds City Council's allocation from the Pothole Action Fund for 2019/20 is £541,847.
- The Council has already set aside a budget for dealing with potholes that have formed, been reported and require attention quickly. It is intended that this additional funding will be used to deal with those locations that have the potential to develop in to potholes or that have suffered repeated pothole formation and require localised repair

 - This work will help improve the highway network and contribute to The Best Council Plan 2019/20 to 2020/21 in improving the resilience of the city's infrastructure.

• This additional funding is targeted at improving road condition and the delivery of better journeys. This meets some of the objectives of the Best Council Plan by reducing the likelihood of accidents and improving infrastructure.

3. Resource Implications

• The scheme proposals have no implications in terms of resources. All design and works resources have been identified within the 2019/20 works programme.

Recommendations

- 1. The Chief Officer (Highways and Transportation) is requested to:
 - a) Inject £541,847 into the Capital Programme from the DfT Pothole Action Fund 2019/20
 - b) Give authority to incur expenditure of £541,847 on carriageway maintenance, to repair potholes, and prevent potholes forming. This will be made up of £483,791 works costs and £58,056 fees, funded from Government Grant, as detailed in Appendix A.

1. Purpose of this report

- 1.1 To inject £541,847 in to the capital programme and to seek approval to incur the expenditure of £541,847 Pothole capital grant 2019/20 from the DfT
- 1.2 To briefly set out the principles of the process of identifying the locations for repair

2 Background information

- 2.1 The 2015 Autumn Statement announced the establishment of the Pothole Action Fund of £250 million which will provide funding over the following five years. The DfT have calculated that this fund will repair approximately one million potholes each year
- 2.2 The allocation for Leeds for 2019/20 is £541,847 which is estimated to be able to repair 10,207 potholes although emphasis has been put on preventing the potholes from forming, as the council has already set aside a budget for dealing with potholes reported to the council that require quick attention.
- 2.3 The money is ring-fenced to carriageways. The most appropriate area to spend this money is to patch areas of road that;
 - have extensive pothole repairs and if left untreated will lead to further potholes or;
 - are starting to rut, crack and craze and will pothole in the near future or;
 - locations that have suffered extensive damage as a result of the severe weather or;
 - major junctions which cannot be treated with preventative treatments and have therefore suffered greater deterioration.

3 Main issues

3.1 **Design proposals and full scheme description.**

3.1.1 The additional government grant funding received last financial year (2018/19) was;

- £1.481m pothole allocation
- £3.857m maintenance block funding (October Budget announcement).

The majority of this additional funding (**£4.5m**) was spent on the local road network. It is therefore, planned to target the classified road network with this year's reduced allocation.

- 3.1.2 Patching is being identified from a combination of the following:
 - Locations with a high number of repeat pothole team visits;
 - Locations where the pothole teams have suggested further work required;
 - Locations subject to repeat liability claims;
 - Local knowledge of areas that are already poor surface and/or liable to pothole;
- 3.2 **Programme** The requirements of the grant include that this funding is to be spent within the financial year 2019/20.

4 Corporate considerations

4.1 Consultation and engagement

- 4.1.1 Due to the limited size of the funding received this year, it has not been be possible to provide works in every ward. Ward members for the affected wards will be informed as to any locations included within this programme of works.
- 4.1.2 The Executive Member for Climate Change, Transport and Sustainable Development has been involved in and consulted in respect of this matter.

4.2 Equality and diversity / cohesion and integration

- 4.2.1 The pothole repair and prevention work will be targeted on the classified roads and will supplement the existing annual programme of work as approved in March 2019, by the Cost and Design Report for Highway Infrastructure Maintenance programmes 2019/20 for which a screening document was produced.
- 4.2.2 A screening document has been prepared and an independent impact assessment is not required for the approvals requested. The screening document is shown in Appendix B

4.3 Council policies and the best council plan

4.3.1 This additional funding is targeted at improving local road condition and delivering better journeys. This meets some of the objectives of the Best Council Plan by reducing the likelihood of accidents and improving infrastructure.

Climate Emergency

4.3.2 A key part of the Best Council Plan priority on 'Sustainable Infrastructure' is how we tackle the risks of climate change. The council's declaration of a climate emergency in March 2019 requires how the proposals outlined in this report impacts upon this agenda. The report has no specific effect on climate, however through the repair / prevention of potholes Leeds will reduce the potential for damage to vehicles, and make the roads safer for other road users such as cyclists. This early intervention should also reduce the need to carry out more disruptive and deeper construction/resurfacing works in the future (on the treated roads) which would require more bituminous and aggregate rich materials to be produced, and have an adverse effect on congestion and the environment.

4.4 Resources, procurement and value for money

4.4.1 Full scheme estimate.

4.4.2 The pothole repair and prevention work will be delivered by both internal labour force and contractors with existing term contracts. There is a finite cost to this work of £541,847.
