1. Summary of main issues

Approval is sought to inject £101,000planning gain funds received from the housing development in Gt Preston on Leeds Road, and to seek authority to spend (ATS) £101,000planning gain monies to undertaken improvements within Whitehouse Lane Picnic Site

The Best Council Plan 2013-17 highlights the ambition for Leeds to become the best city with an economy that is both prosperous and sustainable so all our communities are successful. Within the plan, there is emphasis on supporting communities through healthy lifestyles and getting people active, also building a child friendly city to ensure the best start in life. Improvements to parks play areas and other greenspace facilities are considered to contribute towards achieving these council objectives.

Recommendations

- a) That the Chief Parks and Countryside Officer approve the injection and expenditure of £101,000planning gain monies to enable the improvement works within and to the woods to take place, and that they grant approval to spend (ATS) for the full £101,000.
- 1. Purpose of this report

1.1 The purpose of this report is to seek approval to inject £101,000planning gain monies into the capital programme and to be granted approval to incur expenditure of £101,000 on undertaking the work at Whitehouse Lane Picnic Site.

2. Background information

- 2.1 Whitehouse Lane Picnic, despite being difficult to access due to issues in the past with antisocial behavior is still a much used local amenity.
- 2.2 Located on the junction of Wakefield Road and Whitehouse lane, this former pit site is home to a wealth of flora and fauna and a popular spot for walkers and cyclists to take a rest whilst out enjoying the local countryside.
- 2.3 With a crossing of paths this little jewel on a busy road provides a haven for wildlife and a welcome spot for visitors
- 2.4 Sadly though problems in the past with miss use has led to the site being closed to vetches forcing visitors to park on the side of a busy road.
- 2.5 This scheme proposes to change this, through a series of improvements to make the site a more useable and accessible site, by implementing some radical work to the entire site.

3. Main issues

- 3.1 The ward members wish to support the proposals to the picnic site which were agreed at a meeting on the xx of October 2019.
- 3.2 The works agreed include :-
- Signage x3
- Thinning works
- 4 New planting
- Access controls x2
- Fencing works to both sides of the picnic site including the main entrance on Whitehouse lane
- Provision of wildflowers and seating
- Reduction of the available parking to expand on the meadow
- Creation of a picnic site with benches x 3 and bins
- Accessible path way
- ♣ And drainage works to help aid access around the site

4. Corporate considerations

4.1 Consultation and engagement

4.1.1 Consultation with the ward members and the community group is complete and all 3 ward members have given their approval at the ward member meeting in August 2019.

4.2 Equality and diversity / cohesion and integration

- 4.3 The process for spending green space Section 106 monies has been subject to an Equality Impact Assessment. It concluded there were impacts as regards equality and diversity. Many of the issues relate to the restrictive nature of funding generated through S106 legal agreements. There is a strong focus and reliance on public consultation with existing and potential users as part of the preparation of proposals.
- 4.4 These proposals include improvements that will mainly benefit children and their careers.
