1. Leeds Community Foundation – Current Trustees

The Leeds Community Foundation is both a registered charity and a registered company. It is governed by a board of elected trustees consisting of professionals and experts from the local private, public and voluntary sectors. They bring a wide range of skills and specialist knowledge to the Foundation such as personnel, financial, media, legal, marketing and strategic management. They help to secure, invest and manage the funds as well as their involvement in the process of grant-making.

2. Three Main Funds Currently Administered by LCF

Leeds Community Foundation makes grants to groups that are either based in the Metropolitan District of Leeds or, if based outside the area, must use the grants to benefit the communities of Leeds. Usually, all funding streams are open to 'not-for-profit' organisations. LCF currently seeks applicants to three main funds :

The Leeds Children's Gift Fund which supports activities that help children and young people to make the most of their lives, usually funding groups that work in the most deprived areas of Leeds or that support very disadvantaged children.

The Sports Relief Fund uses sport and exercise to strengthen communities and provide opportunities for people who are excluded or disadvantaged. Leeds has a total of £22,500 to distribute in 2008.

The Keepmoat Fund. The Keepmoat Foundation has been established by the Keepmoat Group which includes Frank Haslam Milan, Haslam Homes, Bramall Construction and Keepmoat Plc. Keepmoat plc are specialists in delivering community regeneration in projects across the North of England. LCF seeks applications from groups, in Leeds, who are working with individuals in disadvantaged communities.
