## 2. Please provide a brief description of what you are screening

It is proposed that a procurement is completed to commission an external agency to undertake two open book cost of care exercises simultaneously, to help inform fee rates for 2022/23, for both older people's care homes and for home care, and to identify a formula to inform future fee rates.

Fee rates for Older Adults care homes were reviewed in 2017/18 following a comprehensive cost of care exercise undertaken by an independent organisation, Mazars. The review resulted in revised fee levels and established a formula to be used to inform subsequent annual fee increases.

The Covid 19 pandemic has placed additional cost pressures on care homes providers and whilst many of these cost pressures are likely to be short term and have in part been funded, it is not yet known how these will impact care homes in the medium to longer term. The care home providers and the Leeds Care Association have indicated that the local authority fees, in accordance with the agreed formula, do not cover the costs of delivering the service and that there is a significant risk that care home providers will not be able to sustain their provision at these fee rates.

Fee rates for home care have broadly been set on the basis of the UK Home Care Association (UKHCA) home care cost model, with some modifications in relation to travel time. However, the disparity is increasing between the home care fee rates in Leeds and the UKHCA minimum fee rate.

The Care Act 2014 places a duty on local authorities to ensure there is a viable and sustainable market of social care provision to meet needs. The Care Act also requires local authorities to make available sufficient capacity, and a choice of quality services for people who fund their own care as well as for people who are state funded.

An independent review of providers' costs, through a cost of care exercise, is required to inform decisions on future fee rates from 2022/23 for both older people's care homes and for home care.

In accordance with Care Act 2014 duties, the Council has a duty to meet the statutory care and support needs of people who are eligible for state funded social care. Additionally, the Care act places a duty on local authorities to ensure there is a viable and sustainable market of social care provision to meet needs. The Care Act also requires local authorities to make available sufficient capacity, and a choice of quality services for people who fund their own care as well as for people who are state funded.

As such, there is a need to ensure that the fees set by the Council are sufficient to cover the costs of delivering good quality services which are commissioned from external providers.

The people requiring care and support services are likely to be frail, elderly and/or have various disabilities. It is imperative that there are adequate services available to meet their health and care needs.
