Recommendations

- a) Note the contents of the report; and
- b) Approve the application for an extension to temporary pavement licences on identical terms to the original licence from premises listed in Appendix 2, to operate a street café on the highway, which will expire on 30th September 2023 when the current provisions of the Business and Planning Act 2020 come to an end.

What is this report about?

- 1 To consider the renewal of Temporary Pavement Licences until 30th September 2023 under the amended Business and Planning Act 2020 to operate on the highway
- 2 In order to support the Covid-19 business recovery phase plans have were put in place to issue Temporary Pavement Licences where appropriate. The extended temporary licences will be issued to be in place until no later than 30th September 2023 under the provisions of the amended Business & Planning Act. The Issue of a temporary licence does not signify that approval would be given to a permanent application at a later date. If required this would be a matter for further application. Full diligence and site inspections continue to take place modified to reflect the timelines set for agreement of temporary pavement licence applications
- 3 The applications comply with the Temporary Pavement Licence Rules & Regulations.
- 4 Temporary Pavement Licences support the Best Council Plan, in particular Health and Wellbeing by allowing users to sit and relax outside, in areas of the City Centre that may not offer seating, and support businesses with growth and investment by allowing them the opportunity to have a Temporary Pavement Licence, which can make them more visible and cater for customers who wish to sit outside.
- The Temporary Pavement Licence Rules & Regulations policy has been amended to recommend that licenced premises limit the use of single use plastics. And we are currently reviewing incentives for licenced premises who show that they are working to limit the use of single use plastic. Additionally, through the single use plastic working group, the Council will work with businesses on climate change on such issues.

What impact will this proposal have?

- 6 Approval of the Temporary Pavement licence will enable more people to enjoy being sat outside while enjoying the hospitality that Leeds has to offer.
- 7 Temporary Pavement licences have no impact on capital funding. The business will pay a fee of £99 for the licence.

- 11 Consultation was undertaken with the street café working group on the 17th August 2022, which include Highways Officers, West Yorkshire Police and Licencing Officers to ensure that the temporary pavement licence could continue to operate under the provisions of the Business and Planning Act 2020. - 12 The relevant portfolio holders for highways and the city centre have been briefed on the provisions of the Business and Planning Act 2020 and the granting of the Temporary Pavement licences.
- 13 Site notices were posted in accordance with the Business and Planning Act 2020 requirements and no comments were received. See Appendix 2 for site notice dates.

The licensing process involves a rigorous consultation stage and any negative feedback or concerns raised as a result of this consultation stage may result in adding specific terms or clauses to the licence or approving the licence on a temporary pilot basis.

Consultation has been carried out with:

- Highways Officers
- Leeds City Council Access Officer
- West Yorkshire Police

Site notices were posted onsite for 7 days to make all businesses and members of the public aware of renewal application proposals, with copies of the application and proposals made available for viewing, in line with Leeds City Council Policy, allowing anyone to comment.

These are also available on the City Centre Leeds website. No adverse comments have been received in relation to the applications.

Should an application be approved, and negative feedback be received once the street café is in place then all necessary actions required to resolve the situation would be taken, including suspension of the street café licence.

Key findings

Street Cafes add to the offering of a vibrant café culture by providing safe outdoor spaces for customers to enjoy, which is of particular benefit for disabled people and parents with young children, as this provision ensures that they do not have to negotiate steep steps / stairs that would otherwise be a potential barrier in accessing the services on offer.

Impacts identified from a street café on the highway are mitigated against by:

- Ensuring the street café area is located in a contained area surrounded by barriers. The barriers must have a lower tapping rail to help blind or visually impaired city centre users to navigate using a cane.
- Requiring adequate circulation space within the street café area that accounts for wheelchair users and pushchair users and people with mobility issues.
- Enforcing strict rules on public highway access that state minimum distances that must be left as pedestrian walkways, for pushchair and wheelchair users and for emergency vehicle access.
- Requiring at least 1/3 of the street café area is a designated non-smoking area which would be of particular benefit to children and people who have particular breathing issues.
- Requiring at least one highchair to be provided for use by children.
- Requiring that all street café furniture to be removed from the highway when not in use or when the street café is closed.
