Executive Summary

To advise the Licensing Sub Committee Members of an application for the certification of a number of films to be shown as part of the British Urban Film Festival, taking place at Everyman Cinema on 14th and 15th October 2023.

In this instance no advance screeners have been provided and the distributor recommends all films are awarded 18 certificates, subject to a declaration mentioned in further detail at 3.3 of this report.

1.0 Purpose of this Report

1.1 This report informs Members with the background, history and issues of an application made under the Licensing Act 2003 ("the Act") for the certification of a film that does not currently have a BBFC (British Board of Film Classification) certification. Finally, this report informs Members of the options available to them when considering an application for the certification of films.

2.0 Background Information

- 2.1 The Licensing Act 2003 applies to premises which provide film exhibitions. At present there are a total of 8 cinemas licensed in the Leeds district.
- 2.2 The majority of films shown in cinemas will carry a certificate from the BBFC, the categories of which are as follows:

Category U Universal. Suitable for all.

A U film should be suitable for audiences aged four years and over, although it is impossible to predict what might upset any particular child. U films should be set within a positive framework and should offer reassuring counterbalances to any violence, threat or horror.

Category PG Parental Guidance. General viewing, but some scenes may be unsuitable for young children.

A PG film should not unsettle a child aged around eight or older. Unaccompanied children of any age may watch, but parents are advised to consider whether the content may upset younger or more sensitive children.

Category 12A/12 Suitable for 12 years and over.

Films classified 12A and video works classified 12 contain material that is not generally suitable for children aged under 12. No one younger than 12 may see a 12A film in a cinema unless accompanied by an adult. Adults planning to take a child under 12 to view a 12A film should consider whether the film is suitable for that child. To help them decide, the BBFC recommend that thy check the ratings info for that film in advance. No one younger than 12 may rent or buy a 12 rated video work.

Category 15 Suitable only for 15 years and over.

No one younger than 15 may see a 15 film in a cinema. No one younger than 15 may rent of buy a 15 rated video work.

Category 18 Suitable only for adults.

No one younger than 18 may see an 18 film in a cinema. No one younger than 18 may rent of buy an 18 rated video work.

Category R18 To be shown only in specially licensed cinemas, or supplied only in licensed sex shops and to adults only.

The R18 category is a special and legally restricted classification primarily for explicit works of consenting sex or strong fetish material involving adults. Films may only be shown to adults in specially licensed cinemas, and video works may be supplied to adults only in licensed sex shops. R18 video works may not be supplied by mail order.

- 2.3 In addition to licensing premises for film exhibitions, the licensing authority has a duty under Section 20 of the Licensing Act 2003 to categorise a film which is absent of a certificate from a film classification body such as the BBFC. The licensing authority may also reject or modify a film which has received certification from the BBFC.
- 2.4 A copy of the current BBFC Classification Guidelines are available <u>here</u>.

3.0 Main Issues

- 3.1 An application has been received from the organiser of the British Urban Film Festival to certify a total of 14 films. The screenings are scheduled to take place on 14th and 15th October 2023, at Everyman Cinema, 412 Trinity Leeds, Albion Street, Leeds, LS1 5AY.
- 3.2 A list detailing the films requesting certification, including the titles and synopses, can be found at **Appendix A**.
- 3.3 The distributor has explained advance screeners are unavailable for each film requesting certification and, in such instances, the Committee are recommended to award an 18 rating to those films subject to a written declaration confirming that the films do not contain any content which would more likely than not, render them liable to be classified as R18 if considered in accordance with the BBFC Classification Guidelines.
- 3.5 The written declaration in accordance with the above can be seen at Appendix B.
- 3.6 A representative of the British Urban Film Festival will be available on the phone should Members of Licensing Sub Committee have any questions.

4.0 Implications for Council Policy and Governance

4.1 There are no implications for Council policy and governance in respect of determining this application.

5.0 Legal and Resource Implications

5.1 There is no right of appeal to the Magistrates Court against this decision of the Committee.

6.0 Recommendations

- 6.1 Members are requested to consider this request for the certification of the films as attached hereto.
- 6.2 Members are recommended to view films prior to the issue of a Certificate.

7.0 Options Available to Members

7.1 The Licensing Authority has the authority to categories a film which is absent of a Certificate from the BBFC.
