2. Please provide a brief description of what you are screening

Off-site highway works associated with a residential development at Old Lane, Drighlington, BD11 1LU.

The proposed works comprise:

- Alterations to footway on the north of Old Lane from Jubilee Croft to the existing bungalow to provide widened and resurfaced footway.
- Carriageway widening and realignment along Old Lane.
- New layby construction to provide parking opposite No. 7-11 Old Lane.
- 2m footway construction on Old Lane from the existing bungalow along the entire site frontage to the northeast
- Vehicle crossings at site frontage to provide driveways to new dwellings

- accessed via Old Lane.
- Dropped pedestrian crossings and tactile paving at various locations between the site access and Whitehall Road.
- New area of footway to be dedicated as adopted highway as shown shaded blue on Land Dedication Plan 21-430 EW24 P03.
- All associated civils works including (inter alia) signs, lighting, road markings and drainage.
- Any Statutory undertakers works resulting from the works described above.

The proposals will contribute to improved access for the new residential development. The works will provide widened footways and informal pedestrian crossings points between the site and Whitehall Road. Dropped kerbs and tactile paving are provided at crossing points. This will be beneficial to those with visual and mobility impairments, as well as elderly and pregnant people.

Street lighting alterations and improvements along Old Lane will provide a safer walking route for people who may feel vulnerable due to their sexual orientation or gender.

The provision of formalised on-street parking along Old Lane would have a positive impact on people who rely on a car, including disabled people.

Key findings

The designs put forward take into account the needs of each of the equality characteristics and will aim to meet Section 278 (4) states that "A highway authority shall not enter into an agreement under this section unless they are satisfied that it will be of benefit to the public.

The proposed works have considered the user hierarchy set out in the Adopted Transport SPD by providing widened footways and pedestrian crossing facilities with dropped kerbs and tactile paving. This benefits those with visual and mobility impairments, as well as elderly and pregnant people.

The carriageway along Old Lane is being widened which will provide more room for

cyclists and free up footways for pedestrians with mobility impairments.

Street lighting alterations and improvements along Old Lane will make people with gender reassignment and those who may feel vulnerable due to their sexual orientation or gender feel safer when walking along Old Lane.

The proposed works involve reducing the width of the footway on the southern side of Old Lane to achieve 2m footway and carriageway depending on the northern side. This could impact on people with mobility impairments however a 2m width is retained which meets current guidance.

Other protected characteristics have been picked up through the considerations above.

Actions

- Junction design that slows down traffic entering and exiting and prioritises
 pedestrians (e.g. Copenhagen style crossings, minimising radii, providing a central

- Provision of appropriate crossing facilities
- Provision of dropped kerbs and tactile paving
- Considering use by cyclists to minimise riding on footways
