2. Please provide a brief description of what you are screening
a) The Chief Officer, Climate Energy and Green Spaces approves the direct award of a new contract under Regulation 32(2) (c) of the Public Contracts Regulations 2015 (PCR) for

the Pilot Phase of ash dieback mitigation to Tilhill Forestry Limited (Tilhill).

- b) The contract will commence on 1st November 2024 and shall expire on 31st March 2026.
- contract value is £440,000.00, inclusive of 10% contingency for any additional sums. Tilhill will be up to £440,000.00, to deliver the management of ash dieback including the ground proofing surveys to confirm accuracy of current data, bat roosting surveys, technical advice about the length of highway to be sectioned for traffic management and the type of traffic management required for each section, the felling of 539 trees with most advanced ash dieback symptoms, plus replanting and establishment management of the trees to comply with Felling Licence Agreement, but also to contribute to the delivery of city targets for climate change and zero carbon.

This is the 'Pilot Phase' of the City's planned approach to the risks posed to people or property due to tree failure caused by the tree fungal disease *Hymenoscyphus fraxineus*, more commonly referred to as ash dieback.

This Pilot Phase will address the highest identified risks adjacent to Leeds A and B roads. The direct award is being made to a specialist company who meet the required specification and the tight timeframes. This Pilot Phase has been created to facilitate shared learning and up skilling when using remote mapping tools that allow on site editing and Inputting of data linked to the Council' ArcGIS Ash Dieback Analysis Dashboard.

Following this Pilot Phase, it is intended that a larger Ash Dieback mitigation contract will be tendered on the open market.

Actions

A detailed Ash Dieback Communications Strategy has been developed to inform all sections of our community of the impact that ash dieback will have on the City's ash trees and why we must remove the worst affected trees that are located in high usage areas – this Pilot Phase focuses on trees within falling distance of A and b roads (Strategic Highway) and which pose risks of harm to highway users and property.

Each tree that is removed will be replaced by the planting of 5 new trees. This is to ensure that as the new trees become established and begin to mature, we benefit from a net gain in tree canopy cover and all of the benefits that this brings.
