Friday Night Flop	"Tracy-Ann Oberman plays a mother losing touch with her daughter in an age of digital distraction. But a turn of events sparks a new beginning.	12A 15	 Vulnerable teenager, disengaged, playing online poker, arguing with her mother and talking about professional poker players. Playing poker with family on the Sabbath, and Rabbi joins in. Bets for participation at Shul. Celebration when child wins. Child brings poker to Sunday school. No actual monetary betting, so not illegal activity, but normalises online gambling, gambling for benefits, and introducing teenagers to gambling. No reference to gambling in BBFC guidelines. No other concerns other than normalisation of gambling and specifically viewing poker and online poker as a way of socialising. Suggest 15 more appropriate due to local concerns about children and gambling -contact made with the promotor and they have agreed with a 15 rating.
Our Neighbour's Ass	A widow, played by Dame Maureen Lipman, left with the responsibility of caring for her late husband's donkey, comes up against her neighbours' frustrations as the donkey becomes a local nuisance.	12A	No concerns with 12A Certification.

-	he erformance	Adapted from an Arthur Miller short story, Shira Piven's stylish and darkly beguiling film follows an American tap-dancing troupe struggling to make ends meet, on a tour of Europe in 1937. The leader, Harold May (Jeremy Piven), accepts a lucrative invitation for the group to perform in Nazi Berlin. It turns out that the star guest in the audience is Adolf Hitler who loves the show and insists they should stay in Germany. At first May tries to conceal his Jewishness, but eventually reveals his identity in an effort to escape an even worse fate. A timely reminder of the dangers of group-think and self- deception.
