Outer South Community Committee – Update Report

Purpose of report

- To bring to members' attention an update of the work which the Communities Team is engaged in, based on priorities identified by the Community Committee. It also provides opportunities for further questioning, or to request a more detailed report on a particular issue.
- 2. This report provides regular updates on some of the key activities between Community Committee meetings and functions delegated to Community Committees, Community Champions roles, community engagement, partnership and locality working.

Main issues

Updates by theme:

Children and Families: Councillor Wyn Kidger

- 3. Consultation took place with the Morley Cluster Council on plans for the upcoming Youth Summit at their meeting on Thursday 24th October 2024. They loved and agreed with the layout, timings and activities on the day and will be attending the Youth Summit on Thursday 21st November 2024.
- 4. The Youth Summit took place on Thursday 21st November there was 100+ young people from 13 schools across the Outer South. The event was very well attended and enjoyed by all the young people and teachers from the schools, and as always, the hosts received positive feedback.

5. On arrival the young people had the opportunity to meet and have their pictures taken with the Lord Mayor of Leeds Cllr Abgail Marshall Katung and the Mayor of Morley Cllr Simon Brown. The was opening by Cllr Wyn Kidger the Outer South children's champion. There was a presentation on how the council works, Councillors, wards and the Lord Mayor, followed by a presentation on Democracy and the various way young people can be a representative across the city. Following a short break there was a carousel of activities which included splitting off into 4 groups who in turn visited the Mayor of Morley in his Mayors parlour, then the council offices, a Q&A session with local ward Councillors, a heritage tour of Morley Town Hall and a lunch break. The groups then came altogether back in the Alexandra Hall to do a shopping game activity that shows young people both the value of money and how hard it is to make a decision for the whole of the ward areas choosing which project they would fund with a limited amount of money. Young people could also design an activity and filled out a Youth Activity Consultation which helps guide Cllrs on what young people want in their local areas. The event was then closed by the chair of the Outer South Community Committee Cllr Stephen Holroyd and a certificate of attendance was presented to each young by the Children's champion and the chair of the Outer South Community Committee.

9. Description of above codes:

- S_FLYT: Fly tipping that has been collected proactively or reported to us which doesn't contain evidence, and no further actions can be taken.
- E_FLYT: Fly tipping found/reported which contains evidence and some further action is taken by Enforcement.
- S_LITR: Reports to service about litter issues
- S_ROAD: Reports to service about streets requiring sweeping.
- H_OVEG: Reports to service of issues relating to overgrown vegetation affecting the Highway.
- E_WIG: Reports to service about Waste in gardens.
- S_SCBC: Scheduled Civic/ Bulky Collections (free waste collections from households)
- 10. The above figures have been taken over a 3-month period and the figures have been included from the last quarters reports side by side, so it is easier to see any increase or decrease in demand for service in particular areas in each Ward.
- 11. Once again, there has been a large uptake in requests for free Bulky/Civic collections throughout the Outer South. There has also been a very slight increase in reports of illegal deposits of waste in the areas.
- 12. Reports of Waste in gardens have increased ever so slightly however due to the seasons there has been a significant decrease in reports of overgrown vegetation in the area as a whole.
- 13. As you are all aware the de-leafing season has started for the teams and once again the team has decided to utilise their resources as they have done in previous years due to the successes that have been seen.
- 14. CNT have had a few issues with regards staffing and vehicles to be utilised throughout the south due to sickness and mechanical failures but overall I believe the crews have been able to work through this and the areas have not seen any negative impact on the services that the team have been providing.

Local Anti-Social Behaviour Team Update November 2024

- 15. LASBT officers are working a mixture of remote, community work and office based. ASB Awareness week is the week commencing 18th November.
- 16. ASB Drop in sessions have been set up across the ward areas the next sessions are on:
 - Rothwell Hub- 4/12/24 at 11am to 1pm
 - Morley Hub- 21/11/24 at 1pm till 3pm
- 17. At the time of this report 44 Cases across the ward areas (increase of 4)

Ardsley & Robin Hood

19. A Partial Closure has been applied for to deal with nuisance bikes and associated anti-social behaviour this is causing for residents. The hate related case is associated with one of the verbal cases, this is a neighbour dispute that escalated over noise nuisance.

Morley North

20. A Partial Closure was obtained to protect a vulnerable tenant from cuckooing, whilst the closure order is in place multi agency meetings are continuing to devise a long term plan to protect the tenant. LASBT are considering Partial Closure Orders on two other properties where there is intelligence to suggest cuckooing.

Morley South

- 21.LASBT have applied for Possession of a Leeds City Council Property for criminality and assault of emergency workers. A Closure Order was obtained due to a property being used for taking drugs. As a result of the Closure Order the tenant signed over the property and is no longer a council tenant.
- 22. LASBT obtained a warrant to enter a property to remove all equipment that could make amplified noise, the seizure was successful and there have been no further complaints of noise regarding this property since.

Rothwell

23. Notice of Intent to Seek Possession (NISP) served for criminality. Possession to be sought on another tenancy due to very serious offence were accused now in prison. An Action day to be carried out around Rothwell Morrisons on the 7th November.

To target youth-related anti-social behaviour throughout Morley North

40. NPT are aware of reports via councillors of an increase in ASB, however have not received any calls, the team require assistance from the public to assist in letting them know when ASB is occurring so that Officers can deal with it. Once Identified NPT will work closely with partners in Youth Service Provisions, to engage with young people, to direct them into available diversionary activities. In addition, officers will liaise with Leeds City Council Anti-Social Behaviour Team, to review and act against those repeatedly involved in anti-social behaviour.

Update

- 41. NPT have recently identified a number of these individuals who have been plaguing the area with ASB whilst also committing several other offences. They have been dealt with where several charges and court dates were received, officers will be looking to utilise their power to request Criminal Behaviour Orders (CBO's) on these individuals to prevent it happening in the future,
- 42. To promote Road Safety relating to the anti-social use of cars and motor bikes in the area.
- 43. This will be done by Conducting Road Safety Operations with partners at Operational Support and DVLA and VOSA using legislation to tackle Anti-social driving.
- 44. NPT continue to conduct speeding operations where advice, further training and tickets are given out, there has been a reduction in calls to service for this, officers will continue to monitor moving forward.
- 45. To prevent and deter theft of motor vehicles and theft from vehicles in the area.
- 46. Due to recent increase in theft of motor vehicles special attention is being paid in identifying and targeting known offenders, whilst also paying regular passing attention to known hotspots.
- 47. NPT continue to hear a number of these offences have occurred through partners and partner agencies however their systems do not reflect this, the team request if any offence occurs be that big or small, please make them aware as it may fit into a bigger picture. Example of a positive result recently is where the team have managed to find over 3000 power tools in a lock up, stolen from vehicles.
- 48. Regular patrols are conducted in the area, however if you do see any ongoing ASB/criminality please do contact the police via 999/101 or through a web report and officers can deal with it positively.

- 55. NPT will engage with retailers to offer crime prevention advice.

To engage with nuisance youths, particularly targeting those engaged in Anti-Social Behaviour within the local parks.

56. NPT will use conduct high visibility and covert patrols and were proportionate use Anti-Social Behaviour Legislation, such as dispersal orders if necessary. NPT will continue to work in partnership with Leeds Anti-Social Behaviour Team (LASBT) to engage positively with those in the parks.

- 63. To continue to disrupt ASB and engage with youths causing ASB in and around Commercial Street, Rothwell, the town centre. NPT will continue use ASB legislation where necessary to disrupt this behaviour and look to engage with partners to find a long-term solution.
- 64. NPT seek to target and reduce ASB around Tesco express and Beechwood shops.
- 65. Deter ASB on off road and other motor bikes along the Rothwell Greenway, links to issues on the Northfields estate on the Ardsley Rothwell boarder.

Updates August Priorities

- 66. NPT encourage the public to report this behaviour when they see it via 101 / online reports it is only the reporting of these matter that will allow us to map times dates and locations and best deploy resources to the right place and time or seek to obtain other resources from other departments.
- 67. NPT have worked with partners in Leeds ASB team and housing and taken initial action against a number of youths and the team have seen a decrease in calls to town centre and local shops.
- 68. NPT are working with stores and partners to identify the youths involved in asb in the town centre, some have already been given community resolutions and ASB warnings by ASB team. The team are continuing this work.
- 69. NPT have arranged a community contact point once a month with their engagement van an officer's being present to speak to the public, take reports and gather information to help us best tackle the issues

Employment, Skills & Welfare: Cllr Karen Renshaw

Employment and Skills

Total number claiming Universal Credit (UC)

70. The Employment and Skills team send an update twice a year and as they updated at the last meeting, the update will come to the next meeting.

Health and Wellbeing: Councillor Stewart Golton

- 71. The Health and Wellbeing Sub Group met on Friday 1st November 2024 at 1pm this was an online meeting. Prioritises were confirmed and gone through for the year.
- 72. Feedback was given on the Winter wellbeing event that took place at Morley Town Hall on Wednesday 30th October 2024.

Public Health Update

Health and Wellbeing update November 2024

Illegal money lending and Loan Shark activity

- 73. Stop Loan Sharks (the England Illegal Money Lending Team) is a national organisation that investigates and prosecutes loan sharks and supports borrowers. It works with partner organisations across the country to do this, including local authorities, healthcare providers, charities, debt advisors and many more.
- 74. The IMLT was set up in 2004. Since then it has supported over 32,000 people, successfully prosecuted 424 loan sharks (leading to total jail terms of over 606 years) and written off at least £91.3 million of illegal debt.
- 75. Of those supported by the IMLT in the first half of 2024:
 - 42% went without food, fuel or missed rent or mortgage payments in order to repay the loan shark
 - 26% had used a food bank and 11% had applied for fuel vouchers from their local authority
 - 37% borrowed for household bills
 - 27% had borrowed specifically for food, fuel, care of young children or clothing for their family a larger number of clients than in previous years.
- 76. In these scenarios, borrowers are likely to be experiencing poor physical and mental health.
- 77. The IMLT's work in the Leeds area in recent months has seen two suspected loan sharks arrested. The team has also received additional allegations of loan sharks operating across the city.

Local Care Partnership (LCP) Dashboard

- 79. **Please see Appendix 2** the LCP dashboard giving details of the current priorities and areas of focus within the Local Care Partnerships. The plan is to refresh and circulate this quarterly. LCP will also be introducing a series of Teams sessions, similar to the Introduction to LCPs session, to give an overview of current activity, share some more detailed examples of what is happening and answer any questions.
- 80. The dashboard aims to spotlight specific projects that are currently being shaped or implemented in different Local Care Partnerships. Each Local Care Partnership also has regular meetings that are aimed at supporting partners to share local activity and

build connections, therefore the topics covered in an LCP meeting could be much more wide ranging than those listed on the dashboard.

Community Mental Health Transformation: citywide rollout

- 81. Community mental health care in Leeds is changing, with all areas of the city set to benefit from early next year. A new model of care and support has been piloted in three areas of Leeds, and original plans had been to extend this further in two distinct waves. But this has now changed, and from February 2025, parts of the new model will roll out citywide.
- 82. This means that all areas of Leeds will start to be served by new community teams made up of people from different health, social and voluntary sector organisations. Initial changes will focus on how these teams work together, how patients are triaged, and securing advice and guidance on psychological therapies. Over time, keyworkers will also be introduced so that everyone has a named contact to help them on their journey. Cold weather communications

- 83. On 1 November, the Cold-Health Alerting system jointly provided by UKHSA and Met Office will go live. As with previous years, stakeholders are advised to sign up to receive the alerts. - 92. While smoking rates have declined in recent years, over 5 million people in England still smoke and smoking remains the single biggest preventable cause of preventable ill health and death. Data shows that using willpower alone remains the most common approach to quitting smoking, despite being proven to be the least effective and so this campaign signposts people to the free Leeds Stop Smoking Service. Key messages are:
 - With the average smoker spending nearly £3,000 a year on cigarettes, there's never been a better time to quit.
 - Cigarettes are the number one preventable cause of death and disease in the UK. When you stop the many health benefits will happen faster than you think.
 - It's never too late to stop smoking, and with the right support you're up to three times more likely to quit for good.
