Executive Summary

This report provides Members of the Area Committee with an overview of the performance of the North East Divisional Community Safety Partnership and ward based Neighbourhood Policing Teams. It will also include details of the key initiatives that have been delivered in local communities to reduce crime and disorder. The report focuses upon the period 1st April 2010 to 31st March 2011.

Recommendations

The Area Committee is asked to note the contents of this report of the North East Divisional Community Safety Partnership.

Members are asked to continue supporting the Divisional Community Safety Partnership in relation to prioritising and tackling Burglary Dwelling during 2011/12 through partnership work at neighbourhood level.

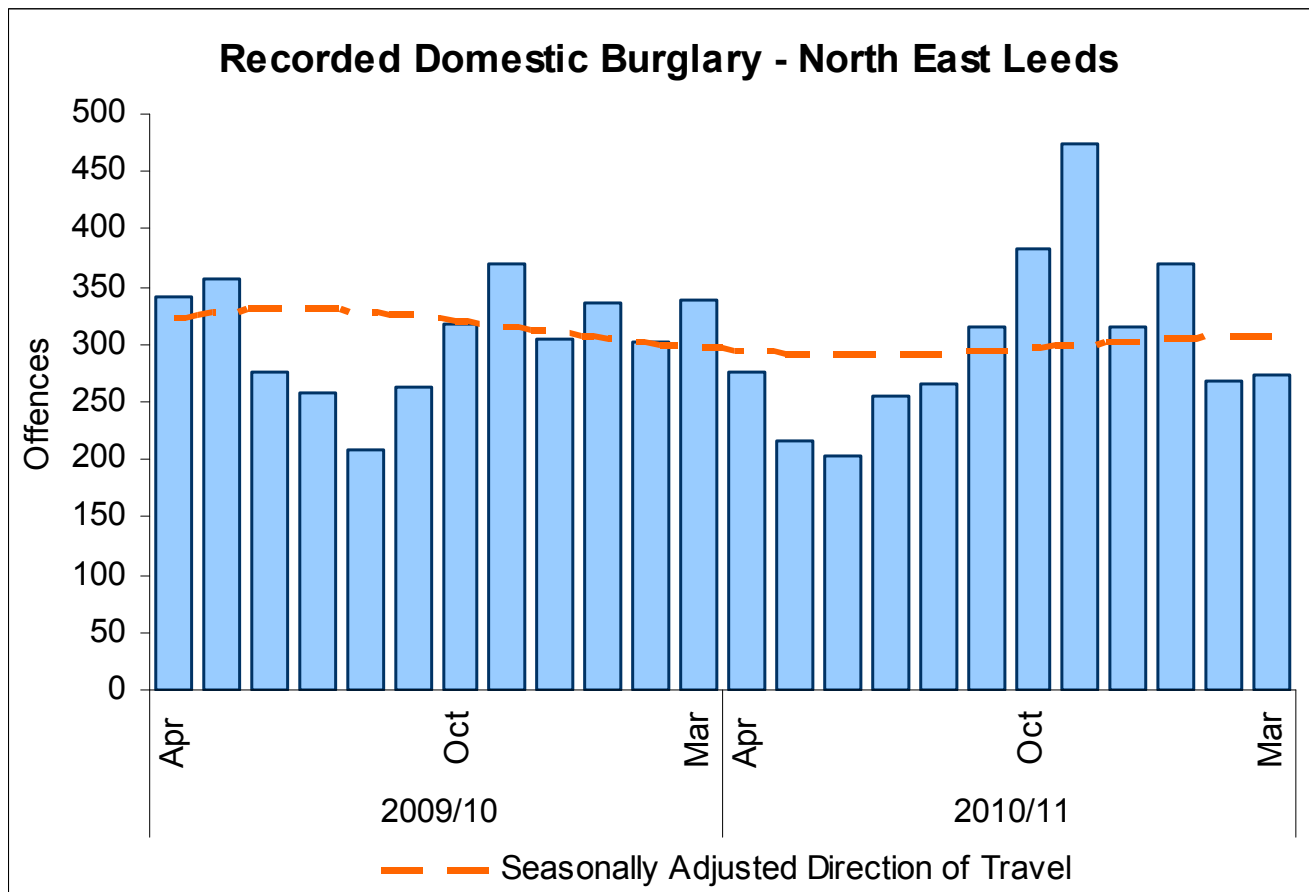
Purpose of this report

1. The report will focus on the following key issues:

Main issues

Update on the structure of the North East Police Divisional Community Safety Partnership and Neighbourhood Management Tasking Arrangements

2. The Divisional Community Safety Partnership (DCSP) Strategic Plan 2011-2015 is currently in development and will be the framework upon which the DCSP will develop activity and management performance against strategic outcomes of the city, defined by The Safer and Stronger Communities Board Partnership plan 2011-2015 which will focus on delivering the following strategic priorities:
 - Reducing crime levels and its impact across Leeds
 - Effectively Tackle and Reduce Anti-social behaviour in our Communities
3. We are currently awaiting ratification of the Safer Leeds performance targets and performance framework for 2011/12.
4. Attached is a brief of the final Divisional targets (2010/11) based on actual outturns and Divisional Targets set for 2011/12 (see Appendix A).
5. Burglary Dwelling remains a key pressure in relation to allocation of resources both staffing and financial. Tackling burglary dwelling remains a key priority within the Division and across the whole of Leeds, we are working closely with Safer Leeds Strategic burglary group to maximise opportunities for closer working and sharing good practise and continue to deliver initiatives at a local neighbourhood level. Although we missed our divisional target by 357 offences we still achieved a 1.6% reduction on 2009/10 despite high peaks in October, November and January (see chart on next page).



6. Attached is an updated structure chart for the North East Divisional Community Safety Partnership (see Appendix B) with details of the relevant lead officers. The structure will be reviewed to ensure delivery against new priorities.
7. A review took place in September to discuss multi-agency operations 'Operation Champion' across neighbourhoods and how it would be delivered during 2011. It was agreed to continue delivering a minimum of one day of action per Neighbourhood Policing Team per six weekly tasking cycle, the themed approach has proved successful and has led to more focussed targeting of issues /areas. A timetable has been produced for 2011. Please note that on occasions these dates may change due to operational demands or unforeseen circumstances.

POCA

8. Following the success of the project during 2009/10, the North East Division allocated a total of £39,639 funding confiscated from criminals under the Proceeds of Crime Act to the Divisional Community Safety Partnership during 2010/11 to continue to support local groups with community projects/activities. In total, across the whole division, we approved and funded 124 applications and spent £38,677. We have received numerous emails showing appreciation and thanks for support. Information regarding the awards continue to be advertised in the neighbourhood management / Neighbourhood Policing Team newsletters and on the police Neighbourhood Policing Team websites. We will be continuing the scheme into 2011/12 and have received funding for the first quarter of the year. Appendix C provides a summary of projects funded in the Inner North East area.

Public Confidence and Satisfaction

9. North East Leeds continues to have the highest Public Confidence in Local Policing during 2010/11 at 60.3 % (March 2011) compared with the West Yorkshire force average of 52.3%. The RAM neighbourhood policing team has the second highest rate across Neighbourhood Policing Teams in the division followed by Chapel Allerton.
10. Operation Confidence commenced in February 2009 and is a contributing factor to the high rates of public confidence. The North East Division produces 11 neighbourhood management newsletters detailing partnership activity around crime and grime within the Neighbourhood Policing Team and delivers to 128,000 households. Feedback from residents continues to be positive and illustrates they are pleased to be kept informed around crime and grime issues. Funding has been secured for 2011 and contributions have been agreed by North East Police Division, East North East Homes, Aire Valley Homes and Safer Leeds Partnership.

Neighbourhood Management Tasking Key Achievements 2010/11

11. The eleven neighbourhood management tasking teams continue to meet six weekly and are still firmly embedded into agencies day to day business and members continue to attend and support meetings.
12. This is not an exhaustive list of activities but includes key achievements from each of the neighbourhood management tasking teams within the inner north east area (data extracted from Divisional Community Safety Partnerships executive quarterly highlight reports).
13. **Chapel Allerton**
 - Multi agency street survey of Riviera Gardens to ID burglary `pinch points` done. Action agreed and carried out to examine street lighting, hedge cutting, and vulnerability of properties. All addresses visited in crime prevention scheme involving CASAC and arrangements made to target harden properties and plans launched to establish a neighbourhood watch. Key arrest made of suspect, burglaries have now come to a stop on this street. Alleygating of ginnels leading off to Riviera Gardens and St Martins Gardens.
 - Wardens and PCSO`s completed street surveys in Chapel Allerton area identified as having suffered historic vehicle crime issues. Flyers posted to all addresses including crime prevention advice. A visual audit of vulnerable vehicles and approx 30 vehicles identified leading to follow up warning letters posted by the Police.
 - Operation Bewisker. Multi agency operation to target a key cohort of ASB offenders in Miles Hill area. Evidence gathered jointly by housing ASBU and Police leading to 13 ASBO referrals. A lot of work done to gather evidence by leaflet / survey and cold calling. Still awaiting ASBU legal advice on ASBOs / Injunction / Tenancy action. Temporary external CCTV cameras installed at parade of shops helping to prevent re-offending.
 - Criminal damage and ASB – The Granges. On-going issue with youths gathering causing damage and ASB in a small area of Granges / Nassau Place. 3 arrests made, ASB warnings served to all 3. Extra patrols and action plan agreed involving ASBU door knocks, LCC anonymous survey, headcam work by PCSO'S and LCC looking to arrange outreach work to divert young people.

- Burglary Operation - Methleys. Operation Champion. Police/Housing/Wardens visit 240 houses handing out advice on burglary and leaflets to encourage information to Police. Crime prevention equipment installed in scores of houses leading to calls to police with intelligence leading to arrest of suspect. Another suspect later arrested as a result of work by NPT staff.
- Beckhill Grove - Arson attacked premises. Fire Service conduct re-visit offering fire protection equipment.
- Burglaries in Woodlands - Following an increase in offending in the area, Police increase patrols including extended tours and night shifts. Suspects routinely visited as part of attrition work gathering evidence. Suspect eventually arrested based on clothing descriptions. Charged and sent back to prison.
- Avenue Hill - needle deposition. Church premises identified as congregating point for drug users. LCC arranged for clear up work by probation and approach Church re demolition of structure in grounds used by users.
- 3 x bolt on -ASBO's submitted. Operation Bewhisker in Meanwood area for persistent offenders (pending Court approval).
- 2 x vehicle crime audits in Chapel Allerton.
- Planning towards bonfire night distraction events, multi agency planning leading to Bonfire Night Extravaganza.
- Target hardening by Fire Service at an address on Harehills Avenue with reference to domestic issues.
- Multi agency operations in relation to damages in Granges. Anti social behaviours warnings, visual audit, target hardening , perpetrator visits, community contact point established. Questionnaires delivered leading to useful intelligence gathered. Operation Champion in this area had led to a reduction in calls and damage reports.
- Nuisance motor bikes on Miles Hills - Several vehicles seized following enforcement campaign. S59 warnings issued.
- Needle clean up at Avenue Hill.
- Operation Gotcha on Mexborough Avenue following increase in burglaries. Insecure premises identified and residents notified.
- Numerous repeat calls for service locations tackled via ward anti social behaviour group (aligned to Ward Tasking).
- Crime Reduction Roadshows.
- 24 July - Safety awareness and crime prevention day Savile Park. 25 July Safety awareness and security day Carr Mills student accommodation. 9 September Operation Champion – Granges. 25 September - Student Safety Awareness Carr Mills Students Complex.
- Speeding vehicles on Gledhow Lane and surrounding area. Police Community safety officers have been out with the SID machine monitoring speeding, and traffic units have also been out monitoring speeding vehicles.
- Operation Blockade - directed patrol and high visibility work with reassurance visits in anti social behaviour and damage hotspots based on crime pattern analysis. Daily patrols across hotspots across the ward.
- Avenue Hill – derelict property cleared of vegetation, branches and grass to reduce issues of drug taking and prostitution in this area.
- Spencer Place – Probation completed cutting back of vegetation at the base of trees.
- Chapeltown Road – Probation painted the street furniture and weeded and tided the planters.
- 5 clean up operations completed in Beckhill estate with significant improvement in local area.

- Clearing of the Bandstand Allotments started in September 2010 following concern from local residents.
- Bonfire Night Activities – The team coordinated a series of interventions to try and reduce issues relating to dangerous use of fireworks on Bonfire Night. This included two multi agency clean ups in the Granges and Hamiltons area in the run up to bonfire night to remove waste and rubble (LCC Environmental Action Team, Community Payback, East North East Homes and Streetscene) and one post bonfire clean up to remove the waste from the nights events (Streetscene). Letters to all house holders telling them to move their bins inside their properties. leaflets were distributed advising of the danger of fireworks and how to report illegal sales. Visits to shop keepers and spot checks to all shops to ensure they are legally allowed to sell fireworks and reminding them of legal ages. Identifying additional youth provision over 4th and 5th November to distract young people away from causing trouble during this period (Youth Service and IYSS). While not a total success the night took place with significantly less trouble compared to last year so there was significant improvements.
- Operation Bewhisker – a series of multi agency operations and information gathering in the Meanwood area has resulted in an increase in public confidence (evidenced by an increase in calls for service) but has also resulted in three out of four of the main ring leaders becoming subject to bolt on ASBO orders which will exclude them from the Miles Hill area where they are causing significant noise, damage, intimidation and are linked to burglary and other acquisitive crimes.
- Clearance of the Hindu Temple site, Chapel Road, Chapeltown – reports and complaints from local residents coupled with an inspection of the site identified a significant amount of fly tipping, needle deposition and overgrown vegetation. The works undertaken were to have the land swept for needles by Streetscene and then the vegetation and trees cleared from the site by Probation to improve the visibility and hopefully deter users from returning. The site was inspected and legal notice prepared but once the owners were contacted they agreed to utilise the skips and clear the fly tipping themselves.
- Meanwood information folders/burglary reduction and annual tenancy visits – to increase the uptake in services within notably the Beckhill and Miles Hill areas the local Children's Centre, East North East Homes, Anti social behaviour unit, Networks Cluster and West Yorkshire Police all completed a door knock of target streets to complete East North East Homes annual tenancy visits, deliver the 'My Meanwood' folder with local service information to residents and increase take up and to offer free target hardening devices to properties in this area which traditionally suffers significantly during dark nights.
- ASB - a raft of multi-agency initiatives to improve community engagement e.g. neighbourhood surveys on Operation Champion have led to an increase in intelligence led interventions including two FITs, three notices of intention to seek possessions served.
- Licensing activity - a number of licensing operations run in the first quarter have included working with the local Pub Watch scheme to conduct searches of local premises with drugs dogs during opening hours leading to an increased number of seizures; and test purchasing operations on off-licensed premises have led to direct enforcement action in areas where underage drinking links to ASB had been identified.
- Neighbourhood Crime Prevention - engagement with local residents has led to the launch of new 'No Cold-Calling Zone's in Chapel Allerton.
- Very successful Operation Champion in Scott Halls area on 18th March where six skips were sited and filled alongside a significant contribution with LCC

Environmental Action Teams and East North East Homes estate caretakers and Streetscene.

- The shops on Sholebroke Mount were cleaned out and works are being developed to improve the shops alongside probation service Community Payback, ENEHL and LCC Properties Team.
- The site of the former Mobil petrol station on Chapeltown Road has been the result of a prosecution under section 215 of the Town and Country planning act and improvements to this site is considered imminent.
- The needle drop sites continue to be targeted with Avenue Hill and the Frederick Hurdle Centre both being looked at on a regular basis until long term solutions to the issues can be found.

14. **Roundhay & Moortown**

- Operation Bellwether - burglary reduction ongoing. Including trembler and smartwater distribution. To end June RAM 144 less burglaries than this time last year. Overall crime under target.
- Operation Binary - action plan to tackle Stonegates ASB. Site visit completed with partners. Unpaid Work to commence work on estate.
- Operation Champions June - Gledhow Towers/Lincombe Drive
- Licensing operations - Op Brunette 28/5/2010 - Arrests at Roundhay Pub possession drugs with intent to supply. Test purchase operations ongoing - 26/6/2010 seven on license premises visited .
- Vehicle Crime operation - increase in TFMV at end of June 37 over last years figures. PCSO's complete street surveys identifying vulnerable vehicles and alerting owners.
- 1 July 2010 – 30 September 2010 Partnership tasking meetings continue to be effective and link in to monthly PACT meetings in the three wards.
- Ongoing work on Operation Binary - ASB reductions in Stonegate estate including improvements in quality of life issues utilising Community Payback.
- Operation Bellwether - burglary reduction operation across RAM. PCSO revisits to burglary victims and utilising tremblers . We stand at 88 burglaries less than same period last year.
- Offender management utilising partner activity - for example tenancy enforcement. Eviction on West Parks which forms part of reducing ASB action plan.
- Operation Champion – 10 February in Roundhay Ward
- We have conducted crime reduction roadshows at Sainsbury Moor Allerton Centre, Tesco's Roundhay Road, and Waitrose Meanwood. This has included offering security screws to secure registration plates which are being stolen in some offences.
- In terms of Anti social behaviour the partnership has met with Youth Services in Alwoodley and Moortown to co-ordinate our approach to an increase in street robbery. We are running Operation Burst which will focus on Anti social behaviour hotspots on a Friday and Saturday evening.

Thematic Sub Groups and Activities

14. **Miles Hills Ginnel** - Funding application taken to East North East Homes Community Panel for fencing, bid was successful and matched by ward members. The fencing has now been installed.

15. **Beckhills** - An alleygating order is currently been pursued for six gates, £17k has been secured via Inner North East Area Committee and match funded with East North East Homes Community Panel. We are currently awaiting planning permission.

Cold Calling Zones

16. Four new zones have been completed in the RAM neighbourhood policing area covering approx 1700 households in partnership with Trading Standards during December 2010. the streets covered are as follows: Fitzroy Drive, Oakwell Crescent, St Margarets View, Oakwell Avenue, Oakwell Mount, Queenshill Approach, Queenshill Close, Queenshill Court, Queenshill Drive, Queenshill Lawn, Queenshill Avenue, Queenshill Gardens, Queenshill View, Queenshill Road, Queensill Walk and Gledhow Lane.
17. 17 new streets have become 'No Cold Calling Areas' in the Chapel Allerton Neighbourhood Policing Team area, covering approx 600 households and were implemented in partnership with Trading standards during March 2011. Streets covered - King George Avenue, Gledhow Park Drive, Ontario Place, Toronto Place, Montreal Avenue, Dominion Avenue, Alberta Avenue, Alaska Place, Vancouver Place, Edmonton Place, Regina Drive, Gledhow Court, Gledhow Park Crescent, Manitoba Place, Calgary Place, Ottawa Place, Gledhow Park Road. An official launch is currently been planned for June 2011 with Trading standards.

Chapel Allerton Burglary Action Plan – Meanwood

18. As a result of intelligence produced by the Divisional Intelligence Unit it was agreed to concentrate on the Meanwood area of the ward. An action plan has been devised and focuses on the victim, location and offender. One day of multi agency action will be delivered every 2 weeks targeting the top 25 streets, the plan commenced on the 7th April 2011 and will continue until 10th August 2011. £10K has been allocated by the North East Division for target hardening appropriate to specific Modus Operandi.

Most Active / Amber Nominals / Offender Management Burglary Pilot

19. Pilot commenced with regards to the offender management of known burglars. 20 nominals have been selected by the North East Division for the duration of the pilot. The group consists of Youth Offending Service, Probation, Housing, newly established anti-social behaviour unit and West Yorkshire Police. The group will identify where partnership work can be improved to ensure opportunities for closer working and management of offenders are maximised.

Media Campaign - Handling / Receiving Stolen Goods

20. A marketing design has been produced 'Don't sit on the fence', the design has now been ratified by Crime stoppers and West Yorkshire Police marketing department. The campaign was launched during April 2011 following a city wide operation around specific targeting of second hand gold shops suspected of handling or receiving stolen goods.

Gang Prevention Strategy – Chapeltown

21. The Gang prevention strategy group continues to focus on the three strands of community engagement / cohesion, diversionary youth working / education and enforcement and offender management. At the end of March 2011 a report has been produced by Safer Leeds to give an overview of the change in trends of crime over a two year period in the Chapeltown area since the partnership was formed. One of the most significant findings illustrated that the number of recorded drugs offences overall (including young persons)decreased by over half with reductions in both Class A and Class B offences. A total of 53 recorded in 2010 compared with 193 during 2009 equating to a 73% reduction. A significant amount of effort and commitment has been illustrated by both statutory and voluntary sector youth providers to engage young people in positive activities and deter young people from criminality. However as a result of pro-active enforcement action carried out by the Police and partner agencies through projects like Operation Quartz has continued to successfully prevent the emergence of gun and gang related problems experienced elsewhere in the United Kingdom. Police operations to keep drug and associated issues out of the area have been conducted as part of planned integrated offender management tactics to prevent and deter criminality and to rehabilitate and resettle ex-offenders. Information from the Chapeltown community has enabled enforcement teams to seize the proceeds of crime and reinvest these in local projects in the area thereby raising the quality of life and making Chapeltown a safer place to live. In total we have recovered drugs in excess of £700k (street value), £90k in cash and over £170k in criminal property in 2010/11 as a result of tackling local criminals.

Test Purchasing / Licensing Enforcement

22. The area committee contributed towards additional test purchase in the RAM neighbourhood Policing Team following the success of Operation Buzzer. Since June last year 9 test purchases have been carried out on 'off licensed' premises resulting in only two fails and 9 test purchases on 'on licensed' premises resulting in just one fail.
23. The premises that failed were reviewed and requested to attend an action planning meeting and will be subject to further test purchases. Recent emphasis has been around tackling illegal drugs use in licensed premises and links to criminality. The Drugs Dog has been deployed in RAM neighbourhood policing team and neighbouring wards, to send out a clear message to the 'on' trade also. As a result of these operations persons have been arrested for possession of controlled drugs and possession with intent to supply. One licensed premises has been taken to review and lost its premises licence on appeal at Magistrates Court (The Streets of Leeds).
24. The neighbourhood Policing Team in conjunction with Leeds City Council and West Yorkshire Police Licensing, have 'merged' three pub watch schemes bringing them together for the North Leeds area. This pub watch is doing well and support is being provided to help the trade 'help themselves' in addressing issues in licensed premises.

Hate Crime MARAC

25. Co-ordinated multi agency working is recognised as the most effective response to all issues of crime and disorder, including agency responses to the victims and perpetrators of hate crime. The Hate Crime sub group was re-organised in April 2010 and become a Hate Crime Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conference (HC MARAC). The overall objectives of the group is to:
- Support and assist victims of hate crime in order to protect them and ensure that they are not re-victimised.
 - Ensure that effective co-ordinated multi agency enforcement action is taken against perpetrators of hate crime to prevent their re-offending and to ensure successful prosecution outcomes at Court.
 - Contribute to the “Hate crime reduction agenda in Leeds”.
26. Overall the Inner North East area has shown a decrease of 3.03% of hate crimes reported, and this equates to a reduction of 2 crimes - a total of 64 crimes reported compared to 66 during 09/10.

Domestic Violence MARAC

27. The North East Divisional MARAC continues to meet monthly to develop multi-agency interventions to support victims of domestic violence. Overall a very successful year in relation to reduction of repeat victimisation of cases managed through the MARAC.

North East Domestic Violence Sub Group

28. Several meetings have took place at Carr Manor High School with the Head Teacher and teaching staff around domestic violence and positive relationships between students. The school have agreed to pilot a domestic violence campaign. The pilot will be jointly delivered by Safer Leeds and the PCT. The aim of the work in Carr Manor is to develop a whole school approach. To date we have written 2 articles for the school magazine ‘Coaching Chronicles’ to raise awareness of the work we will be doing in school. We have also run a poster competition, inviting students to design their own poster to promote the campaign. The winning design has been made into posters and flyers to be displayed in school and distributed to students. A presentation has been delivered to approximately 80 staff and further training sessions will be held with those who have a particular interest in the issue and want to be involved in the campaign as trainers and mentors. A DV sub-group of the student council has been established and focus groups are being held with them to discuss their views on how to engage with other students and the best ways to run the campaign. Further development meetings are taking place this month with a view to rolling out a programme in classrooms in the new academic year.

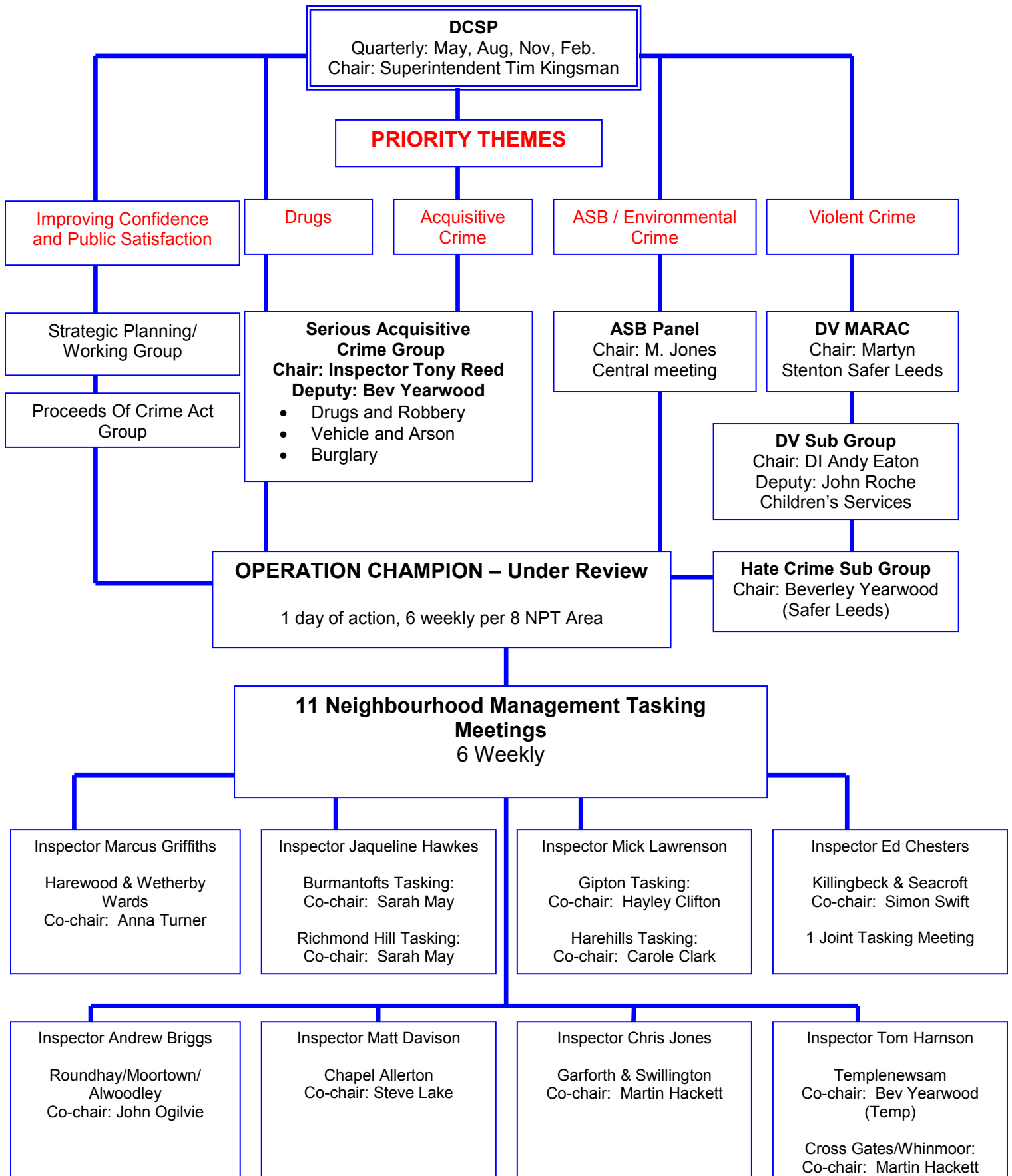
