

Matters Arising from Last Meeting : 27 October 2011

6. Open Forum	Hyde Park & Woodhouse Forum: Concern was raised that there had been no Hyde Park & Woodhouse Forum held recently. Plans are currently underway to hold forum meetings in the ward. Area Management to speak to Hyde Park and Woodhouse members to progress with these plans.	Area Management	A meeting of Hyde Park & Woodhouse forum was held on 22 nd November and Key Messages are included within the Area Update report.
6. Open Forum	Child Poverty and Health Inequalities: Concern was raised over the high rate of child poverty within some wards of Inner North West. A request had been made previously to Tim Taylor requesting that the Area Committee consider a report on health statistics highlighting areas of health deprivation. This report should now also consider the impact of child poverty. The report is scheduled to be brought to the December meeting.	Tim Taylor	Tim Taylor has passed the request on for a report on Health Inequalities to come to Inner North West Area Committee and for this to contain details on child poverty. Recently released JSNA data will form the basis of a report to the February round of Area Committees. A child poverty needs assessment for Leeds has been recently undertaken. Tim Taylor is waiting for confirmation that the data from this work can be broken down to Area Committee boundaries. A request has been made for this information to be presented in a report to a future Area Committee Meeting. Additional information is given below.
6. Open Forum	Cycle Routes: Concern was raised regarding cycle routes within the area. Firstly, the signage for the new designated cycle route is confusing where it crosses Hyde Park Road at the junction of Brudenell Road. Secondly, concern was raised about the loss of the marked cycle lane on the A65, particularly in the Beacroft Street area, due to the ongoing works on the Quality Bus Initiative. The Chair agreed to write to Highways raising a range of concerns expressed at the meeting.	Cllr Akhtar	A Letter has been sent and we are awaiting a response.
6. Open Forum	Transport Sub Group: Members requested an update on plans to offer support for the Transport Sub Group directly from Highways. Cllr Walshaw agreed to address some of the Transport issues through the existing Planning Sub Group. Concerns were raised that this would have a negative impact on existing work of the Planning Sub Group. Area Management to chase a response from Highways.	Area Management	Chris Dickinson has asked for a response from Highways and they are currently considering in what way they can support the Transport Sub Group.

9. Area Update	Bridge Road Planning Application: Councillor Illingworth submitted a resolution asking Plans Panel West to delay its decision on the Bridge Road planning application at Kirkstall, to give further time for consultation and negotiation. The Area Committee supported this resolution and the Chair agreed to write to the chair of the panel making this request.	Cllr Akhtar	A Letter was sent and Plans Panel (West) agreed to delegate the decision pending further investigation of the issues raised. This would come back to Plans Panel (West) if necessary.
9. Area Update	Former Royal Park School: Asset Management had provided an update on developments in relation to the sale of Royal Park School. This explained that it was not possible to progress with a community asset transfer as had been provisionally agreed. The report outlined a range of other possible options for the site. The Area Committee expressed support for the option of transferring the building to RPCC and the Chair agreed to write to the Leader of Council making this request.	Cllr Akhtar	A Letter was sent and following a response from the Leader of the Council, the Executive Board Member has offered to meet with the Area Committee Chair to discuss issues within City Development.
11. Parks & Countryside	Woodhouse Moor Park Patrols: The committee recognised the success of the BBQ patrols on Woodhouse Moor however, concern was raised at what would happen if funding was not available through the Area Wellbeing Budget for 2012/13. Given the large numbers of visitors that Woodhouse Moor receives each year and the unique nature of the BBQ issue it faces, Parks & Countryside were asked to explore the possibility of funding this service from other sources.	Parks & Countryside	The continuation of the BBQ patrols on Woodhouse Moor are to be raised as part of broader discussions that are currently taking place between Parks & Countryside and Safer Leeds regarding a recent petition around Woodhouse Moor.
11. Parks & Countryside	Volunteering In Parks: The committee noted the success of volunteering work within local parks. However, it was noted that this may be improved further through fostering links with the Volunteer Centre. Parks & Countryside were asked to make contact to see what assistance they could give.	Parks & Countryside	Parks & Countryside have made contact with the Volunteer Centre.
13. Localism Bill and Neighbourhood Planning	Neighbourhood Planning Pilot: The committee noted the content of the report on the Localism Bill but raised concern how the pilot areas for Neighbourhood Planning had overlooked the Inner North West despite its previous work on a range of supplementary planning guidance. In light of the report to Executive Board the Chair agreed to write to both the Chief Planning Officer and the Leader of Council to ask how pilot areas had been determined and to highlight the INW areas capacity and need to undertake this type of work.	Cllr Akhtar	A Letter was sent and following a response from the Leader of the Council, the Executive Board Member has offered to meet with the Area Committee Chair to discuss issues within City Development.
14. Area	West Park Centre:	Cllr Akhtar	A Letter was sent and following a

Business Plan	Concern was raised that the consultation period over the future of the West Park Centre had not been held over a long enough period. The committee also expressed support for the retention of the West Park Centre as a council facility. Cllr Akhtar	A response to the Chair's letter was received from the Head of Waste Management which recognised the issues with refuse collection within the more densely populated areas of Inner North West. The Service agreed to take on board the committee's suggestions and proposed to meet with Elected Members to discuss the issue further. This meeting is currently being arranged.

Health and Wellbeing Additional Information

NHS Leeds, Bradford and Airedale and Leeds City Council have worked together on content for area committee profiles. **The process is being led by Public Health in NHS Leeds, Bradford and Airedale. They indicate that the data will be available in the New Year and for February Area Committees.** Each profile has:

- A detailed map of the area and a reference map of Leeds
- Information about different sections of the population
- A neighbourhood index – this summarises information on employment, education, health, safety, the environment and housing for the area and shows how it compares to other areas and Leeds as a whole
- GP registered prevalence of people with cancer, heart disease and lung disease (chronic obstructive pulmonary disease)
- GP reported prevalence of smoking and obesity
- Rates of admission at A&E and admission to hospital (including admission for alcohol related harm)
- Death rates
- Data on adult social care provision and referrals
- Data on the safeguarding of vulnerable adults
- A summary of the types of households and likely present or future health problems, using Acorn segmentation
- A map of health and care facilities such as GP surgeries and care homes

These profiles combine information and analysis from both organisations in new ways. They also make new use of patient data collected by local GPs to give us fresh insights into the needs of people living in each area.
