Approximately 50,000 young people attend the event in July each year at Temple Newsam
Currently the tickets for the event are evenly distributed across the city, with some added weighting for postcodes around Temple Newsam. Ticket allocation is random within these weightings.
We work with Children's social care to distribute up to 2000 tickets to the most vulnerable of young people.
A consultation was carried out by Radio Aire the Council partners on views about the event which included the concept of charging and this has been used to inform the decision making.
This proposal will impact on Young people who wish to attend the event. It will have most impact on those in low or no income families and those whose parents or carers are not willing to support their attendance.

8. Positive and negative impact

8a. Positive impact:

Currently we charge for Opera and Classical Fantasia and there is a perception that by not charging for Party in the Park we are positively discriminating young people. Up to this point the arrangements with the record companies have not enabled charging but this is changing and so charging can now be considered.

Due to the level of demand, the distribution of tickets in the last two years has been limited to Leeds Taxpayers postcodes only. There is a potential that demand from this clientele will fall allowing the event to be opened out to others. This will reduce the criticism the city has received.

8b. Negative impact:

The introduction of charging has the potential to impact on those who do not have the funding, or access to the funding to attend. It will also cause some people who, while they could afford to attend, are against the introduction of a charge.

Opening the event broader than Leeds postcodes may make demand for limited tickets even higher than the current position making it difficult for Leeds residents to secure tickets.

The impact will be greatest on those who are already most vulnerable.

Action required:

Have a reduced rate ticket for Breezecard holders and implement the same concessions for adults as for other charged for events.

Could an adult with a disability get free tickets for himself partner and children, even if child is not in the category of the 3000 tickets below?

Ensure that in the first phase of ticket distribution they are equally spread across all postcodes In the city. This would also require a release of tickets initially to Leeds residents for a limited time period after which they go on general release.

Increase the number of tickets distributed free to the most vulnerable young people to 3,000 and more clearly define the criteria eg looked after children and those with disabilities.
